Ostar gives CU "interactive" sendoff

Cameron University received praise and a sendoff into its interactive future when Allan W. Ostar spoke to the second annual meeting of President's Partners Jan. 12.

Ostar is president of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and father of the "interactive university" concept which has been adapted for Cameron by President Don Davis.

Ostar said the best way to meet the challenges of changing demographics, rapid advances in technology and international competition is through the creation of strategic partnerships among higher education, business and government.

He spoke at a banquet attended by approximately 200. More than 100 individual and business members of the Partners have pledged \$1,000 annually to Cameron.

Lauding the organization, Ostar said

business and industry as stakeholders in the interactive university are supplied with trained graduates, and in return supply visiting instructors and mentors.

He said the interactive university understands the importance of cultural diversity "that our differences do not weaken us; they strengthen us." In the 1990s, the nation will require 700,000 science and

technological professionals, and 85 percent of the new workers will be minorities, women, and disabled workers, he said.

President Davis said funding contributed by the Partners this year will go to the New Business Research Center within the School of Business.

Research center begins business

Cameron's new Business Research Center (BRC,) with financing this year from President's Partners, has moved into a wing on the first floor of the School of Business and started several research projects.

Development of a general business index (GBI) for the Lawton area is the first research project, said Cameron President Don Davis.

Other planned projects are analysis for a theme park venture, a customer satisfaction survey for banks, and a customer survey for a mall, said Dr. Jacquetta McClung, dean of the School of Business.

The GBI consists of 27 variables and will provide invaluable data in recruiting industry. In the past such statistics have been reported as Tulsa, Oklahoma City, and the rest of the state. They will now be reported as Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Lawton, and the rest of the state.

T.K. Bhattacharya, assistant professor of finance, is the director of the BRC. He is assisted by Dr. Abdul Sukar, assistant professor of economics.

Kerr coaches success in workplace

Dr. Jane Buchwald Kerr, Cameron College alumna and one of three women who chairs a department at the university, coaches success in the workplace.

Chair of the department of home economics/human ecology, she teaches consumer economics and career preparation courses including resume writing and job interviewing.

Her recent work achievements include co-authoring a book, "African American Dress and Adornment: A Cultural Perspective," published in 1990 by Kendall/Hunt, Dubuque, Iowa; and presentation of two papers concerning female advancement in the workplace.

In March, 1990 she presented "Political Mistakes From Which You May Never Recover" at the Oklahoma Conference on Advancement of Women in Higher Education, University of Oklahoma Research Center. In May, 1990 she presented "Women, Work and Self-

Image" at the Women & Work Conference, University of Texas at Arlington.

"Women tend to want to do 110 percent, and that is impossible," Kerr said. "They should set realistic goals, achieve one step at a time, then go on to the next goal."

Kerr during the Oklahoma Conference on Advancement of Women in Higher Education advocated political savvy for women in the workplace and stressed traits including discretion and reliability as keys to success.

"Those who wish to rise in their profession use initiative and never miss a deadline," she said. "A lively sense of humor helps define and distinguish leaders. Exhibiting and handling humor effectively may be one of the most important on-the-job skills a woman needs for professional success."

Kerr at 5 feet 4 "suited" for basketball years ago when she was a farm girl at Chattanooga. In 1962, she was Aggie queen at Cameron Junior College where she studied home economics. She earned

a B.S. in home economics education at OSU and a masters in education at OU. She completed her Ed.D. in adult and continuing education at OSU in 1985.

She has one son, David Beavers, 16, a junior at Eisenhower

High School, and three stepchildren. Her stepson, Ken Kerr, earned a masters degree at Cameron in the spring of 1990. Her stepdaughter, Kellie Randall, is a Cameron senior majoring in medical technology. Kyle Kerr is a pharmacist in Dallas. Her husband, Frank Kerr, a native of Walters, is a Cameron junior majoring in history and foreign languages.



UPDATE ON ROTC GRADUATES

As of Nov. 15, 1990, 222 Cameron alumni who have been commissioned through Cameron's Army ROTC program were serving on active duty. This represents 54% of the 415 graduates who have received Army commissions since Cameron's first commissioning class in 1970.

Graduates range in rank from second lieutenant to senior lieutenant colonel. "Cameron should have its first colonel next year when the officers from the class of 1970 enter the promotion zone for colonel," said Lt. Col. Dick Murphy, chairman of the department of military science.

Five graduates are known to have already commanded or are in command of battalion-size units. They include James Beauchamp, '70; Terry Bullington, '70; Roy Edwards, '70; Michael Bergman, '71; and James Pickens, '72.

Philip Brinkley, '72, is scheduled to assume command in early 1991.

"This is a good indication of the quality of Cameron's graduates and how well they are doing across the Army," said Murphy. Cameron's ROTC graduates include 26 lieutenant colonels, 69 majors, 72 captains and 55 lieutenants. They are serving across the Army in a wide variety of assignments, including the Department of the Army and the Joint Staff at the Pentagon.

Dr. Connie Butterfield, '81, is an Army captain on the medical staff at Beaumont Army Medical Center, Ft. Bliss, Tex. A number of graduates are serving in Saudi Arabia.

In addition to the 222 Cameron graduates commissioned through Army ROTC, more than 300 other Cameron graduates are serving on active duty in the Army. The vast majority of these

officers received their commissions through the Officer Candidate School program and later completed their degrees at Cameron through the Army's degree completion program. One such officer student is currently enrolled at Cameron compared to the peak years in the early 1970s when as many as 300 Army officers were enrolled as full-time Cameron students.

Among the more notable army officers with direct ties to Cameron are Maj. Gen. Thomas J.P. Jones, '71, who recently retired as the commander of White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico and Maj. Gen. Wilson A. Shoffner who is commanding the 3rd Infantry Division in Germany. Jones completed his degree while a lieutenant colonel in the "Bootstrap" program. Shoffner was a two-year graduate in the late '50s, and then transferred to Oklahoma State where he received his commission in 1961.

CAREER FAIR SET FOR MARCH 28

The Cameron University placement office will sponsor the third annual Cameron Career Fair on Thursday, March 28, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Shepler Mezzanine.

The fair is designed to give all Cameron students an opportunity to explore career possibilities for college graduates and to visit informally with a number of representatives from businesses and government industries. It also offers graduating seniors an opportunity to make valuable job contacts. No interviews will be conducted; however, those attending might want to bring resumes.

Grads reward Nalley with their success

Dr. Elizabeth Ann Nalley, who grew up on a farm near Checotah and attended a one-room schoolhouse, is a nationally recognized chemical researcher and the national vice president of Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

She delights in the successes of her Cameron former students, and keeps a running correspondence with them.

Nalley is a 20-year faculty member at Cameron and one of 10 female full professors among a total of 54 full professors at the university. In 1978 she became the first female professor promoted to full professor at Cameron University.

Nalley and Dr. Donna Nelson of OU, working under a \$17,000 research opportunity award from National Science Foundation, did research last summer on organic synthesis through organoborane compounds -- research that will benefit the pharmaceutical industry.

Nalley is the recipient of the Cameron University Student Congress Outstanding Professor Award (1986,) the Phi Kappa Phi Meritorious Service Award (1981 and 1989) the Phi Kappa Phi Cameron University Alumni Award (1980) and the CU Phi Kappa Phi Distinguished Faculty Award in 1978.

She is active in the American Chemical Society and is the faculty sponsor of the Cameron University American Chemical Student Affiliate Chapter. She was nominated for the Oklahoma Chemist of the Year Award in 1986.

Nalley was elected national vice president of Phi Kappa Phi by the delegates of the 1989 triennial convention of the honor society. Phi Kappa Phi recognizes academic excellence in all academic disciplines.

She served as a regent from 1980 until her election. While serving as a regent, she conceived the idea and edited a manual which describes in detail procedures for establishing new chapters and maintaining old ones.

She received her B.S. from Northeastern Oklahoma State University in 1965, her M.S. from Oklahoma State University in 1969 and her Ph.D. from Texas Woman's University in 1975.

Several main sources of inspiration for Nalley as a child were the biography of the Polish-born French chemist and Nobel prize winner Marie Curie; the encouragement and high caliber of her science teachers in high school; and a National Science Foundation High School Institute in Chemical Engineering, held at Oklahoma State University, which she attended between her junior and senior years in high school

"One of the main rewards received from the teaching profession is the opportunity to observe the results of the products your university produces -- our students," she said.

"At Cameron this is especially true because the physical science department is small enough that we develop close ties with our students as we serve not only as their teacher and academic adviser, but often as their mentor, professional adviser, and friend.

"This means in many cases we assist them in preparing applications to graduate and professional school and in securing their first job and in many cases their second and other future positions," Nalley said.

'85 chemistry grads succeed in variety of positions

There are so many chemistry grad success stories at Cameron that it would take several weeks to describe them, said Dr. Ann Nalley, professor of physical science.

Here is what has happened to just a few from the class of 22 graduates in chemistry in 1985:

John Argenzia completed his B.S. in chemistry and accepted a position as a chemist with Goodyear in Lawton. He performs quality control analytical tests on polymer and composite samples at various stages in the tire manufacturing process at Goodyear.

Phillip Easton completed his B.S. and entered graduate school at the University of Arkansas the following fall. He completed his Ph.D. in chemistry in the fall of 1989 and accepted a position as a research chemist with Conoco-Dupont in Ponca City.

Robert Karl Herring after graduation at Cameron became a process development chemist with Martin Marietta in Orlando, Fla.

Kathy Hise after completing her B.S. in chemistry began work with National Analytical Laboratories in Tulsa. There she became an expert in environmental analysis procedures. Her work was so

outstanding that her employer has since hired several other Cameron graduates. During the last three years Kathy received additional training, accepted more responsibility, and moved up the employment ladder. She is employed by AGRI-CHEM in Catoosa, Okla. where she does research in agriculture and environmental chemistry. She will be completing her masters degree at OSU in the department of civil engineering this spring.

Darwin "Win" Hormann Jr. after retiring from a career in the Army completed his B.S. in chemistry at Cameron. He became an environmental specialist in Oklahoma City with the Oklahoma State Health Department. Win recognized that there were career opportunities where he could utilize both his training as a chemist and his extensive training and experience in the military. After a year at the State Health Department, he applied for and was accepted into the training program of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) He has completed that training and is assigned as an officer to the Lawton OSBI office. He relies heavily on his analytical training in chemistry and is often called upon to gather and investigate evidence at crime scenes. His wife, Dr. Virginia A. Hormann, is an associate professor of physical science at

Cameron.

Christopher Hynes after completing his B.S. in chemistry at OU entered grad school at Oklahoma State University. He recently completed his Ph.D. in analytical chemistry and is seeking a position in teaching at the university level.

Stan Alan Zisman completed his B.S. in chemistry and mathematics at CU and entered graduate school at OSU. He completed his Ph.D. in organic chemistry. He completed his four undergraduate years with a perfect 4.00 GPA then compiled an identical record in grad school. Stan's Ph.D. research led to the development of several important patentable pesticides. He is now working for Phillips Petroleum in Bartlesville.

Robert Louis Schmurr entered the School of Veterinary Medicine at Oklahoma State University after completing his B.S. in chemistry at CU. He completed his DVM and is now in private practice.

James H. "Jim" Keck moved to Atlanta after graduation in chemistry at Cameron. He is working with Hitachi selling medical and analytical instrumentation.


