Duncan couple's gift promotes classroom excellence

Pazoureck, Thomlinson share Hackler Award

Teaching is an art practiced diligently every day in classrooms across America and around the world.

Cameron University's Harold and Elizabeth Hackler Lecture-

ship in Teaching Excellence recognizes the outstanding contributions the institution's faculty make daily in the lives of college students. The endowment was established in 1996 by the Hacklers – both CU alumni – to recognize superior instruction in the classroom.

Dr. Rebecca Pazoureck, an associate professor in Cameron's Department of Psychology and Human Ecology, and Dr. Vivian Thomlinson, an associate professor in the Department of

English, Foreign Languages and Journalism, have been selected as the newest recipients of the award.

The honors were presented to the two Cameron faculty during a Nov. 29 banquet at the Duncan Higher Education Center.

The Hacklers' initial gift to the university was matched dollar-for-dollar by the McCasland Foundation, then by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, creating a \$100,000 lectureship. Proceeds from the endowment fund merit awards to outstanding teachers and grants to enhance their professional attributes.

Pazoureck and Thomlinson will be jointly appointed to the Hackler

Parker and Bryan inducted into Faculty Hall of Fame

Dr. Dewey Parker and Jack Bryan were inducted into the Cameron University Alumni Association's Faculty Hall of Fame Oct. 7 during the organization's annual reunion in Lawton. The two former professors received their awards during the traditional reunion luncheon.

Faculty hall of famer Parker, of Lawton, received his B.A. in history and elementary education from Central State University, a Master of Education degree in administration and a doctorate in education from the University of Oklahoma.

He served in the military from 1944-46, then was teacher, coach and principal at Canute Public Schools from 1949-54, and a teacher and principal in the Lawton Public Schools from 1954-1970.

Parker was a professor of education at Cameron from 1970-88, and was



CU alum receives public health honor

A Cameron University alumna has been honored for achievements in promoting public health initiatives in Southwest Oklahoma.

Edna B. Alvillar, who recently retired as director of the Southwest Oklahoma Area Health Education Center, was presented the fifth annual Excellence Award for Outstanding Individual Achievement in Public Health in November.

The award is sponsored by the College of Public Health and the Public Health Alumni Association of the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center.





Alvillar received her bachelor's degree in human ecology

from Cameron in 1988.

She was given the award for the body of her work as a health advocate for unserved and underserved people in Southwest

Alvillar worked to improve the health of the residents of the area by creating partnerships among community and academic organizations and has been instrumental in initiating nearly a dozen major public health projects since 1994, including the National Native American Diabetes Conference in 1999 and the National Native American Kidney conferences in 1999 and

Most recently she directed the Southwest Oklahoma Area Health Education Center, headquartered at Cameron. The center works with 26 different counties to link health care resources with each other to strengthen community-based education programs.

lectureship and will be provided grants to be used for approved professional activities. The two faculty members will also have their names engraved on the Hackler lectureship honor roll plaque.

Recipients of the award and lectureship are selected by top university officials based on recommendations from faculty, students and fellow administrators. Competition is open to all CU professors who have been full-time members of the university faculty for at least three years, including the current year, and hold an appointment as an assistant professor or higher. The candidate's principal assignment must be teaching. Past recipients are eligible for future awards.

This is only the second time the Hackler award has been presented. Dr. Clinton Bryan, an associate physical science professor at Cameron, became the first recipient in 1999.

The Hackler lectureship provides an opportunity for Cameron professors to try new and different methods to invigorate their teaching, Bryan said.

"If I had a word of advice for this year's recipients," he said, "it would be that this is an opportunity to go someplace or do something you haven't been able to do before."

Like Bryan before them, both of this year's recipients drew high praise from their faculty nominators.

Pazoureck, who was nominated by her department, was praised for her ability to relate course content to her students.

"Dr. Pazoureck gives assignments that are not only practical, but fun," said department chair Dr. Lawrence Weinstein. "Upon completion of the assignments, her students have been able to apply classroom information to 'real world' situations which they can utilize immediately.'

Pazoureck, a member of the CU faculty since 1975, is also a registered dietitian, holding positions at Comanche County Memorial Hospital, McMahon Tomlinson Nursing Center and Hospice of Lawton before coming to Cameron.

She holds degrees from Madison College, the University of

Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University.

Pazoureck is stively involved in the Oklahoma Association of Family and Consumer Sciences and is professionally involved in the American College of Sports Medicine, the American Association of Lifestyle Counselors and the Oklahoma Dietetic Association. She is a past president of the Southwest Oklahoma Dietetic Association.

Campus recognition includes selection as 1989 CU Professor of the Year, 1998 CU Advisor of the Year and stints as president of Phi Kappa Phi and the Alpha Phi chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma.

In addition to her professorship, Thomlinson serves as director of composition at Cameron. She was nominated by administrators in her area because of her knowledge, enthusiasm, leadership and rapport with students.

"She is known as a demanding, but extremely encouraging teacher of English and is well respected for the time and energy that she devotes to her students," said Dr. Sally Soelle, the dean of the School of Liberal Arts. "I can think of no finer candidate for the Hackler Award."

After teaching English at CU from 1986-1994, Thomlinson returned in 1998. She currently teaches courses in basic writing, composition, literature, technical writing and mythology.

Thomlinson, who holds degrees from Texas A&M and Texas Woman's University, played a key role in revamping CU English department general education courses. She has published a number of research papers on writing skills and rhetoric.

Thomlinson has been actively involved in the Oklahoma University Instructional Technology Collaborative Effort and Cameron's preparation for this winter's accreditation visit by the North Central Association.

Lady Aggies keep raising the bar

The funny thing about goals: Once you reach one, you're ready to move on to the next. The thrill of achieving something you set out to do serves as a motivating

factor and spurs you to try it again, to set the bar even higher.

So it should come as no surprise that the members of the Cameron University women's basketball team talk more about the future than they do about the past these days.

The Lady Aggies, fresh off a 15-12

record and one of the most successful seasons in school history, are determined to make their recent winning ways a habit - not a fluke.

"We had individual meetings with each of the girls at the end of this season and you could definitely see a change in their attitudes," said Cameron first-year head coach Adrian Wiggins. "There is a sense that we have a lot more to accomplish and you can see that in the attitudes of each of our girls."

Since joining the Lady Aggies staff in 1999 as an assistant coach, Wiggins has helped spark a tremendous turnaround within the CU women's basketball program.

In the two seasons prior to Wiggins' arrival on campus, the Lady Aggies had endured a pair of dismal campaigns that produced a total of 10 victories.

That changed last season, Wiggins'

first as a member of the CU coaching staff, when the Lady Aggies rallied for a 13-13 record and challenged for a spot in the Lone Star Conference postseason championship tournament.

The effort was the Cameron women's

first non-losing season since the 1987-88 campaign and gave Lady Aggie fans a glimpse of what they could expect in the near future.

"Last year I think we started to see more lovalty to the program than we had in the past," Wiggins said. "For a while the turnover rate on our team was pretty high and last year we saw more of our players sticking around. I think that consistency is one of the things that has really helped our squad grow and hopefully that will continue. Next year we expect to have 90

percent of our current squad back on the

Along with last year's returning players came some added talent that contributed to the Lady Aggie turnaround, as well. Enter Reykjavik, Iceland, native Signy Hermannsdottir.

A 6-foot-2 center, Hermannsdottir joined the squad at the beginning of last year's second semester. She made an immediate impact for the Lady Aggies, recording double-doubles in points and rebounds in two of her first three games in a Cameron uniform.

Hermannsdottir finished last season as one of the team's leading scorers and rebounds, setting a new school record for blocked shots in a game (6) in the

"Signy is a tremendous player because she is so unselfish," Wiggins said. "She didn't start in half of our games this season, yet she was still one of the best players in the league. It's hard not to be

successful when you're around players like that and Signy is only a sophomore, so she still has plenty of time to improve."

Coaches throughout the Lone Star Conference appear to agree with Coach Wiggins' assessment, as evidenced by Hermannsdottir's recent selection to the 2001 LSC North Division All-Conference First Team.

After ranking among the conference leaders in scoring and blocked shots this season. Hermannsdottir is now the first Lady Aggie named to the all-conference first team since Cameron's Phoebe Dunn was selected the Lone Star Conference Most Valuable Player following the 1992-93 season.

Another outstanding addition to the CU squad this season is freshman Kimberle Woods. A native of Dallas. Texas, Woods fearlessly stepped into the starting lineup this year. producing 12.6 points per game to fuel the Lady Aggie offense.

Woods was a finalist for this year's LSC North Division Freshman of the Year award and was named second team all-conference in her first season of collegiate competition.

"The best thing about Kimberle is she doesn't act like a freshman," Wiggins said. "She had a lot of success this season, but she continued to work hard and has proved to be a very intelligent basketball player."

But any coach will tell you that it takes the right mix of talented newcomers and battle-tested veterans to breed success, and this year's Lady Aggies were no different. Nearly all of the key players from last year's 13-13 team returned this season determined to raise the bar and exceed the success of the previous season

Senior Laci Bender, along with juniors Kelsi Bond and Summer Bode, provided valuable leadership on the court and in practice, while sophomores Tisha King and Stephanie

Cameron and Oklahoma State join forces to offer advanced computer science degree

In yet another demonstration of its commitment to expand educational and career opportunities for Southwest Oklahoma residents, Cameron has initiated a joint project with Oklahoma State University to offer a masters degree in computer science in Lawton.

The program will be offered via compressed video, and is structured to allow students to complete degree requirements in two years. OSU will serve as the degree-granting institution.

Cameron originally sought the masters program at the request of Telos OK, a Lawton computer software company, but has since opened it to any college student who meets admissions requirements.

"This program will contribute significantly to Cameron's economic development efforts in Southwest Oklahoma," said Dr. Terral McKellips, provost. "Many of the types of busi-

nesses we are trying to attract to this part of the state require employees with graduate-level education."

The course of study for the program requires 24 hours of general course credit, including 12 hours in core courses, and six thesis hours. The thesis will be mutually selected by the student and an advisor, resulting in a carefully prepared paper that is orally defended at the completion of the project.

Students wishing to pursue the program must meet all the requirements for admittance to the OSU graduate school. Applicants must hold a bachelors degree from an accredited college or university, complete an eight-hour calculus sequence, and have either a "B" average or above in the past two years of course work or a demonstrated performance in a business environment.

Applicants must also complete an undergraduate major in computer science or have significant course work or experience in that field. Students should

have a knowledge of procedural and non-procedural programming languages, data structures, operating systems, software engineering, assembly language and related mathematics. International students must have a Test of English as a Foreign Language score of 550 or better.

The program began with three course offerings in the spring, and all classes attracted enrollment. McKellips believes the successful start will soon lead to more opportunities for students.

"We're considering a group of graduate assistantships," McKellips said, "so our own computer science graduates can earn a masters degree from OSU and become graduate assistants at Cameron. A program of that nature would allow students to pursue a graduate degree without traveling, and they could continue to earn an income and gain experience in one of Cameron's computer departments."

Oklahomans honored for research efforts

The celebration brought together people interested in advancing economic development by showcasing current research, enhancing the skills of

"One of the recommendations emerging from a recent 18-month local study on economic development is the

need for a greater emphasis on research and technology to develop niche areas likely to bring opportunities and prosperity to Southwest Oklahoma," said Dr. Don Sullivan, CU's Vice President for University Advancement.

Twenty-five faculty make Who's Who list for 2001

More than two dozen current and former members of the Cameron faculty have been selected for inclusion in the sixth edition of Who's Who Among America's Teachers.

First published in 1990 and updated every two years, the book is an effort to pay tribute to exceptional educators.

New program to meet growing need in Southwest Oklahoma

CU, Great Plains offer joint degree

Cameron University and the Great Plains Technology Center entered into a joint partnership this spring to offer an associate degree in applied technology with a speciality in respiratory care.

The program will allow students to enter a technical program leading to certification from Great Plains Technology Center, as well as earn an associate degree from CU.

The program in respiratory care is designed to prepare students for entry-level employment as respiratory therapists. These professionals work in a wide variety of clinical settings to evaluate and treat patients suffering from respiratory illnesses and other cardiopulmonary disorders.

"This degree program will enhance the training and education of health care practitioners in Southwest Oklahoma," said associate provost Dr. Wade Harrison, who heads CU's educational outreach program.

"Health care has always been a consistently expanding career field, and it is expected to continue to do so in the future. This is an important step in filling southwest Oklahoma's health care training and education needs for the future," he noted

The degree program is a two-component process. Great Plains

Technology Center will provide 32 hours of technical and clinical components that include experience at hospitals in the area.

Cameron will provide 33 hours of general education and technical support classes to fill its degree requirements.

The program requires students to first be admitted to CU and then, after completing 12 hours of university classes, apply to the respiratory care program at Great Plains.

"This is a great opportunity for anyone interested in pursuing a respiratory care career," said Jack Powers, director of Great Plains' respiratory care program. "There are very few opportunities for students to get experience across multiple levels of higher education and technical education."

After January 2002, the National Board for Respiratory Care will require associate degrees in that field if applicants wish to apply for entry level certification exams to become respiratory therapists and respiratory therapy technicians.

The respiratory care degree program is the second such cooperative partnership between Great Plains and Cameron. In July 1999, the two joined forces to create an associate degree in manufacturing technology.

Former U.S. ambassador Julian M. Niemczyk, Maj. Gen. Evan R. Gaddis, Dr. Sally Bradstreet Soelle and Dr. Michael W. Cox were honored as Distinguished Alumni during the Cameron University Alumni Association's fall reunion.

Distinguished alumni are honored for their continuing advancement and achievement after gradutation from CU and for their continuing pursuit of excellence. Nominees for the award must distinguish themselves in their careers and/or in community service.


Retired Maj. Gen. Evan R. Gaddis of Alexandria, Va., received his bachelors degree in business administration from Cameron in 1978.



"Specifically, the task force noted that while several companies and government entities are conducting research in high-technology areas, there's no organized effort to demonstrate that Southwest Oklahoma has this capability."

Sullivan pointed out that other high-tech hotbeds such as Huntsville, Ala., and Austin, Texas, tout their total research capabilities as an economic development tool, thus attracting new industry. Cameron saw the task force's recommendation for a coordinated research and information activity as a "call to action," and joined with the technology group to develop the weeklong observance.

Events covered all aspects of research, from the traditional to the unique. A tour of Fort Sill's battle simulations laboratory was scheduled, as was a series of workshops instructing student researchers on how to make scholarly presentations, effectively utilize research resources, analyze data, read graphs and tables, conduct interviews and develop research proposals. Faculty-related workshops explained how to effectively draft a grant proposal, commercialize research and initiate research partnerships with business and industry.

Cameron conducted tours of its Sciences Complex, MultiMedia Center of Excellence and NCR 5100 supercomputer facility. Participants in the McNair Scholars program, a project aimed at increasing the number of first-generation and minority graduate students, were honored during the week, and student researchers competed in a research poster competition.

In a unique twist on its standard format, Cameron's monthly business forum on Feb. 23 addressed the impact of art and culture on economic development.

A 27-member panel, featuring representatives from industry, the military, privately funded research, government and education, shared ideas on the need for a regional research center in Southwest Oklahoma.

The week's events culminated with a luncheon recognizing 14 Southwest Oklahoma researchers whose work has generated the potential - if it has not already done so - to create new products, industry, knowledge or some method of workforce support.
