# In Memoriam

"Mrs. Eugene Fuller, co-founder and Life Trustee of the Seattle Art Museum, and to whose farsighted generosity much of its renowned collection is owed, departed this life on November 20, 1953.

"Coming to the Pacific Northwest in 1872 at the age of twelve, she early acquired an interest in the art of Asia, which in large measure contributed to the importance placed on the Museum's Asiatic collection, regarded as one of the finest in the world. Her formal collection was begun during the years of World War I, augmented in the 1920s, and in 1930 she and her son provided the funds for the erection of the Museum which they donated to the City of Seattle and which in itself is one of the artistic gems of the country.

"Over and beyond this generosity, Mrs. Fuller was a co-donor of the Museum's Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection, in the enlargement of which she took a constant interest, and also endowed the Museum to help meet its minimum budget needs for art activities. These constant gifts, which never appeared on the balance sheet of the Museum, have been largely responsible for its growth and national renown.

"As members of this Board, we shall greatly miss her gentle presence and wise counsel. As long-time friends, we mourn her passing. Hers was a life of true generosity devoted to bringing the artistic beauty of the ages within the reach of the many. In a devotional spirit, she joined her son in the initial endowment of The Seattle Foundation for the civic good.

"BE IT RESOLVED THEREFORE: That we, the members of the Board of the Seattle Art Museum hereby express our deep sense of sorrow and our great personal loss in the passing of Mrs. Eugene Fuller, a friend whom we honored, esteemed and held in great affection."

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT AND DIRECTOR FOR 1953

During the course of twenty-one years the activities of the Seattle Art Museum have become so multitudinous that it is now desirable to present the greater number of them statistically. This report will therefore stress only the more salient features of the year's activities.

## New Kress Gallery

The Seattle Art Museum has enjoyed a notable year in many respects. The outstanding feature has been the donation of funds, by one of our Trustees, to construct an additional gallery for the Samuel H. Kress Collection. This will permit us to give adequate space for the fine items which we have already received and to exhibit more appropriately the group of magnificent additions from the Kress Foundation. The plans for the new gallery were drawn by the firm of Young, Richardson, Carleton, and Detlie.

When completed the two Kress galleries will present a comprehensive survey of Italian art from the Romanesque through the Baroque periods with additional masterpieces from the Flemish and Dutch schools. In the selection of the additional works of art, we have had the utmost cooperation from Mr. Rush H. Kress and Mr. Guy Emerson, Trustees of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, and from Dr. William E. Suida, Curator of Research, and Mr. Mario Modestini, Curator. Although we have had the benefit of their wide experience in this field, the Museum has had great freedom in the specific choice of paintings and sculpture.

During the period of construction and hanging of the Kress galleries, our activities in the immediately adjacent rooms will be curtailed to some degree, and regretably it will cause our present Samuel H. Kress Collection to spend a considerable part of 1954 in storage until the official opening on October 15, 1954.

## Japanese Exhibition

The other especially notable event of the year was our participation in the Official Japanese Exhibition of Painting and Sculpture. This required almost our entire exhibition space during the month of July. Preparations for it demanded a vast effort on the

part of the staff for several months. It was the first time that Seattle has had the honor of being invited to participate in one of the great international exhibitions. The acceptance of such an honor demanded also the acceptance of a great financial responsibility. To meet the pro-rated expenses, four of the five participating museums charged an entrance fee. The cost of our installation and publicity would have been infinitely higher except for the very generous cooperation of our staff and the many who contributed their services in various capacities. Anticipating a deficit, we invited members and friends of the Museum to volunteer as guarantors of a small fund. Fortunately we came so close to our goal that it was only necessary to call on each for 40% of his pledge. Thanks to the great activity of our publicity committee we achieved a remarkable success and attained a paid attendance of over 57,000 and a total attendance including children of over 73,000. This exceeded the attendance of any of the other museums charging admissions.

## *Publicity*

During 1953 we received more publicity than ever before largely due to the famed Japanese exhibition. We are especially indebted to the Seattle Times and the Seattle Post-Intelligencer for the excellent space granted to our activities. For the Japanese exhibition our newspaper publicity was directed by Mrs. Elizabeth Wright Evans, while many folders, brochures, and posters were designed by How. J. Ryan & Sons who most generously contributed their services. We were also indebted to Foster and Kleiser and Sunset Advertising for space for 22 billboards, and to the Seattle Transit System for space for 260 outside bus posters. The Seattle and King County School Systems were responsible for the distribution of over 100,000 letters to parents, and the major banks and business houses enclosed notices of the exhibition in their monthly statements. The city permitted 24 lamp posts in the downtown area to be decorated with plywood shields and flags announcing the exhibition. The principal hotels placed small posters in their rooms and on tables; air lines, railroads, steamship companies, and tourist agencies assisted in similar activities. For this momentous occasion we also had fine television and radio coverage from almost all the stations. Special mention should be given to KING-TV for the excellent half-hour program covering the preview.

Although this major publicity effort dominated the scene in 1953, it is the year-round assistance from the press, radio, television, and our other loyal friends which is so effective in bringing public attention to our activities and services. These are given special emphasis on weekly programs over KXA and KOMO.

### Education

In addition to the many educational services performed by our faithful volunteers, Mr. Edward B. Thomas, Curator of Education, presented 54 television shows; 38 radio programs; 94 lectures and tours; 43 Story Hours for children; served on 10 juries; worked on 51 committees and study conferences; cooperated with 54 community organizations on art and educational projects; prepared 8 Children's Corner exhibits and 5 educational exhibits at the Seattle Public Library.

Mr. Thomas has been able to devote much more of his time to larger groups and to increase his use of mass media, particularly television, because of the ever increasing activity of the Guild's volunteer Docents who are now responsible for most of the gallery tours as well as other aspects of our educational program.

## Library

Our library increased the  $2 \times 2$  slides by 927, bringing our total to 14,363. Our books now number 4,418. In this field, the greatest donor was Mr. Bernard Freyd who gave 85 of the 253 volumes added to the collection. In recognition of his gifts he has been elected an Honorary Member. It is gratifying to note that the use of the library increased about 10%.

## Creative Classes

Although we have greatly enjoyed the privilege of sponsoring the various creative classes which Mrs. Howard S. Lease organized during the past five years, our demands for space this autumn caused us to conclude that phase of our activities. We hope, however, that the success which she and her associates have demonstrated will cause adequate quarters to be built in the city in the near future for this important work.

## Architecture Exhibit

The Fourth Annual Architecture Exhibit proved an outstanding success and brought to the Museum the handsome sum of \$3,827. We are most grateful to the various committees for their initiative and efficiency, and to those who so generously offered their homes for the exhibit and tea. The theme, "A Day in the Country," was illustrated by visits to the following fifteen homes situated across Lake Washington: Diamond S Ranch—Judge and Mrs. James W. ## Changes in Personnel

At the close of the year Mr. Egil Krogh resigned from the Board of Trustees owing to his departure from our city to accept an important position in Rochester, New York. His place had not been filled by the end of the year.

In the early autumn after over twenty years of faithful services as Curator Mr. Kenneth Callahan left the Museum to further his career as a creative artist. This move fortunately has proven to our mutual advantage, for as art reviewer for the Seattle Times his talent as a critic has been more publicized, so that he has continued to render notable service to the Museum. Other changes in our staff have resulted in Mrs. Giacomo Pirzio-Biroli being employed as Research Assistant, Ernest Dietrich as a Museum Assistant, Mrs. William J. Lahr in charge of Information and Sales, and Mrs. Milton C. Richards as Staff Secretary.

#### Maintenance

Some of the items which we especially purchased for the Japanese exhibit, such as tube lights, will continue to be of value in other gallery installations. For the same exhibitions we purchased new lights for both the Jade Room and the Print Room, which the Park Department installed. The Park Department also installed radiators which we purchased to heat more adequately the downstairs addition. On that floor the most notable improvement was

the enlargement of our darkroom and the purchase of new photographic equipment to facilitate our photography. The city also built storage racks for publications and stationery in our basement supply room.

#### Future Plans

Each year we become more aware of the fact that nearly all of our facilities require additional space. The growth and the enrichment of the collection during the past twenty years make it a great potential asset to the community. The word potential is used advisedly, for it cannot achieve its full purpose if the material has to be confined to storage sometimes for years at a time. At the most, some of the cream of the collection is exhibited only during the summer months when the schools are closed.

We do not aspire to become static, for the changing exhibits are an essential factor in the life of the Museum and permit us to serve our function as a stimulus for the art of the community. To be of service to the schools, however, we need exhibition space so that classes can be sure of seeing at least some of our finest material of every culture whenever they visit the Museum.

To meet these needs we have been working sporadically for the past two years on plans for an addition to the south in cooperation with the firm of Young, Richardson, Carleton and Detlie. Many difficult problems appear at last to be attaining a logical and relatively economical solution. In the development of these plans, the advice of Mr. Norman Davis, Vice-President of the Museum, has been a most important factor. It is hoped that during the coming year we may be successful in raising funds through the support of our fellow citizens, so that by next year the start of this essential step in the growth of the Seattle Art Museum may be reported.

It is with pleasure that I acknowledge a contribution in excess of \$10,500 from the sale of securities donated by Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr., toward the building fund, which was initiated last year by the gift from Mr. and Mrs. Walter L. Wyckoff. With their permission this fund was used to give us working capital with which to finance the Japanese Exhibition. Fortunately it was reimbursed. Such unrestricted funds fill a long-felt want. I take great pleasure in acknowledging an additional gift of \$5,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Wyckoff for capital improvements.

In closing I wish again to thank the staff for their faithful service and initiative which has been so largely responsible for our success. We are most grateful to our good members and our friends who have contributed so generously to our activities.

## Museum Guild

#### 1953-54

The various committees of the Museum Guild continue to serve the Museum with numerous major projects throughout the year. The volunteer activities of these women contribute greatly to the growth and development of the Museum.

The Program Committee followed the plan of previous years in the Guild Lecture Series with morning and afternoon lectures on the second and fourth Tuesdays from October through April. The morning series, conducted by Dr. Richard E. Fuller and Mr. Millard B. Rogers, completed a two year study entitled, Survey of Chinese Art. The afternoon series called Old World Holidays was designed to give armchair art tours to a number of foreign countries. The speakers for this series were chosen largely from Guild members who had been recently to these countries: France, Miss Joanna Eckstein; England, Mr. John Ashby Conway; Mediterranean Highlights, Mrs. Cassius Gates; Holland, Mrs. Frank H. Molitor; Portugal, Mrs. Elizabeth Smithson; Spain, Mrs. Ronald Koenig; Austria, Mrs. Pauline Bolster; Italy, Mr. Roland Terry; The Holy Land. Mrs. Lester Lewis; European Porcelain, Mrs. William L. Harnan; Cities of India, Miss Pamela Pearce; and Turkey, Mrs. Millard B. Rogers.

Members of the *Docent Committee* conducted tours of the Museum exhibitions from May 1953 to June 1954 for more than 15,000 Museum visitors, approximately 8,600 of which were during the Japanese Exhibit in July and August. This was accomplished in 220 scheduled tours (93 of which were during the Japanese Exhibit) and 20 unscheduled tours.

A monthly 10:00 o'clock Coffee Hour for Prospective Museum Members was initiated this year by the Membership Committee. After a social period, the groups were conducted on a behind-thescenes tour of the Museum by the Curator of Education to acquaint old and new members with the organization and activities of the Museum. The favorable response to this has shown up in the increase in new members.

The Public Relations Committee arranged over a dozen teas for organizations and convention groups visiting Seattle who were interested in viewing the Museum's exhibits. Approximately 1,390 persons were served.

The Projects Committee published the 1954 Art Calendar reproducing 54 objects from the Museum's collections. To date over

3,000 copies of this calendar have been sold. This committee also is responsible for the Art Auction held December 4 and 5, 1953. The art objects auctioned were made up from gifts of generous donors and objects from the Museum's collection. The net profit of \$4,564.56 was applied to the purchase of new objects for the Museum. Two acquisitions from this fund have already been made: a Landscape, by the Flemish painter, Paul Bril, signed and dated 1600, and a Nottingham alabaster relief, The Entombment, English, about 1400.

The Hospitality Committee again this year served coffee and tea during the Guild lunch hour on lecture days.

Publicity for Guild activities was secured by the *Guild Publicity Committee* and included several picture spreads and single pictures as well as 209 inches of copy from the Seattle Times and the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

A *Speakers Bureau* helped to fill requests outside of the Museum for speakers who could explain the facilities of the Museum and the activities of the Guild.

The Museum Guild through the radio chairman produced a *Monthly Radio Program* on station KXA. The talent for this was drawn largely from among the Guild women who had appeared on this year's lecture series.

The visual aid material assembled by the Guild members in the *Treasure Chest* now includes dolls, costumes, models of dwellings, and other authentic articles suitable for the social study courses of the 3rd grade level covering the Philippines, China, Japan, Mexico, and South America. This material was used by 43 public schools in the city, 3 county schools, and 1 private school. Many of the schools called for their return four or five times. The committee estimates that over 5,000 children used this material.

Again the *Foreign Students' Christmas Party* was held at the Museum as a gesture of friendliness and good cheer. About 600 invitations were issued to the students attending the University of Washington, Seattle University, and Seattle Pacific College. The supper party and entertainment furnished by generous donors for this large group is a sizeable undertaking each year.

The Annual High School Art Exhibit was sponsored by the Museum Guild. This is a juried show open to public and private junior and senior high schools in King County and includes painting, sculpture, and prints.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

#### AUDITORS' CERTIFICATE

We have examined the accounts of the Seattle Art Museum for the calendar year 1953, and have prepared the attached statements which, in our opinion, correctly set forth the financial condition of the Museum at December 31, 1953, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

Securities in the Founders' Endowment Fund and in the Margaret E. Fuller Endowment Fund, shown on the balance sheet at values when acquired, or \$344,147.22, had market values of \$497,525.00 at the close of the year.

A special fund has been set up to account for restricted gifts and the disposition thereof; these were carried in the operating fund statement during the previous year and showed an excess of \$8,224.27 of expenditures over receipts, of which \$7,000.00 was borrowed. These advances represented special funds administered by the Museum for such purposes as the Japanese Art Exhibition, remodelling for the Kress exhibit and preparation of building plans.

During 1953 the \$7,000.00 loan was repaid and other receipts in excess of expenditures resulted in a balance of \$41,218.25 to the credit of the fund.

It must be reiterated that the Museum operates on a strictly cash basis and that, accordingly, properties of considerable value, such as art collection, library, furniture and fixtures do not appear upon the balance sheet.




Fig. 2. Northern Celadon vase (porcelaneous ware); China, Sung dynasty; H. 7½ in. (Ch25.33). Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection.




Fig. 3. Eight-sided pagoda, three-color glaze (earthenware); China, Early Ming dynasty; H. 31½ in. (Ch24.36). Eugene Fuller Memorial Collection.




Fig. 14. Relief fragment:

Archibald Stewart Downey.






Fig. 15. Head of Buddha (gray volcanic stone); Java; ca. 800 A. D., Borobudur; H. 15¼ in. (FInII.13). Gift of Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr.
