
girls bounce to 5-3 season





The Lady Aggies finished the 1984-85 season with a 22-9 mark, the fourth time in seven years that an R.T. Toma team has collected 20 wins. The women also secured a home court advantage in the first round of the District IX playoffs by defeating Central State by a 76-61 margin in the final regular points per game to better the a season game for both teams.

Melanie Saunders topped the allstime rebounding record during the course of the season, as she collected 233 to run her total to 695. 



Copeland's co-captain abilities proved well for Toma and the Lady Aggies during her junior year so she was chosen to this position once again.

Toma considers Copeland a definite threat to opponents.

"She is so aggressive and she has good judgment on offense and defense. Her shooting percentage has been one of the best on the team for the past two years, and she continues to be a dominent factor in rebounding for the Lady Aggles.'

After the 1984-85 season concludes, Copeland plans to give up hasketball. Following graduation, she will become a computer analyst for the civil service department in Fort Sill.







Despite this, Tomniy was still


and universities across the nation including Kansas State Universit and North Carolina State.
