Humble (Emilio Pena, 1938). 1930 style of Egyptian interpretation. Fascia has a modified Egyptian design made of pressed sheet metal. Body of building is an elongated octagon finished with a standing seam metal roof. Note the herringbone pattern of brick on flat capitals. The tile on the bottom of the octagon is a low wainscot that is extended up to become trim around windows and doors accented by a pediment above the central door, and above that, the original bright blue Humble insignia. Engaged piers uphold the canopy of formidable design. Stucco over brick, this was undoubtedly a showcase station and the most intricate Humble design left standing.
