

Annual Report of the President and Director

Although many of our statistics for the past year are not spectacular and reflect only the very demanding routine activities which our organization must maintain, a survey shows major fields in which we have excelled previous records. Our active membership increased to an unprecedented degree through the efforts of the Guild. The sales from our Northwest exhibitions were far higher than previously. By specific request we lent more items to important exhibitions than ever before. Our accessions both in their scope and value exceeded previous years. Preparations for Century 21 added to many phases of our activities.

EXHIBITIONS

In the expensive circuit of *The Arts of Thailand* we of necessity drew the month of September which, coming at the end of the tourist season and before the school routine is established, is traditionally low in attendance. Scheduled concurrently as an added attraction was an exhibit of Picasso's recent original lithographs which we shared with the Vancouver Art Gallery. Like the other museums, to defray costs we had a 50c charge for adults. Our paid attendance was 13,137, with 10,667 children and 1,224 preview guests admitted free, making a total attendance of 25,128, but we closed with a deficit of \$2,000.

Our other most notable traveling exhibits were the sculpture of ancient Gandhara from the Pakistan museums, the Sara Roby Collection of American art from the Whitney Museum in New York, the Larry Aldrich collection of contemporary paintings, the architecture of the great Italian Pier Luigi Nervi, and the German Expressionist prints from the Museum of Modern Art which we augmented with related material from our own collection.

In the spring a very distinguished exhibition of 18th century porcelain showed the height which the Museum's collection and those of the members of the Seattle Ceramic Society have attained in this field under the leadership of Mrs. William L. Harnan, Honorary Curator of Porcelain.

The maintenance of the seven annual exhibitions demanded a very large proportion of our gallery space. The largest of these as usual was the Northwest Annual to which we allotted eleven galleries. Although by necessity we limited the entries to one item per artist we had 697 entries from which the jury selected 252 items. The other exhibitions also gave the local artists in various mediums the opportunity of exhibiting their work sometimes in the face of international competition. In addition we had two group shows of the work of local artists and seven one-man exhibitions including major retrospectives by both Ambrose Patterson and Walter Isaacs. From these local exhibits 92 items were purchased or received purchase awards for nearly \$13,000, a new record for this museum.

The summer show, which was outstanding in importance, was as usual drawn largely from the Museum's collection, selected this time by Edward B. Thomas, Assistant Director, to emphasize the supreme craftsmanship in various mediums throughout world history. This theme paid honor to the national convention in Seattle of the American Craftsmen's Council, as did also the concurrent retrospective exhibit of the prints of Mauricio Lasansky.

Our total attendance for 1961 was 242,689.

LOANS

The loans from our collection to various exhibitions brought us exceptional kudos. The famous Japanese Deer Scroll by Sotatsu from the late Mrs. Donald E. Frederick was featured both in Tokyo and later in an exhibit entitled the *Japanese Decorative Style* which Dr. Sherman E. Lee organized for the Cleveland Museum of Art and the Art Institute of Chicago. He was also responsible for the accompanying catalog. We were represented by twenty-five items, including as one entry the set of four 17th century doors.

In Paris during the autumn we were represented in the 7000 Years of the Art of Iran by fifteen items which were prominently featured at the Petit Palais. At the same time ten of our paintings were in the retrospective exhibition of Mark Tobey at the Musee des Arts Decoratifs of the Louvre where he was among the first five contemporary artists in the world to be so honored. Fortunately Seattle was the last place

for the selection of this exhibit by the director, Mr. Francois Mathey, and most periods were already represented so that our collection was not too greatly depleted. We served, however, as the collection center for all the paintings from the Pacific Coast and were responsible for the many details including the shipping in two large cases excellently designed by our Assistant Curator, the late Mr. Ernest Dietrich. Both of these exhibitions are now scheduled for limited tours before their return, when we will be responsible for the distribution of the Pacific Coast Tobeys.

We also were honored by having four of our 16th-17th century paintings included in the exhibition of *Art Treasures from the Samuel H. Kress Collection* at the National Gallery.

LIBRARY AND LENDING MATERIAL

Nearly 200 volumes were added to our reference library including some important gifts. It was gratifying to note that an increasing number of our objects were illustrated in both popular and definitive publications. Fifteen of our Tang dynasty

Our photographs and slides demanded almost the entire time of our excellent photographer Earl Fields. Our collection of slides numbers over 23,000, of these over 21,000 were in use during the year with more than half being borrowed by outside

The loan of painting facsimiles increased and over 900 were borrowed by nearly 70 institutions.

ACCESSIONS

Although as usual the scope of our accessions is very wide and the quality often

Murphy, Chancellor of UCLA and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Kress Foundation of the highest standard, the most notable single event was unquestionably the receipt of the indenture from the Samuel H. Kress Foundation for our portion of its collection of paintings and sculpture, providing that it is kept on permanent exhibition. As an additional compensation the Foundation will maintain its restoration service. At our request just before the confirmation of this deed we were fortunate in being able to receive Francesco Guardi's Holy Family which we had exhibited in our initial allotment ten years ago. It was exchanged for Jan Steen's A Game of Skittles. The conservative appraisal of this collection is in excess of \$1,000,000. In view of this fact and in view of the cooperation which the Seattle Art Museum received from Mr. Rush H. Kress, brother of the donor, and Mr. Guy Emerson, Art Director of the Foundation, the Board requested approval of the membership that they both be enrolled as Benefactors

In addition nearly 150 items were accepted from about 30 donors. The bulk of the material augmented the Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection, but many of the finest objects came from Mr. and Mrs. Norman Davis and others were purchased by the Board from the income of the Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund. We are also indebted for major accessions to Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr., Capt. and Mrs. John H. Bowen, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Brink, Miss Joanna Eckstein, Mrs. Fred Everett, Mrs. Howard A. Frame, Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Isaacson, and the Seattle Ceramic Society, Units 1 and 2. The list of items and donors which begins on page 44 shows an emphasis on both great antiquity and on current Northwest art but if possible always reflecting the creativity of their diverse ages.

ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBIT

The 12th Annual Exhibit of Architecture was held in the Magnolia Bluff district under the title of Views of Northwest Living. Although two of the handsome homes dated back to the 30's, the others were all built in the past decade and were shown to emphasize the functional aspects of fine contemporary design. Mrs. Allen B. Morgan served as the excellent Chairman for this important event which netted over \$5,600 for the operating fund of the Museum. The Vice-Chairmen, to whom we are also most grateful, were Mrs. David R. Bollong, Mrs. Russell de Alvarez and Mrs. C. Bagley Wright, Jr., while the Secretary was Mrs. George T. Asp, and the Treasurer Mrs. Christian Johnson. As usual innumerable details of this event involved over 500 volunteers on sixteen committees. Although all the volunteers are most sincerely thanked we record our gratitude only to the chairmen: Advertising, Mrs. Morell E. Sharp; Brochure, Mrs. A. Dean Johnson; Flowers, Mrs. Wesley J. PUBLICATIONS AND PUBLICITY

Aside from our Annual Report and our News Letter the only publication of the year was the Engagement Book which was issued for the tenth consecutive year without repetition and a very high standard was maintained in the objects illustrated. The quality of the items, the accompanying text and the layout all brought forth exceptionally high professional praise. The kudos that it receives justifies its continuation for ample material of high quality is still available.

We again take pleasure in acknowledging our indebtedness to the Seattle Times, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer and the Argus for the publicity that they have given to exhibits and activities which contributes so greatly to the success of the events. The Museum also expresses its indebtedness to numerous local television and radio stations that cooperate so generously.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT

The major expense of nearly \$3,000 was spent on the repair and restoration of art objects. This included the difficult task of mounting as kakemono in Japan the twelve large and rare rubbings of sculpture reliefs of Angkor Wat. The most notable piece of equipment purchased with Museum funds was an hydraulic lift for the moving of sculpture

We are indebted to the Park Department for the installation of two mercury lights at the front entrance for the convenience of our evening visitors. As usual we express gratitude to the custodial engineers of the Park Department for their exceptional maintenance of the building and for their cooperation in many Museum projects. STAFF

During the early summer D. Ross Edman resigned from our educational staff after two successful years to accept a graduate assistantship in fine arts at Oberlin College and to work for a master's degree. His place was taken by Miss Barbara Rumpf who serves as Associate Curator of Education. Miss Rumpf has a master's degree and a wide background in both European and Oriental art. In the early autumn Mr. Millard B. Rogers resigned as Associate Director to become the director of the new Center for Asian Arts at the University of Washington under a grant from the Ford Foundation. He is still on the staff of the Museum as Research Associate. His knowledge of our collection permits the Museum to be of maximum value to this new project. Mr. Edward B. Thomas, who has served on our staff for over ten years and as Educational Director since 1954, was promoted to Assistant Director, a position he has filled most efficiently. In the early autumn Mr. and Mrs. Terence N. Todd moved to San Francisco. Mr. and Mrs. Donald G. Scott were added as part-time assistants and Miss Roberta Humphrey, now Mrs. P. Cameron DeVore, became staff secretary. In September Mr. Ernest Dietrich resigned to take graduate work at the Far Eastern Institute at the University of Washington and to our great regret died shortly thereafter.

TRAVEL EXPENSE

The Board authorized two official trips by the Director with an allotment of \$2,300 towards his expense from income of the Univart Trust which he had personally established. One trip was to London and Paris in November where he saw the Tobey and Iranian exhibits and on his return in Washington, D.C., accepted on behalf of the Museum the indenture from the Kress Foundation. The other was to Detroit and Toledo in May to meet with the Council of the American Association of Museums and the Association of Art Museum Directors of which he was again elected Vice-President. Mr. Thomas also attended the American Association of Museums meeting because the Seattle Art Museum will be host for the annual meeting of that organization in May 1963. In April Mr. Thomas attended the biennial conference of the National Art Education Association in Miami where he was the principal speaker in museum education. Other travel expense was contributed to bring Miss Rumpf from New York to accept her appointment and towards a well deserved tour of Western art museums for our excellent Registrar, Miss Emily Tupper.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

The Museum had no special lectures this year; instead the principal lectures in subjects related to art were under the auspices of the University of Washington. Owing to the conflict in October with the Thai exhibit we sponsored only the usual late spring series of chamber music concerts with the generous cooperation of the Music Performance Trust Fund of the Recording and Television Industries under the direction of Ronald Phillips. In October the Museum was a co-host for the 38th annual meeting of the Western Association of Art Museums. The staff also had exceptional activities in preparation for the World's Fair.

The Museum is fortunate in having been allotted for exhibition space at the Fair the future service area of the Exhibition-Banquet Hall. This low ceiling area of 100x40 feet is adjacent to the main flow of traffic on the east side of the building. Physical obstructions divide it into two areas of one-third and two-thirds and imposed numerous restrictions to be accommodated.

The smaller section we are devoting to a selection of the work of Mark Tobey from the Museum collection so that the artists of the Northwest may be represented by their most famous exponent. In the larger area we are showing Art of the Ancient East selected to give representation to twelve nations and at the same time to introduce the visitors to the scope and quality of the Museum collection. The Director and Assistant Director were responsible for the selection of the material, while Neil Meitzler devised a model for its dramatic display that would permit the logical circulation of the anticipated crowds.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Mrs. A. Scott Bullitt resigned from the Board and Mrs. Thomas D. Stimson accepted reelection. Mr. Charles M. Clark, who was then serving as Treasurer, most regrettably died on December 7th, after having served most faithfully as a Trustee and an officer of the Museum since 1951. Mr. Walter L. Wyckoff accepted the office of Treasurer while Mr. Langdon S. Simons, Jr., accepted election to the Board. It is my privilege to announce that true to his devoted service to the Museum, Mr. Clark designated our organization in his will for a bequest of \$50,000. This most generous act permits his name to be permanently enrolled as Benefactor.

The fact that we ended the year in relative affluence does not permit complacency. Our budget is bound to be greater in the current year.

Our building fund has been practically static since its inauguration in 1958 on the occasion of the 25th Anniversary. With the passage of time it becomes all too obvious that expansion before long will be a necessity. The auditorium is often taxed to capacity. We need additional exhibition space so that more of our growing collections may be on view not only for the enjoyment of our visitors but also to assist in both University and school instruction. Our storage has become inadequate both for exhibition material and gallery equipment and for several years has demanded the use of commercial storage in spite of many improvements. Our office space is taxed to capacity and our parking space all too often non-existent.

I close with an expression of gratitude to my fellow members of the Board and especially to my fellow members of the staff as well as to the faithful volunteers and members whose support in both service and funds plays such an essential part.

Annual Report of the Education Department

LECTURES AND TOURS

The Education Department staff gave this year 29 talks in the community and 66 special lectures and tours in the Museum in addition to our regular P.T.A. and Docent Study Programs. A new program for docents-in-training was initiated to provide a fundamental art history background as a basis for their future studies.

TELEVISION AND RADIO

There were 66 television programs presented and 8 special radio broadcasts. Our weekly half-hour program on KING-TV's Community Workshop observed in October its tenth year on the air and has enjoyed one of the longest continuous runs in Northwest television. The monthly evening TV program on KCTS is reaching an increasingly large audience as the station extends its signal into new listening areas throughout the State. In addition, *Our Neighbors, the Japanese*, a series televised in 1958, was re-run for third grade classrooms.

The Museum's weekly radio broadcasts on KOMO and KTW, done by Millard B. Rogers and the Radio Chairman of the Museum Guild, continued as usual. We wish to thank both the radio and television stations for their excellent cooperation in these programs.

CLASSES IN THE MUSEUM

In the spring the Curator of Education taught a class of 10 sessions on the *History* of *Art: Renaissance to Modern* which was co-sponsored by the Y.W.C.A.

Also in the spring D. Ross Edman, Assistant in Education, taught 2 Saturday classes of 6 sessions each for children in grades 2-6 on *The World Around Us*. He also conducted a course of 18 sessions on *Art and Architecture of the 19th & 20th Centuries* for exceptional art students from the Seattle Public Schools, for Junior and Senior High School students interested in art and for pupils from Holy Names Academy. In the summer he taught 2 classes on *Crafts of the World*, one of 9 sessions for grades 2-6, and the other of 12 sessions for grades 7-12.

In the autumn Miss Barbara Rumpf, Associate Curator of Education, conducted a course of 11 sessions on *Ancient Art* for exceptional art students from the Seattle Public Schools, for Junior and Senior High School students interested in art, and for pupils from Holy Names Academy.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Edward B. Thomas was editor and narrator of a new educational film, *Chinese Ink* and Watercolor. He also is the first Vice-President of the Pacific Arts Association and is planning the program for their convention of art educators from the 12 Western states to meet in April, 1962 at Seattle.

In addition to her educational activities, Miss Rumpf has been assisting the Registrar's department in research and authentication of art objects. During the summer the Curator of Education accomplished two reorganizations. The jade room was rearranged to facilitate tours and to give a more educational emphasis to the collection and the material in our storage was rearranged in historical areas to ease exhibit changes, better protect the objects, and have them readily available for study by visiting scholars.

The scope of the Museum's education program would not be possible without the help of our many volunteers. We are particularly indebted to the Guild's Docent Committee, who tour numerous groups, arrange a monthly Senior Citizens program and maintain an Outside Speakers service. We also thank the Junior League for the Treasure Box visits to school classrooms and their much needed assistance in mounting and filing educational materials.

Report of the Seattle Art Museum Guild

1961-62

Annually the Chairman of the Guild inherits the redoubtable task of putting into succinct prose the achievements, failures and current status of the organization for the information of the membership. This formidable task is made worse by the fact that the Guild's working year runs from June through May while that of the Museum runs from January through December.

The Guild neglected its summer holiday in order to sponsor a supper dance, A Night in Camelot, in July. This turned out to be a very exclusive party, because we also neglected to sell many tickets. Still it produced about a thousand dollar profit and was an enchanting mid-summer night.

We next galvanized ourselves to prepare programs which would fill those vacant seats in the auditorium. With such titillating titles as *World Masterpieces at the Exposition* and *Designing Women*, we are having a winning season. Dr. Fuller, Mr. Thomas, Mrs. Lahr, and Miss Rumpf are lecturing marvellously to standing room only audiences and our afternoon speakers find all the seats filled with receptive admirers.

The Hospitality Committee, needless to say, is hard pressed to get enough tables set up to seat all at luncheon. But its members are ushering and serving and smiling sweetly at the largest consistent attendance ever.

The Public Relations Committee adapted itself beautifully and served Sunday coffee during the Thailand exhibit, served tea to a number of visiting groups, and even served luncheon to a convention of the Western Association of Art Museums.

The amount of newspaper coverage by the daily papers greatly increased over the past few years. The number of pictures and their excellent placement is gratifying. The Publicity Chairman has also provided herself with an assistant to cover the East-side weekly papers and some special duties. The Radio Chairman has arranged informative and amusing programs on station KTW each month called *Your Seattle Art Museum*.

The Docent Committee consists currently of 47 conducting docents, 16 associates and 22 in training. From January through December, 1961 the members gave 342 tours. The city turned out so enthusiastically for the Thailand exhibit that they gave 97 tours during that exhibit alone. Besides giving tours they undertake some other interesting duties such as showing films in conjunction with exhibitions, and providing a program the first Friday of each month for Senior Citizens in cooperation with the Council on Aging. Often one of them *is* the program. They assist the Education Department with materials for school children's classes and in 1961 gave 37 talks outside the Museum both on the subject of art and on the services of the Museum. The training program has been strengthened greatly with the addition of a regular series of lectures by the Education Department on art history for the specific benefit of docents-in-training. So many women desire placement on the Docent Committee that even the waiting list has been closed at present.

To add to the excitement of the autumn the Junior League suddenly had to thrust back into our arms the Treasure Box program which they had been handling for several years and with only five women trained to show them. One of the five kindly trained enough of our members to get the corps up to sufficient strength for the 199 calls to be filled this school year.

Membership I have left until last because it is tied uniquely to a new concept of Museum membership which we are trying to promote. Realizing that the metropolitan area of Seattle enfolds many people who delight in art but cannot get to the Museum often for lack of time or money or because of distance, we began in 1961 to take the Museum to them. We saw the formation of the Eastside Associate Guild with about 165 members, all new to the Museum except for perhaps 15, which meets in Bellevue, provides its own programs and occasionally calls on the Docent Committee for a speaker or guide. They have been urged to make their own rules and ways so that they receive from our association exactly what they want. As new associate guilds form they, too, will be allowed to tailor their group to their own desires. The pilot associate guild and new ones in process of forming are being tactfully mothered by our Vice-Chairman. The Membership Committee assists with refreshment and speakers at the initial gatherings of these suburban residents. This Committee likewise has the onerous duty of checking membership cards for people going into the auditorium on Guild meeting days.

Only the loyalty and enthusiasm of intelligent volunteers abetting the wisest, kindest, most tireless staff of professionals, from maintenance man to director, can account for the good will, cheerfulness, seriousness of purpose, and population explosion that has painted the walls with sunshine around here lately.






FIG. 2. Two Cranes, by Jakuchu Ito, 1713-1800, Japanese; ink on paper; $45\frac{1}{2} \times 17\frac{1}{8}$ in. (J32/J2136.1) Donated by friends in memory of Grant I. Butterbaugh


FIG. 4. Ukiyo-e painting, colors on silk; Japan, Genroku era, 1688-1703; $14\frac{3}{4}$ x $19\frac{7}{6}$ in. (J32.76) Gift of Mrs. Alfred F. Woolsey and Miss Maud Oakes


FIG. 5. Fan painting, from an album of 12, by Shibata Zeshin, 1807-91, Japanese; lacquer on paper; H. 6¹/₄ in. (J34/ Z563.1.10) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection







FIG. 6. Bottle, porcelain with coral-red glaze; China, Ch'ing dynasty, reign of Ch'ien Lung, 1736-96; H. 9¾ in. (Ch22.80) Gift of Dorothy Chatterton Malone in memory of her mother, Katherine Mehrling Chatterton







FIG. 9. Statuette of a divinity, bronze; Syria, Phoenician, ca. 900 B.C.; H. 4³/₄ in. (PIs11.16) Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection


FIG. 10. Dagger, bronze with alabaster inlay in handle; Iran, Luristan region, ca. 11th cent. B.C.; L. $15\frac{5}{6}$ in. (PIs6.20) Gift of Mrs. Howard A. Frame, Los Altos Hills, Calif.








FIG. 16. Male head, limestone; Persepolis, Iran, ca. 4th cent.; H. $10\frac{1}{4}$ in. (Cs11.41) Gift of Mrs. Fred Everett in memory of her husband







FIG. 25. Le Jardinier au Plantoir et La Jardiniere au Vase, soft paste biscuit; French, Sevres, ca. 1765; H. ca. 9 in. (Fr21.2) Blanche M. Harman Ceramic Collection, Gift of Seattle Ceramic Society, Unit 1








FIG. 30. Rising Orb (Bahai Series), 1935, by Mark Tobey, 1890-, American; tempera over gold paint on cardboard; 97_8 x 127₈ in. (A32/T555.30) Gift of Capt. and Mrs. John H. Bowen



Securities are carried on the balance sheet at cost, when purchased or at market values when otherwise acquired. Securities were sold during the year at prices exceeding original carrying values by \$11,584.55 and the several fund balances were increased accordingly.

Securities carried on the balance sheet at \$970,718.54 had market values of approximately \$1,250,000.00 at the close of the year.

It should be noted that the attached statements are made on a strictly cash receipts and disbursements basis; this report does not attempt to evaluate or account for the Museum's art collections, library, equipment or properties other than money and securities.
