Annual Report of the President and Director

ANCIENT SCULPTURE FROM INDIA

In the early spring the Director accepted for the Museum the privilege and the responsibility of being one of five American museums to participate in the circuit of the great exhibition of Ancient Sculpture from India. Assembled from twenty-one museums in India it consisted of twenty tons of stone and terra cotta sculpture. It was selected from a more comprehensive exhibition shown in Japan, and the official contract with the Indian Government for the loan was negotiated by Dr. Sherman E. Lee, Director of the Cleveland Museum of Art and the former Associate Director in Seattle, 1948-52. He also wrote the exhibit's excellent catalog. In addition to Seattle, the exhibit was shown at the De Young Museum, San Francisco; Cleveland Art Museum; Metropolitan Museum of Art; and the Honolulu Academy of Arts. Expenses for the show, including its return to India, will be prorated to the participating institutions.

Because of its size and weight this was the most difficult and complex exhibit the Museum has ever handled. Our building in Volunteer Park had neither the space nor structural strength to display it, but fortunately in completing the Coliseum facilities, the City, following the plans of Paul Thiry, Architect, was constructing a storage area adjacent to our Seattle Art Museum Pavilion at Seattle Center. By the Museum paying for overtime work, construction of this needed additional space was rushed to completion in the rough on Sunday, August 9, so that the exhibit could be installed just in time for its preview on the following Thursday. Although most of the entire staff was involved in this achievement which was accomplished without damage, special mention is due Neil Meitzler, designer, William J. Lahr, shipping supervisor, and Jack C. Fletcher, Seattle sculptor, as well as the two excellent Indian curators from the National Museum in New Dehli, G. D. Khullar and V. P. Dwivedi.

The Indian Ambassador to the United States, His Excellency Mr. B. K. Nehru and Mrs. Nehru honored us by being present at the preview of this notable event which was preceded by an official dinner given at the Sunset Club by the Museum's Board of Trustees.

To explain the background of many of the pieces great photographic enlargements were fortunately obtained of some of the principal sites from which the sculptures came. These and others were also illustrated by the continuous projection of color slides which had been taken in 1959 by our Associate Director, Edward B. Thomas. Stands and background panels from hundreds of sheets of plywood were made at the Museum by the Custodial Engineers, and painted at the Pavilion with monochromatic primary colors typical of the Indian palette. Mrs. William J. Lahr prepared the script for the Acoustiguide tour which elucidated the exhibit and assisted the Indian curators in training the excellent volunteer docents. Special thanks are also due to the volunteer Guild members who attended the door and collected the admission fee from noon to nine daily for nearly two months. During the period we had two security officers at our expense steadily on duty to comply with the request of the Indian government.

In spite of the excellent publicity from TV, radio, and the press the exhibit was not a financial success but it contributed greatly to our national prestige and demonstrated that we could handle one of the most difficult exhibits to be circuited in the United States. We had a paid attendance of 11,315 at \$1.00 and a total attendance of over 14,000 including the preview, as well as school and university classes which were admitted free. Owing to the high cost of the exhibit we were left with a subtantial deficit.

To stress this exhibit we showed at the same time the cream of our own Indian collection from July until early September. This had been enriched by some outstanding accessions. To take advantage of the simultaneous showing of these two notable collections, Millard B. Rogers, Research Associate of the Museum and Director of the Center for Asian Arts at the University, organized a Seminar of most of the available great scholars in this field under the generous sponsorship of the Ford Foundation. The papers delivered are to be published by the University of Washington Press. The three day meeting was most successful.

THE 66th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL INSTITUTE OF AMERICA

This event, which took place in Seattle December 28-30, also brought to us a distinguished group of scholars for their first meeting to be held in the West. We were selected for this honor owing to the strength of the Museum's collection of ancient art and especially that of the Mediterranean. Simultaneously we were honored by having the December issue of their monthly magazine Archaeology dedicated to a selection of our recent accessions. The Museum was host to the delegates on the second day for luncheon in the Activities Room followed by a program in the auditorium. Most of the Museum was devoted to our early cultures which had been greatly enriched by new accessions in classic and Near Eastern fields through the generosity of Norman Davis, the expenditure of Museum funds, and gifts from the Director.

EXHIBITIONS

The complete schedule of 1964 exhibits appears later in this report. The 50th Annual Exhibition of Northwest Artists was exceptional in being sponsored by the Ford Foundation in the final year of its Program for the Purchase of Works by American Artists in which numerous major museums have participated. The Associate Director, Mr. Thomas, was in charge of obtaining the services of an artist jury of national renown, approved by the Foundation, for the selection of the exhibit and of the items to be purchased by the Foundation. The Museum had the privilege of selecting half of these for its own collection in addition to its own awards. The other

Ford Foundation purchases were given to tax exempt institutions of the artists' choice. The Jury consisted of Ellsworth Kelly, painter, New York; Gabriel Kohn, sculptor, Sarasota, Florida; Boyer Gonzales, painter, Director School of Art, University of Washington.

SALES

From the exhibitions 90 items were purchased by individuals for about \$7,500.00. In addition 8 items were purchase awards as well as 12 paintings and sculpture bought by the Ford Foundation for over \$10,000.00. Through the initiative of Mrs. Frank H. Molitor our sales desk had the record sales of approximately \$20,000.00 from which we had a profit of nearly \$9,000.00. Our designer, Mr. Meitzler, was responsible for the growing line of Christmas cards and note paper as well as the cover of the Engagement Book for which the items as usual were selected and captioned by the Director. For the first time this issue was sold out at \$1.75 aside from those distributed professionally.

LOANS

A complete list of loans to other institutions appears later in the report. We lent by request 111 items out of town, two of which were to Japan and three to Canada. In all we lent 250 items to 66 institutions, aside from the framed facsimilies which totaled 1088 to 65 tax supported or non-profit organizations in the Puget Sound area.

LIBRARY

We added 118 volumes to the Library by gift and purchase. 172 publications were also received in exchange with other museums here and abroad. From the collection 33 objects were reproduced in 14 exhibition catalogs, 41 in 13 books, and 30 in 9 periodicals. In addition illustrated articles regarding the Museum appeared in 5 other periodicals.

PONCHO AUCTION

The great success of the PONCHO Auction in April with the Seattle Art Museum as the principal beneficiary brought to us the assurance of \$100,000 for the remodeling of our Pavilion at the Seattle Center. Much time has been spent in the past year with the development of plans and specifications with Edward M. Burke of the firm of Paul Thiry, Architect, in evolving a practical solution to permit the building to be as functional as possible. To facilitate the construction the Board approved the employment of Howard S. Wright Construction Company as the contractor on a cost

plus basis. During my world tour in the autumn Mr. Thomas was left in charge of the project with an advisory building committee from the Board of Trustees and consultation with the Museum staff. The contract specified that the alterations will be completed as soon as practicable with a schedule pointing to April 1. Although the ideal specifications for economy have been subsequently modified without significant sacrifice, the cost will be far in excess of the PONCHO grant. The additional funds will be drawn from the bequest of our generous patron, Mr. Richard Dwight Merrill, who died during the autumn. Our thanks are expressed to the faithful committee members who worked unceasingly for PONCHO, and to the many donors of auction items. We are particularly grateful to the dealers and friends who most generously contributed art objects that added greatly to the interest of the acution and to its financial returns.

ACCESSIONS

Except for the year when we received the Kress Collection 1964 was the most important for new accessions in our history. The historical sequence was enlarged in many fields with material often of supreme quality. Over 180 items range in size from 57 gold and silver coins from ancient Greece and its colonies to a large Flemish Gothic tapestry.

We express our gratitude to the many generous donors who made this possible. They and their gifts are included in the listing beginning on page 50. The cataloguing of accessions reflects the dedication and scholarship of the Registrar, Miss Emily Tupper, and her assistant Miss Lucretia Hoover.

ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBIT

The 15th Annual Architectural exhibit had the title of Capitol Hill Classics and featured a number of the handsome residences in that district dating from the early years of this century. Under the exceptional leadership of Mrs. S. Allison Creighton an outstanding record was attained. Although the price had been raised to \$5, tickets for the maximum number of persons to be accommodated were all sold prior to the event and brought to the Museum a net profit of almost \$14,600. We are most grateful to the hundreds who served on the committee and to the home owners who so graciously cooperated.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

In addition to the Guild lectures, we presented ten lectures usually with the cosponsorship of the University. Three lectures were by two of the leading Japanese scholars on Ancient Far Eastern Ceramics, Prof. Tsugio Mikami of the University of Tokyo, and the famed Fujio Koyama. These were co-sponsored by the University's Center for Asian Arts. The India Society of Seattle co-sponsored two lectures by P. R. Ramachandra Rao on Amaravati and Nagarjunikonda, two great archaeological sites of South India which were the source of some of the finest pieces in the great Indian sculpture exhibition. The School of Art at the University co-sponsored two lectures by Marcel van Jole, Professor of Art Philosophy at the National Institution of Fine Arts in Antwerp. The Bonsai Unit of the University of Washington Arboretum Foundation co-sponsored a lecture and two demonstrations by Yuji Yoshimura when the members' Bonsai were exhibited in the Activities Room.

The newly formed Contemporary Art Council of the Seattle Art Museum, under the chairmanship of John Denman, sponsored in cooperation with the University's School of Art a Symposium at Meany Hall on *Problems and Issues in Art Today* discussed by the following distinguished authorities on contemporary art: Thomas B. Hess, Sam Hunter, Gabriel Kohn, Barnet Newmann, and Harold Rosenberg. With general admission at \$2.50 and student registration at \$1 a capacity house reflected the great interest in this subject.

As usual we had our chamber music series in the spring and autumn of six concerts each under the direction of Ronald Phillips. They are sponsored jointly by the Museum and by a grant from the Recording Industries Trust Funds, with the cooperation of Local 76, American Federation of Musicians.

PUBLICITY

We are most grateful for the national publicity which we received from the previously mentioned article in Archaeology and a featured article in the February issue of Art In America which we had long been invited to submit. The Associate Director is to be commended for the article and our staff photographer, Earl T. Fields, for the excellency of the photography. The Director was one of twelve art museum directors to be photographed by request against a background piece from his own museum by the noted Yousuf Karsh of Ottawa. This was in conjunction with the exhibition of their selection of photographs for the Eastman Kodak Building at the 1965 New York World Fair. The Seattle Art Museum was the only one West of Chicago to be so honored.

We are also most grateful to the Seattle Times, Seattle Post-Intelligencer, and the Argus, as well as other local publications for publicity which our activities have received. Mention is also due the Junior League's Puget Soundings for publishing the scholarly articles by the Associate Curator of Education, Barbara Rumpf. Thanks are also due the radio and television stations for their generous service arranged by our public relations officer, Mrs. John H. Bowen. The total attendance which was almost 250,000 for the year depends directly on these various mediums of communication.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT

The City, through the staff of the Park Department, has done exceptionally fine work in performing its contractual duty of maintaining the building. After an interval

of about ten years the gallery walls were again recovered. The interior walls of the offices and public areas were repainted, and those of the Central Court washed for the first time. A new sonic alarm system was installed to provide better security in the entrance lobby. Purchases by the Museum in excess of \$4200.00 were made for equipment including an electric adding machine, electric bulletin typewriter, bronze gallery plaques, sculpture stands, and kitchen equipment as well as an electric lift truck essential in shipping and receiving at the Pavilion. Almost a like amount was spent on professional conservation and repair as well as the carbon dating of 3 ancient wood sculptures and the spectral analysis of 2 metal pieces.

The only change in our staff was the employment of Stanley W. Hess to replace Nancy Corwin Dyke in charge of photographic records, labels, and slides. Mrs. Dyke resigned to accompany her husband to Japan. Mr. Hess has also rendered general curatorial assistance. TRAVEL

To assist in attendance at professional annual meetings \$1,500.00 was divided by the Director and Associate Director from the income of the Univart Trust established by the Director. From that same source the Board also allotted \$3,000.00 to the Director towards the expense of his round-the-world trip in the autumn. In recognition of the importance of the triennial meeting of ICOM, the Board from the same source donated \$1,000.00 to the host committee in New York to assist in meeting the travel expenses of European delegates. In preparation for the exhibit of Ancient Sculpture from India the Museum paid the expenses of Mr. Meitzler and Mr. and Mrs. Lahr for a week in San Francisco to study the installation. This was charged to the exhibit.

In conclusion the Board of Trustees and Officers deserve an expression of my gratitude for their advice and faithful support. As usual I am greatly indebted to my fellow members of the staff for their initiative on which so much of our success depends and especially to the faithful museum secretary, Mrs. Coe V. Malone. I know of no museum that receives more efficient service than we do from volunteers and the various committees of the Guild. Thanks are also due to our Museum members who during the past year have increased both in numbers and in magnitude of their financial contribution without a concerted drive.

Annual Report of the Education Department

The work of the Education Department was divided between our two staff members so that only one was responsible for the planning of specific programs. Those which were shared included Guild lectures and Docent tours.

Continuing programs planned by Miss Barbara Rumpf, Associate Curator of Education, included Docent Training, Docent lectures, and History of Art classes for senior high school students. A special Art History course for adults was given in the spring. In addition Miss Rumpf gave a lecture in Eastern Washington and published four articles on Museum objects, one for Artforum magazine and three for Puget Soundings.

The Curator of Education planned the monthly half-hour television programs for both KING and KCTS, a monthly program for P.-T.A. art chairmen, and the Docent Study Program. This fall Miss Rumpf took charge of the Docent Study Program so that the Curator of Education could begin a new training program for the Guild's Treasure Box Committee. Special lectures given to outside groups included the Museum's Highline and Overlake Associate Guilds, and the Japan Society. The Curator of Education continues to serve as one of the jurors for the Junior League Northwest Art Projects, having helped with the selection of those items considered for purchase since its beginning.

In the spring the Curator of Education gave a four week brush up course on the Art of India for the Active Docents and later prepared the script for the Acoustiguide tour of the Ancient Sculpture from India exhibit.

The Museum's weekly radio programs were continued by Millard B. Rogers and the Guild Radio Chairman. Edward B. Thomas, Associate Director, gave six outside

lectures and participated in three television programs. A special thank you should be given to all the broadcasting media, particularly television stations KCTS, KING, and KOMO who gave so generously of their broadcast time.

Saturday classes for children were discontinued this summer upon the resignation

of Mrs. Patrick Dyke.

The Guild's Treasure Box Committee expanded its program to include some school districts outside Seattle. An additional Japanese box was completed and plans continue for duplicate boxes of the other countries.

The Guild's Docent Committee was responsible for the monthly Senior Citizens Day and Outside Lecture Service in addition to conducting tours of the Museum's exhibits. Particularly noteworthy was the special effort they put forth during the Ancient Sculpture from India exhibition.

This report ends with our deep appreciation of the work done by all our volunteers.

Report of the Seattle Art Museum Guild

1964 - 1965

We differ from most museums in that our membership and our volunteer group are one and the same. Elsewhere general membership merely has the opportunity to attend certain lectures, films, and previews, while the volunteer committee is frequently a closed group, joined by special invitation only, often with extra fees. At no other museum that I know is there a volunteer group comparable to ours in the breadth of its many and varied activities. We should all feel very proud of our Guild

The Docent Committee is one of our largest and most active subcommittees which conducts tours of the Museum and the Pavilion. Of its 93 members, 49 are Active Conducting Docents, 18 are Associate Docents (those temporarily excused from their tour responsibilities), and 26 are Trainees. During the past twelve months the 49 Active Docents conducted 9 tours for Senior Citizens, 83 tours of the Ancient Sculpture from India exhibit, and 266 tours for school or other groups, for a total of 458. In addition the Senior Citizens of Seattle were given morning and afternoon entertainment in 9 monthly programs. Docents also gave 37 talks outside the Museum. By participating in two Vincent Price shows sponsored by Sears, Roebuck & Co. the Docents were able to give the Museum \$1,300 this year. At Renton last spring Docents worked a total of 280 hours, earning a donation from Sears of \$500 and last fall in Seattle they worked 270 hours, earning a donation of \$800. In conjunction with this project four TV shows were prepared and presented.

The Hospitality Committee consists of 22 women. They have served coffee and

tea to an average of 120 women at lunch on Guild Days.

The Membership Committee has been fortunate to have its energetic Chairman serve again this year. In September informal Open House was held at the Museum from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. for three days. Invitations were sent to prospective members in suburban areas and nearby towns. Docents gave tours in the galleries, refreshments were served, and a personal hostess-guest approach was stressed. The results seemed highly gratifying. In January another membership tea was held. Museum members were invited only if they brought prospective members. The theme was Meet Our Artists. The six women artists—Doris Chase, Jean Johanson, Yvonne Humber, Lisel Salzer, Ruth Penington, Ivarose Bovingdon - displayed examples of their work and chatted with guests. The party was phenomenally successful and about 500 guests attended. Marked membership applications were distributed so that the direct results of the tea could be assessed. Each month delinquent members have been phoned, and in December the Chairman mailed 151 personal letters to all delinquent members for the past two years urging them to rejoin the Museum. The membership totals show her tremendous work is bearing fruit.

As for Projects, it was decided in the spring that the Guild would undertake no money-raising projects of its own, but would instead assist the PONCHO committee in every possible way to make their auction a success since the Museum was to be PONCHO's principal beneficiary. Guild members also worked tirelessly and in great numbers on the Architectural Exhibit.

Last summer Dr. Fuller asked the Guild to undertake the preview of the Ancient Sculpture from India exhibit at the Pavilion. The committees in charge of decorations and refreshments did a marvelous job, even though working under the difficulties of an unfinished building. The Guild also provided volunteers for the ticket desk, and the catalog and Acoustiguide booth. During the eight and a half weeks of the exhibit, 156 volunteers (men as well as women) worked a total of 1,062 hours. This was in addition to the 83 Docent tours mentioned previously. This tremendously reduced the expense of presenting the exhibit and was the equivalent of donating enough money to the Museum for hiring people to do this work. Our deepest thanks go to all Guild members who helped the Museum on this project.

The Guild also has been promoting a three-week spring tour of European art centers, called *Art a la Carte*, with the Guild Vice Chairman as tour leader. A small donation in the name of each person going on the trip will be made to the Museum by the Doug Fox Travel Service.

The Projects Committee concentrated on encouraging the sale of Museum Engagement Books during the holidays and is planning both a spring and a fall project.

The Program Chairman was responsible again this year for the exciting series of afternoon Guild lectures. Following last year's *The Art of Living—Abroad*, this year we have *The Art of Living—at Home*.

The Public Relations Committee Chairman served for the third year. Last February the Committee served luncheon for an Edmunds School District Workshop being held at the Museum. In October they gave a beautiful tea for some 70 members of the Japan-American Society, and some 800 persons were served refreshments at the preview of the Indian exhibit.

The Publicity Chairman, also serving for a third year, has done a masterful job of keeping Guild activities before the public. Twenty-two releases were sent to the Seattle Times and Seattle Post-Intelligencer, with four pictures, covering Guild Day lectures, Docent activities, membership teas, etc. Seven releases went to 15 out-of-town papers. Spot announcements were sent to Seattle's four television stations and eight local radio stations. KOMO-TV helped publicize Guild activities further by interviewing one of the Guild speakers on the Katherine Wise show, and also by twice inviting Treasure Box Volunteers to speak on the Treasure Box program. Each month some phase of Guild activities is also featured on a program produced by the Radio Chairman and heard over station KTW at 10:50 a.m. the last Sunday of the month.

The Treasure Box Committee was fortunate in having its Chairman for a third year. This Committee consists of some 22 dedicated volunteers who show the Treasure Boxes before third and fourth grade public school classes. Since last September there have been over 300 requests for the boxes. A five-day session training course was given last September to new volunteers, and there are now boxes for China, Scandinavia, Mexico, Austria, the Philippines, and two for Japan.

During Easter vacation the Treasure Box Committee presented at the Arts for Youth Council Festival a display showing one of the Treasure Boxes, representative articles from it, explanatory material, and letters of appreciation received from school children.

The Guild Vice-Chairman has been our chief liaison with the Associate Guilds. The Overlake Associate Guild has again been meeting at the Crabapple Restaurant in Bellevue. The group now boasts approximately 200 members, with an average attendance of 85 at each meeting. Their fall and spring lecture series have been keyed to the theme of *The Influence of the Past on Today's Designs*.

The Highline Associate Guild has 85 members and a regular program attendance of about 50. Their series of monthly talks has been held at the Hyatt House.

The Richard E. Fuller Associate Guild meets this year at the Jolly Jester Restaurant in Aurora Village and the membership currently is about 100.

This year has seen the inauguration of two new associate guilds, the "Couples' Guilds," which meet four evenings a year, either at the Museum or the Pavilion. Membership in each was limited to 55 couples and both were quickly filled. Although most programs begin with dessert or punch, the twin series began with an Italian dinner at the Museum, followed by a slide lecture, and ending with gallery tours of the current exhibits conducted by local artists.

The Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary, the Treasurer, and our Parliamentarian have all been wonderfully cooperative in performing their special jobs and we appreciate very much the backing and wise counsel of our Advisors. We are deeply indebted to the Education Department for all its work in behalf of the Docent Committee and the Treasure Box Committee and we want to express our appreciation too, to Miss Tupper, Miss Lyons, Mr. Thomas, and Dr. Fuller for their constant support and wonderful help. Our sincerest thanks go also to all other members of both the office and technical staffs.




Fig. 2. Above: Jain dancing girl, broken in antiquity, originally intended for cupola of Jain temple, white marble; India, Udaipur region, Rajasthan, 10th cent.; H. 395/8 in. (In11.65) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection






Fig. 5. Pair of tomb figurines, glazed earthenware; China, T'ang dynasty, 618-906; H. $6\frac{5}{8}$ in. (Ch24.50, 51) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection






Fig. 7. Opposite: Figurine of priest or dignitary, orange earthenware; Mexico, from border area of states of Tabasco and Chiapas, Classic Maya, 317-987; H. 9½ in. (PC21.38) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection




Fig. 9. Above: Kyathos (wine ladle), black figured red earthenware; Classic, ca. 500 B.C.; H. 6½ in. (Cs20.50) Norman Davis Collection







Fig. 11. Above: Jar with cover as carapace of tortoise, head incised on one handle, tail on other, gray earthenware; Anatolia, excavated at Balikesir, Yortan culture, Early Bronze Age, ca. 4000-2300 B.C.; H. 61/4 in. (PIs20.15) Gift of Mrs. James D. Burns




Fig. 14. Above: Saints George, Lazarus, Bartholomew, Sebastian, Benedict, painted on panel; Spain, region of Palencia, mid-15th cent.; 34½ x 26½ in. (Sp37.1) Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund






Fig. 16. Tapestry representing a court scene, wool; attributed to Maitre de Philippe, Brussels, ca. 1510; H. 11 ft., 2 in. (F43.3) Purchased from the Bequest of Charles Moseley Clark




Fig. 19. Double glass beaker, Bohemia, ca. 1730; H. $3 \frac{1}{2}$ in. (CEu3.1) Purchased from the Bequest of Lester W. Lewis


Fig. 21. Portrait of a Lady, by David Teniers, the Younger, 1610-90, Flemish; oil on canvas; $61\frac{1}{2}$ x $61\frac{5}{8}$ in. (F37/T2554.1) Given in memory of Andrew Price by Mrs. Price and their family




Fig. 25. Coffee pot, porcelain with polychrome enamels and gold; medallions by Christian Friedrich Herold, 1700-79; German, Meissen; H. $8\frac{1}{2}$ in. (G27.19) Gift of Mrs. Kenneth Fisher




Fig. 28. Offrande a la Rose, by James Ensor, 1860-1949, Belgian; oil on board; $13\% \times 17\%$ in. (Be31/En794.1) Gift of Mr. and Mrs. C. Bagley Wright, Jr.




Fig. 29. Ascension, by Joan Josep Tharrats, 1918- , Spanish; oil on canvas; 261/4 x 283/4 in. (Sp31/T3296.2) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection




Fig. 30. Gervais's Last Guitar, by Spencer Moseley, 1925- , American; polymer on canvas; $47\frac{5}{8}$ x $47\frac{5}{8}$ in. (A38/M8526.1) Gift of the Ford Foundation, New York City

Financial Report

AUDITORS' REPORT

We have examined the balance sheet of the SEATTLE ART MUSEUM

as of December 31, 1964 and the attached statements of cash receipts and disbursements on account of income and expenses for the year then ended.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Securities are carried on the balance sheet at cost, when purchased, or at market values when otherwise acquired. Securities were sold during the year for \$8,672.68 more than their original carrying value and the several fund balances were credited accordingly.

Securities carried on the balance sheet at \$1,032,274.89 had market values of approximately \$1,756,308.13 at the balance sheet date.

It should be noted that the attached balance sheet and statements are made on a strictly cash receipts and disbursements basis; accordingly this report does not attempt to evaluate or account for the Museum's art collection, library, furniture or properties other than money and securities.

In our opinion the accompanying statements present fairly, on the cash basis, the financial condition of the Museum as of December 31, 1964 and the results of its operations during the year then ended, on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
