Incidents, long forgotten, are more vividly recalled by picture than by pen.




The High School

The Cameron Aggies started the season with a two weeks' session of summer training in the Wichita Mountains during late August. At the opening of the official season the boys were all in good shape and fell into the early work with a hearty cooperation that was pleasing to Coach Bill Huff.

The first game, a non-conference one, was with the Southwestern Bulldogs at Weatherford. The Aggies held the Bulldogs to a 9-0 score, showing little difference between the Junior College and the Senior College teams.

The strong Oklahoma City University eleven were the next opponents for the fighting Aggies. The score up to the fourth quarter was 12-6 in favor of the Goldbugs, the Aggies scoring on a long pass to Ward who ran about twenty yards for the counter. In this stage of the game the Aggies' first string men were nearly all taken out on account of injuries. Due to the limited supply of men, the remainder of the game was all in favor of the Goldbugs. Hi Wolf, gigantic right guard, Toby Waggoner, tackle, Vern Page, midget All-State center, and Frank Ward, the galloping ghost, showed in this game the stuff that, later in

the conference games, made them feared by all Aggie opponents.

The first Conference game was with the Oklahoma Military Academy Cadets of Claremore, who were champions in 1928. The game was played on the home gridiron and was viewed by the largest crowd of the year, being the occasion of the Annual College homecoming. The Aggies steamrolled their traditional foes to the score of 18-0.

Randolph College Loboes of Cisco, Texas were next on the Aggie schedule. The extreme heat of the southern climate proved to be a great handicap, and the Texans won, 26-13.

At Goodwell, Cameron faced the Panhandle Aggies, another fourvear college. The Cameron Aggies were the first to score on a long pass to Sargent, elusive right half-back who twisted and wiggled over the line. The goal was kicked and Cameron led, 7-0. The Panhandle Aggies came back strong in the last period of the game and made a touchdown but failed to kick goal. 


Track Prospects







The Forensic Society, under the leadership of Dean King, a Phi Kappa Delta debater and orator, holds an active place in the spring activities at Cameron.



Among other reforms, the "O" Club successfully instituted the "No High School Letter" ruling on the campus.







The team averaged about one hundred and seventy-five pounds, and several backfield men were in the ten-second class as speed merchants.





