Institutional award to be presented Oct. 1 in OKC

Cameron to be honored by aviation hall

A noted group of Oklahoma pioneers will be recognized later this year for contributions to the state's aviation industry and Cameron University will be among those honored.

The Oklahoma Aviation and Space Hall of Fame will present Cameron an institutional award Oct. 1 during a ceremony at the Omniplex in Oklahoma City. The event provides an opportunity to promote public interest in aerospace education and development, as well as showcase outstanding achievements, said Don Finch, Deputy Executive Director of the Kirkpatrick Science and Air Space Museum.

"We believe that induction into the hall is a significant honor," Finch said. "Past recipients include Oklahomans who made lasting contributions to the development of aviation, space exploration or the aerospace industry."

Cameron will be honored for its involvement in the Clarence E. Page Endowed Chair. The C.E. Page Foundation established the chair in July 1992 to explore innovative ways to teach science and math to elementary students. The

endowment has allowed Cameron to develop and conduct an annual space camp for teachers and students, as well as develop curriculum for gifted, disadvantaged and Native American

Dr. William James, a professor in Cameron's education department, serves as the chair of the program.

This year's ceremony will mark the dedication of the aviation hall to the memory of Oklahoma flier Wiley Post in the centennial year of his birth. In


Heralding the Millenium

Six retirees honored for service to Cameron

Cameron University bade farewell to six members of its faculty during the school's 1998 Commencement May 9.

The combined service of the six educators at Cameron totaled more than 110 years — leaving a large void for the university to fill.

Honored during the ceremony were Dr. Jan Karasz, with the technology department; Dr. Dick George in math; Dr. Don Chenoweth in politics, sociology and criminal justice; Walter Tallent in nursing; and Dr. Wanda Stephens and Jean Michener from the business department.

Each of the retirees was presented an engraved sterling silver bowl by CU President Don Davis.

Michener retired last fall, while the remainder announced their retirements at the conclusion of the spring semester.

Karasz was an assistant professor in Cameron's technology department, holding degrees from Southwest Missouri State University, Missouri University and the University of Oklahoma. She also held an associates degree in technology from Cameron.

Karasz advised Cameron's chapter of the Data Processing Management Association, served as a member and chair of the Cameron Faculty Council and served on the state committee for Faculty Chairs. She was selected for inclusion in *Who's Who Among Ameri*can Teachers twice and worked with a

She joined Cameron in 1975, teaching electrical and data processing courses.

After retirement, she plans to travel, develop skills in drawing and watercolor and "just enjoy life."

George, professor and chairman of the math sciences department, holds degrees from Oklahoma State and Duke.

He joined Cameron in 1985 after teaching at North Carolina State University, UNC-Charlotte, Trinity University and Georgia College. He taught college algebra, calculus, differential equations, mathematical statistics and real analysis at Cameron.

He plans to return to Edmond as an adjunct professor at local universities,

Chenoweth, an assistant professor of Politics, Sociology and Criminal Justice, holds degrees from the University of Minnesota, Indiana University and St. Louis University.

His academic and professional activities include membership in the Political Science Honor Society at St. Louis University, Phi Alpha Theta and the Southwest Association for Canadian Studies. He served as president of the Rocky Mountain Association of Slavic Studies and was listed in *Best Teachers in America*.

Cameron's Internet website and two of its publications were recognized during scholastic and public relations competitions held this past spring.

CU's website and alumni newsletter were winners in the Oklahoma College Public Relations Association's 1998 awards competition, held annually to recognize excellence in college-related advertising, photography, literature, promotional materials and development of new ideas.

The Wichita was picked for the organization's All-Oklahoman honor, and received the OIPA's sweepstakes award for top college magazine. It was the second straight year the publication has garnered this award.

Individually, several Cameron students were recognized for their work, bringing home six first-place awards, four seconds and two thirds.

Longtime Aggies coach Red Miller dead

Noted Oklahoma high school and college basketball coach Raymond "Red" Miller died June 30 in a Lawton hospital. He was 76.

A native of Cooperton, Okla., Miller began his coaching career at Rocky High School. He spent 16 years at the Washita County school as a teacher, coach and administrator before coming to Lawton.

Miller joined the Cameron faculty in 1965 and became the Aggies' head coach in 1966.

He coached at Oklahoma Baptist University for three years before returning to Cameron, where his Aggies took the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference championship in 1973 and again in 1974.

The '74 squad went to the NAIA National Tournament.

He retired from coaching after the 1977 season, but remained at Cameron as a teacher and school sports information director.

He was inducted into the Oklahoma Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1980.

After leaving Cameron in 1985, Miller was active in civic affairs, serving two terms on the Lawton City Council.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth, and one son.

Aggies head north to start volleyball season

Last year Cameron's volleyball team experienced one of its best years in school history. The squad jumped out to a 9-1 start and was ranked as high as fifth regionally, the lone loss coming to nationally ranked Southern Colorado.

The team finished 19-9, qualified for the Lone Star Conference Tournament and ranked seventh regionally. Junior setter Luz Fernandez and sophomore outside hitter Shawna Sears were named to the North Division All-LSC first team, while senior outside hitter Shelly Urban and freshman outside hitter Lora Spencer earned second-team honors.

But that was last year and this is a new season.

"We're excited about this season," said head coach Kim Vinson. "We feel good about recruiting; we're excited about the four players we've signed and two more prospects we are talking with. I think the mix of

recruits and returning players will enable us to pick up where we left off last season."

A few things will be different for the Aggies this season as Southeastern Oklahoma begins volleyball play and Cameron joins a new Southwest Region after belonging to the South Central region since it joined the NCAA.

Although the new region is smaller now — 30 schools, compared to 46 in the old region — the competition will be tougher. In the final poll before the national tournament, six teams ranked in the Top 25 nationally and another six teams ranked in the final regional polls. Fifth-ranked West Texas A&M went to the tourney, winning the national championship.

"I really think this new region will be one of the top two in the country," said Vinson. "It will certainly be more competitive with more nationally ranked teams and teams which were ranked regionally last year. We have our work cut out for us." In the current NCAA volleyball system, as with many other sports, only the top regionally ranked teams qualify for post-season play. Conference winners get no automatic bids, although conference performance is considered. The new region consists only of the Lone Star Conference and the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

The Lone Star Conference race will be another source of entertainment. With Southeastern Oklahoma adding volley-ball, both the north and south divisions have seven teams. The north division should have plenty of fireworks with Texas Woman's University, University of Central Oklahoma and Cameron competing for a title.

"The LSC should be very interesting this year," said Vinson. "In the north TWU, UCO and Cameron all had some fierce battles last season, which made for good rivalries. I fully expect to have battles again this year. Texas A&M-Commerce will also be much

when they travel to a four-way event hosted by the University of Alaska-Anchorage Aug. 27-29. Missouri's Truman State and Cal-Dominguez Hills round out the field.

improved.'

In 1997, CU had one of its toughest schedules in school history. This coming season may be even tougher, with the added regional competition and the improvement of the LSC.

"We've added some LSC south division opponents to the schedule. They won't count toward our conference record, but they will be very competitive matches," said Vinson. "We've also added some opponents from the Heart of Texas Conference—teams which are currently in the transition to NCAA Division II from the NAIA. But they're also perennially nationally ranked teams, so I think our schedule may be a little tougher than last year."

The Aggies will be gunning for their fourth consecutive winning season in 1998. With the added competition, volley-ball should be as exciting as ever and should again jump-start the school year for Cameron.

Former Cameron VP dead at age 80

Retired Maj. Gen. Charles Pershing Brown, who was the first native Oklahoman to command Fort Sill and served as a Cameron vice president, died June 29.

Brown's 35-year military career took him around the globe -- including service in World War II and Vietnam.

He received Cameron University's Distinguished Service Award and was inducted into the Oklahoma Heritage Association Hall of Fame in 1986.

Brown, 80, earned his bachelors degree from OU in 1940. He earned an MBA from New York University and graduated from the Army War College and the Command and General Staff College. He was an ROTC cadet colonel and Distinguished Military Graduate.

He was stationed at Fort Sill when he assumed command of the 694th Field Artillery, taking the unit into Pacific Theater combat in World War II.

He returned to Fort Sill in 1957 as chief of the Resident Instruction Division. He assumed command of the 214th Artillery Group and then the 52nd Artillery Group before leaving to spend three years at the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Military Operations.

Seventy-one new members were added during the drive.


he was assistant division commander of the 1st Cavalry Division in Korea. He returned to Fort Sill in 1964 to become assistant commandant of the Artillery and Missile School.

He later joined Headquarters, U.S. Continental Army, at Fort Monroe, Va., as deputy chief of staff, comptroller. He was promoted to major general in July 1966 and moved to Washington, where he was named director of the Army Budget.

He came back to Fort Sill as commanding general in July 1967 and stayed here until being assigned to the First Field Force in Vietnam in 1970. He participated in three major campaigns in Vietnam.

In 1971 he served as senior military adviser to the personal representative of the president at the US-Vietnam peace negotiations.

Brown retired from the Army in July 1975 and joined Cameron as its development officer. He became a special assistant to the president in 1981, and in 1982 his duties were changed to give him direct supervision over the business office, physical facilities, university relations and athletics. He was named

Vice President of University Operations in 1982 and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1987.

After his retirement from Cameron, he served as chairman of the Fort Sill Retiree Officers Council and was on Lawton Chamber of Commerce's board of directors and its military affairs, Cameron and retiree affairs committees. Brown also served the Southwest Oklahoma Chapter of the Association of the Army, the Armed Services YMCA, and the Home Savings and Loan Association.



Lending a helping hand

Research project benefits Lawton-based cosmetics industry

Cameron University is one of the first higher ed institutions in the state to receive funding from the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology through a new research grant program, a move that will directly benefit one Southwest Oklahoma industry.

Cameron was among three recipients of grants awarded through the Oklahoma Applied Research Support Intern Partnership Funding Competition. Cameron will receive more than \$23,300 over a two-year period to develop procedures for analyzing aloe vera-based cosmetics.

To be eligible for funding, colleges and universities were required to develop a research and development project which utilized an intern shared between the institution and a private firm, and held potential significance for business and industry. Carl Albert State College and the University of Central Oklahoma also received grants.

Cameron's partner is Lawton's Cosmetic Specialty Labs, Inc. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently passed stringent regulations mandating the monitoring of various ingredients present in cosmetics produced by the company. These regulations require Cosmetic Specialty Labs to immediately formulate a plan to monitor the concentration of chemicals used in its products.

While procedures already exist to monitor these components in their pure form, the analysis of mixtures used in complex

AST worked with Cameron's criminal justice department and the Lawton Police Department to develop the CD-based interactive program called the "Law Enforcement Training System, Academic Series."

The program contains 18 different training scenarios, including such situations as operation of emergency vehicles, the use of force, investigating sex crimes and handling domestic situations.

The program promotes critical thinking by officers and students and contains elements officers would be forced to face in a real-world situation, without the real dangers.

The computer-based program is among AST's first commercial endeavors and breaks new ground in the field of law enforcement education and training. The effort not only affects Southwest Oklahoma and North Texas law enforcement agencies, but has implications nationwide.

During the May 15 demonstration, Cameron was recognized for its assistance and support for development of the program.

Cameron Today is published quarterly by Cameron University under the authorization of President Don Davis. 3,000 copies have been prepared for Alumni Relations and Information Services by Cameron Printing Services at a cost of \$0.14/copy. Cameron University is an equal opportunity institution.

cosmetic formulas poses a unique problem, since it involves sophisticated separation and pre-purification procedures.

With the grant, Cameron will develop procedures to identify and determine percentages of active ingredients used in the company's products. Samples are to be tested at six-month intervals over the two-year life of the project, which began Aug. 1.

"This project holds special benefits for students, who will get an idea of how private industry operates, as well as learn chemistry techniques in an academic setting," said Dr. Ann Nalley, the project's principal investigator. "This project will also contribute to Southwest Oklahoma's economy by enhancing the operation of one of its industries."

During the project, the students will be trained as analytical and cosmetic chemists who can both separate and purify the cosmetic ingredient, and develop analysis methods.


Three interns will assist Cameron with the testing. The first will spend 30 hours weekly on the project. Two junior interns will be full-time college students who each will spend 12 hours weekly on the research.

"Their research experience will not only enhance their employability, but also assist them in preparing for advanced study in graduate school," Nalley said.

The project will enable Cameron to utilize new research equipment now being installed at the university. With it, researchers will be able to identify and measure 30 different components—camphor, menthol, zinc oxide, hydrocortisone, lidocaine and benzocaine among them — used in cosmetics.
