# President's Partners honored at gala

Cameron University President Don Davis hosted the annual "President's Partners Gala" on March 25 at the Fort Sill Officer's Club.

The event was held to express Cameron's appreciation for the Partners' donations to the university. The Gala highlighted what can be accomplished through the Partners' contributions.

A feature of the evening's program was a presentation by Provost Terral McKellips entitled "The Magic of Informational Technology." This presentation illustrated the many uses of instructional technology in the curriculum. Various departments at Cameron set up exhibits to demonstrate the learning processes which result from integrating instructional technology into their curriculum.

The President's Partners was organized in 1989 to raise funds to meet the short and long-term financial needs for quality education at Cameron University. During the past year over 20 new partners have been added for a total of 160 partners.

The projected goal is to raise \$1 million by the turn of the century. In order to accomplish this goal, each partner contributes \$1,000 annually. Contributions may be used to provide scholarships for outstanding students, endow chairs for exceptional professors, encourage research and its application, improve facilities and assist in recruiting faculty and students. For each \$1,000 contribution, the donor has the option of designating up to one-half of the contribution to a university program of their choice.


# Construction begins on Sciences Complex

A new chapter of Cameron University's history opened on January 27, 1995, with a groundbreaking ceremony for the new Sciences Complex. Construction will take approximately 16 months and classes are scheduled for the new building during the fall semester of 1996. The Complex will provide CU students with the latest in lecture, laboratory and computer-assisted instructional spaces.

President Don Davis said: "The Sciences Complex includes major investments in environmental quality, energy efficiency This and educational support systems. 'engineered flexibility' ensures the Complex's usefulness well into the next century. These high technology investments have consumed a large portion of the budget for the Complex, but they will pay off in long-term savings. In the short-run,

however, there is a need for funding beyond that provided by the HERO bond issue. To meet this need, we are seeking assistance from friends of Cameron University to help furnish and equip the new Sciences Complex."






# Medical technology scholarship established

Retired Col. John Prybyla of Wellesley, Mass., has established an endowed scholarship fund to provide an annual scholarship to a Cameron medical technology student in honor of his wife Mary.

Prybyla's first gift of stocks designated for the Mary Kate Wellman Drew Medical Technology Scholarship was made in 1992. He recently added shares of stock, increasing the endowed fund to \$23,668.

The proceeds from the endowment have provided a \$350 scholarship for a medical technology student each semester since the spring of 1993. The latest gift will allow Cameron to increase the scholarship to \$500 per semester.

When Pearl Harbor was attacked on De-

cember 7, 1941, Prybyla was a captain in field artillery with the Rhode Island National Guard and was attending a three-month battery officers course at Fort Sill. Upon completion of the course, he was held over as a gunnery instructor for OCS at Fort Sill. It was during this time that he met Mary who was a dental technician in civil service at the Fort Sill Hospital. They were married at Fort Sill in February, 1944.

Applicants for the scholarship must be majoring in medical technology, and it is desired that either the student or a relative be active military, a member of the Reserves, National Guard or ROTC. The first recipient was Angela Broom, a veteran of Desert Storm and a member of the Army Reserves.

Kimberly Laudick, whose husband is active military, received the scholarship during the

## Clements donate funds for scholarship

Alvin "Buck" and Irene Clements have created a \$25,000 permanent endowment to Cameron with the earnings to be used as scholarships for Cameron University students engaged in the study of agriculture.

The Clements live near Ninnekah on Big Hunt Farms and farm approximately 2,000 acres in Stephens and Grady counties. Both Cameron graduates, Buck was honored as a Cameron University Distinguished Alumni Award recipient in 1994. Buckreceived an associates degree in agriculture from Cameron Junior College in 1938 and his bachelors degree in agronomy with a soil science option in 1940 from Oklahoma State University. He worked with the Soil Conservation Service for 35 years where he was director of the first completed water shed project in the United States and was the administrative assistant state conservationist. After retiring in 1976, he expanded his farming interests to include cattle and quarter horses and was listed in the 1981 Quarter Horse Journal as one of the top 20 producers of quarter horses in the United States. He has served on the board of the Federal Land Bank Association of Anadarko and on the board of the Farm Credit Bank of Wichita. Buck was selected "Mr. Wheat" by the Oklahoma Wheat Growers Association in 1981 and received the Master Agronomist Award from the agronomy department at Oklahoma State University in 1992.

Irene received an associates degree in home economics from Cameron in 1939 and later received a bachelors in home economics, masters in guidance and counseling and Ph.D. in home economics and administration of programs in higher education at OSU, and a masters of teaching from SOSU. She taught home economics for twenty-one years in public

schools, five years for the Oklahoma Department of Vocational Education and nine years at USAO in the home economics department as professor and department head. In 1991 she was inducted into the College of Home Economics Inaugural Hall of Fame at OSU and was inducted into the Future Homemakers of America Golden Circle of Friends in 1994. She served as committee chairman of the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture's A-OK Cook-Off for three years.

They were named the State Farm Bureau Farm Family of the year in 1987.

# CU, businesses, establish accounting internships

The Cameron School of Business, the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company and Security Bank and Trust Company have established accounting internships for students.

The internship is a planned practical work experience within an organization that deals with the line of work a student hopes to enter, said Dr. Jacquetta McClung, dean of the School of Business.

The first internship was initiated by the Goodyear-Lawton Plant. Two interns were placed in cost accounting and financial accounting under supervision of John Konneker and Melinda Madden. Two students, David Brockschmidt and Michele Jones, completed the program in the fall of

1994, and two more students, Casey Pattern and Cheryl Grooms, are currently enrolled.

The second internship was developed with Melvin McGuffin, president of Security Bank & Trust Co. The student, Matt Lau, will become acquainted with audit examinations, internal control policies and procedures, and preparations of various reports required in the banking industry. Lau works under the supervision of Vicki White, auditor. White is a graduate of the Cameron University accounting program.

To qualify, the student applicant must be a senior or a second semester junior who is majoring in accounting. The student must have completed at least 12 hours of specified upper-division courses and must have an overall GPA of 3.25 or higher and a GPA of 3.30 or higher in accounting courses. A student may not receive more than three credit hours for the internship, and is required to work a minimum of four hours each week for every credit hour enrolled in the internship program.

The objective is an academic experience, and there is no monetary compensation for the intern. The topics to be covered and the means of covering them are worked out with each organization.

"The internship allows the student to apply theories learned in the class to an actual work situation, and gives the student a competitive edge in the job market," McClung said.

## Trees to be planted

Cameron University has won a matching Small Business Administration Grant to plant trees on campus.

The trees will be in the area east of West Hall, north of the Biology Building, and west of Nance-Boyer.

The SBA grant is \$8,900, matched by \$7,943 from Cameron, for a total project cost of \$16,843.

Bids will be sought and the trees purchased from and planted by a small business contractor, said Dr. Don Sullivan, Cameron vice president for development. Trees will be about 3 to 4 inches in diameter. The project includes chinese pistache, laceback elm, austrian pine, red bud, caddo maple, and bald cypress trees.

The project is expected to be completed this spring and is part of a larger campus development plan to beautify the area near the location of the new Sciences Complex and the entire campus, Sullivan said.

Planting and selection will be in accordance with standards established by the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture-Forestry Service. Care and maintenance of the trees for the three-year establishment period and the remainder of their useful life, will be provided by the Cameron University Grounds Department. David Voegtlin, grounds foreman, will supervise, assisted by Mike Edwards, lead groundskeeper, and Steven Monostori, groundskeeper.

# Cameron returns to the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference



"This is a very positive day in Cameron athletics,"

### President Don Davis said.

The Cameron athletic department received some much anticipated news March 7; a new conference affiliation.

Cameron University is returning to the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference after a 21 year hiatus. Cameron was a member of the OIC until the summer of 1974 when they left, taking the journey of an independent, moving to the Lone Star Conference, eventually and most recently back to independent status.

"As an independent, we were limited in our scheduling possibilities; and as a result, interest decreased. We feel this should increase campus interest and in turn bolster our programs," Davis said.

Cameron and Panhandle State will join the seven other existing members: University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma, Southwestern, East Central, Northeastern, Northwestern, Langston, and Southeastern.

All of the current schools are members of National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), but have already indicated that they will apply for membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II (NCAA II). Three of the schools have already applied for membership. The other five members will apply before July 1, 1995. Cameron has been a member of the NCAA II since 1988.

The schools face a one year orientation period and then a two year probationary period before they will become full NCAA II members. If everything goes as planned, all of the schools should be full NCAA members by the 1998-99 school year.

Cameron will begin competing for OIC titles as soon as next year in all sports except basketball. Cameron should be eligible for the basketball titles in the 1996-97 school years.

Cameron learned when it first went to the NCAA that scheduling could be a problem for the first year of transition. The basketball teams must schedule 18 NCAA II members to be eligible for the post season tournament. The games against the OIC schools will not count against those 18 games during the first year of their orientation period, but they will count the next two years of their probationary periods.

"We are working to schedule games that will give us the requisite number of games against NCAA schools to make us eligible for the playoffs," Davis said. "Next year (1995-96) we will not compete for conference titles in basketball, but we will in all other sports."

Davis said the new conference also will aid in the funding process, allowing Cameron to slice travel expenses and pump more money into other areas of the athletic budget.

"There will be no reduction in the athletic budget," Davis promised. "What we should notice is a decrease in travel costs that will then be shared to other areas."

Cameron's farthest trip in the Lone Star Conference was a 606 mile jaunt to Kingsville, Texas (Texas A&M-Kingsville). The Aggies farthest trip in the OIC will be a 298 mile hike to Goodwell, Okla. (Panhandle State). The average trip to the eight conference schools will be 161 miles.

All of the coaches seem pleased and ready to make the move.

"The new conference affiliation is something we have been wanting and anticipating," basketball Coach Jerry Stone said. "The OIC schools already have strong programs in place. I see the primary advantages to our move in terms of attendance, fan interest and rivalries, and recruiting."

"I think this is a good move for us. It will definitely enhance the morale of the community and the student body as a whole," volleyball and women's coordinator Kim Vinson said. "The move will also help our softball program. We will be able to have a conference championship, which is something the kids have never had."

"I think the conference affiliation will be a good move for us," baseball coach Ron Ihler said. "It will mean more games against NCAA II opponents and in terms of the travel budget, the games will be closer. The level of competition in the OIC is strong, and I think we will be able to compete with them."

# Tennis teams start season nationally ranked

Both Cameron tennis teams have started the 1995 spring season nationally ranked.

The Lady Aggies begin the spring season ranked 11th nationally and fourth in the Midwest Region.

Individually, sophomore May Lee, a native of Kampar Perak, Malaysia, opens the season ranked 27th nationally and eighth in the Midwest Region. Freshman, Erica Consen, a native of Paramaribo, Suriname, South America, comes in ranked 18th in the Midwest Region, and the doubles team of Consen/Lee enter the spring season ranked sixth in the Midwest Region.

The Aggies, in just their second full season of competition, begin the spring season ranked 13th nationally and fourth in the Midwest Region.

Two Aggies have garnered individual honors with junior Jason White, a native of Corsicana, Texas, coming in eighth nationally and third in the Midwest Region. Sophomore Derk DeVries, from Parimaribo, Suriname, South America, enters the spring season ranked 13th in the Midwest Region and the doubles team of White/Keith Howard is ranked ninth in the Midwest Region.

The top two teams in each region are automatically entered in the national tournament. The No.'s 3-10 ranked teams will go to two separate four team regionals, with the champions of each regional advancing to the national tournament.

The 1995 NCAA II National Tournament will be held May 11-14, 1995, in Davis, Calif.

### Cameron athletes display exceptional academic records

The Cameron athletic department is proud to announce that several of its athletes maintained outstanding academic records for the 1994 fall semester.

Fifty of the 96 student-athletes at Cameron were named to the athletic honor roll. A student must maintain a grade point average of 3.0 or better to make the athletic honor roll.

Every sport within the department reported athletes who made the athletic honor roll, with baseball registering the largest number, with 11 honorees. Of the nine women's basketball players, three maintained a perfect grade point average of 4.0 for the semester. They were Jennifer Beale, freshman - biology, Teresa Clayborn, junior - romance languages, and April Ellickson, sophomore - physical education.

Other athletes maintaining a 4.0 grade point average for the fall semester were: Grant Babbitt, freshman - undecided - men's tennis; Scott O'Connor, freshman - business management - golf; Stephanie Hillstrom, freshman - psychology - volleyball; Alice Clifton, senior - history - softball; and Erica Consen, sophomore - biology - women's tennis.

We are very proud of these students, and hope to see our athletes continue to excel," said CU athletic director, Jerry Hrnciar.

The Lady Aggie volleyball team has signed a pair of recruits to add to a strong returning class for Coach Kim Vinson. Signed on to play for Cameron next season are freshmen Jennifer Swain, from Lubbock, Texas, and Hilary Baggett, from Santa Rosa, Calif.

Swain is a 5'10" middle hitter, attending Monterey High School in Lubbock. She was named honorable mention all-district as a junior and second team all-district as a senior, as well as being named two-time team most valuable player.

"Jennifer is a strong, physical girl who hits the ball very hard, Vinson says. "With her height and strength she will definitely help us hitting as well as blocking."

Baggett is a 5'11" middle hitter, attending Piner High School in Santa Rosa, Calif. She was named first team all-North Bay League and team most valuable player her senior season, as well as playing for the Empire Volleyball Club.

"Hilary gives us more size up front and she is a tremendous blocker which is one area that will help us immediately," Vinson adds. "With some experience she will be a good college player."

Cameron finished 9-22 last season, but returns eight of 11 letterwinners from that squad.
