Goodyear grant to total \$200,000

Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company has awarded a \$200,000 grant to Cameron University to assist with construction of the university's new Sciences Complex. When making the announcement, Gordon Murdock, manager of the Goodyear plant in Lawton, said:

"The basis for the success of the Goodyear operation in Lawton is the cooperation of the people of Lawton and Southwest Oklahoma. This grant is one way we can be good corporate citizens by giving something back to the community."

Now under construction, the \$10.6 million facility will consolidate the university's physical and biological sciences into one state-of-the-art structure which will fully integrate new technologies in telecommunications and computer assisted instruction into Cameron's sciences curriculum.

"This grant will allow us to better equip the Sciences Complex so we can incorporate new instructional technologies into our teaching processes," said Cameron President Don Davis.


"Many superb learning resources are available through worldwide telecommunications networks," Davis explained, "and the Goodyear grant will allow our students and faculty to interact with them.

"Goodyear's Lawton plant is the flagship for the company and in fact sets the standard for the entire tire manufacturing industry," Davis continued. "The company knows first-hand of the benefits to be gained from utilizing new technologies and wants Cameron to be able to take advantage of advances in instructional technologies."

The Goodyear grant will allow the purchase of computers, multimedia equipment and interconnecting networks so Cameron students and faculty can access evolving technologies.

Other examples of new technologies which will be incorporated into the new Sciences Complex include computer modeling and simulations to create experiments and demonstrations in laboratories.

Over \$600,000 has been pledged by individuals, foundations and companies for sponsorship of various facilities in the new Sciences Complex. Donors names will be placed on permanent plaques in the building. "By using computer simulations, we can create conditions and perform experiments which before have been impossible on our campus," Davis said. "This new technology will allow us to do these projects safely and at the same time avoid the environmental problems of storage, handling and disposal of dangerous chemicals."

Cameron and Goodyear have worked together on several educational projects in recent years. The university developed a unique associate degree program for Goodyear employees which was offered in synchronized schedules during both day and evening sessions to accommodate the company's rotating work shifts.


"Goodyear has long been an outstanding corporate citizen in Southwest Oklahoma," Davis said. "In addition to the company's obvious positive impact on our economy, Goodyear employees lead the community in such activities as United Way contributions and other public service projects.

2 Distinguished Alumni Awards 1995

The Cameron University Alumni Association presents awards annually to alumni who have made significant contributions to society and whose accomplishments and careers have brought credit to Cameron by distinguishing themselves in their careers, and/or in service to their communities, and/or through continued support of Cameron University. Dr. Robert E. Kuntz and Brig. Gen. Bill Bilo will each receive the award during the reunion luncheon on Saturday, October 7. Nominations are accepted throughout the year. One of **Dr. Robert E. Kuntz's** contemporaries once called him a "natural born naturalist." Even before he entered high school, he was familiar with every nook and cranny of the Wichita Mountains. Under the influence of a Lawton High School teacher, Lily Stafford, he was guided to a career as a biologist. Kuntz now lives in San Antonio, Texas, where he retired in 1981.

Kuntz was born in 1916 in Lawton. He received an associate degree in biology from Cameron in 1936, a B.A. in biology and a M.S. in zoology from OU, and a Ph.D. in parasitology (epidemiology) from the University of Michigan. He joined the navy in 1943 retiring as a captain in 1964. As a parasitologist and medical entomologist with the Naval Medical Research Institute and later as chairman of the department of parasitology at the Southwest Foundation for Research and Education, he worked with many different ethnic groups in the Middle East, Africa and Southeast Asia. He retired from SFRE in 1981.

Significant career achievements include the introduction of a new concept in epidemiology of schistosomiasis due to <u>Schistosoma mansoni</u> and <u>S. haematobium</u> infection, and a demonstration of a causal relationship between <u>S. haematobium</u> infection and bladder cancer. His bibliography consists of over 245 publications and over 1900 abstracts. His photographic credits appear in numerous textbooks and publications including National Geographic Magazine. He has shared his large collection of biologic and research

materials with numerous schools, museums and other institutions including the University of Oklahoma, Smithsonian Institution, the Houston Museum of Natural Science and the National Zoo in Washington, D.C. Eight species of parasites, one spider and one bird bear the name "kuntzi" in honor of him.

Kuntz's memories of Cameron include the courtship of his wife-to-be, Nedra Campbell, class of '37. His two sisters also graduated from Cameron, Eleanor L. Kuntz, now deceased, class of '41; and Dorothy Kuntz Wilson, who lives in Lawton, class of '40.



Brig. Gen. Bill Bilo, of Alexandria, Va., was born in Washington, D.C. in 1944. He received a B.A. in history at Cameron in 1973, and a masters in public and business administration from Southeastern University in Washington, D.C. In 1964, he enlisted in the army and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1965, after graduating from the Artillery and Missile Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill. During his active duty career, he had two combat commands in Viet Nam. Bilo was voluntarily released from active duty in 1972; and since then, he has held many command and staff positions with the Oklahoma, Virginia and Maryland Army National Guard. In 1993, he was selected as the deputy director of the Army National Guard in Washington, D.C. He is also a consultant to DICO, Inc., a residential construction company.

His numerous decorations include the Legion of Merit with one bronze oak leaf cluster, Bronze Star Medal with three bronze oak leaf clusters and "V" device, Meritorious Service Medal with one bronze oak cluster, Army Commendation Medal with four oak leaf clusters and "V" device, and Vietnam Service Medal with two bronze service stars. He served as military coordinator for the construction and dedication of the Vietnam War Memorial and the Korean War Memorial in Baltimore, Md. The "We Care Too Program", which he established in the Baltimore City High Schools, placing military officers as mentors in every high school in Baltimore, received a citation from the mayor of Baltimore. He has also been a classroom volunteer in a school for learning disabled and abused children.

While at Cameron, Bilo met his wife, the former Diane Patton, a Cameron graduate of 1966, originally from Chattanooga, Okla.

The Faculty Hall of Fame Award, sponsored by the Cameron University Alumni Association, will be presented for the first time this year. The award will be presented annually to current or retired faculty who have taught a minimum of five years at Cameron. The award is intended to honor faculty for their teaching effectiveness, positive impact on student lives, and involvement at Cameron outside of the classroom and in the community. Blanche Beavers and Tony Allison will each receive the award during the reunion luncheon on Saturday, October 7. Nominations are accepted throughout the year. A 1996 nomination form is on page 4.



Blanche Beavers loved teaching and the reward of seeing her students accomplish their goals. While teaching at Cameron, in addition to her regular teaching load, she taught a 7:00 a.m. class and evening classes each semester so that those who worked could obtain a degree. The result of this dedication is reflected in the many success stories among her former students who list a variety of occupations including management positions, college presidents, school administrators, bankers, high ranking military personnel, and lawyers.

Beavers retired and returned to her home town of Ryan, Okla., in 1975 after a 39 year teaching career. She received a bachelors of commerce degree from Oklahoma College for Women in 1936, a masters of commercial education from OU in 1940, and completed additional post masters work from several universities.

Beavers taught six years at Ryan High School, one year at Lawton High School and 32 years at Cameron, from 1943 to 1975 under the regimes of five Cameron presidents. She was chairman of the Cameron business department for over 20 years. She received the Oklahoma Business Education Association's Outstanding Business Educator Award in 1975 and Cameron Teacher of the Year in 1963. She was honored by the CU Alumni Association with a Distinguished Alumni Award in 1982, and was commissioned as "Honorary Lieutenant Governor of the State of Oklahoma" by former Lieutenant Governor George Nigh in 1960. She instituted an interscholastic contest at Cameron which is still held annually and has grown to encompass

departments campus wide. In her honor, the Blanche Beavers Business Administration Award is given each year to the outstanding undergraduate business administration major at Cameron.

Beavers has continued to support Cameron since her retirement through donations to the Cameron Foundation and to Cameron's National Public Radio station, KCCU.



When **Tony Allison** arrived at Cameron in 1972, there was only one major available through the speech program. He worked with others on campus to develop a new communications degree with four areas of concentration to include speech communication, radio/TV, public relations/organizational communication, and journalism.

Allison, an associate professor, chairman of Cameron's communications department, and former director of forensics, has taught at Cameron since receiving his masters in speech communication at Southwest Texas State University in 1972. He also has an associate degree from Lubbock Christian College and a bachelor's degree from Abilene Christian University.

He has directed workshops which bring over 1600 students to the campus each year including Summer Speech-Debate-Broadcast Camps for students and teachers, Gifted and Talented Workshops, Interscholastic Contests, and High School Speech Demonstration Day. The summer speech camp attracts students and teachers from a four-state region and is one of the largest in the country. For 21 years he directed a nationally ranked speech and debate team which won two national championships and was ranked in the top 10 from 1977 through 1995 at the Pi Kappa Delta National Speech and Debate Tournament. He participated in developing Cameron's National Public Radio station, KCCU. He has been instrumental in securing grant money for numerous grants and donations to Cameron. The Oklahoma Speech Theatre Communication Association presented him with the Oklahoma Outstanding Communication Educator award in 1986 and 1991. He is actively involved in the community and his church.

Vital to Allison's philosophy of education is what Aristotle called "ethos," the high ethical values of the individual. He feels that it is important that the student be honored as a person and learn to honor others. Through this philosophy, he has influenced many students who have attested that if it were not for Tony Allison, they would not have obtained a college degree.

Cameron History, 1909 - 1911

When Cameron State School of Agriculture opened in 1909, the area surrounding Lawton was devoted largely to farming. Small agricultural service centers provided for the needs of farming families, but there were few high schools during the early years following statehood, and thus many students did not have access to a high school education. That need was answered in part in 1908 when Oklahoma's legislature approved the construction of six district agricultural schools, one in each of the Supreme Court districts. To compete as the site for one of the new schools, communities had to guarantee 160 acres of land for its location.

In Lawton, a group of motivated and creative businessmen organized the University Improvement Association, as it was known, to raise money to purchase the required land. They did so by acquiring land west of the fledgling community, and developing and selling it as town lots. With their profits they then purchased the acreage for the new school, which satisfied legislative requirements. Students were to receive instruction principally in agriculture, but also in other limited academic areas.

The new school was named for the Reverend Evan Dhu Cameron, who served as the first state superintendent of public instruction in Oklahoma. Reverend Cameron, educated in religion and the law, was also deeply committed to education and as a result of his many efforts became known informally as the father of education in Oklahoma. During his administration as superintendent, three normal schools, a school for the blind and deaf, the college for women in Chickasha, and the agricultural schools were established.

Cameron's first president, J. A. Liner, was college-educated and held a teaching position in Alabama at the time of his appointment to the Cameron presidency. He was tasked with establishing the new school in Lawton. While the first building was under construction


There are comparatively few records which document the first two years of Cameron's history. on the present campus site, the original small group of faculty and students met in the basement of the First National Bank, then located on C Avenue. Accommodations at this location were anything but ideal. The basement reportedly consisted of one dimly–lit room which the new president transformed into classroom and study areas. He had no separate office, clerical staff or equipment. The Armory building nearby on E Avenue was leased to accommodate athletic programs during this formative period.

The State Commission of Agriculture and Industrial Education administered this and the other agricultural schools in the state. Students studied agriculture, manual training, mathematics, English literature, and domestic science, a course intended ostensibly to make better homemakers of young women. It appears that in the first few years Lawton housewives may have enrolled in the course to bolster enrollment, which

remained low and threatened Cameron's existence. Superintendent Cameron, perhaps to legitimize the course and undoubtedly reflecting his personal beliefs about women's roles declared in 1909 that such courses might help to arrest "the wild wave of restlessness" that had come over the women of the country, and "bring them back and fix them firmly in the sphere where God intended them to dwell." Some of these young and restless women expanded their domestic spheres by becoming teachers.

Regardless of one's course of study, classes were held from 8:15 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. The original Cameron students and their faculty remained at the bank location for nearly two years. The building later became the Warren Hotel and was ultimately razed in the name of renewal and progress. The first graduating class graduated from the new campus on Gore Boulevard west of downtown.

Osteopathic Medicine in Des Moines, Iowa. He has offices in Duncan, Lawton and Altus.



Volleyball looks forward to new season

The Cameron volleyball team, with eight returning letter winners, is looking for the success at the end of last season to carry forward to the 1995 season.

The Lady Aggies finished the 1994 season with a 9-20 record, but finished strong winning seven of their last 13 matches.

Couple that with eight returning letter winners, including five starters, and the Lady Aggies are looking for their first winning season since 1991.

"I am excited about our possibilities this season because we have a great group of kids returning," Coach Vinson said. "A majority of our team is made up of second year players, but they all saw a lot of playing time last season. We may be young, but we bring back a wealth of experience."

Leading the way for Cameron is senior, outside hitter, Tamra Kirkpatrick. Kirkpatrick led Cameron in kills, hitting percentage, solo blocks, and total blocks last season. She needs 382 kills this season to become Cameron's career leader.

Also returning is junior setter/outside hitter Chancy Clark. Clark led the Lady Aggies in total kill attempts, service aces, and digs, and was second in set assists and kills.

Cameron returns six freshmen who saw extensive playing time last season. Leading the way for the kiddie corps were Stephanie Hillstrom and Nicoli Martin. Hillstrom was third on the team in kills and second in total blocks. Martin was fourth on the team in kills and third in total blocks.

Also returning is setter Luz Fernandez and outside hitter Jaime Johnson. Fernandez led the way in assists with 595, was third in service aces and fourth in digs. Johnson was second in hitting percentage and set a Cameron single match record with 31 digs against Texas Woman's University.

Added to the mix for the 1995 campaign are freshmen Jennifer Swain and Hilary Baggett. Swain was named second team all-district for Monterey High School in Lubbock, Texas, and Baggett was named first team all-North Bay League for Piner High School in Santa Rosa, Calif.

The schedule is once again one of the toughest in the Midwest Region. Cameron plays 11 home matches culminating in the fourth annual HOJO Classic on Oct. 27-28.

"If we are successful with the schedule we have, we will get some regional recognition, and that is the first step toward post-




