Enthusiastically embracing the future, we also look back with gratitude to those whose artistry, creativity, and generosity have brought us so far. In this year of incredible movement, we stop for a moment to consider and acknowledge all that has been achieved.

As our city continues to evolve and grow, so too will the museum—always maintaining the fine balance of going forward while looking back.

In the past fiscal year, the Board of Trustees and museum staff focused significant energy on the historic Seattle Asian Art Museum. The downtown museum, now in its ninth year, enjoyed a highly successful year financially and artistically. The Board acquired and began development of the Olympic Sculpture Park and secured funds required to stabilize the museum's long-term financial future.

The level of attendance and community involvement at the Seattle Asian Art Museum exceeded our expectations. Exhibitions, which included Modern Masters of Kyoto: Nihonga from the Griffith and Patricia Way Collection, Paul Horiuchi, Art of Protest, and Sheer Realities: Clothing and Power in Nineteenth-Century Philippines, attracted the largest number of visitors to the Seattle Asian Art Museum since 1991. Activity also centered on The Year of Korea and its Explore Korea: A Visit to Grandfather's House interactive exhibition. Popular exhibitions, free days, family programming, and special events such as a fashion show encouraged a growing number of Seattle citizens to become involved with the Seattle Asian Art Museum.

Many children had their first exposure to the museum through their teachers' participation in the Wyckoff Teacher Resource Center. We expanded our summer art camp and developed learning galleries for two downtown exhibitions: Impressionism: Paintings Collected by European Museums and Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe. Children and parents benefited from our new Educational Resource Room; the Knudsen Please Touch Room is a visually engaging, child-centered space for learning, play, and performance. More than 9,000 new families joined as members in the past two years.

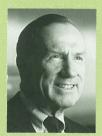
The Olympic Sculpture Park was the year's most exciting project. Following the museum's purchase of a six-acre waterfront property in December 1999, we have been shaping the vision for this new public open space. The museum recently signed a design agreement with the City of Seattle that provides for integration of the new park with the public waterfront and Myrtle Edwards Park. We are pleased to have continued and thoughtful participation from community groups, business associations, government leaders, and our new neighbors

The long-term future of the Seattle Art Museum seems assured with the completion of the Century Endowment Campaign, now nearing its December 2000 closing date. Our efforts over the past five years have brought the museum's total endowment to more than \$77 million. In the past year alone, three remarkable challenge grants were awarded to the museum: the National Endowment for the Humanities honored SAM with a significant challenge grant for its education programs; the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation approved an endowment challenge grant to establish a new conservation department; and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation gave its largest gift to any arts organization to date. This successful campaign reflects strong leadership and great public generosity.

We take pride in the accomplishments of the past year. Dr. Fuller's museum is growing in Volunteer Park, in downtown Seattle, and on the waterfront. Programs are expanding to engage more of our community with exceptional art. Our educational programs are strong. Our museum is assuming a larger position in the Seattle community and in the international art world. We are both excited to be part of the Seattle Art Museum's future.

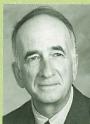

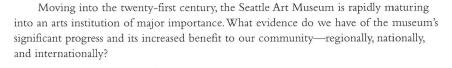

President



Attendance per annum exceeds half a million; membership is at the unprecedented level of more than 35,000; and more than 299 objects were added to our collections this year, including the work of contemporary European artists such as Anselm Kiefer, wax printed cloth from Africa, and pieces by early twentieth-century Asian artists such as Qi Baishi and Tsuji Kako, Chinese and Japanese respectively. As the fiscal year came to a close in the summer of 2000 and fiscal year 2001 began, the museum acquired two spectacular works especially appropriate for Seattle: Alexander Calder's bright red, large-scale stabile, Eagle, which will eventually be the focal point of the Olympic Sculpture Park, and Albert Bierstadt's Puget Sound on the Pacific Coast, an important nineteenth-century American landscape painter's dramatic vision of Puget Sound.

At the forefront of our museum's mission is access to the best in the visual arts, both in our collections and in special exhibitions. Fiscal year 2000 exhibitions downtown— Impressionism: Paintings Collected by European Museums, An American Century of Photography: From Dry-Plate to Digital, Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe, and 2000 1/2: going forward looking back—together with the multitude of more modest shows, constituted an exhilarating and thought-provoking artistic program that broadened our perspectives, temporally and globally. Next year, we can look forward to an equally vibrant schedule that features three SAM-originated exhibitions—Creating Perfection: Shaker Objects and Their Affinities, John Singer Sargent, and Treasures from a Lost Civilization: Ancient Chinese Art from Sichuan. At the Seattle Asian Art Museum, 2001 will be The Year of China.

Staff changes that took place in fiscal year 2000 included the retirement of William J. Rathbun, John A. McCone Curator of Asian Art, after twenty-seven years of dedicated service; Steven C. Brown, Associate Curator of Native American Art, for ten strong years; and the announcement by Trevor Fairbrother, Deputy Director of Art and Jon and Mary Shirley Curator of Modern Art, that he will leave the museum in early 2001. As lead curator, Trevor has significantly raised the stature of this institution artistically and intellectually. We are most appreciative of their impressive accomplishments while at the museum. A national search is underway to identify successors who will continue the legacy that these fine curators have established.

Looking forward, we are excited by the imminent addition of a painting conservator for the first time in the museum's history. We also welcome David Lotz, who joined the staff as our Chief Technology Officer, and Christopher Rogers, who, as Director of Capital Projects, is overseeing the realization of our Olympic Sculpture Park, as well as other projects. These talented individuals are directing important new initiatives that will impact the future of the Seattle Art Museum.

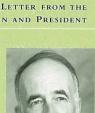

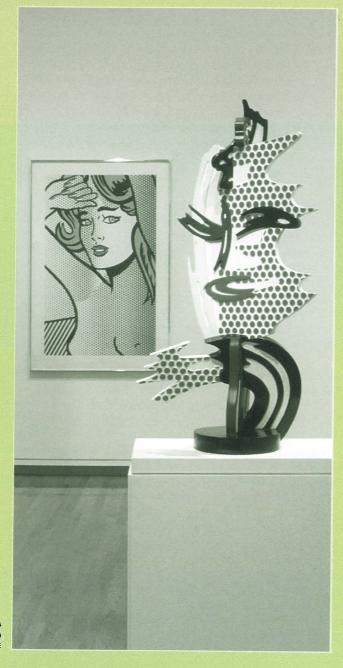

This year SAM's ambitious exhibition schedule offered visitors and members the opportunity to view spectacular private collections, celebrate the achievements of important Northwest artists, and learn more about the important role the visual arts have played in the history of cultural exchange.

Exhibitions of the past year struck a balance between past and future by examining cultures transitioning into the modern era. We brought together revered impressionist paintings culled from Europe's finest collections and marked the turn of the century by paying homage to the past one with one hundred years of photography. We examined the mutual influences of East and West through the art of Japanese Nihonga paintings, the progression of porcelain, and the intimate setting of a Korean household. We gave special tribute to the work of eminent local artists Paul Horiuchi, James Washington, Jr., and Jacob Lawrence, while enchanting crowds with retrospectives of Roy Lichtenstein and Eastman Johnson. And, of course, we enlivened and challenged perceptions at the cusp of the millennium in 2000 1/2: going forward looking back—with artistic visions that will continue to have impact for many years to come.

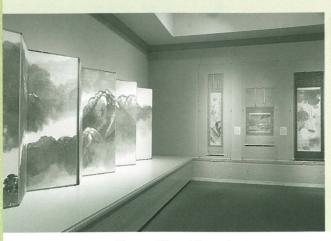

### Modern Masters of Kyoto: Nihonga from the Griffith and Patricia Way Collection

August 19, 1999-February 13, 2000 Attendance: 31,336

Curated by William Rathbun and Michiyo Morioka Hanging scrolls and screens by Kyoto painters from the superb collection of Griffith and Patricia Way, including the work of Tsuji Kako and Tomita Keisen. The show traveled to the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (April 13-July 31, 2000). It will also have an extensive nine-venue tour in Japan in 2001 and 2002.

# Explore Korea: A Visit to Grandfather's House

October 23, 1999-ongoing Curated by William Rathbun and Sarah Loudon

Elaborate construction has transformed the gallery to simulate a traditional Korean house, allowing visitors to enter the men's quarters, women's quarters, and kitchen. In addition to the home's furnishings, older artifacts related to a traditional lifestyle are on display in the gallery surrounding the house. This exhibition is based on Explore Korea: A Visit to Grandfather's House, which was organized by The Newark Museum, Newark, New Jersey. Explore Korea and the accompanying programming for schools and the public was made possible by generous grants from the Korea Foundation; PONCHO (Patrons of Northwest Civic, Cultural and Charitable Organizations); and the Nesholm Family Foundation. Additional support was provided by Seattle Art Museum Supporters (SAMS); a Seattle Public Schools World Language, Culture, and International Education Programs federal grant; and the King County Arts Commission Hotel/Motel Tax Fund. His rich legacy was celebrated with works ranging from the 1930s to the 1990s from the museum's permanent collection and loans from private and public collections.

### Art of Protest

April 27, 2000-January 21, 2001 Curated by Chiyo Ishikawa, Tara Reddy, and Susan Edwards

This cross-cultural exhibition explores the ways artists have used their work to incite social change, either by addressing pervasive social issues or referring to specific events in history. Featuring artists from Europe, North America, Asia, and Africa from the sixteenth through the twentieth centuries.

### Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe

# **2000 1/2: going forward looking back** June 8–July 16, 2000

Curated by Trevor Fairbrother and assisted by Tara Reddy A contemporary art exhibition intended to evoke the clash between cultural traditions and modern industrial conveniences in the wake of a millennial transition. A broad range of sculpture, paintings, photographs, works on paper, installation, sound, and video art that harmonized and clashed in varying ways. The display was compiled from SAM's permanent collections and outside loans.

### Women from Utopia

Contemporary paintings by four Aboriginal women from the expansive collection of Margaret Levi and Robert Kaplan. *Utopia's* depictions of landscape and "dreamings" are distinctive expressions of a strong community.

### West African Wax Prints

May 8, 2000-ongoing

Curated by Pam McClusky and Leasa Fortune
Colorful contemporary cotton fabrics field-collected from West Africa for SAM's collection. Used for
both traditional and Western clothing, the textiles
are often printed with symbols that communicate in
subtle ways.

### Documents International: Eleven Heads Are Better than One: Sixth-Graders Connect with SAM

This exhibition, curated by sixth-graders from South Shore and Washington Middle Schools, was part of a four-year project called *Growing Up With Art*.

Upcoming projects include a publication devoted to SAM's African collection, an exhibition catalogue

relating to recently discovered ancient art from Sichuan, China, and a book featuring a selection of Chinese porcelain from a private collection.

### CONSERVATION

Caring for its collections is at the heart of a museum's responsibility to the public. Whenever a work of art is taken in or out of storage, displayed, or loaned, its condition must be analyzed and strategies for protecting it implemented. The museum has long recognized the need for an in-house conservation department. Now, thanks to the following contributors, an unfinished space on the downtown museum's fifth floor, held in reserve for this purpose, will be transformed into a conservation lab and a new department established.

The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation awarded the museum a \$1.5 million endowment challenge grant during 2000, to establish an on-site conservation department. The Mellon Foundation grant requires a 2:1 match, which will bring the initial core endowment for conservation to \$4.5 million. We gratefully acknowledge the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Sally and Bill Neukom, and Charles Simonyi, whose support enables us to meet this ambitious challenge.

While the Mellon Foundation's grant will provide long-term support for the operation of the conservation lab, generous awards from the King County Arts Commission and the Norman Archibald Charitable Trust will provide crucial support for constructing the 1,800-square-foot conservation studio.

### LOANS

The Seattle Art Museum loaned thirty-five objects from its permanent collection for seventeen exhibitions, which were shown in twenty-one national and international venues.

Acquisitions





Like any flourishing enterprise, a museum must grow in order to stay vital, informed, and representative. In the last year, we added 299 objects to the museum's collections, increasing our understanding of art and contributing to the museum's goal of developing a rich, outstanding permanent collection. Our curators were able to acquire both historical and contemporary works, broadening the permanent collection with items from Ancient America, Asia, Africa, and Europe. From the delicacy of Qi Baishi's painted plum blossoms to the artistic vitality of the Maasai, the museum is working toward an expansive archive of global beauty and cultural expression.

Through the generosity of our donors, we acquired two major American works of art recently: a monumental landscape painting by Albert Bierstadt entitled *Puget Sound on the Pacific Coast*, and a superb sculpture, *Eagle*, by Alexander Calder, which will be one of the first sculptures installed at the Olympic Sculpure Park. Other highlights of the year's gifts of art include a collection of twelve Ancient American objects, including works from the Mayan, Nayarit, and Andean regions; a nineteenth-century Japanese painting by Yamamoto Baiitsu; an African Dogon monkey mask; and a monumental painting by the contemporary German artist Anselm Kiefer.

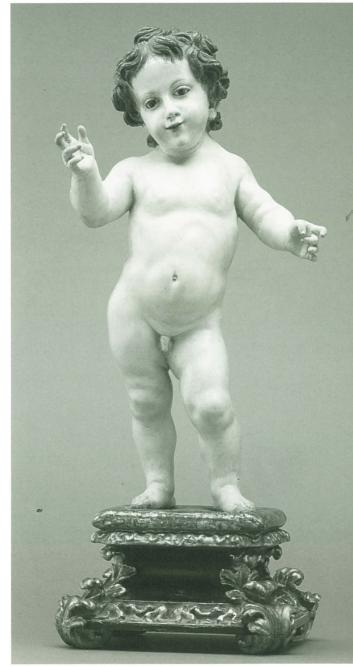

### FAMILY AND ART STUDIO PROGRAMS

Family and Art Studio Programs are experiencing a time of growth and are making significant strides toward three important goals: creating an enjoyable social and educational environment for families and schoolchildren; encouraging higher attendance and new, diverse

audiences; and collaborating with other museum departments and community organizations.

The museum undertook two ambitious projects this year. For Impressionism we transformed the Art Studio to replicate an impressionist painter's studio. Visitors of all ages could dress in period costumes, paint each other's portraits, work from a still life, or record a landscape. At the downtown museum, we recently opened the Knudsen Please Touch Room, a hands-on learning gallery for families with artmaking, costumes, puzzles, puppets, and games to engage the young at heart.

Two Art Studio programs have engaged and sustained new audiences. During the Seattle Public School spring break, the museum partnered with the After School Activities Program (ASAP) to offer a weeklong arts camp for low income Seattle public school students. Students shadowed museum staff, visited local artist studios, worked with a guest artist exhibiting at the museum, and created their own art during the Art Works! Camp. In the museum's summer arts camp, Summer Art FUNdamentals, the museum worked closely with the Central

Area Youth Association (CAYA) and the Treehouse, an organization offering programs for foster children, to recruit children for their first art camp experience.

The museum has also worked with arts partners to co-sponsor studio classes for children and teens. We are proud to be in the third year of our partnership with Youth Advancement through Music and Art (YATMA) to offer after-school art classes for at-risk youth in the museum's Nordstrom Art Studio. Two new partners are Seniors Making Art and the Seattle Academy of Fine Art. With Seniors Making Art, we offered a ten-week, intergenerational sumi ink painting class that overflowed with registrants. The Seattle Academy of Fine Art and the museum partnered to offer two five-week classes on drawing and painting for 12- to 14-year-olds.

The strong foundation that we have built with our community partners and family audiences provides the solid base from which these new ventures and opportunities spring. A newly convened Family Advisory Committee, consisting of parents, community advisors, SAM staff, and volunteers, has an exciting task: to guide the museum as we deepen our commitment to engage children and families in meaningful, lifelong relationships with art.

### SCHOOL AND TEACHER PROGRAMS

This year marked the completion of a four-year museum partnership with Seattle Public Schools called *Growing Up With Art*. This pilot project brought artists into the classrooms of six elementary and middle schools, and brought students into the museum to work with specially trained docents and artists. Teams of teachers, educators, artists, and docents collaborated to develop comprehensive, sequential lessons aligned with the Washington State Essential Academic Learning Requirements (EALRs), along with the means to assess student learning. This assessment work garnered attention in the museum and education communities, and SAM staff have presented their findings nationally.

A successful component of the *Growing Up With Art* program is the Ann P. Wyckoff Teacher Resource Center (TRC). Recently endowed through a generous gift from Ann P. Wyckoff, this center lends educational materials free of charge. Registered borrowers of TRC materials have increased more than 50 percent in the last year, and attendance at TRC events has almost quadrupled. The TRC is accessible to educators across the country at www.seattleartmuseum.org/trc.

In the past year, the School and Teacher Programs staff have made presentations to a wide variety of educators at parent-teacher organizations, after-school programs, and teacher preservice classes, reaching more than 2,300 educators.

Teachers were offered professional development programs with in-depth scholarly content and practical classroom applications from leading humanities experts. The School and Teacher Programs department will build on already-established partnerships with other cultural organizations such as the World Affairs Council, UW Jackson School for International Studies, UW Simpson Center for the Humanities, and Seattle Arts and Lectures, to develop summer teacher institutes with humanities scholars as teaching fellows.

In 1999, the museum was honored to be one of just two art museums in the country awarded a prestigious challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. This \$500,000 award acknowledges the vision of our programming, and will ensure the continued operation of the Wyckoff Teacher Resource Center. As this is a 4:1 challenge grant, SAM must raise an additional \$2 million. We gratefully recognize all those who are enabling SAM to meet the match requirement.

The museum will explore distance-learning initiatives with students and teachers by linking with other cultural institutions, schools, and libraries in King County through a new broadband communications network known as I–Net.

School and teacher programs at the Seattle Art Museum are made possible by a challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and by contributions from the Century Circle Endowment, the Vicki and Tom Griffin Education Endowment, the William Randolph Hearst Endowed Fund for Education Programs, C. Calvert Knudsen Education Endowment, the Barbara and Michael Malone Education Endowment, the Seattle Art Museum Supporters (SAMS) Education Endowment, the Volunteers Association/Rental Sales Gallery Education Endowment, the Ann P. Wyckoff Education Endowment, contributors to the Annual Fund, and operating support from the Washington State Arts Commission.

Generous funding for *Growing Up With Art* was provided by The Pew Charitable Trusts; M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust; Microsoft Corporation; the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency, with the H. J. Heinz Company Foundation; The Coca-Cola Foundation; The Discuren Charitable Foundation; PONCHO; King County Arts Commission Hotel/Motel Tax Revenues; and the Washington State Arts Commission.

### ADULT PROGRAMS

In presenting two international symposiums this year, SAM was a rich educational meeting ground for scholars, connoisseurs, and other lifelong learners. The first symposium was held at the Seattle Asian Art Museum in August in conjunction with Modern Masters of Kyoto: Nihonga from the Griffith and Patricia Way Collection. Later in the year, the second symposium was part of the programming for Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe and included speakers from China, Europe, and across the United States. An American Century of Photography: From Dry-Plate to Digital: The Hallmark Photographic Collection programs included informative, entertaining presentations by living artists represented in the collection: Sandy Skoglund, Linda Connor, and William Wegman. Closing out the year, Patricia Hills, author and cocurator of Eastman Johnson: Painting America, joined 2000 1/2: going forward looking back artist Whitfield Lovell in an opening night program, which considered parallels in art and social movements in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Contributing to the exciting year of adult programming were SAM's eight art councils. The Asian Art Council and Contemporary Art Council joined forces with the Henry Art Gallery to present a performance piece in the Fuller Garden Court of the Seattle Asian Art Museum by Chinese artist Zhang Huan. Other highlights of the year included a provocative panel discussion led by photo critic A.D. Coleman on Digital Analogies: Issues for a Medium in Transition, sponsored by the Photography Council: Simon Schama discussed his new book, Rembrandt's Eye, sponsored by the Decorative Arts and Paintings Council; and a performance beneath the backdrop of Eastman Johnson's paintings by Seattle Symphony's principal violist, Susan Gulkis, sponsored by the Council of American Art.

### DOCENT-LED TOURS

Docent-led tours continued to be an important and vital part of our education program for both school and public audiences. Docents toured the special exhibitions Impressionism: Paintings Collected by European Museums, An American Century of Photography: From Dry-Plate to Digital and Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe as well as our permanent collections. Continuing education programs were held with nationally known artists, educators, art historians, and collectors. Funding for these programs was provided by the Betty M. Winskill Memorial Docent Education Fund. Four docent study groups have been formed that focus on specific areas of the collections and meet regularly to study objects in the museum's collections. The study groups are: African Art, Asian Art, Australian Aboriginal Art, and Northwest Coast Native Art.

### FILMS

The Seattle Art Museum's film program added to its much-respected legacy by celebrating the twenty-second installment of the world's longest-running film noir series. Special honor was paid to the one-hundredth anniversary of master director Luis Buñuel and the five-decade career of American avant-garde pioneer Kenneth Anger. The program also offered new work by Northwest filmmakers Bruce Bickford and Karl Krogstad, and treated families to a festival of Asian films. Cultivating a broad range of diverse audiences is part of the museum's mission, and the film program supported this effort by presenting films from England, Japan, China, Iran and Ireland, as well as a series offering a psychoanalytic perspective on world cinema.

The downtown film series is generously supported by the Bagley Wright Endowment.

### COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

In 1997, the wide appeal of *Leonardo Lives* led to partnerships with community organizations that planned programs in connection with SAM's exhibitions. The response continues to be overwhelmingly positive with partner organizations and SAM benefiting by sharing resources, talents, and audiences.

A highlight of An American Century of Photography: From Dry-Plate to Digital was "Best of Youth in Focus '99," an exhibition of teen photography. Youth in Focus works with inner-city youth to provide a creative, positive learning experience using photography. The exhibit, seen on the First Floor Panels, included the young artists' black-and-white prints, self-portraits, and personal statements. The teens also worked with SAM staff to create an online version of the exhibition.

### SEATTLE ASIAN ART MUSEUM PROGRAMS

At the Seattle Asian Art Museum, a broad range of high-quality programs and new uses of technology significantly advanced the goals of furthering community involvement with the museum.

In October, the museum opened Explore Korea: A Visit to Grandfather's House, SAAM's first interactive exhibition planned jointly between the Education and Curatorial departments. The exhibition offered a presentation of a traditional Korean house, with an entry gate and three furnished rooms that visitors could freely explore. It was planned with the assistance of a community advisory committee, and was received enthusiastically by Korean Americans and many teachers. The exhibition also served as the impetus for celebrating The Year of Korea at SAAM, with an ambitious slate of workshops and performances throughout the year.

The exhibition *Sheer Realities: Clothing and Power in Nineteenth-Century Philippines* offered another important opportunity for community involvement with the museum. A Filipino American advisory committee was convened and did extensive planning for the exhibition and related projects, such as a resource kit of Philippine textiles for the Wyckoff Teacher Resource Center. In June, an opening event was held for community leaders, featuring a fashion show of traditional Philippine clothing.

Public programs expanded into new territory with events such as the Annual Chinese Art Colloquium held in conjunction with the special exhibition *Art of Protest*. Professors Martin Powers and Jerome Silbergeld were featured speakers, offering discourse on protest in traditional and contemporary Chinese art. An afternoon symposium was also held on the art of Paul Horiuchi. This year also saw an increase in the number of international scholars and performers who came from Asia to present programs, such as lectures on Nihonga painting by Kyoko Shiokawa; a demonstration by Korean ceramic artist Bu Won Park; performances of Japanese comedy by Rakugo Rakugai; and Buddhist ritual music and dance of Korea.

The Seattle Asian Art Museum was very fortunate this past year to have the valuable assistance of three interns supported by funds from the Blakemore Foundation. The foundation also supported an extensive schedule of scholarly programming at SAAM, as well as travel for young scholars to attend both the *Modern Masters of Kyoto* and the *Porcelain Stories* symposium.

The kind support of the Pendleton and Elisabeth Carey Miller Charitable Foundation allowed the museum to extend ArtStars, its teen docent program, into its fourth year.

### OPEN STUDIO

In its third and final year, SAM's Open Studio has expanded its digital literacy training to include communities in education, graphic design, and technology. An afternoon workshop co-sponsored by the King County I-Net Division explored examples of enhanced TV, CD-ROM, and web-based broadband projects. This workshop was streamed live from the museum's web site. An all-day workshop co-sponsored with the Seattle Arts Commission (SAC) and the City of Seattle's Information Technology department featured Michael Century from McGill University in Montreal and presentations on five local technology-based arts projects. This workshop was videotaped by the Seattle's cable access channel (TVSea) and broadcast multiple times during the following months. The final workshop, also co-sponsored with SAC, featured artists and Internet-industry representatives exploring ideas for developing a real and virtual city-sponsored Arts Resource Center using technology, government resources, and public/private partnerships. Open Studio/SAM has now evolved into a partnership with the City of Seattle and the Seattle Arts Commission to help develop an Arts Resource Network opening in 2001.

Open Studio was supported by the Rockefeller Foundation with additional support from the Benton Foundation in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Arts.

### LIBRARY

In the last year, combined library holdings at both the Dorothy Stimson Bullitt Library at SAM and the McCaw Foundation Library of Asian Art at SAAM have grown to 20,430, an increase of nearly 3,000 materials in the last four years. This growth in acquisitions has been made possible in part by generous gifts from individuals, some of whom have given their personal book collections to the libraries. Notable gifts were received from Evelyn Davis in memory of Sherrie Fisher; the Decorative Arts and Paintings Council; Jan Hwang and Leo Ling in memory of Ms. Hwang's parents; Mrs. Albert Kerry; Mr. and Mrs. Elliott Mittler; Elizabeth Molitor; Ruth Nutt; the West Seattle Art Club; Ann P. Wyckoff; and Laurine White in memory of Dorothy Bradbury.

### VOLUNTEERS

Galvanized by Sally Hirst, Volunteers Association Chair, 700 volunteers on fourteen committees contributed more than 31,000 work hours to the museum. In addition, the Volunteers Association completed its first pledge of \$50,000 to SAM's Century Endowment campaign and embarked on a second \$50,000 pledge to support school and teacher programs. SAM celebrated volunteers during National Volunteer Week with additional benefits and activities, including the Volunteer Art Show 2000 and free admission to museums in Seattle and Vancouver, B.C. The museum also honored thirty-three volunteers at a Volunteer Soirée for their outstanding service to SAM.

Sponsored by the Volunteers Association since 1933, the First Friday Program featured a provocative range of lectures including Evelyn Vanderhoop's Talking Fingers: Weavings from the Northern Northwest Coast and Remarkable Ideas That Things Are Fine: Images of African Americans by White Artists by Curatorial Research Associate Rock Hushka. More than 850 guests enjoyed the lectures and docent tours along with free coffee service and a special menu for senior patrons. First Friday Program chair Mary Rae Mattix initiated a partnership with the Washington Athletic Club to create Art & Eat, a luncheon and art discussion hosted by the WAC.

### RENTAL/SALES GALLERY

This past year was a successful one for the Rental/Sales Gallery, which is the major funding source for the Volunteers Association. Revenue increased substantially again this year, as did the number of both rentals and sales. There were 1,769 rentals and 252 sales to area homes and businesses. The gallery hosted four major shows, plus four rotating exhibits in the Focus Galleries. The First Avenue Window installation drew increased, favorable reviews, and worked as an excellent tool to interest new audiences in the museum's exhibits.

### TECHNOLOGY

Technology plays a vital role in opening the museum and art to communities throughout the region and the world.

Our worldwide presence is enhanced via our redesigned web site (www.seattleartmuseum.org),

which has expanded to keep pace with our ambitious exhibit and education schedule. Such notable exhibitions as *Grandfather's House, Porcelain Stories,* and *An American Century of Photography* have been augmented by web-based presentations. These have included a variety of multimedia capabilities such as web broadcasts and video, audio, and interactive demonstrations.

Enhancements were also made to our downtown facility's internal network to include the Library and Educational Resource Rooms, and to introduce new MP3 Audio Tour Guides at the Seattle Asian Art Museum. Regional access will also be extended via the King County I-Net initiative, which is deploying fiber-optic cable to extend the reach of organizations such as the museum.

Network-based technologies, such as an intranet, are being used within the museum's own operations to combine corporate information. The new eMuseum interface with the Collection Management System exemplifies the integration of web-based access to a traditional production database system that includes more than 12,000 digital images of our collection. Similar initiatives are also being applied to our online store to share resources such as event information via extranets.

The vastness of the Internet also allows for greater flow of information between museums domestically and internationally. Continuing efforts to standardize how art is described will enhance the way we research and exchange works of art with other institutions.

The museum is indebted to technology corporations who generously provide important in-kind gifts. These unique gifts support the museum's technology infrastructure and enable new outreach techniques.

In-kind technology gifts for 2000 were provided by Microsoft Corporation, Symantec Corporation, and Hewlett-Packard. The museum also extends its thanks to NetDesk for contributing Microsoft product training to staff, UltraBac.com for their donation of network backup software, and Silicon Graphics for the loan of equipment to demonstrate emerging exhibition technologies.

# CENTURY ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN

The Century Endowment Campaign was launched during fiscal year 1996, when the museum's total endowment stood at \$29 million. The primary purpose of this campaign has been to secure the financial foundation necessary for SAM to move, innovatively, into the future. As of June 30, 2000, the museum's endowment stands at over \$77 million including pledges receivable and outside trusts. Our progress toward the \$40 million goal of this campaign is equally impressive, with less than \$1.7 million left to raise by December 2000. This incredible growth is due to the generosity of those who believe in the necessity of having this permanent source of support. We take this opportunity to thank you all.

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This year, under the dynamic leadership of Margi Allison, Vicki Griffin, and the Annual Fund Committee, the campaign raised a record \$827,000 in unrestricted support, the largest amount in the fund's history.

Supporting all facets of museum operations, Annual Fund donors help to bring outstanding special exhibitions, educational programs, and outreach events to the people of the Northwest. The museum offers its deepest thanks to all our contributors for their ongoing dedication to this program.

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Created in honor of Seattle Art Museum's Illsley Ball Nordstrom Director Mimi Gardner Gates, the Director's Circle provides dedicated Annual Fund support for the exhibitions, programs, and activities offered at the Seattle Asian Art Museum. This year, SAM celebrated the purchase of a six-acre former industrial site as the future home of its Olympic Sculpture Park. In the year ahead, SAM will work to acquire the last remaining parcel needed to complete the park, and oversee a design process that will define a new civic space dedicated to outdoor sculpture. One of ten design grants from the National Endowment for the Arts will support the museum's design process.

Government officials have been working closely with the museum to identify public funding to support the park and an improved public waterfront. Washington State's federal delegation, under the leadership of Senators Slade Gorton and Patty Murray, recently secured funding for the park through the VA/HUD and Independent Agencies spending bill.

The Olympic Sculpture Park will combine art and the environment in an unparalleled setting. As we move forward with developing the site and our artistic and educational programs, we take this opportunity to thank all those who have enthusiastically participated in this initiative.

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### ANNUAL SUPPORT FROM FOUNDATIONS AND GOVERNMENT AGENCIES

Foundations and government agencies generously awarded the museum more than \$1,000,000 toward exhibitions, educational activities, and operations this year. As the museum continues to serve more schoolchildren, explore new technologies, and bring innovative exhibitions to its growing audience, its financial challenges increase as well. The museum must identify and commit to new projects and exhibitions long before support from corporations and foundations can be secured. The stability provided by annual support from the following organizations makes these financial and artistic risks possible:

- · Corporate Council for the Arts/ARTSFUND, including a Kreielsheimer Foundation Award for Special Needs and Recognition that acknowledges in part the immediate challenge of securing property for the sculpture park project; and an award designated specifically to support Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe, from the Guendolen Carkeek Plestcheeff Decorative and Design Arts Fund.
- PONCHO, whose investment in the museum's exhibitions and programs is evident throughout this report. In addition to its initial award in support of the long-running Documents Northwest: The PONCHO Series and the special exhibition Porcelain Stories: From China to Europe, PONCHO extended its commitment to include partial funding of the Wyckoff Teacher Resource Center at SAAM and the special exhibition Explore Korea: A Visit to Grandfather's House.
- The Seattle Arts Commission, King County Arts Commission, and Washington State Arts Commission, with assistance from the National Endowment for the Arts, who through their support enabled the museum to pursue its diverse exhibition schedule.
- The Institute of Museum and Library Services awarded the museum a two-year General

Operating Support award, identifying SAM as a leader in the museum field and providing stable support for the museum's day-to-day activities.

### CORPORATE FORUM

The Corporate Forum offers top-level corporate executives and community leaders an exclusive opportunity to meet and discuss a wide range of issues important to our community. With the Forum, the museum underscores its partnership with the business sector and its role as a cultural leader in the Pacific Northwest. Speakers at this year's Corporate Forum Breakfasts included Peter Neupert, president and chief executive officer, drugstore.com; and David Rockefeller, Jr., director, Rockefeller & Company. We are grateful to Ragen MacKenzie, Inc., for their sponsorship of the 1999 and 2000 breakfasts, and Arthur Andersen for its sponsorship of the 1999 breakfasts.

### SEATTLE ART MUSEUM SUPPORTERS (SAMS)

This year was one of tremendous

growth for SAMS as it raised a record \$174,000 and pledged \$50,000 to support the Century Endowment Campaign. Since its inception fifteen years ago, this remarkable group of volunteers has raised over \$1.5 million in support of exhibitions, education, and outreach. SAMS emphasized the value of the past and excitement of the future with innovative events: the 1999 Nordstrom Designer Preview broke tradition by adding an evening fashion show to the yearly luncheon, Sotheby's Heirloom Discovery Day featured verbal appraisals of treasured heirlooms, and An Evening of Discovery included an entertaining discussion on the future of online auctions with Amazon.com chief executive officer Jeff Bezos and Sotheby's vice chairman David Redden. 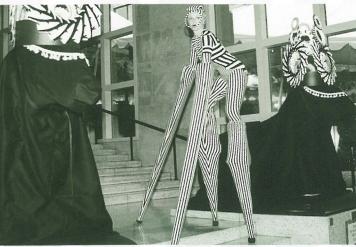

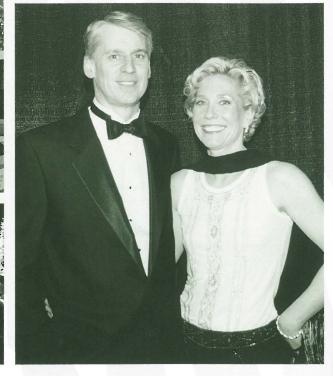

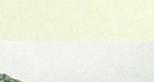

FINANCIAL REPORT

Year ended June 30, 2000

Members and donors to the Seattle Art Museum funded an ambitious exhibition and education program this year while providing extraordinary contributions to the long-term support of the museum.

Operating support totaled \$17,008,183 for the year ending June 30, 2000. Individuals, through memberships, gifts, admissions, and purchases, continue to provide the overwhelming share of support for the museum, 57 percent of total revenue. Foundations provided 8 percent of operating support and showed the largest increase over the prior year, up 62 percent.

Corporations provided 8 percent, and government, 3 percent of museum revenue. Investment income provided 20 percent of the museum's revenue.

Operating expense totaled \$16,990,892, resulting in a surplus of \$17,291. Facility and security expense comprised 13 percent of operating expense, exhibition and collection care expense was 24 percent of the total, education 12 percent, marketing 9 percent, and store and café expense 10 percent. Accession of art objects required 1 percent of operating expense.

Support expenses totaled 31 percent of expenditures. Administrative expense was 14 percent of total expense. Development costs (fundraising and membership program) were 14 percent of total expense. Depreciation of museum equipment and furnishings was 3 percent of the total.

The museum's temporarily restricted funds represent funds received in this and prior years but limited to expenditure for donor-specified purposes. Contributions, primarily in support of the Olympic Sculpture Park, increased the museum's temporarily restricted net assets by \$32,542,934 to \$40,013,289.

Permanently restricted funds are invested to provide income for the long-term support of the museum. Donations and investment returns increased permanently restricted assets by \$20,100,196 to a total at year-end of \$77,866,901. Endowment investments totaled \$72,378,356.
