
At the beginning of the school year '26-'27, we had a class of thirty members who were loyal to both the class and the school.




The Prep department at Cameron consists of nearly fourty members in the seventh and eighth grades representing all parts of Oklahoma and part of Texas.







The financing of this club is done entirely by its members.




DRAMATIC CLUB







Leon Crain and William Moon tied for high honors of the team and each received a nice cash reward.



THE FARM


Our farm consist of eighty acres of good bottom land and seventy acres of upland.

The improvements on the farm are: one combination horse and dairy barn, a silo, machinery shed, hog house and pasture, a complete poultry plant, a ten acre orchard, an alfalfa field, garden plot, and a small vineyard.


We also have on the farm several head of good Percheon horses, a herd of registered Holsteins, Durock Jersey hogs, and in our poultry plant are Purebred Rhode Island Reds, White Leghorns and White Wyandotts.

The farm acts as an experimenting laboratory for the ones who are taking the agricultural courses, produces eggs, poultry and milk for the boarding club, and furnishes employment for a number of students who wish to work their way thru school.

Mr. Hulse, Agricultural instructor, and Mr. Sawyer, farm manager, are interested in making the farm show as large a return as possible and altho the returns of the farm for the last year have exceeded anything ever obtained previous to this they have both set about to make returns from next year exceed the past, especially do they hope to see an improvement in the livestock as several new members have been added recently.

Football at Cameron has been slowly but steadily improving both in quality and momentum for a number of years.


Within the last five years it has advanced from the inferior class to the class that is respected by other schools.







BASKET BALL


The 1927 Basket Ball season was by far the most successful in the history of basketball at Cameron.




LASTWORD
