McLarty lauds CU, praises Partners

President Bill Clinton's White House Chief of Staff Thomas F. (Mack) McLarty has been called "Mack the Nice."

The Cameron University President's Partners audience learned why when he spoke at the organization's fifth annual meeting Feb. 12 at the Fort Sill Officers Club.

He called friends in the audience by their first names and praised Cameron University, the Partners, and the Lawton-Fort Sill community.

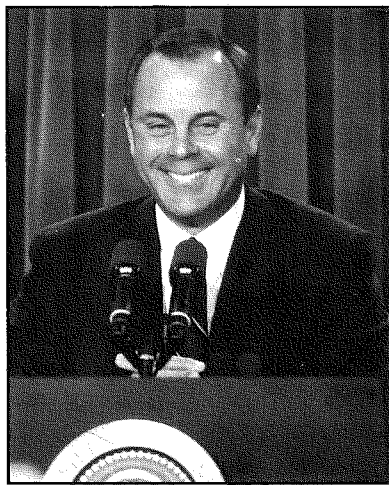
He said of Cameron President Don Davis:

"Don's leadership is almost a legend. He has developed vision and a strategic plan for the university and made hard decisions. Cameron enjoys a superb reputation, not only in the state of Oklahoma, but throughout the country. It is recognized as an interactive university, effectively fulfilling the needs of business and industry, soldiers and civilians in Southwest Oklahoma."

McLarty said the Cameron President's Partners program is a model of success because it reflects the commitment and cooperation by the community to provide needed funds to further education.

When McLarty was 11 years old, his father was president of the Hope, Ark. Chamber of Commerce.

He said he could remember darting in and out of the living room, and listening to his father urging other citizens to get something done. He'd call the person by his first name and say "I know we can count on you to do this."

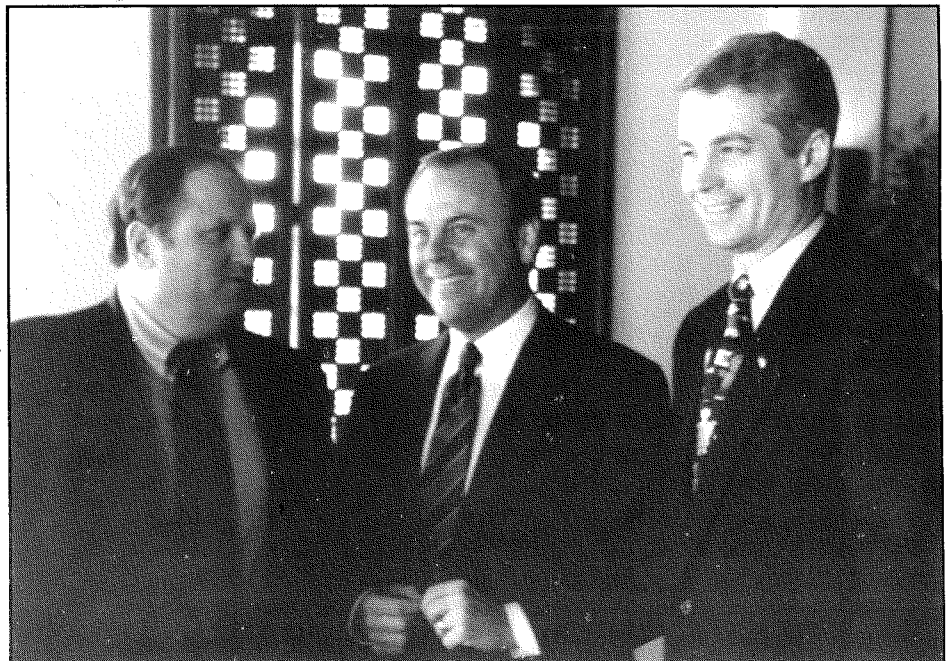
McLarty told the Partners:

"It is evident and obvious you can be counted on to get something done."

He spoke of the need for national education reform and said Pat Henry, Lawton businesswoman and past president of the national Parent Teachers Association, is responsible for parental involvement being included in Clinton's Goals 2000: Educate America Act.

He praised interaction in the Lawton-Fort Sill community, exemplified by the coop program, and described Fort Sill as the firebase of America's Army, and the best Army post in the world.

McLarty and Clinton met in Miss Mary's Kindergarten in Hope, and became lifelong friends. U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy introduced the former Arkla, Inc. president as the trusted White House gatekeeper with ability and talent to facilitate decisions.

The Foundation was founded March 22, 1972, for the purpose of collecting, administering, and disbursing gifts and endowments for the benefit and support of the university. The Partners organization held its first annual meeting in January 1990.

Aulena Gibson, former chair of the foundation and one of the founders of the Partners organization, said:

"People want to be included in the future of the university, but they need to be asked."

The first \$100,000 gift of the Partners, matched by an equal amount from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, established a \$200,000 endowment for faculty development. Partners gifts have also helped fund the Cameron Business Research Center, the Cameron Child Development Center, and the Cameron University honors program.

Alumnus Pettijohn establishes \$500,000 trust for CU

Cameron alumnus Leon Pettijohn and his wife of Redlands, Calif., have established a \$500,000 trust with Cameron University as the beneficiary.

"My wife and I are pleased to make this gift to Cameron and know that it will be used wisely and for good causes," Pettijohn said in a letter dated Feb. 1 to President Don Davis.

Pettijohn, whose first job in hospital administration was assistant administrator at Comanche County Memorial Hospital, is senior vice president, Medical Group Operations, Pacific Physician Services, Inc.

"I am pleased to say that the 20,000 shares of PPSI stock that I contributed to the trust were sold recently at a net value of \$25 per share," Pettijohn said. "Therefore, the trust begins with \$500,000 invested in an account with Prudential Securities in Newport Beach."

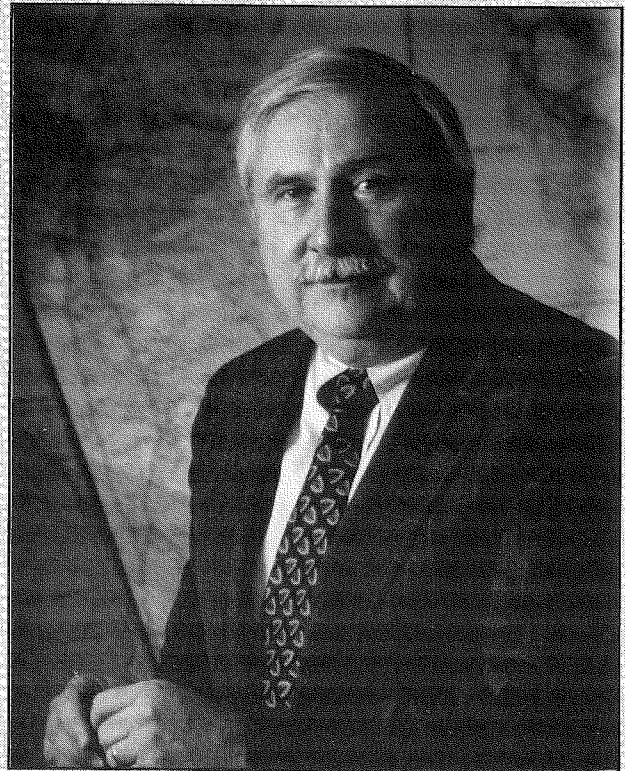
The trustee of the trust is Anthony Daigle of Paris, Texas, and the account executive for the trust at Prudential Securities, Inc. is Tom Blanchfield.

Pettijohn's mother, Thelma Pettijohn, is a resident of Altus. Pettijohn attended Cameron from 1957 to 1959. Upon completion of the Cameron program, he enrolled at Oklahoma State University where he earned a B.S. degree in banking and finance. He then served four years in the Army as a medical service corps officer. Following military service he earned a M.S. degree in hospital administration in 1969 at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas.

He was assistant administrator at Comanche County Memorial Hospital for four years, then held positions of assistant administrator for four years at various other hospitals.

In 1977, he became assistant regional administrator and vice president of Operations at American Medical International, a large hospital management company. After six years he moved to the Memorial Hospital System of Houston as regional administrator. He next was associated with National Medical Enterprises, another publicly held hospital management company. At NME, he was administrator and vice president of operations of the western region from 1984 to 1986.

In 1986, Pettijohn joined Pacific Physician Services, Inc., a publicly traded prepaid health care management company, as vice president of operations. He is responsible for overseeing operations of the company's 42 outpatient medical centers in

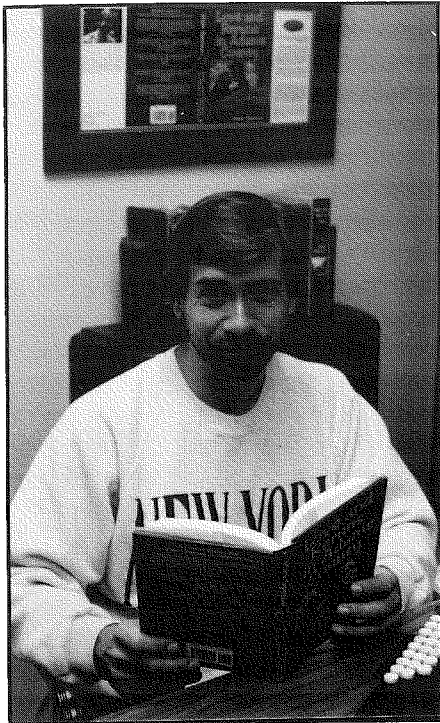

California and Arizona, and is involved in determining the strategic direction of the company.

Violinist Lee-Chin Siow wins McMahon competition

Violinist Lee-Chin Siow of Oberlin, Ohio won first place Feb. 26 in the ninth annual Louise D. McMahon International Music Competition at Cameron University.

The violinist, originally of Singapore, received \$5,000 and a week's residency in master classes at Cameron next year, a solo recital, and a featured performance with the Lawton Philharmonic Orchestra.

The competition started with 47 applicants from six states and representing five countries. During competition, it was narrowed to nine semifinalists, then to three finalists. The three performed with the Lawton Philharmonic.

The interactive event is sponsored by Cameron University and the Lawton Philharmonic Society and is made possible by a grant from McMahon Foundation. McMahon has provided \$320,000 in financing the nine years of competition.

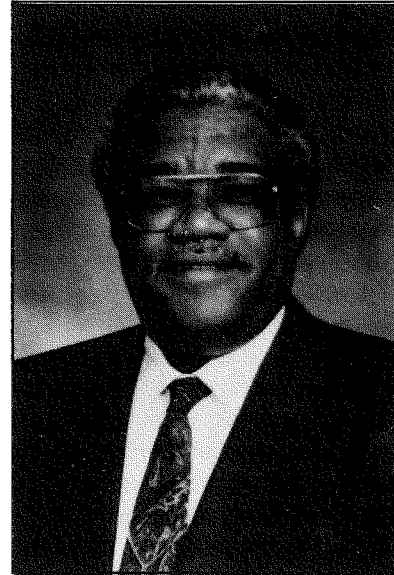
Competition is cyclical, rotating annually among pianists, instrumentalists, vocalists, and string musicians. This is the first year of string competition.



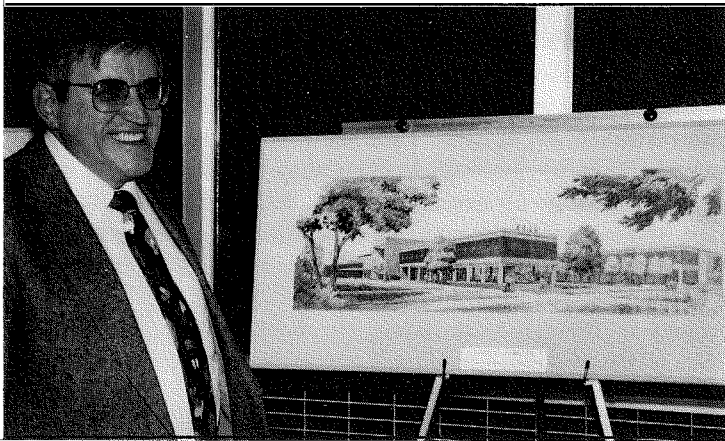

At graduation ceremony in May 1970 he was selected as the first individual to receive a bachelors diploma from Cameron University. He led projects varying from feeding the hungry to obtaining scholarships for college students. A staunch supporter of the university, he was a member of the Board of Directors of Cameron University Foundation, Inc., the Cameron University Alumni Association, and President's Partners and suggested curriculum additions made during this year's celebration of cultural diversity.

CU wins summer science grants

Cameron University for the fifth consecutive year has been awarded grants to conduct summer science sessions for area teachers and students.

Dr. Ted Snider, chair of the department of physical science and coordinator of the summer program, said a 1994 grant of \$37,158 will be used to sharpen skills of 20 elementary teachers of science and math this summer. A course for 24 high school students will also be conducted this summer under a \$36,000 grant. The sessions, approved by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, are funded through the federal Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act.

Two CU students win Carl Albert Internships

Criminal Justice students Yvonne Goetsch of Lawton and Sherry Graham of Duncan are working as Carl Albert interns with the Oklahoma Department of Corrections. Goetsch works at the center in Lawton, and Graham works at the Waurika Center as temporary employees of the state. Carl Albert internships encourage careers in government service. It is the first time two CU students have been accepted in the same semester.

Endowed chairs increase to five

Three Cameron University professors are working this year as endowed chair recipients, and The Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma and Cameron University on Jan. 25 approved two more endowed chairs.

The five chairs, each with matching funds from The State Regents' Endowment Trust Fund program, total \$2.5 million.

The two new chairs will be funded through a trust created by the late Joyce Elizabeth Hansen of Santa Monica, Calif. The trust provided almost \$600,000 to the Cameron University Foundation. Hansen established the trust at the suggestion of a family friend, the late R.H. Drewry of Lawton.

The two new chairs will honor Hansen's parents, earlyday Lawton residents. They will be the Dr. Joseph H. Mullin Chair in Agriculture and the Mary Dixie Mullin Chair in the Sciences. Each will be \$500,000, including matching amounts from the state regents. The remainder of the Hansen gift will be used to establish a scholarship program in agriculture and the sciences.

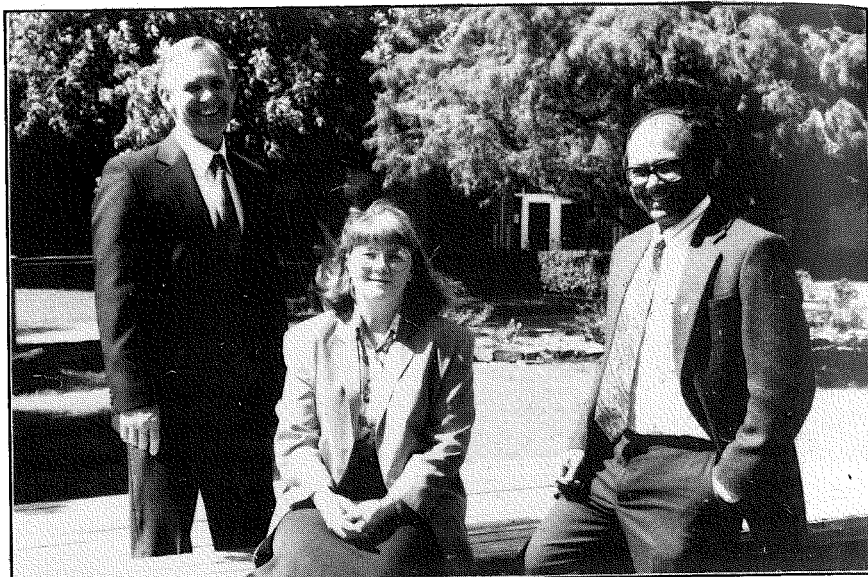
Dr. T.K. Bhattacharya, Dr. William James, and Dr. Sally Soelle through application made in their departments won endowed professorships this year. All the chairs provide the professors the opportunity to do specific work relating to their fields.

Dr. T.K. Bhattacharya, assistant professor in the School of Business, received the Lawton Independent Insurance Agents Endowed Chair. The purpose of that chair is to promote economic growth and business development in Southwest Oklahoma.

As designated director of the Business Research Center, Bhattacharya is responsible for publications that promote economic development, as well as workshops directed towards new technology, innovative marketing techniques, and emerging issues and concerns of small business owners.

Bhattacharya, who teaches investments and corporate finance, received his doctorate in finance at the University of Oklahoma in 1992, was a Barnett Scholar at OU in 1986-89, and a Cleo Cross Scholar there in 1987. He is editor of the Southwest Oklahoma Economic Review, has been a research assistant, and has published articles in economic reviews.

Dr. William James, professor of education, received the

Clarence E. Page Endowed Chair, which is associated with the Clarence E. Page Aerospace Educational Complex of the Oklahoma Air Space Museum.

James is facilitating programs that increase awareness and knowledge of the educational aspects of aerospace for students and educators within Cameron University fields of mathematics, science, and aerospace. He will also establish a writing project that will give information about aerospace history and concepts.

James earned a doctorate in education at Oklahoma State University in 1976. He received his masters in education at the University of Arizona in 1964 and a bachelors in education in 1962 at East Central State University.

Dr. Sally Soelle was named the first recipient of the McCasland/Cache Road National Bank Chair. The McCasland Foundation in addition to endowing the chair has supported purchase of equipment for the new sciences complex at CU, has provided scholarships for Cameron students, and funded the McCasland lecture series.

Soelle received a masters in history at the University of Oklahoma in 1984 and a bachelors in history at Cameron University in 1982. She received her Ph.D. from the OU history department in 1993.

As co-coordinator this year of Festival II: A Celebration of Diversity, she helped organize the McCasland lectureships, bringing three internationally known scholars of multiculturalism to the campus. She has played a pivotal role in organizing events, fund raising and promotion of Festival II events. She has served as faculty sponsor for the History Club and for Phi Alpha Theta, the history honor society.

University takes masters to Europe; proposes M.A. in teaching

Cameron has made two thrusts on the academic front. It is creating a new, innovative master of arts in teaching. A second project will take the university's master of education in early childhood education to teachers in American installations in Europe.

The European project is part of a University of Oklahoma contract with the Department of Defense. OU officials felt that the Cameron program best met the needs of the contract, said Dr. Terral McKellips, provost.

The program will also provide training and certification for child caregivers in Department of Defense schools in Europe. Several CU faculty members, including Dr. Margie McMahan, director of the Cameron Child Development Center, and Dr. Bill James, professor of education, are expected to teach part-time in Europe.

Cameron will operate under contract from OU, with expenses paid.

"OU pays all expenses, including travel, so that essentially we are indemnified against any costs," McKellips said.

The OU contract is for a five-year period. Cameron will have one full time faculty person in Europe, Dr. Jane Lannak, who was also employed under a previous contract operated by

Boston University. Headquarters for the project is Rhein-Main Air Force Base, Germany.

The new master of arts in teaching was proposed in response to an April 1992 request for proposals for planning grants to support development of innovative teacher education programs. The request was made by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

Cameron proposed a master of arts in teaching designed for students seeking teacher licensure who have completed a bachelors degree which includes required courses for a teaching specialty. The program features heavy concentration of field experience to include five hours of teaching in a public school classroom each day for 12 weeks, and a daily seminar conducted by a team composed of a public school teacher, a discipline specialist, and a teacher educator.

The OU/CU regents in January also approved the deletion of the bachelor of science in agriculture education at Cameron. Reasons cited by Cameron officials included low enrollments and low numbers of graduates. McKellips said other agriculture bachelors programs are thriving, and will be enhanced through the Dr. Joseph H. Mullin Endowed Chair in Agriculture.

University prepares Festival II finale

Cameron's Festival II is reaching its climax. The finale is a cultural and academic extravaganza that includes lectures by six international authorities on diversity; art shows, a play, a mass instrumental and choral concert, and 50 scholarly papers from all parts of the country.

All are scheduled in April. The academic conference April 6-9 is the highlight of Festival II: A Celebration of Diversity.

The conference will explore diversity in the community, the classroom, the business environment, and in history.

Dr. Cornel West, the premier African-American philosopher, will deliver the keynote lecture at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 6, at University Theater.

He is the third speaker in the McCasland Lecture Series this year. His topic is "Beyond Eurocentrism and Multiculturalism." West is professor of philosophy and director of the African-American Studies Program at Princeton University. His latest book, "Race Matters," has become a bestseller.

His, and all keynote addresses have been funded by the Oklahoma Foundation for the Humanities and the National Endowment for the Humanities and are free and open to the public. Participants not wishing to purchase luncheon tickets may hear luncheon addresses by entering the audience area of Shepler Mezzanine at 1:15 p.m.

Other keynote speakers are Dr. Arthur Loeb, Harvard University; Dr. Russell Thornton, Dartmouth University;

The final theater production of the academic year will open April 7. "Life is a Dream" is a drama from Spain, adapted and directed by Dr. Ted Wendt, Fine Arts dean. The play explores the thin line that separates the reality of dreams from the dreamlike quality of our waking lives.

Alumnus Mike Cox headlines Jazz Fest

Alumnus Michael Cox with his saxophone returned to the university Thursday, March 24, to headline the 18th annual Cameron University Jazz Festival.

Who has he played with? Just about everyone, at least once. He has performed with jazz small groups, jazz big bands, and with Ray Price, Maureen McGovern, Ringling Brothers, Bob Hope, Patti Page, Kay Starr, Margaret Whiting and Ella Fitzgerald.

Last year, in addition to instructing at Capital University Conservatory of Music in Columbus, Ohio, he played 250 gigs.

His diverse background as a working musician includes gritty Oklahoma blues, country, funk, rock and roll, fusion, symphony and pit orchestras, and swinging straight-ahead jazz.

He has received awards and grants from the International Association of Jazz Educators, and, in 1989, from the National Endowment for the Arts. He was voted jazz soloist-college winner in the 1990 Downbeat magazine student awards.

"Cox howls at the moon until dawn," wrote John McDonough of Downbeat.

The CU Jazz Fest is sponsored by the School of Fine Arts, music department, and the Lectures and Concerts Committee, said John E. Moots, founder and director of the fest and director of the jazz ensemble.

The concert included selections by the jazz ensemble directed by Moots, The CU Gospel Chorus directed by Bonita Franklin, and five jazz standards by soloist Cox performing with the jazz ensemble. His selections included jazz standards "Moon River," "All the Things You Are," and "Slow Funk."

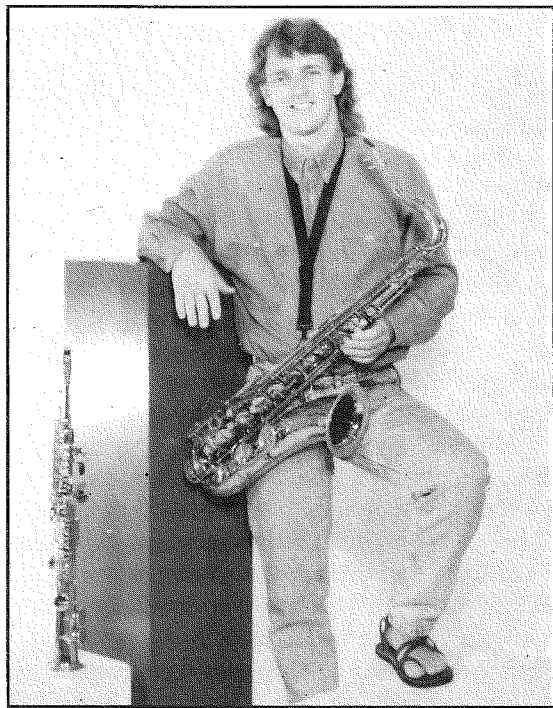
The festival also included instrumental studio clinics and workouts by high school jazz ensembles.

Cox, a native of Lawton and 1983 graduate of Cameron, comes full circle to headline the Jazz Fest. His interest in music began at age 8 when he played along to his favorite records in his older brother Danny's garage band practice room.

Cox returned in 1987 as a member of the Steve Story band which headlined the festival that year.

As a teenager, Cox played almost every weekend in bands with his brother, Danny.

"Danny took me to Fort Sill to hear and meet saxophonist Logan Walker. I think that may have been the first time I really heard, live and up close, the language of jazz on the saxophone," Cox said.

He received scholarships to Cameron from the Independent Insurance Agents of Lawton, the Lions Club, and McMahon Foundation.

He married Rosemary Holman, also a Cameron alum. He assumed a teaching assistanceship at Wichita State University and earned a masters there. In 1988, after four years in Kansas, they moved to Greeley, Colo., where he started a doctorate degree in

music at the University of Northern Colorado.

When Cox is in Lawton, he sits with his brother Danny who is a keyboardist with The Bootleg Boogie Blues Band. He gives credit for his success to his brother, his parents, his wife, and his Cameron experience.

In the early '70s, his brother, Danny, driven by desire and love for music, went on the road. He simply loaded up the van, got in, and went.

"When he came back home he wasn't rich monetarily, but he had certainly proven to me that you could play music and survive," Cox said.

"There are certain ideas or concepts that I have really latched onto, and which I think about almost every day. Once Dr. David Pickthorn said in a lesson at Cameron, 'I never want to be in a situation where I'm not playing my instrument, not playing music.'

G. Wilson Duncan says thanks for opportunity

G. Wilson Duncan hitchhiked to Oklahoma in the middle of the Great Depression, and, beginning at 4:30 a.m. every day, worked his way through Cameron.

Duncan, Class of '37 and founder of G. Wilson Duncan Co. public accountants and tax counselors in Stillwater, returned to campus during Homecoming Oct. 2, 1992. It was his first time back in 56 years, and he reflected on the hard work and opportunity Cameron gave him.

He was reared on a farm in Franklin County, Tenn., and graduated from high school in 1933. His first job was working at a flour and feed mill, eight hours a day, six days a week, for \$7.20 a week. At the same time he was working as a houseboy for room and board, with the goal of going to college someday.

After 18 months he was convinced he was getting nowhere, so he hitchhiked to Chickasha, where he had relatives. That summer he roomed with a cousin at Oklahoma A&M and refinished furniture, but in the fall was told he had no sponsor, and his job had to go to someone who did.

"That shook me up a little," he said. Hoping to earn meals and room, he tried out with 60 other lads for the Cameron football team. But he hadn't played in two years and didn't make the squad.

He discussed his problem with Grace Winningham, matron at Whitehurst Hall. The basement contained the student cafeteria. Grace Winningham advised him to see President C.M. Conwill about getting a job.

"I told him I had worked for two years and had saved enough money to pay my room, board and tuition until Christmas, but to continue school, I was going to need a job soon thereafter."

Conwill said he would do his best to have a job for Duncan after Christmas. Duncan paid his tuition and got a job at Waldron's Candy Company in Lawton. He worked three afternoons a week and Saturdays.

"I was paid \$3.50 a week. That kept me in spending money."

Before the Christmas break, Conwill told him he would be in charge of the breakfast shift in the cafeteria at Whitehurst.

"Since that crew is made up principally of football boys, you will have to see that your help wakes up in time to do the job or you will have to do it for them."

Duncan recalled:

"I rose about 4:30 every morning. This continued until I graduated in May of 1937. As I recall I was not required to pay any additional funds and the college never paid me any."

Upon graduation from Cameron, he enrolled at Oklahoma A&M where he earned a major in accounting. While in school he worked for an accounting firm, and after graduation he became a partner in the firm. In 1941 he purchased the firm and operated as G. Wilson Duncan Company, a family business. His brother, Thomas Aaron Duncan, joined the company. His wife, Daisy, was office manager for years. His nephew joined the firm in the 1970s. Duncan, now in his 55th year, still works about half-time as a tax accountant.

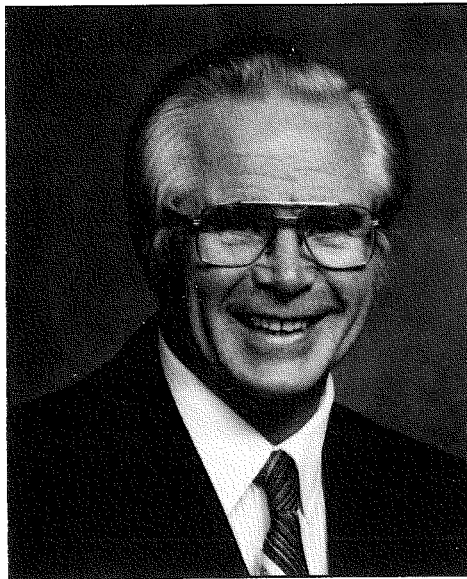
Before Christmas, 1993, 58 years after he got the Cameron job at the cafeteria, he wrote a letter to Cameron University.

"I would like to tell you that I appreciate the opportunities that have come my way. One, which I cherish dearly, was the opportunity I had while I was at Cameron. Please find the enclosed \$5,000 check that represents dividends on Cameron's investment."

President Don Davis said Duncan's determination and drive to overcome all obstacles to achieve a college education are an inspiration to students, faculty and alumni.

The gift will help construct the new Sciences Complex. The gift will be memorialized in a plaque in the new building, and a seat in the multi-media lecture hall of the new building will be named in Duncan's honor.

The Wilson/Golf Coaches Association of America poll ranked Cameron fifth in the nation, behind Cal-State Stanislaw. Against their Division II opponents, the golfers were 6-1 in the fall, and

tied for second at the Woodyard Hungerland Intercollegiate meet in Huntsville, Texas in March. Senior Mike O'Connell led the team with a 73 average over the 13 fall rounds.

Tennis nets new faces

Three new faces can be seen on the Cameron courts. The women's team netted Malaysian transfer student May Lee, while the men picked up Shawn Foster from Texas, and Surinam native Derk DeVries. In early spring meets, the men defeated Texas Wesleyan and Midwestern State, and Southeast-

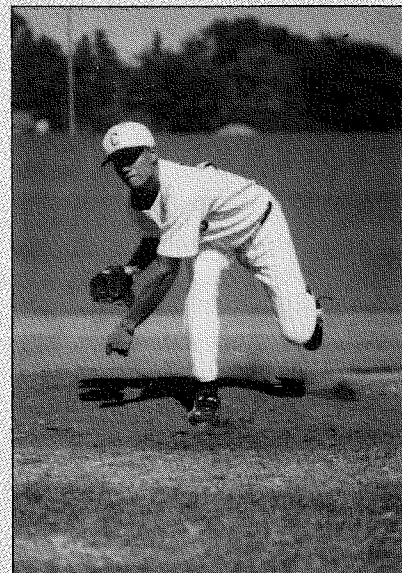

Athletes score in academics

The cumulative grade point average for all student-athletes and trainers in the fall was a 2.8 on a 4.0 scale. Heading the list were the women's basketball and volleyball teams and the golf team, posting team grade point averages above the 3.0 mark.
