Annual Report of the President and Director

The commemoration of the centennial of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Japan and the United States was the dominant factor in almost all phases of the Museum activities during the past year, and to this the entire staff gave unparalleled effort.

EXHIBITIONS

The Japanese exhibition was entitled *Treasures of Japan* and combined the cream of our own collection with the collection of archaic Haniwa and other early ceramics from the Tokyo National Museum and outstanding items from the fine collection of the Honolulu Academy of Arts. The Haniwa, which traveled with two curators, was also shown in this country only in the National Gallery in Washington, Asia House in New York City, the Art Institute of Chicago, and subsequently at the DeYoung Museum in San Francisco. Although our collection, so far as I know, covers the entire historical span more consistently than any other museum in the Western world, and it was supplemented by material of top quality, the exhibit failed to be a complete financial success, but it brought rewarding professional and international kudos to our organization.

Our annual exhibits were larger than ever and more demanding in space. The 46th Northwest Annual, for instance, required the utilization of all the non-permanent galleries to exhibit 242 items out of 1178 submitted by 706 artists. It is encouraging to note that fifteen items were sold for \$2,200.00 aside from the purchase prizes. Our lack of space emphasizes the fact that we might henceforth have to limit the artist to one entry and also limit the size of entries in order that more artists may be represented. We had six one-man shows, all by artists with at least local affiliations in accordance with our established policy of encouraging home talent.

Many of the historical exhibitions were drawn from our own collection. The most important was the exhibition Art in Wood, presented in honor of the Fifth World Forestry Congress for which Seattle was host. This was suggested and selected by Edward B. Thomas, Educational Director. During the year, however, space did not permit exhibiting many of our outstanding items. In the crowded schedule, exhibitions are usually too fleeting to be of material service to the schools and universities. A complete list of exhibitions and juries is included at the conclusion of the written reports.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND PROGRAMS

Again we take pleasure in acknowledging our indebtedness to the Music Performance Trust Funds of the Recording and Television Industries for participating with the Museum in the sponsorship of twelve Sunday afternoon chamber music concerts during the late spring and early autumn, under the direction of Ronald Phillips. We also presented a concert by Madame Teruko Uraguchi of Tokyo and a musical program by the Norwegian Male Chorus of Seattle.

We were fortunate in having three noted scholars lecture under our auspices: Dr. Eleanor Consten of the Institut fur Kunstgeschichte, Aachen, West Germany, on Chinese Porcelain, a History of Taste; Dr. Julius Held of Barnard College, on Sources of Rubens; Dr. William M. Milliken, Director Emeritus, Cleveland Museum of Art, on Sienna, City of the Virgin; and Ernest van Harlingen on Watercolor Techniques. During the Japanese exhibition we presented four of their great films: Rashomon, Gate of Hell, Magnificent Seven, and Ugetsu.

LIBRARY AND LENDING MATERIAL

Our Library was increased by 186 reference books which we received by purchase and gift, aside from the periodicals. These included some of the most important publications of the year. Our Librarian, Miss Hermie Lyons, was pleased to note that eleven of the Museum's objects were reproduced in the various publications.

Our collection of slides grew in both number and use. In spite of our gift of duplicates to the University of Alaska and discards, our collection is now 22,000, of which about 16,000 were used. The deterioration of color slides will of necessity increase the discards in years to come.

Our loan of facsimile paintings recommenced when our storage was more clear and 563 were borrowed by 43 institutions.

Over 300 original items were lent to over 50 museums and institutions both here and abroad, the most notable being four items in the very selective small exhibition

at the opening of Asia House in New York City; 71 of our finest Japanese objects at the DeYoung Museum in San Francisco; and 13 examples of our early Gandhara sculpture of India to the Art Institute of Chicago.

ACCESSIONS

The wide scope of our interest is indicated by the list, beginning on page 46, of nearly one hundred and fifty accessions representing more than twenty cultures from about the same number of sources. Thanks to our major exhibit there was an exceptional emphasis on Japan to fill gaps in our historical sequence. The twenty-three Japanese items were exceeded in number by the contemporary American pieces due to the purchase awards in various mediums. Nearly one third of the total accessions were additions to the Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection, but some items were acquired by the Board through the Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund. We are also especially indebted to Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Norman Davis, Miss. Joanna Eckstein, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Gerber, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Hauberg, Jr., Mrs. Corydon Wagner, and others, as well as to contributors to various purchase funds. The relatively limited funds at our disposal preclude some fields, but permit the purchase of items of supreme importance in others, with an emphasis on authenticity and the extent to which each piece reflects the creative art of a specific culture and period. The market, however, appears to be becoming universally more restricted.

ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBIT

The Eleventh Annual Architectural Exhibit, which for the first time was held in the Highlands, bore the title *Ageless Architecture*. Eight homes were selected to permit a comparison of contemporary domestic architecture with houses built over thirty years ago in the finest European tradition. This project, under the very able chairmanship of Mrs. Clifford W. Phillips, resulted in a net profit to the general funds of the Museum of \$7,000. We also express our deep gratitude to her fine Vice Chairmen, Mrs. Robert Denny Watt, Mrs. Russell de Alvarez, Mrs. J. Elroy McCaw.

The magnitude of this event is reflected in the fact that the service of 500 volunteers is required on the various committees in handling the innumerable details under the following committee chairmen: Secretary, Mrs. Allen B. PUBLICATIONS AND PUBLICITY

The success of our organization in serving the community depends to a large measure on the publicity which we receive gratuitously. For part of the duration of the Japanese exhibit Foster and Kleiser and the Sunset Outdoor Advertising Co. each generously donated twenty billboards. We are also most grateful to the following commercial banks which included fliers in their statements: National Bank of Commerce, Pacific National Bank, Seattle-First National Bank, Seattle Trust & Savings Bank. These were also distributed through the Seattle Public Library and the King County Library, Seattle Public Schools, the principal hotels and the AAA.

The event caused us to publish a catalogue entitled Japanese Art in the Seattle Art Museum, including an historical sketch by the Director and fully described illustrations of 208 items. We acknowledge with pleasure our indebtedness to Harold Phillip Stern, Associate Curator of Japanese Art at the Freer Gallery, for his editorial assistance in its initial stage. From our staff, Millard B. Rogers and Miss Emily H. Tupper especially collaborated, as well as D. Ross Edman and Miss Lucretia Hoover. This publication was accomplished with the financial assistance of The Seattle Foundation which granted \$5,000 to cover almost 50% of the cost of printing. The publication brought excellent professional comment in Europe and Asia as well as in this country. It also was responsible for the official tour of the Museum during the brief visit to Seattle of Her Imperial Highness Princess Michiko of Japan at the recommendation of Yukio Yashiro. This event brought favorable international publicity to the Museum.

For the ninth consecutive year we published an engagement book which maintained its high standards in the quality of the objects illustrated as well as in the layout and captions. Although at best not a money-making project, it serves in some measure to overcome our geographic isolation and lack of other publications to spread knowledge of our collection. The professional compliments which it receives justifies the effort on the part of the Director in selecting and describing the items, and of the staff for editing and layout. The publication will be continued.

Press coverage of exhibits and activities is essential to their success, and we wish to acknowledge the utmost cooperation from the Seattle Times, the Post-Intelligencer and the Argus. The Museum also deeply appreciates the many local television and radio stations which so generously donate their facilities, staffs and air time for the presentation of our educational programs, spot announcements and news events.

TRAVEL EXPENSE

In the autumn the Director personally established the Univart Trust to furnish about \$4,000 quarterly to be available at the request of the Board of Trustees of the Seattle Art Museum towards the travel expense of staff members on official business and towards the purchase of items for the collection. In accordance with the established precedent of other museums, a contribution to the Director was authorized towards his personal travel expenses both for a five-day trip to Japan to attend the opening of the Yamato Bunkakan Museum at Nara and to visit the exhibitions of Japanese National Treasures celebrating the tenth anniversary of their Cultural Properties Act, and also towards a subsequent previously planned trip to Europe and the Middle East, including attendance in New York at the semi-annual meetings of the professional committees on which the Director serves. In the autumn, Mr. Rogers, Associate Director, had leave for about two weeks to travel again as a lecturer for the Archaeological Society of America, which was a marked compliment to him.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT

The most notable improvement in which the Museum invested was the very successful reconstruction of the Information-Sales counter in the lobby to give more space and more visual control. A number of items in the collection demanded professional repair including remounting of screens in Japan. Conservation is a substantial item in the budget of almost all museums. To a more modest degree purchase of equipment and material both for files and storage was required and was paid for with Museum funds, but we are grateful to the City for the resetting of the fountains on

the facade to prevent leakage and for the replacement of the obsolete panel box and controls for the illumination of the south galleries, as well as for the completion of the installation of fluorescent lighting in the stacks. Again we acknowledge the high standard of maintenance attained by the Seattle Park Department's staff of custodial engineers.

STAFF CHANGES

In the spring we engaged Miss Lucretia Hoover, a recent graduate of Oberlin College, to serve as assistant registrar under Miss Emily Hartwell Tupper. In the late autumn Allen C. Wilcox resigned as assistant curator after seven years of service to establish an art service shop. His place was taken by William J. Lahr. During the early spring and summer Neil Meitzler went abroad at his own expense on leave of absence. His place was temporarily taken by Paul Dahlquist.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mrs. C. Bagley Wright, Jr., was elected to the Board of Trustees to fill the vacancy left by the death of Mrs. Donald E. Frederick.

Our gratitude to our faithful members must be expressed, for without their support our organization would cease to function. This year our accounts closed slightly in the black thanks to a few major but unpredictable and unrestricted gifts from good friends and to the increase in our endowment income, largely through the efforts of the finance committee of the Board. The margin of profit, however, does not permit complacency.

In closing I wish to thank the many volunteers for their assistance in various programs, the Board of Trustees for their wise counsel, and especially my fellow members of the staff for their initiative and faithful effort which is so vital to our civic service.

Annual Report of the Education Department

The Education Department staff gave this year eighteen lectures in the community and eighty-four talks and tours in the Museum, including our regular P.-T.A. and Docent Committee study programs. They have also presented fifty-four television programs and three special radio broadcasts. Our weekly half hour program on KING-TV's Community Workshop observed in October its ninth year on the air and a single broadcast brought a mail response from as far north as British Columbia and south to Chehalis, west to Aberdeen and east to Cle Elum.

The Associate Director, Millard B. Rogers, for another year has done the weekly Monday evening radio program, "Art for Your Sake," on KOMO. In May his weekly series "Your Seattle Art Museum" was transferred from Sunday afternoons on KXA to Saturday afternoons on KTW, with the fourth program of each month being presented by the Guild Radio Committee.

The Curator of Education, Mrs. William J. Lahr, initiated in June a new monthly series of evening educational programs on KCTS-TV, and the series will be continued throughout the coming year. She also collaborated with KIRO-TV for a special filmed

Project 7 television documentary on the Museum, its history and collections, and taught twenty-eight education classes cosponsored by the Y.W.C.A.

D. Ross Edman, the Assistant in Education, expanded the number of classes in art history and appreciation held at the Museum after school and Saturdays. The following courses were offered and enjoyed an excellent enrollment: spring—Survey of Painting, 3 classes of 18 sessions for Junior and Senior High students; summer—Japanese Art, one class of 20 sessions for Junior and Senior High students; one class of 9 sessions for Grades 3-6; fall—19th Century Painting, four classes of 10 sessions for Junior and Senior High students; American Art, one class of 10 sessions for Grades 2-6.

The Educational Director at the beginning of the year completed a trip to India and Southeast Asia, prepared an Acoustiguide tour of the *Treasures of Japan* exhibit, selected several exhibits, participated in the Washington Art Association convention in Spokane, and was elected Vice President for the next two years of Pacific Arts Association, a sub-organization for the eleven Western States of the National Art Education Association.

As always we have had generous and enthusiastic assistance from our many volunteers. We particularly thank and are grateful to the Guild's Docent Committee and the Junior League of Seattle. The Docent Committee each year grows in size and enthusiasm and in addition to conducting tours of our exhibits presents the monthly programs for Senior Citizens, maintains an Outside Speakers service and assists with our classes for young people. The Junior League has continued the Treasure Box visits to school classrooms and has provided much needed assistance in mounting, filing and cataloguing educational materials.

Report of the Seattle Art Museum Guild

1960-61

According to our By-Laws, the purpose of the Seattle Art Museum Guild is the cultural enrichment of its members and service to the Museum. With these aims in mind our work for the past year has been so directed.

Guild days continued to be the first and third Thursdays of the month from October through April. The morning program consisted of a series of illustrated lectures by Dr. Fuller, Mr. Rogers and Mr. Thomas on the subject of *The Exotic Art and Architecture of Further India*. The afternoon series, arranged by the Guild Program Chairman and her committee under the direction of Mr. Thomas had as a theme *Art and Motion Pictures*. In addition to showing films which illustrated various techniques in the medium, three guest speakers appeared to talk on special films. They were: Mr. Gervais Reed, of the University of Washington Henry Gallery; Miss Ellen Walsh, of the Seattle Public Library Film Service, and Miss Edith Lind, of the audiovisual department of the Seattle Public Schools. We are very appreciative of the contributions of these speakers.

The Docent Committee, composed of 75 members, conducted 174 tours in the Museum and gave approximately 50 talks to outside groups. An innovation this year has been the lunch-hour short tour on Guild day. Docent aid to the Education Department has made it possible to enroll at least 50% more children than would have been possible without such assistance to the Staff. Docents have also assisted in clerical work in the Education Department. They have carried on this program in addition to a constant schedule of study under Staff supervision.

For the purpose of welcoming new members and recruiting others, the Membership Committee has held two coffee hours and behind-the-scenes tours at the Museum. Others are scheduled for the future. One or more Committee members attend Guild lectures to welcome newcomers and guests and to enroll new members.

The Hospitality Committee, under the direction of its Chairman, is indispensable to the comfort and pleasure of the Guild. Twenty-four women give faithfully of their time and energy, serving tea and coffee, decorating tables and ushering on Guild day.

The Public Relations Committee has held three beautifully appointed teas in the activities room for outside groups in conjunction with Docent-led tours of the galleries. The services of this Committee are available for conventions, clubs and other groups. This Committee also served refreshments on Sundays during the Japanese show.

Our Publicity Chairman has enjoyed the cooperation of both major newspapers. The space allotted to the Guild activities contributes greatly to the convenience of Guild members and stimulates interest in our program among non-members.

The Radio Chairman conducts a monthly program through the courtesy of Station KTW. The interviews between the Chairman and various artists, Staff, and Guild members has been very informative. The program also serves to disseminate information about Museum activities to the general public.

A special event held in October was the informal gallery tour and tea for foreign students who attend local universities. We are grateful to the Committee which arranged this annual party.

A well-organized group of 175 men and women functioned as a Volunteer Sales Committee during the *Treasures of Japan* exhibit. This group gave a total of 350 hours of work which considerably reduced the expenses of the exhibit for the Museum. We thank the Chairmen and all who assisted them.

In recognition of their services to the Museum, the Guild contributed to memorials for Dr. Grant Butterbaugh, Irving Humber and Miss Alice Gates.

For their constant aid and encouragement my sincere thanks go to the Guild Board, Advisors, Committee Members, Museum Staff, and the Director. It is my earnest hope that the membership feels that we have successfully attained the Guild purpose and that they will join us in a greater effort next year.














Fig. 27. Virgin Mary, Austrian, 18th cent.; boxwood with polychromy and gilt; H. 3¾ in. (Au11.1) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection







We have examined the accounts of the SEATTLE ART MUSEUM

for the calendar year 1960 and have prepared the attached statements which, in our opinion, correctly set forth the financial condition of the Museum at December 31, 1960 and the results of its fiscal transactions for the year then ended.

Securities are carried on the balance sheet at cost, when purchased or at market values when otherwise acquired. Securities were sold during the year at prices exceeding original carrying values by \$8,848.09 and the several fund balances were increased accordingly.

Securities carried on the balance sheet at \$954,912.24 had market values of approximately \$1,200,000 at the close of the year.

It should be noted that the attached statements are made on a strictly cash receipts and disbursements basis; this report does not attempt to evaluate or account for the Museum's art collections, library, equipment or properties other than money and securities.
