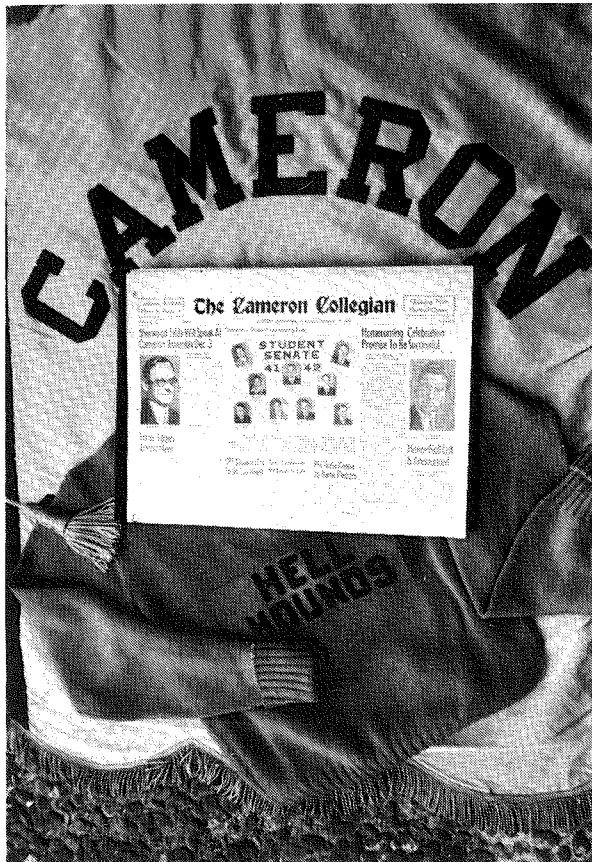

Class of '42: You must remember this

Members of the Class of 1942 -- due special recognition on their golden reunion at Homecoming this year -- must remember this.

Cameron Collegian newspapers for the fall of 1941 and the spring of 1942 were sprinkled with photos and articles about students and graduates joining the military services and serving over the world during World War II.

In his 11th year as president of Cameron, Charles M. Conwill was outlining Cameron plans for participation in national defense. He was also expressing hopes for Cameron as a four-year school, which became a reality by legislative action 24 years later.

Jess Thompson, director of athletics and football, boxing and basketball coach, was inducted into the Navy in March, 1942.

Cameron won the title of Oklahoma Junior Collegiate football champions and tied for the basketball state junior title with Eastern Aggies of Wilburton.

Instructors and administrators on campus numbered 40. More than 600 students were enrolled.

The Homecoming parade, seven blocks long, was held Nov. 26, 1941 to advertise the Thanksgiving Day football game.

The engineers float featured an electric powered cog wheel above the sign "We Keep the Wheels Turning." Four members of the Rhapsode Speech Club filled a midget Crosley car.

Mildred Blakeley, later Mildred Dale, was crowned football queen by football captain Tom Mix at the Homecoming game. Cameron football players dressed in long white underwear with yellow shirts for the game.

Wrinkle resistant ties were \$1 at Lintz Department Store.

Movies advertised "in technicolor" were "Weekend in Havana," starring Alice Faye, Carmen Miranda and Cesar Romero; "Unfinished Business" with Irene Dunne and Robert Montgomery; and "A Yank in the R.A.F." with Tyrone Power and Betty Grable.

Huscher Flying Service was urging readers to "fly and save tires -- faster, cheaper, cleaner and safer."

Sara Johnston :

Sara Sasser Johnston at age 83 sometimes stays up reading Latin all night, and she looks trim and fit enough to teach all day or dance the night away.

The Cameron alumna and former Cameron instructor has had multi-careers as a Latin and English scholar, college and public school teacher, wife of a coach, and mother of two daughters.

"The only time I was ever really organized was in my classroom," she said. "There it all came together."

President Don Davis said:

"Sara Johnston is a teacher without parallel."

He said that when his family moved to Lawton from Velma-Alma he barely knew the English language and was lost in the big Lawton junior high. She had him work after school for weeks, and drilled him in the basics. He never again made a grade lower than an A in English. He was one of a legion of students who graduated from her after-school class.

Sara was born Aug. 24, 1908 on her grandfather's farm at London, Ky. The family moved to Lawton when she was 5. All eight children helped in the Sasser grocery store on the south side of Lawton. Her father, Campbell W. Sasser, was famous for giving people credit to keep them eating during the Great Depression.

At the evening meal, their father presided. He talked about voting and good citizenship and learning for pleasure. There was no gossip, no criticism of other people.

Each Sunday, rain or shine, the Sasser kids marched like a row of ducks from their home south of the railroad tracks to the First Baptist Church.

Sara graduated at Lawton High School in 1927, and became the only Latin major at Oklahoma College for Women in Chickasha. A bout with pneumonia interrupted her sophomore year, and she came home and finished her junior college work at Cameron.

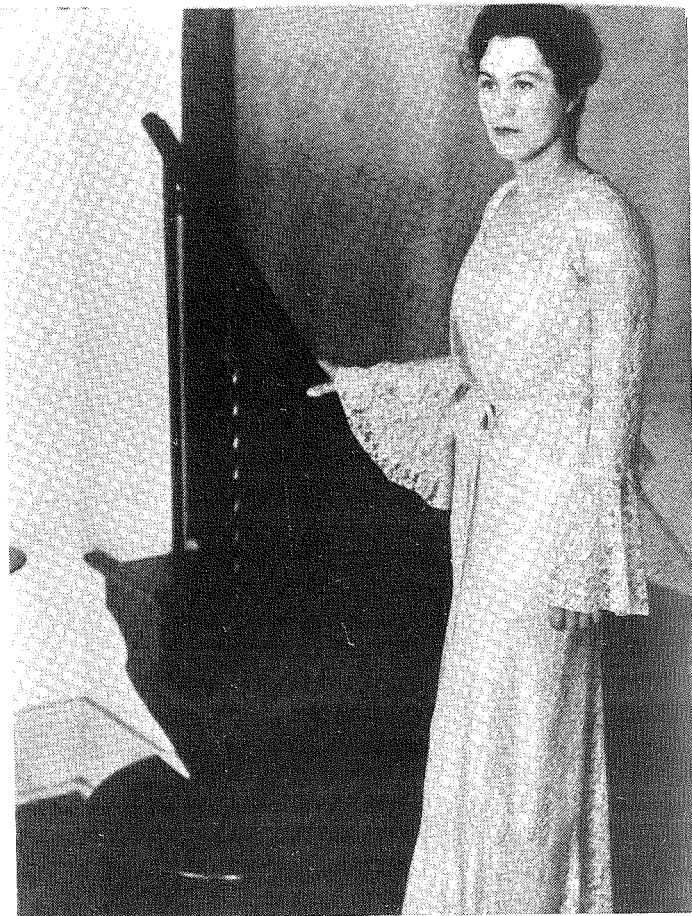
She laughs and fondly admits to being a flapper in the Roaring Twenties.

"I made 32 dances one month in July. Medicine Park and the old country club near Highland Cemetery were booming. Sometimes I'd go to three dances in one day -- afternoon, evening, and late night."

After earning her bachelors at OCW in 1931, she took a teaching job at Cameron.

Cameron became the backdrop for her romance with Julius Johnston. In 1932, he joined Cameron as high school principal, assistant football coach, and basketball and track coach. The following August they were married. Sara, wife of the coach, became surrogate big sister and mother to athletes.

"Oh Lordy. Everybody hung out at our house. We couldn't

keep any food," she said. Among the athletes were Harris and Gene Hancock, Conway Garner, Buck Kinsey, Ray Portillo, Ralph Steeds, Tony Parker, and Lew Johnson. They became friends for life. Ju Johnston coached at Cameron a total of seven years.

The Johnstons moved to Las Cruces, N.M., where he coached at New Mexico State University four years, then returned to Lawton in 1943, and he coached at Lawton High School. Ju Johnston died in 1980.

Sara taught at Las Cruces High School, then in the public schools in Lawton. She reared two daughters, Joey (Mrs. Michael) Wilkerson of Lawton, and Janey (Mrs. William) Scott of Ste. Genevieve, Mo. Sara Johnston taught a total of 30 years. She was Lawton High School teacher of the year in 1970, and retired in 1971.

One of a kind

It was September 1955, the first day of school, and I figured I might as well turn in my books and start looking for someone who was willing to hire a 14-year-old fat boy on a full-time basis.

The reason for my despair was the 9th grade English teacher I'd been assigned. I'd heard about Sara Johnston, the toughest teacher in school -- a devotee and disciple of English and Latin who insisted that her students show the same enthusiasm for Shakespeare, Shelley, and Keats as she, or face dire consequences.

That first day of school was a typical hot Oklahoma day. I walked into her classroom and wedged myself into a desk at the back, hoping she wouldn't notice if I happened to doze off.

The bell rang and this petite woman with delicate features shut the door with a bang and stared down at her new batch of students. She had a hint of a smile but the smile was overshadowed by her piercing eyes that were proof-positive that she meant business.

"Do you have pencil and paper on your desk?" she asked. "I expect you to be prepared when the bell rings."

I'd crammed my new notebook under

my seat and now, in desperation, I was trying to tear out a sheet of paper and find a pencil before she saw me.

She was already talking about nouns and pronouns; adjectives and adverbs and prepositions and I was still fumbling for my No. 2 yellow lead pencil.

My desk was built for a kid 40 pounds lighter. Between my rump and belly there was no space at all, and grappling under it gave me the appearance of an overweight contortionist.

"Randy," she said in a voice that resembled the growl of a Bengal tiger. "What in the world are you doing back there? You are squirming around like a worm in hot ashes."

"I'm trying to get my pencil," I explained.

"Well, hurry up and get it because you're wasting my time and holding up this class and I'm not going to permit that to happen."

I got out of my desk, dropped to my knees and found my elusive pencil.

For the next hour she told her new class what she expected of us, and with each expectation, my heart sank because I was certain I didn't have the ability to meet the least of her demands.

I went home that night glum about

my future. I asked my parents to call the school and get me out of her class. I told them there was no way I could pass, and I didn't want to suffer the embarrassment of flunking out of junior high.

My dad wouldn't hear of it. "I've known Sara since we were kids so don't tell me she's mean," he said. "She's a Sasser and there is no such thing as a mean Sasser. As long as you try, she'll go the extra mile for you," he said without the slightest hint of sympathy.

Mrs. Johnston did go that extra mile. After nine months in her class I knew the importance of English. She taught me how to read and she praised the way I wrote.

By the end of the school year in May of 1956, she had convinced me that if I wanted to be a newspaper reporter someday, I could.

"Just try," she told me. "You can be anything you want to be if you try hard enough."

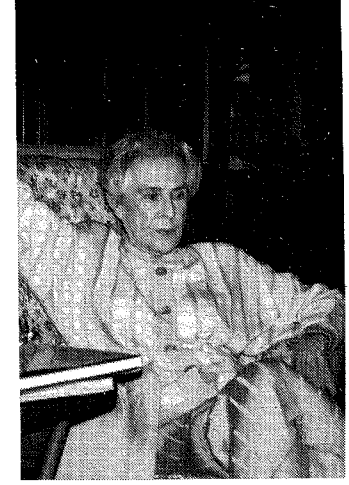

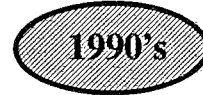

Burleson excels as military, civic leader

Retired Air Force Col. Aaron Burleson of Altus started his military career as a National Guardsman while a student from 1938-1940 at Cameron Junior College.

He was born in Lawton Nov. 20, 1920. He planned to become a doctor, but dropped out of school in early 1940 because of the illness and death of his father, Judge Aaron Burleson.

Burleson played cornet and French horn in the Cameron Band, and on Sept. 16, 1940 was mobilized at Cameron with the 158th Field Artillery Band with the 45th Division.

He was called to active duty as a corporal for one year. He retired 34 years later as a colonel.

In 1942 he transferred from the 45th Division to the Air Corps as an aviation cadet. He received pilot wings in 1944 and during World War II flew combat missions in a B-24 aircraft. He flew approximately 10,000 flying hours in more than 20 different types of aircraft. He flew bombing missions over Formosa, China, and Japan.

He was awarded the Legion of Merit with one Oak Leaf Cluster; the Distinguished Flying Cross and many other decorations.

He spent 16 years in Special Air Mission operations in Washington, D.C. where he was responsible for scheduling all VIP flights for U.S. and foreign dignitaries. He was responsible for insuring support at each scheduled stop on presidential missions flown by Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon.

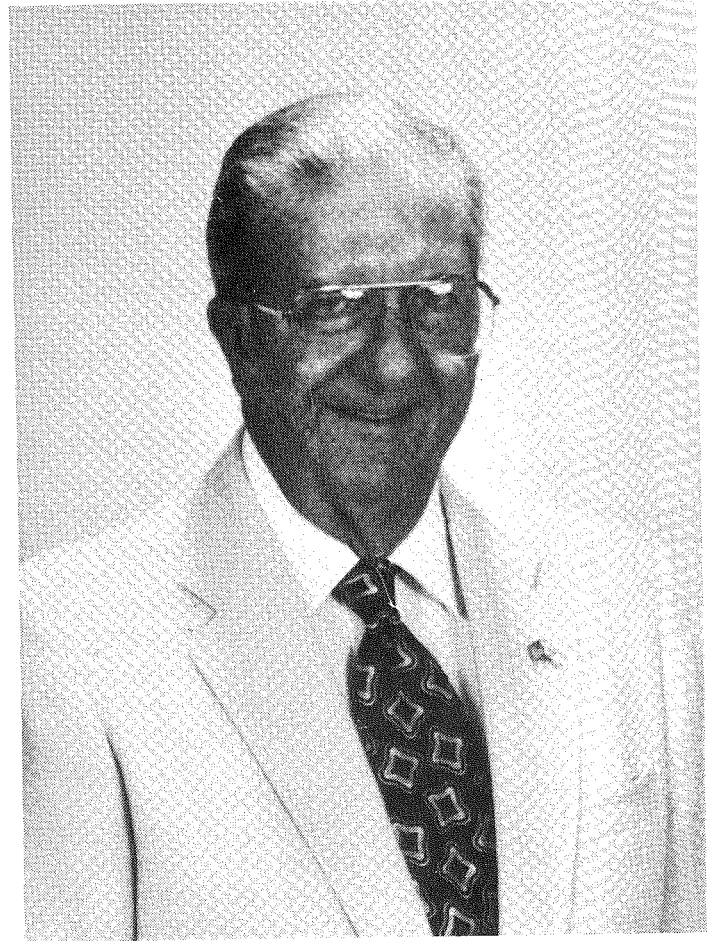
Burleson flew vice presidents, cabinet members, congress members and many other VIPs.

He was an instructor pilot in the Lockheed Jetstar four-engine executive jet and flew as instructor for three Air Force chiefs of staff, Generals Curtis Lemay, John P. McConnell, and John D. Ryan.

In 1970 he was transferred to Altus Air Force Base as vice commander, 443 Military Airlift Wing. He became commander of 443 Air Base Group, and retired in 1974.

Upon retirement from the Air Force, he became director of economic development for Altus-Jackson County Economic Development, Inc. He was chairman of the governor's Industrial Team for the State of Oklahoma. For the past seven years he has been director of military development for the Altus Chamber of Commerce. Altus Air Force Base was selected as Best Base in the Air Force for 1991.

He is a member of Kiwanis Club, life member of the Order

of Daedalians, and member of the Governor's Industrial Team for Oklahoma. He is national vice president for the southwest region of the Air Force Association; was three-term president of the Air Force Association for the state of Oklahoma; and was president three terms of the Altus chapter of the Air Force Association.

He was awarded a certificate of appreciation from Gov. George Nigh; Distinguished Citizen Certificate from the Military Airlift Command; and a Medal of Merit, Exceptional Service Award, and Presidential Citation from the Air Force Association.

He is married to the former Myra Hosch of St. Louis. Their three children, Barbara, Chris, and Debra, are graduates of the University of Oklahoma. Their oldest granddaughter is in law school at OU.

Rector Johnson: "dean of superintendents"

Rector Johnson received a high school diploma and a two-year teachers certificate from Cameron State School of Agriculture in 1924, launching him into a 53-year career in Oklahoma education.

He began as principal and teacher in the Hulen school from 1924 to 1926.

Now of Broken Bow, he was principal and teacher in the Indianoma Schools from 1926-1933; superintendent at Indianoma 1933-1944; superintendent of Snyder school in 1944; with the state Department of Education in 1945; and superintendent of schools at Broken Bow from 1946 until his retirement in 1977.

At the time of his retirement he was dean of Oklahoma public school superintendents.

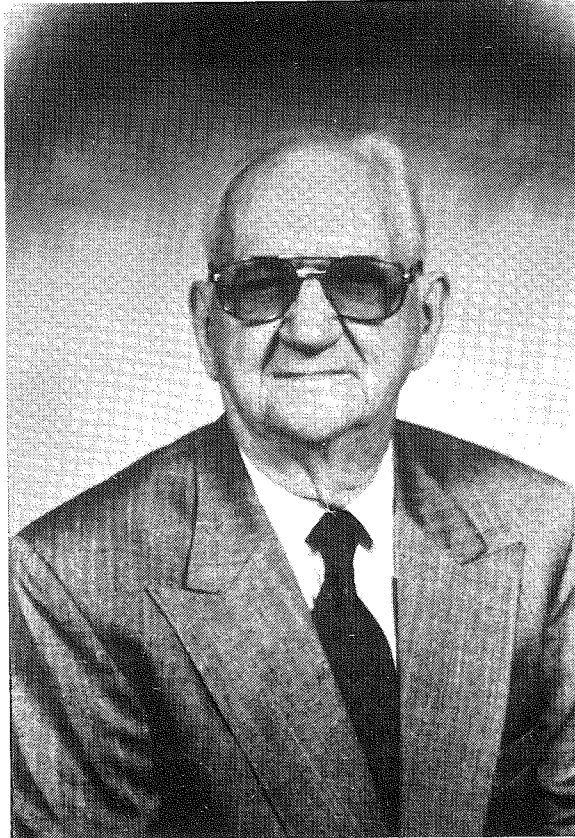
He is a past member and chairman of the Oklahoma Textbook Commission and was a member of Gov. Henry Bellmon's Blue Ribbon Education Committee. He was one of five Oklahomans to attend the White House Conference on Education during President Lyndon Johnson's administration. In 1965 with a group of Comparative Education Society members he evaluated elementary, high schools and colleges in Scotland, England, France, Italy, East Germany and Moscow.

Rector Johnson was born June 11, 1902 in Pochontas, Ark. and moved to Faxon with his parents, William James Johnson and Orabelle (Birdie) Johnson in August 1920.

At Cameron he was president of the Literati Literary Society, clarinet player in the band that played for the inauguration of Gov. Jack Walton in 1922, member of the jazz orchestra, debate team, and Wichita staff. He was leader of the basketball "group" in 1922. There was no formal men's

basketball team. He also sang second tenor in the boys quartet.

Rector Johnson graduated from Central State University in 1933, and earned a masters degree in education and school administration at Oklahoma City University in 1940.

He is a life member and past president of the OEA. He has been a member of the Board of Trustees of the E.T. Dunlap Higher Education Center since 1986. He is a past president and has been a member of McCurtain County Retired Educators Association since 1977.

He received meritorious service awards from the Oklahoma Education Association, Oklahoma School Administrators, and Governor Henry Bellmon. He received a Distinguished Student Award from Central State University and a Service Award from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

At Broken Bow he has been a member of the board of directors of the 1st Bank and Trust more than 20 years. He has served on the board of directors of Forest Heritage Society and the Little Dixie Community Action Agency. He served on the Oklahoma Planning and Resources Board during Gov. Gary's administration. He is a charter member of the Broken Bow Chamber of Commerce.

He is also a member of Broken Bow Masonic Lodge and is a 32nd degree Mason and member of the McAlester Consistory. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church and taught a men's Bible class.

He and his wife, the former Virginia Moetah Calhoun, were married July 17, 1932. They had two sons, the late James Calhoun Johnson, and Richard Rex Johnson. They also have five grandchildren.

Bob Johnson: American ace

Robert S. "Bob" Johnson at 5 feet 9 and 145 pounds played guard on the 1941 Cameron football team beside a 210-pound center and a 260-pound tackle. He started boxing with the Cameron team when he was still in high school.

Bob Johnson, always the fighter, became the fourth ranking American flying ace of all time.

He had 27 confirmed kills of Nazi planes in World War II, when he flew a P-47 Thunderbolt with the 56th Fighter Group based in England.

He said he often remembered as the black-crossed German fighters dived at him during the air battles over Europe something that Cameron football coach Jess Thompson told him. Because of Johnson's small size, the coach would often pull him aside before an important game, look him in the eye and say:

"Now go out there and get 'em. Don't forget they get into their pants one leg at a time, just like you do."

Johnson was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, Silver Star, nine Distinguished Flying Crosses, Purple Heart -- a total of 26 medals for 91 missions including escorting the B-24 and B-17 bombers, the fighters' "big friends," in daylight bombing of Germany.

He flew with the 61st Squadron, led by one of America's greatest aces, Francis Gabreski.

"We took part in a great adventure, that of air superiority over Europe, which played a major role in the defeat of Germany," Johnson said.

During his term of operations, Johnson was hit five times by enemy fire, three times by flak, and twice by FW-190s. But he was never shot down. On one mission, one of his Thunderbolts, or jugs, was shot apart by cannon shells and hundreds of bullets, its canopy jammed closed so he couldn't get out, the rudder shot to pieces by twenty-one 20-mm direct hits. Bob,

trapped, hurt, burned, half blinded by oil whipping his face, made it back to England and landed.

Johnson, who became a lieutenant colonel, was the first to exceed Eddie Rickenbacker's World War I record of 26 aircraft destroyed in Europe.

The movie, "Fighter Squadron," is based in part on Johnson's career. His book, "Thunderbolt," published in 1958, details many of his battles.

Bobby said "An ace must be determined and aggressive, have extraordinary eyesight, quick reflexes, flying ability... You were flying a weapon, its purpose to destroy the enemy. Our old commander Hub Zemke used to tell us, once you have committed yourself, go. Don't go half-way across the street and change your mind. Go all the way..."

Johnson was born in Lawton Feb. 21, 1920. He and his friends as boys used to go out and catch the field artillery horses at Fort Sill, and ride them "wild," without saddles. He hunted squirrels and rabbits, and learned to swim in a puddle in the creek near Doe Doe Park.

When he was 8, his dad took him to an air show at Fort Sill. The youngster marveled at the maneuvers of three pursuit planes and fell in love with flying. The day before he was 16, he received a student flying license.

He attended Cameron in 1939-40 and 1940-41. He was president of his class

the first year, and president of the student senate the second year, and earned his associate in engineering degree.

"That schooling paid off in my career that followed," he said.

Following the war, he joined Republic Aviation Corp. in Farmingdale, Long Island, N.Y. He was with Republic in sales and flight testing for 18 years, then was in the insurance and securities business from 1964 until his retirement in 1991.

He is a charter member of the Air Force Association and was president in its fourth and fifth years following Jim Doolittle, Tom Lamphier, and C.R. Smith.

In 1961 he started the P47 Thunderbolt Pilots Association and became a charter member of the 56th Fighter Group Association. His career and his work with the associations have taken him over the world. He became friends with many other aces, including some of his former enemies. He has met or known six American presidents.

He and his wife, the former Barbara Morgan, also a 1941 Cameron grad, celebrated their 50th anniversary in February 1992. They live on a 23-mile long lake at Lake Wylie, S.C. But he said they have been so busy he hasn't used his fishing or hunting equipment for a long time.

Dr. Herbert Orr achieves in medical field

The medical achievements of Herbert S. Orr Jr., M.D. include serving as a battle surgeon in World War II, helping build a hospital, and philanthropic endeavor.

He was born in Lawton May 12, 1917, and after graduation from Lawton High School attended Cameron Junior College. He earned an associate degree in chemistry at Cameron in 1936. At Cameron he was a boxer, member of the choral society, and an honor student.

Dr. Orr's brothers, Howard, Carl, and Richard, all attended Cameron.

Orr earned a B.S. in chemistry at Oklahoma State -- then Oklahoma A&M -- in 1938. He and Mrs. Orr, the former Carlean L. Sherrill, met at Oklahoma A&M.

He was accepted in the OU Medical School with the highest entrance exam score that had been made in Oklahoma. He received his M.D. in 1942.

In World War II Dr. Orr was a captain and battalion surgeon with the 395th Infantry, 99th Division. The unit served in the Ardennes, Rhineland, and Austria. Orr's decorations include the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Presidential Unit citation, Combat Medics, and several battle stars.

He did his internship at Toledo General Hospital in Ohio, then joined Hillcrest Memorial Hospital, Tulsa. He was chairman of the intern and resident committee at Hillcrest. He designed the original obstetrics and gynecology department for Doctors' Hospital in Tulsa.

He was vice president and member of the board of directors of the hospital from its inception to its sale, with the use of the proceeds to create Founders of Doctors' Hospital, Inc.

The Founders of Doctors' Hospital, Inc. foundation was established in 1983. The foundation is governed by a 13-person board which meets monthly. The officers are elected annually. Dr. Orr is president of the foundation which has assets exceeding \$35 million. The purpose of the foundation is broad-based giving, generally to medical education and health care, research, scholarships, community services, performing arts, religious and philanthropic activities. Grants are made in the Tulsa area.

The foundation has given approximately \$18 million, including \$20,000 per month to the Oklahoma Medical School at Tulsa for the benefit of family practice.

Orr is past president of the Tulsa Junior College Foundation, the Inola Lions Club, Cedar Crest Country Club, and Tulsa Exchange Club.

Dr. and Mrs. Orr have five daughters and one son; 16 grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren.

The children are Mary Helen Schnetzer, Tulsa; Carolyn A. Shuey, Bartlesville; Patricia S. Orr, Tulsa; Sandra Burkitt, Tulsa; Joy L. Wilhelm, Gurnee, Ill., and Herbert Orr, Tulsa.

The medical tradition is being continued in the family. Daughter Sandra is a registered nurse in pediatric intensive care in Tulsa. Sandra's daughter, Jennifer is a pre-dental student at Kansas University. Son Herbert installs X-ray, catscan and other medical equipment over the world. Herbert's wife is an RN supervisor of outpatient care at St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa. Daughter Joy is taking an emergency medical technician course in Waukegan, Ill. Patricia is studying physical therapy in Tulsa. Son-in-law George Schnetzer is a M.D. in Tulsa. A granddaughter, Michelle Boice, M.D., is an obstetrics and gynecology resident in Tulsa and is married to a doctor. Granddaughter Kimberly Orr is in pre-med at OSU.

Tom Wilson: South Africa's loss, our gain

World War I caused Tom Wilson to be exiled from Kimberly, South Africa, where he was born Feb. 3, 1905. He and his family wound up in Southwestern Oklahoma, where he attended the Cameron State School of Agriculture. He became a master carpenter, chief carpenter at OU in Norman, a Number One OU sports fan, and renowned Oklahoma Methodist layman-evangelist.

He was a farm boy in Kimberly when his twin brother broke his arm, and the family took the youngster to London to have a specialist reset the bone. While the family was in England, ships were being attacked by the Germans and the family's return to South Africa was impossible.

His mother had a sister in Southwest Oklahoma, and the Wilsons decided to come here in 1915.

"The Germans sank the Lusitania, the U.S. declared war, and we never did get back home," Wilson said.

The farm was 13 miles southwest of Lawton at a little community called Holliday, now gone.

Their folks put Tom and his twin brother, Jack, on a train to Lawton, and they walked from the station to enroll at Cameron. They carried their clothes and walked through the pastures and barbed wire fences.

"When Friday came, my twin brother and I decided we would find the railroad track and walk home. We did, arriving about 1 a.m. We thought we'd had all the schooling we

wanted, but on Monday we were back, and didn't get home again until Thanksgiving."

Tom lettered in track in 1923 and 1924, and played clarinet in the band. He was business manager of the Wichita yearbook and 1924 editor of the Delphic World, journal of the Delphic Oracle Literary Society. He graduated in 1924.

Tom earned a teachers certificate but the then powerful Ku Klux Klan opposed his appointment as a teacher. Tom said he was suspect because he was part Irish, his family was Catholic, and he was a foreigner from a suspect continent, Africa. Tom Wilson became a carpenter and builder.

His twin brother is deceased. His sister, Ilene Davis, of Norman, is a 1925 Cameron graduate. Tom's wife, the former Hazel Davis, grew up on a farm several miles from the Wilson place. Her father had a big lake which was a favorite swimming and picnic spot.

Tom and Hazel Wilson had three children. They are Dr. Jack W. Wilson, Raleigh, N.C., of the economics department at North Carolina State; the late Margaret Richardson, who died in 1983; and Sandy Sharp, an English teacher in Richmond, Va.

Tom Wilson's achievements seem to go in 50-year increments: OU four-sport season ticket buyer, member of McFarlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Norman, member of the carpenters union -- all for a half-century.

While he was employed by the Navy, the University of Oklahoma moved into the Navy facility at Norman, and he began working for OU as supervisor of maintenance and construction in 1946. All maintenance and remodeling on campus is done by the carpenter shop, and seven crafts were under his supervision. He retired in June 1975 after almost 30 years of service.

His favorite projects at the OU campus included the renovation of Buchanan Hall and the Cardiac Arrest Center under the stadium.

"I'm quite proud of the Cardiac Unit, because a good friend, Ray Matlock, who suffered a heart attack at a football game, survived because of the unit," he said.

He is a gardener and since retirement has provided thousands of pounds of fresh vegetables to individuals and to his church's market, which proceeds help mission projects.

He was awarded the Harry Denman Award in 1983 for his efforts for the Methodist Church. The minister, Phil Fenn, said Tom Wilson is personally responsible for more than 1,000 people joining McFarlin.

"Never have I heard him complain about another person or say anything demeaning about them," Fenn said. "...He immigrated from South Africa and has proved himself to be a more conscientious citizen than those who have had the privilege of being born here."

Cameron is still looking for a way to reach the higher level of competition it has found the last three seasons in the rugged Lone Star Conference. But Frank Crosson's club, which finished 3-7 last season, has key offensive returnees that could push it to that plateau.

Most of them accounted for a potent passing attack that helped junior quarterback Alex Pugh lead the LSC in touch-down passes (12) last fall. Senior flanker Michael Ivory was one of Pugh's favorite targets, hauling in 22 passes for 488 yards and five touchdowns. Senior Derek Deshotel caught 21 for 345 yards and three scores.

The CU defense will be looking to a solid crop of transfers to compliment one returnee at linebacker and two in the secondary. Highlighting that group is junior college all-American tackle John Ware.

The kicking game will be solid with second-team all-conference placekicker Steve Youmans and honorable mention all-league punter Troy Goudeau returning.
