Fiday evening at the Harvard Business School Teach In against Racism, Jonathan Kozol made it clear it was time for concerned citizens to speak out if we hope to prevent devastating defeat to the progress in race relations achieved in the 1960's. So I have to speak out in utter dismay at what I find in Boston today. After an absence of three years I return to find Boston the most racist city in the country. This is appalling! Where is the Boston that produced William Lloyd Garrison and Wendell Phillips who fired the spark for abolition? What became of the Boston that raised a monument to Crispus Attucks -- the first American to die in the Revolution?

Parents of South Boston - is the talk in your homes filled with racism and hatred? If it is - as surely as night follows day - it will erupt in stabbings and rioting amongst your children on the school play-ground. You are creating the very atmosphere that endangers your child.

As a Cantabridgian with Irish blood in my veins, let me quote from an Irish edator who wrote for "The Pilot" in the 1880's . He believed in the American Dream. Speaking before a black gathering in Boston, John Boyle O'Reilly championed the Negro:

"No man ever came into the world with so grand an opportunity as the American Negro. He has all the qualities that fit him to be a good Christian citizen of any country. "Again:

"If my children were not allowed into Northern schools - if I myself were not allowed into Northern Hotels - I would change my party and my politics every day until I changed and wiped out that outrage."

Would that some of our Irish Boston politcians of today would have this faith in blacks and grant them justice and fair play.

For shame, Boston, for shame! You are denying your own great heritage.
