Annual Report of the President and Director

BUILDING PROGRAM

The most important milestone passed by the Seattle Art Museum during the past year was the successful completion in February of the building program described in last year's report. The Gould Gallery with its three movable walls gave us the much needed flexibility which we anticipated. The adjacent former jade room was named the Parsons Gallery in memory of Mrs. Reginald H. Parsons and the new jade room which corresponds to it on the north was named the Fuller Gallery in memory of Mrs. Eugene Fuller. On the lower floor the Activities Room and the remodelled Lower Gallery with its built-in cases were both eminently successful and filled long felt needs.

EXHIBITIONS

In this category the outstanding event was the exhibition in April of paintings from the collection of Walter P. Chrysler, Jr. This required ten galleries including the Gould Gallery. For this exhibit the galleries were open to all classes from schools and universities free of charge in the morning. From noon until nine every day with the permission of the City Council we had a 50-cent charge for all visitors above the age of 12. A paid attendance of over 45,000 visitors not only covered the expense of the exhibit but gave us a handsome surplus which was needed to meet our increased budget for the year.

We are indebted to many for the necessary publicity but special gratitude should be expressed to Foster & Kleiser, Sunset Advertising, and Heidelberg Brewing Co. for their most generous contribution of over 20 strategically placed billboards, while our expenses were kept to a minimum by many volunteers who served in various capacities. Mr. Millard B. Rogers, Associate Director, was responsible for publicity as well as for the excellent installation.

For this month and May the Parsons Gallery was devoted to the fine exhibition 18th Century English Porcelain sponsored by the Seattle Ceramic Society. In June The Bird in Art exhibit opened to mark the annual meeting of the Cooper Ornothological Society and continued through the summer. For this the wide scope of the Museum collection was notably enlarged through the borrowing of fine scientific renderings and important art objects, the latter especially from the Cleveland Museum of Art. During the summer we showed the Pageant of World Art from the Museum collections. In mid-August the excellent but expensive exhibition Design in Scandinavia required four of the galleries.

In addition to the five annuals we had space to give nine of our local artists one-man shows of varying magnitudes of which the largest were for Peter Camfferman, Jacob Elshin, and Ambrose Patterson. Other major shows aside from the historical field were George Biddle paintings, Jack Lenor Larsen textiles, and the Galka E. Scheyer Collection of *The Blue Four* from the Pasadena Art Museum.

We were represented by nearly one hundred items in thirteen exhibitions outside the State. By request last spring we sent 22 items by air to Rome for inclusion in the *Exhibition of Iranian Art* sponsored by the Italian Institute for the Mid and Far East. We were especially grateful in seeing the catalogue to note that one of our pieces was among the few color plates while eleven were illustrated in black and white giving a visual representation exceeded only by the National Museum of Teheran.

At the request of the Indian Embassy in Washington to honor the 2500th anniversary of Buddha we sent paneled photographs of over 40 outstanding examples of our Buddhist art for exhibition in India. Almost simultaneously we prepared a small selection for Asiatic circuit by the United States Information Agency.

That Agency also gave us a major task of assembling for circuit in Europe and the Pacific area two contemporary exhibits of the work of four Seattle painters, Guy Anderson, Kenneth Callahan, Morris Graves, and Mark Tobey, and four Eastern sculptors, Rhys Caparn, David Hare, Seymour Lipton, and Ezio Martinelli. By contract the director accepted the responsibility for selecting, borrowing, assembling, photographing, insuring, and packing the material prepared for circuit as well as the writing of the catalogue. This assignment required much of the time of our organization during the last four months of the year.

LIBRARY

The Library received 228 volumes by purchase and gifts. The most important items were a 16-volume Japanese publication *Catalogue of World's Ceramics*, 24 volumes on Greek pottery, and 7 volumes as a gift from the National Gallery in London on paintings in their collection. We also received catalogues and handbooks by exchange with over 100 museums in this country and abroad. We added over 1200 kodachrome slides, about half of which were taken in Japan.

During the year we lent nearly 9,500 slides principally to schools, universities and museums.

ACCESSIONS

The extensive list of our accessions and the donors to whom we are most grateful begins on page 23. Although the items include many fields our exceptionally close contact with the Far East during the past year resulted in a heavy concentration on art of Japan and Thailand in which many important gaps were filled. Notable additions were also received in the art of many important periods of other great cultures. A distinguished group of contemporary paintings and sculpture testifies to the fact that the present day artist was not neglected.

ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBIT

The success of the annual Architectural Exhibit again played a vital part in balancing our budget by bringing a net profit to the Museum of \$4,614.19. As usual we are indebted to hundreds of women serving on various committees, this year under the able chairmanship of Mrs. John Graham and her vice-chairmen, Mrs. I. R. Stanislaw and Mrs. John W. White, with Mrs. James F. Lyons as secretary, Mrs. Allen P. Green, Jr., treasurer, Mrs. Kenneth Gordon, assistant treasurer. Committee chairmen included: Mrs. Charles H. Todd, brochure and illustration; Mrs. James McCurdy, ticket distribution; Mrs. John D. Reagh, posters and tickets; Mrs, Robert McKinstry, map; Mrs. John C. Finley, publicity; Mrs. Aldis B. Johnson, transportation; Mrs. Millard B. Rogers, patronesses; Mrs. Joe E. Wolff, flowers; Mrs. Alan Kennedy, properties; Mrs. Robert G. Anderson, radio and TV; Mrs. Rollen Wyrens, signs; Mrs. Frank Gilbert Black, Mrs. Clarence M. Ambrose, Jr., and Mrs. Roe Duke Watson, hostesses. Mrs. Herbert Brink was again invaluable as chairman of the advisory committee.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT

We are indebted to the City for a new automatic burner for the furnace which permits a far more accurate temperature control. The City also repainted the stairway, lower hall and offices and installed fluorescent light fixtures which we had purchased. At our expense we had lettered signs painted throughout the building. We purchased for the office one electric and one regular typewriter and for the storage stacks another flat truck and a large two-tray hand truck to facilitate exhibition changes. For the Educational Department we purchased a portable projection screen and a storage cabinet, and with the assistance of the City installed a sink in the seminar room for the High School Art classes.

PUBLICITY

We again take pleasure in acknowledging our indebtedness to both the Seattle Post-Intelligencer and the Seattle Times as well as to various neighborhood papers, radio and television stations for acquainting the public with the Museum activities.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Last summer Horton C. Force passed away after serving the Museum faithfully and competently as Secretary since the inception of the building in 1932. Mr. John L. Scott was elected to the Board to fill the vacancy and Mr. Charles M. Clark was appointed Secretary. A joint committee was appointed by the City Council and the Museum to study ways and means of greater support from the City.

THE STAFF

On the resignation of Mrs. James B. Howe, Mrs. Frank Molitor was added to our staff at the Information Desk, while Miss Judith Flanagan became staff secretary on the resignation of Mrs. Milton C. Richards. Mr. Ernest Dietrich and Mr. Allen Wilcox both qualified for the Pension Plan.

The Museum contributed travel expenses to Mr. Millard B. Rogers for his Far Eastern trip during the summer and to Mr. Edward B. Thomas for a visit to Japan during the autumn.

We have had an excellent and active year but one that has been most demanding on the staff and on our operating funds. The Chrysler show, the fine day for the Architectural Exhibit and the great but unpredictable generosity of a very few year-end donors were essential factors in balancing the budget. We are most grateful to them and to all of our members.

In closing I wish to express my gratitude to the Board of Trustees and especially to my fellow officers and to my fellow members of the staff upon whose initiative and constant service the success of the Museum depends.

Annual Report of the Education Department

The regular educational programs were continued as follows: 139 half-hour television broadcasts (84 original *live* broadcasts; 55 kinescoped rebroadcasts), 17 television guest appearances, 57 fifteen-minute radio programs, 52 five-minute radio programs, 8 P.T.A. days, 4 Girl Scout Leaders' days, 51 Children's Story Hours, 96 lectures with tours in the Museum, 14 lectures out of the Museum. Faithful volunteers presented in behalf of the Museum 132 Junior League Treasure Box Visits serving 4,174 students in the Public Schools, 376 Guild Docent Committee tours serving 22,383 people.

Approximately 14,500 third graders see each *Treasure Trip* television broadcast in their classrooms; 2,300 high school students watch *Man's Story*, giving us a total annual classroom audience of 278,000 students in Seattle and King County. Over 50,000 people see each *Community Workshop* broadcast on KING-TV, and an estimated 50,000 saw each *Man's Story* program on KOMO-TV. The total audience for our 1956 television programs over local commercial channels was approximately 5,365,000. An estimated 24,000 people hear each *Art for Your Sake* radio broadcast on KOMO and 3,000 to 5,000 people listen to *Your Seattle Art Museum on the Air* over KXA. The total 1956 radio audience was approximately 1,500,000. Our remaining activities had a total annual attendance of approximately 15,000 children and adults, with an additional 26,557 attending activities conducted by volunteers.

Two new activities were initiated this year. Art Class for Exceptional Students: on May 20 the Museum, in cooperation with the Seattle Public Schools, launched a special painting class for two outstanding senior art students from each high school. Students receive professional instruction at the Museum two afternoons a week. Spring quarter classes were taught by Prof. Ambrose Patterson and autumn classes by Mr. Guy Anderson. The Museum provides the instructor and classroom; the Seattle Public Schools provide the studio equipment and art supplies and select the students. Helen Bush School Classes: beginning in September students from the 7th, 8th and 10th grades have been coming to the Museum on a weekly basis for special lecture-discussions correlated with their studies in World History and World Geography.

Television again was a major activity. For the first time several programs were presented in *live* color on KOMO-TV. Broadcasts were given in Yakima and Tokyo and kinescopes shown in many other cities. A *live* remote broadcast of the Chrysler exhibit was done from the Museum galleries by KING-TV. During the summer Mrs. A. M. Young gave a series of 10 programs on the history of art for KING-TV.

A full academic year of weekly half-hour television broadcasts for classroom viewing in the Seattle Public Schools has now been recorded for KCTS-TV educational station. Sixteen programs in the Treasure Trips series have been kinescoped for third grade Social Studies. Mrs. Lahr, our Curator of Education, began a series for high school home economics classes. The series of 20 programs for 10th grade World History classes, Man's Story, was completed in March. It was rebroadcast by KCTS-TV in the spring and again in the autumn, and KOMO-TV showed it this summer for the general public. Individual programs have been used as demonstrations in many states including New York, Florida, Michigan, Ohio, Louisiana, Illinois, Oklahoma, California, and Oregon. Many school systems throughout the nation have requested permission to use the series or to copy it. At the 20th American Exhibition of Educational Radio and Television Programs, Man's Story received first award for the best school telecast in the nation. Popularly known as the Ohio Awards the competition is held annually at Ohio State University and this is the first time a telecast for classroom use has been so honored. The award included the following citation: "For effective utilization of the cultural resources of their community, this program, which offers cultural enrichment to members of a broad audience, utilizes humor in good taste along with the best aspects of the television medium for teaching purposes. Unusual visual materials are shown to advantage and we commend Seattle for this combination of good teaching and good television."

In the autumn the Educational Director had the privilege to be in Japan two and a half months to study Japanese art and gather material for Museum lectures and television programs. A highlight of the trip was the opportunity to visit the Shoso-in, 8th century Imperial Treasure House in Nara. Also several television programs about the Seattle Art Museum and Seattle artists were arranged for broadcast in Japan by Radio Tokyo Television and the American Embassy in Tokyo.

Thank yous and grateful appreciation are due committees of the Junior League of Seattle and our Museum Guild for their volunteer services; television stations KING-TV, KCTS-TV and KOMO-TV, and radio stations KXA and KOMO who have presented our regular broadcasts; to fellow staff members who do so much to assist the Educational Department, and particularly Mrs. A. M. Young, Mrs. William J. Lahr and Mr. Millard Rogers, who pinch-hitted during my absence in Japan.

Report of the Seattle Art Museum Guild

1956 — 1957

As chairman of the Seattle Art Museum Guild I feel it is a privilege to report briefly our activities this past year. It has been a most successful one due to the splendid cooperation of the Museum staff plus the efforts of our capable Executive Board.

Attendance at the Guild lectures has been very good and our program has more than justified this response. The morning lectures have again been given by Dr. Fuller, Mr. Rogers and Mr. Thomas with *The Art of Japan* for the subject. The afternoon series, *The Painter Speaks*, has been presented by local artists and their paintings were exhibited for a two weeks' period in the Activities Room.

Some of our committees are busier at certain times of the year than others but the Membership Committee is constantly on the alert and actively engaged in recruiting new members for the Museum. The monthly coffee hours seemed to have served their purpose and this year we substituted a brunch in the Activities Room to honor new and prospective members. This was so satisfactory that we have scheduled another for April.

The Docent Committee is sometimes called the backbone of the Guild and has lived up to that reputation. When I compiled the figures on their tours I checked them a second time because they seemed incredible—370 tours with more than 22,000 people conducted through the Museum. The figures this year were somewhat enlarged due to the Chrysler exhibit.

Year after year the Hospitality Committee serves coffee and tea between the morning and afternoon lectures and assists with the supper for the Foreign Students Christmas party. This year they joined forces with the Public Relations Committee and served light refreshments during the Chrysler exhibit. This was intended as a public service which it proved to be, but it also resulted in an unexpected windfall for the Guild treasury. This service was extended on Sundays through the *Design in Scandinavia* exhibit. In addition the Public Relations Committee continued to function at a number of large teas for various organizations.

For the past five years the major project of the Guild has been the engagement book. The Museum staff assembles the material and the Guild assumes responsibility for the distribution and the selling. They not only are a source of revenue, over \$500 net profit this year, but are also a means of publicizing the Museum and acquainting people with its treasures.

Judging from the very complimentary letters we receive each year, the annual Christmas party given for foreign students is a high spot in their holiday season. This year about 400 attended, many in native costumes, and they were extravagant in their praise of the program, the decorations and the supper.

The Guild was pleased to present a check for \$350 to the Accessions Fund of the Museum. At the final Guild lecture in April a check for \$1,000 was presented to Dr. Fuller for the Museum. Two large Podocarpus plants were purchased for either side of the bay window in the Activities Room.

I would like to thank the personnel of the Museum and the members of the Executive Board and their committees for their able assistance and continued cooperation which has made it possible for the Guild to enjoy such a successful year.

We have examined the accounts of the SEATTLE ART MUSEUM for the calendar year 1956 and have prepared the attached statements which, in our opinion, correctly set forth the financial condition of the Museum at December 31, 1956, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

Securities carried on the balance sheet at values when acquired or \$717,998.22 had total approximate market values of \$988,903.00 at the close of the year. During the year the proceeds of security sales exceeded the carrying values by \$123,531.35 and were added to the several surplus balances.

It should be noted that the attached statements are made on a strictly cash basis and no attempt has been made to evaluate the Museum's collections, library, equipment and properties other than money and securities.




Fig. 3. *Kuei*, ram's head handles, bronze; China, Shang dynasty; H. 53% in. (Ch6.115). Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund.






Fig. 14. Head of a barbarian, probably a Dacian, marble; Roman, ca. 120 A.D.; H. 15½ in. (Cs11.29). Gift of Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr., Philadelphia.




Fig. 16. Amphora, green glass; Roman, 1st-2nd century; H. 12¾ in. (Cs3.10). Gift of Norman Davis, Seattle.


