### The Football Season

Building a championship football team with only three lettermen from the '28 season was the task of Coach Penn O. Dickson last fall.

Though coming to Aggieland highly recommended as a producer of winning teams, the outlook was anything but good for a victorious season in 1929. However, the practice sessions had hardly begun before fans could see the new spirit and the system that Coach Dickson was giving the men.

In the first game of the schedule the team from Gainesville, Texas, was snowed under 41 to 0.

With that victory as a start, the Aggie's parade to the conference championship began a week later when Connors Aggies were defeated for the first conference win. On the same afternoon Wichita Falls

was turned back. Winning two games in one afternoon is something new in football. One week later the "Thundering Herd" reserves, were herded into the winning streak of the Aggies, at Shawnee. Handing the first defeat to a Hurt-coached team on its home field. In this game the Cameron team was scored on for the first time. A blocked punt of Captain-elect Fuqua being covered behind the line by a Bison player.


After winning these four games the Aggies met and defeated three conference opponents in a row, Eastern Oklahoma, Christians, and Chilloco Indians. The Panhandle A. and M. College fell next. After beating Murray the Aggies dropped the next to Wayland College for their only defeat of '29.



### The Championship Fight

Led by the fighting Captain Ward the Cameron Aggies of '29 were easily the class of the conference. Climaxing his athletic career for Aggieland by the great game he played against the Cadets, Ward is deserving of much praise. With less than three minutes to go, it was none other than the fighting Ward that broke through the Soldier defense and carried the ball for thirty-five yards before finally being dragged down by the safety. That was the necessary punch and a few seconds later the game and the Championship was ours.




### State Champions


















### Aggie Battles

### The Storm Hits The Cadets




### BASKETBALL

Fighting hard to bring to Aggieland another state championship the caging squad of Cameron fell short by only three points. For the last two seasons the Aggies have been jolted out of the conference title by a margin of three points each time.

The Aggies gave followers a vision of what the 1930 season might be in defeating the Oklahoma City University "Goldbugs," 33 to 31; Travelers Insurance of Wichita Falls, 43 to 28; Panhandle A. and M., 47 to 35; and Petrolia Gassers, 66 to 37, in preseason games.

In the conference race the Aggie onslaught routed the Jayseers from Northeastern in two home tilts, 76 to 49, and 41 to 24.

In similar fashion Cameron took two games from Eastern Oklahoma, 48 to 11, and 39 to 23; two from




