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deeper life. A moment's consideration will persuade you that is true. Your son dislikes algebra but he likes birds, snakes and lizards. It will take twice as long to get his algebra lesson as it takes him to get his natural history lesson. And though he works only half as long he gets the natural history lesson better than he does his algebra lesson. Why? Because, while he studies his algebra with his mind he studies his natural history with his mind and heart.

"It is not as a man thinketh solely with his mind but as a man thinketh in his heart that creates character and upbuilds life. Nothing can be more devilish than pure intellect unbalanced by appreciation. Goethe portrayed Mephistopheles as a cold, calculating, sneering cynic and depicts the angels in heaven as emotionally responsive to beauty and goodness, and he thus teaches that you can't really understand except you also appreciate. Shakespeare said 'brain education may put a sharp weapon in a mad-man's hand.' If the boy is a bad boy almost the worst thing you can do is to educate him for the education will only give his depravity further opportunities to manifest self. Lust is more powerful to seduce when it can speak with music in its voice. Malice is more malignant when it can sharpen its speech with cunningly contrived words. We need to do more than school the intellects of our boys and girls; the emotions and the will must also be schooled."

Catharine Waugh McCulloch Sends Information to Editors.

Catharine Waugh McCulloch, as legislative superintendent for the Illinois Equal Suffrage association, sent out this week to all Illinois editors the following letter:

The Illinois Equal Suffrage association sent letters to the Republican and Democratic candidates for congress and the legislature, asking each his attitude on the question of extending further suffrage rights to women.

The letter reminded them that the women of Australia, Finland, Norway,

If each of these six could be replaced with a believer in woman's enfranchisement suffrage measures could probably pass the senate.

"Now, there is such a thing as impassioned thinking—thinking which is not only touched but suffused with feeling. That is the kind of thinking which the bible eulogizes. Some speak as if the intellect was the only organ of knowledge with which the soul is equipped; but the mind is not the exclusive faculty by which knowledge can be gained. You can know by thinking and you can know by feeling. Our hearts have eyes with which to see as well as our minds.

"Paul says something in one of his epistles about the eyes of the heart being enlightened. There are realms of truth in which thinking will find out things better and faster than feeling will, but in some matters the heart is
