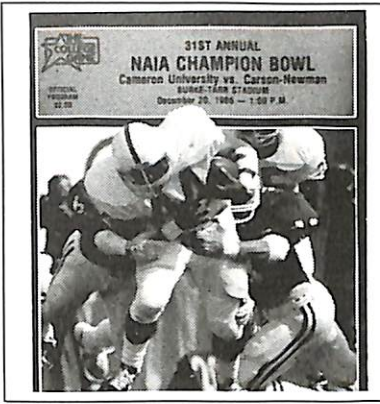

THE COLLEGE: Carson-Newman is a coeducational liberal arts college, founded in 1851, operated by the Tennessee Baptist Convention.

LOCATION: Our campus is located in Jefferson City, Tennessee, a town of 6,000 people just 30 minutes from Knoxville. Housing includes five dormitories, married student residences, and off-campus apartments.

ENROLLMENT: Our 1700 full-time students come from 29 states and eight foreign countries, with a male/female ratio of 1 to 1.

FACULTY: Sixty percent of the faculty have earned doctorates. Our student/faculty ratio is 16 to 1.

MAJORS: The Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Science in Nursing are offered with majors in over 50 different areas.

Prelaw, premed, and pre dental programs are popular at Carson-Newman. Binary programs in engineering and various health sciences are offered with other institutions.

Honors programs and Individual Directions degree plans are available.

ACTIVITIES: Carson-Newman's active campus life includes 15 varsity athletic teams, extensive intramurals, Baptist Student Union, honor societies, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, ROTC, and a variety of social clubs and interest groups.

CAREERS: The career Counseling Center offers individual career exploration, resume-writing and job interview coordination, internships, and a network of business and professional alumni.

STUDENT AID: The Financial Aid program offers scholarships, grants, loans, and campus jobs for Carson-Newman students.

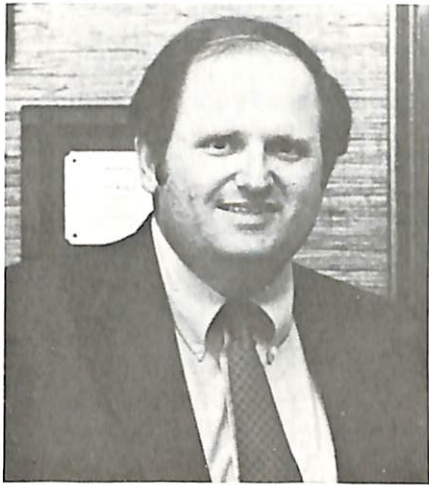
STUDY ABROAD: Students may participate in foreign travel-study programs with Carson-Newman faculty and special summer programs, as well as a Semester in London.

President

Following in his father's footsteps, Don Davis became president of Cameron University in 1980.

Davis graduated from Cameron Junior College in 1962 and earned a doctor of jurisprudence from the University of Oklahoma in 1969. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1970 and served on several committees. His biggest contribution came as a member of the House Committee on Appropriations and Budget.

Davis received the American Legion Distinguished Service Award in 1977, was named one of Oklahoma's five best legislators by "Oklahoma Monthly" in 1978, was honored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of its Outstanding Young Men in 1979, and has served as president of the Rotary Club.

His father, the late Clarence L. Davis, was Cameron College president from June, 1957, until his death in July, 1960.

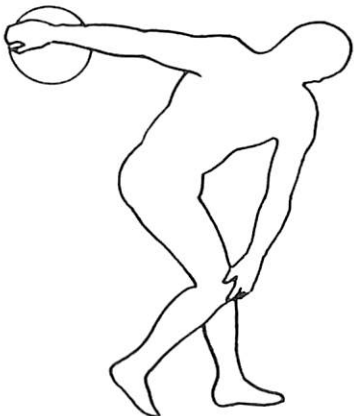

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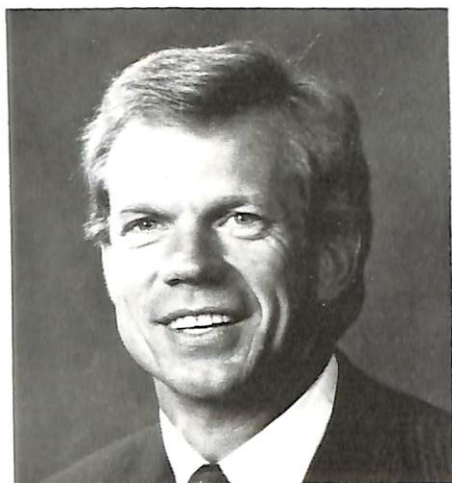
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EAGLE COACHES



Coach Ken Sparks

The year 1980 was a chance for Carson-Newman to start all over. A new decade had begun; a new coach had been chosen to lead the way — a man named Ken Sparks. Sparks was hired as the school's 17th head football coach, and the dividends came quickly. The foundation was built in 1980 and 1981 with back-to-back third place finishes in the SAC-8. In 1982, Carson-Newman won its first ever South Atlantic Conference championship, and the Eagles made it back to the NAIA playoffs for the first time in ten years.

The Ken Sparks era at Carson-Newman scaled new heights in 1983 when Sparks, who was voted as the SAC-8 Coach of the Year, guided the Eagles to their second straight conference championship and the school's first ever NAIA national football championship. Carson-Newman motored through the playoffs with a vengeance. During the first two rounds, the Eagles reeled off 83 points to their opponent's 28. The site of the Champion Bowl was Grand Junction, Colorado, and Carson-Newman's foe was Mesa College of Grand Junction, a team that had itself played for the national crown the year before. When the smoke had cleared, Carson-Newman had defeated the Mavericks 36-28 and won the school's first NAIA national

championship in any sport since Bobby Wilson led the Carson-Newman baseballers to the national title in 1965.

The 1984 season was a near reflection of the championship effort of the year before. Sparks was named SAC-8 Coach of the Year, Carson-Newman won its third consecutive South Atlantic Conference trophy and the Eagles made it back to the NAIA Championship Bowl. The game with Central Arkansas ended in a tie, and Carson-Newman was named national co-champion. A few weeks later, Sparks was named the NAIA National Coach of the Year.

Last season the Eagles' record dropped to 5-5, but considering what they were up against, 1985 was still a very productive year. Going into the season, Carson-Newman faced the cold fact of 15 starters lost to graduation, not to mention three new coaches and perhaps the toughest schedule in the history of the program. After the homecoming game with eventual conference champion Mars Hill the Eagles found themselves at 2-4. There was no hope for a fourth conference title; there was no hope for a fourth straight trip to the national playoffs. And the chances of avoiding a losing season were slim at best. But with nothing but pride on the line, Carson-Newman finished the year with a flurry. The Eagles won three of their last four games to complete the season on a high note and set the stage for more positive results in 1986.

Head Football Coach

Brian Naber's reputation as a coach who can turn a program around has followed him to Cameron University.

In three seasons at Doane College in Crete, Neb., Naber's teams improved from 2-7 to 7-4 and 7-3. He was NAIA District 11 Coach of the Year in 1982.

In his first two seasons at Cameron University, his teams were 5-5 and 3-7. The 1986 team was 9-1-1 entering the NAIA playoffs, and he has been named District 9 Coach of the Year.

Naber is a native of Seward, Neb. He earned his B.S. from Concordia Teachers College in Seward in 1971, earned a Masters at the University of Northern Colorado in 1972, and has completed 12 hours toward his doctorate.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Northern Iowa in 1971 at UNC in 1972. He served at Minneapolis Lutheran High School, The American School in Japan, and Fort Hays State before accepting the Doane challenge in 1981.

William "Bill" Carter accepted the position as athletic director at Cameron University in 1985 after a distinguished career as a coach and administrator at the high school and college level.

A native of Davenport, Iowa, he received his B.S. degree from the University of Dubuque in 1962 and his M.S. from Oklahoma State University in 1968. He coached and taught at Davenport, Dubuque and Griswold, Iowa, high schools and spent two seasons at Riverdale High in Port Byron, Ill., before moving to Wichita, Kan., Collegiate School in 1971.

Carter served at Collegiate, Kapaun Mount Carmel High, Friends University and Collegiate again before moving to Cameron in 1985.

He has authored two basketball publications, "The 1-2-2 Zone Defense and Its Variations" and "The Controlled Sideline Break." He is a member of the Rotary Club.

Carter currently is serving in the dual capacity as athletic director and basketball coach.

NAIAC provides coaches in all sports with a strong voice in the establishment of rules and standards in each sport. The All-America and Academic All-America awards programs are a function of NAIAC and the Awards Committee, subject to the policies and guidelines established by each individual sport association.

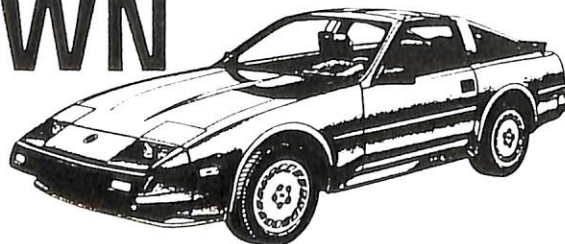
Phyllis Holmes, director of women's athletics, Greenville College, Greenville, Illinois, is the NAIA Executive Committee Liaison for the National Division I and II Football Playoffs.

Holmes also serves as National Executive Committee Liaison for Affiliated Conferences and the NAIA insurance program. She will serve as the first female president of the NAIA in 1988-89.

All NAIA championship meets, games and tournaments are under the direct supervision and control of the 10-member Executive Committee. The National Executive Committee is elected by the membership of the NAIA at the Annual Business Meeting of the Association.

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National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics



The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics to nearly 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964-84), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968-83) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division in the NAIA. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity apart.

ADMINISTRATION

The NAIA is governed by two bodies. The Council of Presidents, composed of one president from each district, is responsible for fiscal matters, academic standards and supervision of the national staff. The 10-person Executive Committee, elected by the membership, is responsible for organizing championship events and overseeing the committees and associations. The Executive Director conducts the day-to-day operation of the National Office, headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri. A full time staff of fifteen serves the membership from the National Office.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 32 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, headed by the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes district playoff events, the champions of which qualify to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA participants is accomplished through a network of people including faculty athletic representatives, District Eligibility Chairs, and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada that awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OF MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletics programs with the standards of the regulatory associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are more stringent than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

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
