

MARV MOTLEY, MOST VALUABLE PLAYER

This is the third undefeated football season for coach Jim Stangeland at Long Beach in the past five years. The Vikings' five-year record is a fantastic 44-3-1, including three post-season bowl wins, 38-16 over Tyler, Tex., in the 1960 Junior Rose Bowl; 66-8 over Contra Costa in the 1962 Potato Bowl; and 48-15 over Mt. San Antonio in last year's Elks Bowl.

The current Viking varsity is full of record breakers, particularly Marv Motley, Greg Barton and Ron Drake. Motley gained 300 yards in a single game against El Camino, breaking the mark of 262 by Dee Andrews in 1961. Barton completed a record 83 passes in 145 attempts for a record 57.2 percentage. Drake caught 39 passes to smash the record 32 by Bill Raine in 1950.

Six members of the Metropolitan Conference champion Viking team were named to the all-conference team, with Motley being selected as conference player-of-the-year. The other honored Vikings include end Drake and guard Fred Convertini on the offensive team and tackle Mike Westphal, guard Tom Ammirato and back Pat Cashman on the defensive unit.

An athlete of note in Long Beach's defensive backfield is Earl McCullouch, who established new national interscholastic records in both the 120 high and 180 low hurdles last year at Long Beach Poly. McCullouch's records are 13.7 and 18.1.



FRED CHEEK, SCORED 134 POINTS

This is the third Junior Rose Bowl game for the Cameron Aggies. In 1947, in the highest scoring game in JRB history, Cameron lost to Chaffey, 39-26. In 1961, the Aggies, led by Joe Don Looney and Bill Harper, upset an undefeated Bakersfield eleven, 28-20, in a real thriller.

Many observers in Lawton, Okla., rate the current Aggie varsity the equal or better than the 1961 club that won the national championship. Lester (Bear) Jensen, in his first year as head coach at Cameron after a long and successful career at Claremore High School, welded together a team which averaged 46.7 points in rolling over nine opponents that included the best in Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Nebraska, Colorado and Kansas. The Aggies' backfield includes Fred Cheek, the nation's leading JC scorer with 134 points (16 touchdowns and 38 extra point kicks) and Vernon Moore, a transfer from Oklahoma State who missed the opening game but still garnered 988 yards rushing and 10 touchdowns.

Coach Jensen, who compiled a 105-35-6 record in 13 years of high school coaching, was an all-Big Six guard as a freshman at U. of Oklahoma in 1946, before transferring to East Central.





#### LONG BEACH CITY COLLEGE

in Long Beach in 1913 and the establishment of Long Beach Junior College in 1927. Reorganized as Long Beach City College in 1944, the school is now responsible for all posthigh school education in the Long Beach Unified School District, which includes the cities of Lakewood, Signal Hill and Avalon (Catalina Island), in addition to Long Beach, a city of around 370,000.


Beach City College campuses, the Liberal Arts campus in northeast Long Beach, and the Business and Technology campus across town on Pacific Coast Highway. Students from both locations are equally eligible to compete on athletic teams. Outstanding facilities on the Liberal Arts campus are the relatively new library, auditorium, radiomusic, art and science buildings. Notable recent additions to the Pacific Coast Highway campus include industrial shops, modern electronics and materials testing laboratories, and a data-processing laboratory containing more than \$100,000 worth of special equipment.

The college also offers evening classes, which have an enrollment of 9,000, while an additional 10,000 adult students are enrolled in one or more classes at the various Long Beach CC Adult Centers. Though total enrollment at LBCC approaches 26,000, only the 7,000 full-time students are eligible for participation on Viking athletic teams.

Dr. Wiley D. Garner, president of Long Beach City College, assumed his present post in August of this year, succeeding Dr. George E. Dotson. A member of the LBCC staff since 1946, Dr. Garner has previously served as dean of the college's adult education program and as an associate dean on both the Liberal Arts and the Business and Technology campuses. He is currently serving a term as president of the California Association of Adult Education Administrators.







The history of Cameron State Agricultural College corresponds to the history of the territory which it serves. Early day residents of southwestern Oklahoma

in their city. Cameron State School of Agriculture, named for E. D. Cameron, then state superintendent of schools,



vigorously demanded and supported plans for equalizing educational opportunities for their children. Since high schools, few in number, were often located in remote areas, many students desiring higher education were denied the opportunity because of the lack of facilities and economic factors. The history of Cameron reflects this pioneer desire.

When the state of Oklahoma planned six district agricultural schools in 1908 it was provided that no less than 80 acres of land would be donated at no cost to the state for each school site. The businessmen of Lawton immediately purchased 160 acres for a state school opened in 1909 with a faculty of six and a student body of 108. The school became a junior college in 1927, at which time the name of Cameron State Agricultural College was adopted.

Under the direction of Dr. Richard B. Burch, Cameron in 1961 was accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities. In the five years Dr. Burch has been president, Cameron's physical size has doubled and enrollment has increased 25 percent. Before coming to Cameron, Dr. Burch earned his Bachelor of Science degree at East Central State College in Ada, Okla., and both his Masters and Doctorate degrees in education at the University of Oklahoma. During the present year, in addition to his duties as president of Cameron College, he is serving as Grand Commander of the Masonic Lodge of the state of Oklahoma.

Lawton, site of Cameron College, is the third largest city in Oklahoma, with a population of 108,000, and is the home of Fort Sill, the U.S. Army Artillery and Missile Center, which was designated as a National Historical Landmark last year.

The past year the Keathley Rifles won four competitions and lost none. They outpointed both the U. of Oklahoma and the Oklahoma Military Academy drill teams.

# JUNIOR ROSE BOWL GAME

**GOT ITS START** 





AT THE BEGINNING — These four men were instrumental in creating the Junior Rose Bowl game in 1946. Here, shown as they got together on the 10th anniversary of the game in 1955, are Bill Schroeder, P. H. "Pus" Halbriter, Myron Thomas and Walter Hoefflin. Hoefflin is Grand Marshal of today's parade and game, and also president of the Tournament of Roses Association.

The idea of the Junior Rose Bowl game was born in the mind of the late Myron Thomas in 1946, when he was president of the Pasadena Junior Chamber of Commerce. Thomas was so confident of his idea that he appointed a fellow Junior Chamber member, Walter Hoefflin, to be chairman of the dream. Hoefflin, who this year is president of the Tournament of Roses Association and Grand Marshal of the Junior Rose Bowl parade and game,

worked day and night creating reality out of Thomas' dream. He soon realized that outside help, particularly in promotion and finances, were needed. The two young Pasadenans contacted Bill Schroeder, then, as now, managing director of the Helms Athletic Foundation, and P. H. "Pus" Halbriter, head of the Signal Oil Company's Youth Foundation. Schroeder served as chairman of the game's first Board of Management, composed of a group of Southern California newspapermen. To insure the success of the venture, a budget of \$40,000 was required, and this amount was underwritten by the Signal Youth Foundation, thanks to the efforts of Halbriter. Two outstanding teams, Compton and Kilgore, Texas, were chosen to play on Saturday, December 7, 1946, and the promotion was on its way. Heavy rains the week preceding the game threatened to wipe out the work of Thomas, Hoefflin, Schroeder and Halbriter, but on the morning of the game the sun shone

brightly and 43,000 curious fans turned out for the first Junior Rose Bowl game.

Compton and Kilgore put on an exciting game, won by the Californians, 19-0, and the future success of the game was assured. Both rival quarterbacks in that inaugural game, Bev Wallace of Compton and Adrian Burk of Kilgore, went on to play many years in the National Football League.

#### SEE THEM FIRST IN JUNIOR ROSE BOWL

Players from past Junior Rose Bowl games can be found in the front ranks of college and professional teams throughout the country. Ever since 1946, when Adrian Burk and Bev Wallace went from the Junior Rose Bowl inaugural to become pro quarterbacks, the "alumni" of JRB games has grown.

Hugh McElhenny, the great halfback for University of Washington and San Francisco 49ers, was introduced to Junior Rose Bowl fans with Compton in 1948. "The King," as Hustlin' Hugh is known, is one of pro football's elder statesmen now, but he still picks up yardage for the Detroit Lions.

Ray Willsey, coach of the University of California, was the quarterback on Santa Ana's 1949 team. The Boise QB in 1950 was a hard throwing right hander named Larry Jackson, who won 24 games last year for the Chicago Cubs. A 12-year veteran of pro football, punting specialist Don Chandler of the New York Giants, played in the 1952 Junior Rose Bowl game with the Bacone Indians. Another pro "alum" is Earl Leggett, one of the Chicago Bears' front four defensive linemen, who played with Hinds in 1954. From the 1955 game

Charlie McNeil went on to become an all-American Football League defensive halfback with the San Diego Chargers.

Vern Burke, who was player-of-the-year with Bakersfield in 1959, went to Oregon State, where he set a national collegiate pass reception record in 1962. Joe Don Looney, who played an important part in Cameron's 28-20 upset win over Bakersfield in 1961, was one of the naton's top backs a year later at U. of Oklahoma and then was the first draft choice of the New York Giants, who have since traded him to the Baltimore Colts. Playing against Looney in the 1961 game was Ernie Pye, outstanding linebacker of the past several USC teams.

A number of players from the 1962 and 1963 games were prominent in this year's college play. Dunn Marteen, player-of-the-game and Santa Ana quarterback in '62, led Los Angeles State to the first undefeated season in the school's history. His rival JRB quarterback, Columbia Basin's Mike Monahan, had a fine year at U. of Idaho, where his teammate and captain was Dick Litzinger, who also captained Santa Ana's JRB eleven. Santa Ana defensive back Wylie Carlyle earned allconference honors at Whittier. Andy Sixkiller, 1963 Northeastern Oklahoma A&M back, was a defensive star at Miami (Fla.) this fall, while Orange Coast end Gary Carr starred at U. of Washington.








