The Cameron State School of Agriculiure is one of the original six secondary agricultural schools established by the First State Legislature. Now there are four of these schools in the state, located at Tishomingo, Warner, Goodwell and Lawton, respectively.

The purpose of the district agricultural school is to provide an opportunity to secure a well rounded secondary education, mor practical than has heretofore been offered. of agricultural and industrial education and may be relied upon to carry out the purpose and intent of the law establishing secondary agricultural schools in this state. Local government is in the hands of the President and Faculty.

The peculiar climate and soil of this section make a school of Cameron's type especially important to the great Southwest. Realizing the need of a school and experimental station of this kind for this section of the state, an association of business men, headed by the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Lawton, purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land, where Cameron is now located, and presented it to the state as a special inducement to locate a school here. With a semi-arid climate and unusual soil problems, we try to adapt the instruction in general agriculture to the conditions in our own part of the state.

We commemorate Tuesday November Sixteenth. 1909 as the birthday of Cameron. On this day the first term was opened in the basement of the First National Bank building. During the thir-1 month of the third $:$ crm, the school was moved from the basement of the bank into the present location, a modern three story brick building which will accommodate two hundred students. It was during the fourth term of school that our Girls' Dormitory was crected by the citzens of Lawton. This building is thoroughly modern in every respect and affords accommodation for fifty young ladies. Other improvements include a modern combined horse and dairy barn, an implement shed, planned and built by the boys, class in carpentry, a one hundred ton silo, boys' dormitory and two cement storm caves. In the way of livestock we have established a herd of pure-bred Holstein cattle, a herd of pure-bred Poland China hogs, and two of the best registered Percheron mares in the state.

The school has had a steady and substantial growth and is now one of the permanent educational units of the state.

Cameron of today shines far in her glory but Cameron of tomorrow will shine fariher and brighter.
