

RESOLUTION: Opposing Violence Related To Quality Education Concerning Bussing

The Board of Directors of The Cooper Community Center, 719 Shawmut Avenue, composed of people, black and white from within and without the Roxbury area, has unanimously voted to state that; it is their deep belief that violence and disobedience of the law makes, above everyone else, the children the injured parties. We in this country can not afford to have the childrens' point of view and attitude to their companions wounded. We can not afford to generate hatred in any child regardless of color or age.

We recognize the right to protest, even by demonstrations, laws that are enacted. But this action must be taken without violence, scurrilous language or outright disobedience to the law.

We plead on behalf of what our country stands for to exert all influence to prevent the generation of hatred among our people with special awareness of the harm we do to children by such hatred-generation.

The Board also expresses pride in its staff members who have actively participated within the troubled area to quiet violence and insure children of our community a safe and quality education.
