Bryan becomes first Hackler Award winner

A love of learning and an appreciation for teaching excellence. Those words may best sum up Harold and Elizabeth Hackler's relationship with Cameron University.

The Duncan couple, retired Halliburton employees, certainly haven't let what most people think of as "their twilight years" prevent them from leading fulfilling

lives. Both are active volunteers in their community -- and both have obtained college degrees from Cameron in the years following their Halliburton careers.

On July 8, the couple marked another milestone with Cameron University when Dr. Clinton D.

Bryan was named the first recipient of the Harold and Elizabeth Hackler Excellence in Teaching Award during a ceremony at the Duncan Higher Education Center.

With his acceptance of the award, Bryan, an associate professor in Cameron's physical science department, became the first faculty member to hold the Harold

Federal EPSCoT award enhances CU's economic development work

Cameron University was named a winner of a U.S. Department of Commerce EPSCoT award in October. enhancing a Lawton-area initiative to develop an economy geared for 21st century's high-tech industry.

EPSCoT is the Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Technology, which distributed nearly \$2 million in research funding nationwide in 1999. Cameron was one of 11 successful applicants chosen from a field of 29

As the lone Oklahoma winner Cameron received a \$70,000 contract -matched by \$323,719 in local funds -- to analyze the existing workforce of the region and to develop an economic development plan and implementation strategy toward diversifying the local

economy.

Cameron president Don Davis is directing the economic initiative with the assistance of a trio of coordinators: CU vice presidents Don Sullivan and Leo J. Baxter, and Tony Pokorny, an executive from Advancia Corporation who has been loaned to Cameron for the economic development research project.

The initiative is a boost to the work of 80 community leaders who are part of a task force developing an economic development strategy for Lawton and Southwest Oklahoma The EPSCoT funds will be used to allow the task force to take an in-depth look at other successful communities and learn more about high-tech industry.

CU to host teen debaters & broadcasters

Cameron University will be overrun with high school students this summer when the School of Liberal Arts' communications department hosts its 26th annual speech, debate and broadcast camps.

Two camp sessions are planned for high school and junior high students.

Last year the camps attracted more than 400 students from eight states.

The first camp -- July 9-14 -- will concentrate on Lincoln-Douglas debate techniques and beginning and advanced individual events.

The second camp -- July 16-21 -- will focus on cross-examination techniques, Lincoln-Douglas debate, television field production, beginning radio and television, and extemporaneous speak-

Teachers, college students and high school seniors may receive college credit for camp participation.

Pre-registration is required and room assignment is on a first-come-first serve basis. Participants will stay at Cameron during the camps.

Registration for the event is \$335/ person. Early birds can receive a \$40 discount by registering before June 10. Withdrawal deadline is July 1.

and Elizabeth Hackler Lectureship in Teaching Excellence.

The Hacklers endowed the lectureship in March 1996 to recognize excellence in teaching at Cameron. The couple's initial gift was matched through the McCasland Foundation and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education to create a \$100,000 lectureship endowment.

The recipient of the award and lectureship is selected by Cameron's provost based on recommendations from a committee of faculty, students and administrators. Competition is open to all CU faculty.

The idea for the honor came about because the Hacklers were impressed with the quality of teaching they observed in the classroom while they were Cameron students.

Harold, at age 67, was the oldest graduate to cross the CU Commencement stage in 1993 and his wife repeated that distinction when she received her bachelor's degree this past spring.

Both opted to continue their educations after retirement 10 years ago so they could "keep up with today's world, interact with others, and keep our minds alert," according to Elizabeth. They succeeded.

Cameron already has more endowed faculty positions than any other regional public university in Oklahoma — 22 of them, in fact — and endowments such as the one given by the Hacklers allow the university to enhance the quality of teaching and learning through academic endeavors not otherwise possible.

Bryan began his work at Cameron as a chemistry lab instructor and tutorial instructor in 1988. He took a sabbatical to obtain his Ph.D. from the University of Arkansas, then returned to CU to become an assistant professor and establish himself as an effective teacher of undergraduate research, especially in the fields of chemicals and crystallography.

He has been routinely given high marks by his students for teaching excellence in the classroom, and has been described by Dr. Gary Buckley, his department chair, as someone "totally dedicated to providing students with quality and caring instruction at all levels."

Bryan has been unafraid to expand his education methods into new areas, such as teaching chemistry classes through interactive television. He also represents Cameron in the Instructional Technology Collaborative Effort.

His research articles have appeared in a wide array of scholarly journals and he is active in a number of professional organizations, such as the American Chemical Society, the Council on Undergraduate Research and the

American Crystallographic Association. Bryan was also listed in the 1997 edition of Who's Who Cameron students help local youngsters embark on the 'right road to reading'

Thanks to eight Cameron University students, 30 youngsters at Andrew Jackson Elementary School in Lawton can read better than ever before.

The college students, members of Cameron's Sociology Club and the Alpha Kappa Delta sociology honor society, initiated a pilot partnership with the school last January when third grade teacher Lillian Bell allowed them to implement a new reading program in her class called the "Right Road to Reading."

The program is designed to increase students' reading potential, as well as provide mentors to encourage success. Volunteers from the two CU organizations, who do not receive pay or university credit for their work, are assigned to children who may require extra help with reading or motivational skills.

In many cases, children do not have an opportunity to read outside school. Organizers believe that the more a

child reads, the more his or her potential for learning will increase. Students who meet a standard for reading excellence are rewarded with incentives to encourage continued reading improvement. The two Cameron organizations hold fund raisers and solicit local businesses to help provide the incentives.

Additionally, Cameron students assist teachers as they prepare students for required state testing.

The "Right Road to Reading" pro-

gram has recorded many successes in the short period it has been underway, including helping 96 percent of Jackson third graders pass a state-required multiplication test. Research shows 92 percent of the 30 participants have increased their reading levels.

While "Right Road to Reading" is only underway at Jackson Elementary School, Cameron participants are hoping for other opportunities to expand it into other classrooms.

CU professor receives state honor

Cameron professor Elizabeth Ann Nalley has been honored by the Oklahoma Science Teachers Association as its 1999 Higher Education Professor of the Year.

The award is presented to an Oklahoma professor who demonstrates exemplary actions both in and out of the classroom to promote science education.

Nalley has been a member of the Cameron faculty since 1969.

This award is the latest in a series won by Nalley during her years at Cameron. The university presented her with its Distinguished Service Award in 1995, and she was inducted into the CU Alumni Association's Faculty Hall of Fame in 1996.

Tech Center affiliate office placed at CU

The Oklahoma Technology Commercialization Center branched out into Southwest Oklahoma this spring with the establishment of the center's first affiliate office on the Cameron University campus.

The office is located within the university's technology park and is directed by Advancia senior vice president Anthony Pokorny through an "executive-on-loan" program.

"We are excited about this added dimension for our economic development efforts," said CU president Don Davis. "The alliance with the Tech Center complements our 'smart companies' campaign focusing on increasing job opportunities in knowledge-based companies, either by expanding existing firms or attracting new ones."

To be an affiliate, private and public sector organizations partner with the Tech Center to advance its mission and expand access to services. Affiliates provide resources such as facilities, staff time and equipment, attend special training, jointly prepare goals and objectives, and participate in the feedback process. In turn, they have access to the center's online databases and extensive technology-based economic development resources.

The Tech Center, Cameron's Business Research Center and Advancia are assisting in the creation of an economic development plan to expand Southwest Oklahoma's high-tech industry

The Tech Center will assist by identifying emerging technologies suitable for the existing industry base and identifying new opportunities that might be a fit for Southwest Oklahoma.

The Tech Center is surveying existing technology to assess Lawton's strengths and weaknesses for starting and growing advanced technology companies. This information will be integrated into an economic development plan which is expected to be delivered to city officials early in 2000.

The Oklahoma Technology Commercialization Center is operated by the Oklahoma Technology Development Corp., a private, not-for-profit corporation dedicated to the creation of additional high technology businesses in Oklahoma. The center is operated under contract with the Oklahoma Center for Advancement of Science and Technology and is funded with state appropriations.

Its mission is to create wealth for the citizens of Oklahoma and improve the state's image as an attractive venue in which to start and grow advanced technology businesses.

Teams in transition

Jones steps down; Helvey adds women's duties; Prince joins cagers

Cameron University athletes saw lots of changes when they reported for the Fall 1999 semester. New faces are on board, and some of the old ones can be found in different roles — especially on the tennis courts.

Jones resigns

After nearly two dozen winning seasons and seven consecutive national tournament appearances, Cameron women's tennis coach Joe Jones has

"We've had a good run over the last several years and it's been a lot of fun,' said Jones. "But I feel it's time for me to concentrate on either the classroom or the tennis court. And at this stage of my life, I feel it should be the classroom."

As an assistant professor in the Health, PE and Recreation department, Jones came to Cameron in 1975, after stints at Southwestern Oklahoma State and Lawton Eisenhower High School. The first year for women's tennis at Cameron — 1977 — started a string of 22 winning seasons in 23 tries, including four 20-win seasons.

This past season's women's team qualified for the national tournament for the seventh straight season. A 21-7 overall record enabled the Lady Aggies to finish eighth regionally and 26th

nationally.

"Coach Jones will be missed," said CU athletics director Sam Carroll. "His hard work and dedication to the program will be big shoes to fill."

Helvey adds duties

Men's tennis coach James Helvey will assume the women's tennis coaching duties — the second time in his career that he has coached two teams simultaneously. He was Texas Weslevan's men's and women's tennis coach, as well as sports information director.

With Helvey at the helm, the Aggies have a 97-60 record, haven't suffered a losing season in six years, and have posted consecutive 20-win seasons. CU has qualified for postseason play for five consecutive years. Overall, Helvey has an eight-year collegiate career record of 190-124.

He stood out in the Heart of Texas Conference and was voted Coach of the Year in 1992 and 1993. His women's team at TWU won the 1993 conference title. In December 1992 he was named the stringer for the Davis Cup Team in the US's final against Switzerland. He also served as a teaching professional in 1993 at Fort Worth's Riverbend Athletic Club.

Before his college coaching career, Helvey gathered practical experience through college tennis. He received a

Wagner leaves mark on CU records

As a 5'-10" freshman third baseman, Jeremy Wagner came to Cameron with the hope of getting playing time and posting good numbers. By the time his career ended as a 5'-11" senior outfielder, he not only accomplished those goals, but broke a few records along the

The four-year starter graduated last May as the most decorated baseball player in CU history.

Wagner's story had modest beginnings with a .369 batting average and a .854 fielding percentage. But it showed signs of life with four home runs, 13 doubles and 41 runs batted in.

Each year the numbers got a little better. By his final year — his best — Wagner hit .438 from the plate (and a slugging percentage of .822) with 15 doubles, seven triples and 52 RBIs — all of which were career bests. Jeremy raised his batting average from .308 to .438 over the last month of the 1999

Ziegler to head Lone Star group

Cameron University professor Robert Ziegler was elected during the summer to serve a two-year term as president of the Lone Star Conference's governing body.

The governing group is comprised of faculty representatives from each of the 17 member colleges and universities in Arkansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and

As president, Ziegler chairs meetings of the conference's faculty representatives, including one held in conjunction with the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division II national meeting in January. His term started with the Fall 1999 term.

Ziegler, as assistant biology professor at Cameron, serves as the university's faculty representative to the Lone Star Conference. He has been a member of the CU faculty since 1968.

Ziegler previously served as conference president from 1991-93.

Wagner now holds five CU career hitting records and spots among the top five players in five more categories.

Wagner holds CU records in at-bats (646), hits (251), RBIs (191), triples (15), and homers (30). He's in second place in doubles (48) and games played (192), third in runs scored (154) and walks (88), and fourth in batting average (.392).

Wagner is listed in 10 of the dozen hitting categories maintained by Cameron — more than any other player who's worn an Aggie baseball jersey.

Off the field, Wagner's honors include appearing on the Lone Star Conference's All-Academic team twice, first-team All-LSC catcher as a junior and firstteam All-LSC outfielder as a senior. He was named to the All-South Central Region second team this past season and was named to the All-Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference second team as a sophomore.

"Wagner had as good or better career than anyone we have ever had here,"

said CU head coach Ron Ihler. "He was a model of consistency through four years as an Aggie. He is well deserving of any honors he has received. Replacing 'Wags' will be an extremely difficult task. We certainly wish him the best in whatever he decides to do with the rest of his life."

In addition to his on-court presence. Prince has presented academic papers on a variety of issues. He earned a bachelor's of science degree from Southeastern in 1981, along with a master's in education in 1993. He's working on another M.Ed in school administration.

"We are very excited to have David on the staff," said CU head coach Garrette Mantle. "David brings a great deal off experience, having previously recruited at SOSU and been a part of three programs in rebuilding phases. I know David is aware of the time and commitment this job takes and I know his enthusiasm and passion for what he does will only be an asset for this program and university."

1999 CUAA Faculty Hall of Fame winners Cameron alums honor Phillips, Smith

The 1999 recipients of the Cameron University Alumni Association's Faculty Hall of Fame Awards represent seven decades of service to higher education.

Emeritus professor Dr. Donald S. Phillips and Dr. Charles Wayne Smith, professor and chair of Cameron University's history and humanities department, have been selected as 1999 recipients of the honor.

The alumni association presents the award annually to honor Cameron's outstanding current and retired faculty for teaching effectiveness, positive impact on students' lives, and involvement outside the classroom and in the community. Nominations for the annual award are due by Apr. 1 each year.

DR. DONALD S. PHILLIPS

Dr. Donald S. Phillips' dedication to his career in education is evident in his philosophy of teaching.

"Teaching is the primary function of educational institutions. Every activity of the organization should be directed toward the improvement of instruction," Phillips says. "My heart is filled with joy when I recall the diverse population of students served by Cameron. During my years at Cameron I saw many students overcome a myriad of obstacles to obtain their educational objectives."

Born in 1932 at Choska, he graduated from Haskell High School, then entered the Army. Phillips served in Japan and Korea with Oklahoma's 45th Infantry Division during 1950-52.

After his military service, he enrolled at Oklahoma State University where he received his bachelor's in industrial arts education, a master's in technical education, and a doctorate of education with a emphasis in technical education.

After obtaining his bachelor's degree in 1957, he was a structural designer at Aero-Commander, Inc. in Norman for four years. In 1961 to 1964, he taught at Capitol Hill High School where he started a technical drafting and design program.

Phillips began his higher education teaching career in 1964 while working toward his doctoral degree at OSU, advancing from instructor to professor and department head in technical education. He was also the coordinator of graduate studies for the School of Occupational and Adult Education. He served as an advisor to approximately 30 undergraduate and 15 masters degree candidates each year. He prepared proposals, secured funding and conducted 15 research and training projects with budgets ranging from \$5,000 to \$500,000 from state and federal agencies and the country of Brazil.

In 1968 he took a leave of absence from OSU to serve as project coordinator of the Bio-Medical Equipment Technology Curriculum Development Project for the Technical Education Research Center headquartered in Cambridge, Mass.

His career at Cameron began in 1979 when he was appointed dean of instruction. In 1980 he became dean of academic

affairs with the responsibility of planning, budgeting and administering the university's academic program. Other responsibilities included coordination of the activities of the library, admissions and records, research, and management of data processing in support of the university's academic mission.

Phillips moved to the department of technology, serving as chair and professor from 1983-1989. During this period, the department won two National Science Foundation Grants and advanced its leadership in technical education. His concern for a lack of student excellence in written communication skills resulted in the promotion of Writing Across the Curriculum as a campus-wide activity. He was also involved in planning. implementing and teaching telecourses.

He served as associate provost from 1989 until his retirement in 1997. Responsibilities included educational outreach, general education, university assessment, interdisciplinary studies degree programs, faculty development and staff development.

He authored several publications and made presentations in the areas of research, leadership and curriculum development.

During the 1960s, Phillips was influential in organizing the Oklahoma Technical Society and has been a board member and journal editor. He is a recipient of its highest award for education excellence, the Joe Ables Award. He is also a member of the Oklahoma Vocational Association: American Technical Education Association, serving as a trustee: American Vocational can Vocational Association, serving as a trustee; Alberta Consultant evaluation; and Phi Kappa Phi. He has been a 1972. consultant evaluator for North Central Association since 1972.

Program a pattern for other states

New CU degree benefits area industries

In a continuing effort to improve the quality of Southwest Oklahoma's labor force and provide more and better jobs for its graduates, Cameron University has won approval to offer an associate degree in manufacturing technology.

An early benefactor of the program is Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company in Lawton, which will use it to enhance the skill level of its personnel.

But the degree, an Associate in Applied Science Degree in Manufacturing Technology with an option in industrial maintenance, also has the potential to help meet training needs of other Southwest Oklahoma manufacturers.

"The development of this program is consistent with Cameron's economic development effort," said Provost Terral McKellips. "We believe it is as important to retain quality industries as it is to recruit new ones. Offering this degree helps us accomplish that.'

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education approved Cameron's degree request at its June 30 meeting. Great Plains Area Vo-Tech is a cooperative partner in delivery of the program.

Cameron's development of the degree program has been highly successful. So successful, in fact, McKellips noted that Goodyear is now negotiating in three other states where it has manufacturing facilities to replicate the program developed in Oklahoma.

The action helps meet Cameron's goal of offering quality applied science degree programs in technical fields.

At Goodyear and many other area manufacturing plants, the accelerating rate of technology has outpaced the skill base of maintenance technicians currently employed. Compounding the problem, there is no pool of trained individuals outside the company with the expertise needed, said Dr. David

O'Keeffe, Dean of the CU School of Science and Technology

"This new program will enhance Southwest Oklahoma's manufacturing sector," O'Keeffe said. "Highly trained maintenance technicians can assist firms in keeping their factories operating efficiently. They will not only be able to perform normal tasks, but also be better equipped to carry out problem-solving activities."

"This will make them more valuable professionals — highly skilled and paid accordingly," O'Keeffe noted.

Approximately 68 credit hours are needed for the AAS degree through courses offered by Cameron and Great Plains Technology Center. Roughly half is technical-occupational specialty training provided by GPTC and another one-fourth is technical support or related courses. The remaining 25% are general education courses.

During that time, his students have seen him as a knowledgeable, fair, witty professor who makes history lively and relevant. This statement is a reflection of his teaching philosophy which he says "has simply been to see each student as an individual with goals, ambitions and dignity that deserved both my respect and best teaching efforts possible."

Born in 1940, he received an associate degree with highest honors in 1962 from Clarke Memorial Junior College, Newton, Miss., and a bachelor's degree in history and a minor in political science with honors from William Carey College. Hattiesburg, Miss. He had graduate fellowships at the University of Southern Mississippi where he earned a masters in history and minor in political science and a doctorate in

During Smith's first three years at Cameron, he contributed to the development of the social science department and to the study of European history within that department. He participated in the development of Cameron's governance structure, a mandate of North Central Accreditation (NCA) evaluators. From 1973-77. he was an associate professor with responsibilities division from the state of the ties divided between teaching and the development of an intendiinterdisciplinary humanities program. He became a full professor in 1977.

Smith was appointed special assistant to the president for caden; academics in 1981 and served as vice president for academic affairs and details and served as vice president for academic affairs and student service from 1982-89. His duties included supervision visit. supervising the NCA self-study and accreditation visit;

directing the university's academic reorganization; and establishing academic advisement, the student development center, Title III programs, the media center, graduate planning and library automation. He was a member of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's council on instruction from 1982-89.

He returned to full-time teaching in 1989 and has been chair of the department of history and humanities since 1995. Major accomplishments in this position have included coordinating the work of a faculty committee in developing the NCA program review for student teaching credentials in social science and overseeing the development of museum studies courses to be added to the department curriculum. Smith plans to retire at the end of the 2000 spring semester.

A published scholar and academic presenter, Smith has served as consultant for projects funded by the Oklahoma Humanities Committee on "The Role of Women in Southwest Oklahoma."

He is a member of Phi Alpha Theta and has served as advisor to the Cameron chapter. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, serving as its president in 1976-77 and was honored with the Cameron chapter's Distinguished Faculty Award.

His civic and community activities include serving on the Lawton City Council from 1980-84 and on the board of the Oklahoma Foundation for the Humanities since 1993. He also served on the boards of the Salvation Army and Boys Club and on the Arts for All budget committee.

Excellence in medicine: Dr. Joseph Salamy - Class of 1940



Rush Springs High School grad Dr. David R. Shaw. Starkville, Miss., received his bachelors in agriculture from Cameron in 1981. He was active in the Aggie Club, Agronomy Club, Collegiate FFA, the President's Club and Phi Kappa Phi.

A proposal written by Clark brought New Directions Oklahoma's first grant from the Nicole Brown Simpson Charitable Foundation. This led to a meeting with foundation staff and members of the Brown family on behalf of victims of violence. An invitation was extended to participate in a "March to End Silence," with the Lawton delegation creating Ms. Simpson's silhouette.

Clark became a member of Junior

League of Lawton in 1991 and served as president in 1998-99. She has served on the Oklahoma Coalition on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault since 1980. She is a member of the Comanche County FEMA board and has served on the State Department of Health's domestic violence and sexual assault advisory committee.

She was a 1997 nominee for Outstanding Women of Comanche County and was named to Outstanding Young Women of America in 1986.

The federal program, said Sullivan, is a "hallmark in federal government recognition that economic development can come from advancing technology as much as it can from supporting research."

The EPSCoT program makes it possible for regional institutions such as Cameron to be major players in the state's economic development, he noted.

The initiative is believed to be the first such effort focusing on development of high technology industry in an Oklahoma community. Other groups working on the project included the Oklahoma Technology Commercialization Center, Fort Sill, the Lawton Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the Great Plains Technology Center.
