KRESS COLLECTION

The major event of the year was unquestionably the opening on October 15th of the two galleries devoted to the Samuel H. Kress Collection. Last year's report gave the essential details of this very important development except for the fact that I now have permission to announce that we are indebted to Mr. and Mrs. Norman Davis for the construction of the new gallery and to members of our Board of Trustees for the alteration of the former gallery.

The selection of the paintings was finally completed in June. The summer months were then devoted to the perfecting of the galleries and to the innumerable details involved in the preparation and publication of the catalogue. The expense for this major item was covered by a grant from The Seattle Foundation and by an allotment from our Building Fund which we hope to replace in the near future.

For the success of this small building program we should acknowledge the fine work of John S. Detlie and John L. Rogers of Young, Richardson, Carleton and Detlie, and the contractor O. B. Daniels and Sons. The high quality of the catalogue was attained through the meticulous care of the Acme Press and the Museum's staff.

A commemorative luncheon for the opening was dignified by the presence of both Governor Langlie and Mayor Pomeroy, while John Walker, Curator of the National Gallery of Art, was the principal speaker. I am glad to be able to report that the installation, catalogue, and the details of the opening met the unqualified approval of Mr. Rush H. Kress and his fellow officials of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation.

EXHIBITIONS

In our regular schedule, the principal exhibition was on Caravaggio, the Italian 17th century artist, and the *Tenebrosi*, or light and dark painters, who followed him. This exhibit had been initiated by Dr. Sherman E. Lee over two years ago and was brought to fulfillment by the Assistant Director, Millard B. Rogers. In this project we had the generous cooperation of seven major museums and three important New York dealers. Since most of the paintings were large and of high value the expenses were heavy.

We also had the notable privilege of the initial showing in the country of the famous collection of early Chinese gold and silver belonging to Carl Kempe of Sweden. The other major circuits in which we participated were the paintings of Per Krohg, the great Norwegian artist; *Impressionism in American Art*; and the Henry Lee McFee memorial exhibition. As usual much of our gallery space was devoted to contemporary art with a strong emphasis on the work of Northwest artists, although the annuals of both the Printmakers and the Seattle Photographic Society solicit world wide competition.

By invitation we participated in a number of exhibitions throughout the country and the great memorial exhibition in Paris for the famous Orientalist, the late Rene Grousset. From nearly six hundred items from the entire world, two of the three which we sent were among the thirty illustrations in their catalogue, an honor which we share only with the Victoria and Albert Museum.

ACCESSIONS

Aside from the outstanding European paintings and sculpture which we received from the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, the Museum's collection was greatly enriched with material of high quality. For the first time our European accessions required the entire long gallery. In this regard special mention should be made of the ceramics, most of which have come to us through the generosity of an anonymous donor, thus expanding our collection into another popular field. Various memorial donations, as well as the funds from the Guild Auction in 1953, were invested in European old master paintings and sculpture. Some excellent paintings were also acquired through the Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund. Many of the world's cultures were represented by single items sometimes of world importance with an emphasis on China and pre-Columbian America.

LIBRARY

Our Library was increased by over 200 volumes, about half of which were the gift of Bernard Freyd. To our collection of small color slides were added about 1500, most of which were taken for us in Europe by Mr. Thomas. Since we discarded over 1000 black and white slides that have been replaced by color, our collection in this 2 x 2 size now exceeds 15,000. The loan of our educational material was slightly greater than in the previous year.

MEMBERSHIP

Although during the year there was a net gain of only 58 members, the much needed income from membership increased from \$26,990 to \$29,280

This is a most encouraging situation as it indicates that many who were already members elected to give increased support to their Museum by raising their class of membership.

ARCHITECTURE EXHIBIT

The spring architecture exhibit-tour again proved to be of essential financial importance in maintaining the activities of the Museum during the lean summer months. The net proceeds brought to our general fund \$3,782 which was almost identical to the pervious year. For this event Mrs. Ray Murray, Jr. was the efficient chairman, while Mrs. Herbert Brink served as advisor, and the following as subchairmen: Mrs. Miller Munson, vice-chairman; Mrs. George H. Thompson, secretary; Mrs. A. Talcott Ostrander, treasurer; Mrs. Allen P. Green, Jr., assistant treasurer; Mrs. Norman Piggott, public relations; Mrs. Donald A. Meyer, tickets; Mrs. Millard B. CHANGES IN PERSONNEL

During the year both Mrs. Thomas D. Stimson and Mr. Edward W. Allen resigned from the Board of Trustees after many years of faithful and valuable service. To fill these positions Mrs. Corydon Wagner of Tacoma and Mr. Joshua Green, Sr., accepted election.

Mr. Millard B. Rogers, Assistant Director, was also given the title of Curator. Mr. Edward B. Thomas was promoted to Educational Director, and to assist him in his enlarging broadcasting program Mrs. William J. Lahr was transferred from the Information Desk to be Curator of Education. The responsibility for her former position is now shared by Mrs. Leonard J. Bushnell and Mrs. James B. Howe, Jr. At the first of the year Mr. Allen Wilcox joined the staff as a Museum Assistant. During the summer Mr. Walter Froelich resigned to move to Canada.

In recognition of her knowledge in a specialized field and in appreciation of her service to the Museum, Mrs. William L. Harnan was appointed Honorary Curator of Porcelain.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT

The City had an excellent job done on the much needed reroofing of the building. To reduce the light bill for the City and to increase the efficiency of illumination, the custodial engineering staff installed throughout our storage the fluorescent lights which we had purchased for the Japanese exhibition the previous year. Under the leadership of Mr. Rogers great progress has been made in the reorganization of our storage.

Our major investment of equipment was steel book shelving for our Library stacks, and additional typewriters.

PUBLICITY

Our greatest publicity was of course attained by the opening of the galleries devoted to the Samuel H. Kress Collection. For this event we had the utmost cooperation from both the *Seattle Post-Intelligencer* and the *Seattle Times*. Both papers were also most generous to us throughout the year, as were also the various neighborhood papers, radio and television stations.

Y Y Y Y

As with many things in life the problems which we face could easily be solved with additional funds. In spite of the fact that our current income did not cover our relatively small budget for the past year, the Board of Trustees authorized a much needed small salary raise for our staff.

As I have already mentioned we had to allocate from our building fund about \$10,000 to meet our necessary expenses. We therefore have to raise additional funds to cover the construction of the activities room which we are building this summer. This small goal however should be easily achieved. The addition will not only meet a vital need, but will give access to a future south wing, a necessary objective, which will require a major expenditure. In these projects I trust that we will receive the support of our friends and members.

In closing I wish to give thanks to the members of the Board of Trustees for contributing advice and funds, to our many members and the faithful volunteer workers among them, and to the fellow members of my staff upon whom so much of our success depends.

During 1954 all of the regular educational activities were continued. The general trend was to decrease the number of outside talks to clubs and social organizations, and to increase the use of mass communication media, particularly television.

We presented 53 television broadcasts, 104 radio programs, and also used "spot" announcements on both radio and television to publicize special exhibitions and activities. In the Museum we gave 50 lectures and tours, 50 Children's Story Hours, and 6 Children's Corner exhibits. Outside the Museum there were 17 lectures and 5 exhibits at the Seattle Public Library. By cooperating with many civic agencies, and serving on many committees and juries, this department has aided the Museum in its role of assistance and leadership both in art and in education for our community. Three important activities in which I participated outside the city were: the Conference of the Committee on Art Education, held at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, and in conjunction with this, a special seminar on television in art education; the Washington Art Association Conference in Spokane; and the Governor's Conference on Education at our State Capitol in Olympia.

During the summer I spent four months visiting museums and art centers in Egypt, Turkey, Greece, Crete, Italy, France, Spain, Belgium, and England. In these countries I took color slides to be added to our slide collection and which this department has been using for many lectures and television programs. Several of these programs have been broadcast in color television. We will do expanded color broadcasting as the receiving and transmitting equipment increases in this area.

In the latter part of 1954, the ground work was prepared for our second weekly television program. At the request of the Seattle Public Schools, every week we are doing an educational broadcast for in-school viewing. For each broadcast, teacher study guides are prepared by this department and published by the Seattle and the King County Public Schools. The purpose of the broadcasts is to correlate art and the Museum's collections

with classroom studies. Programs are to be presented for different age levels and different academic areas. This new service to the schools integrates the Museum with the community's formal educational system to a greater extent than ever has been previously possible. In order to provide this service, it was necessary to increase our educational staff by appointing Mrs. William J. Lahr as Curator of Education.

A third program, which also is to begin in early 1955, was requested by KOMO-TV. This will give the Museum three regular weekly one-half hour television programs. I know of no museum in this country, or in Europe, that can match this kind of activity in general education and public relations.

A large portion of the Museum's educational activities is carried on by our ever faithful volunteers. Special thanks should go to the Seattle Art Museum Guild, particularly its Radio Committee, and its Docent Committee who guided thousands of adults and children through our galleries. Thanks too, to Mrs. Paul F. Moran for her out-of-Museum lectures in our behalf; to Mrs. Carl Swanson for the magnificent work she has done in taking our Treasure Boxes to school classrooms; to the Junior League of Seattle, who supports the Story Hours and who, in this new school year, has taken on the responsibility of the Treasure Box project. Thanks too, to KING-TV, KOMO-TV, KCTS-TV, and Radio KXA and KOMO for their generous donation of broadcast time and assistance.

All the members of the Museum staff both directly and indirectly participate in our educational activities and my grateful thanks goes to each of them, but especially to Millard Rogers who has presented our weekly radio broadcasts and many special television programs.

Throughout this year thousands of volunteer hours have been spent by a great many women on the various activities and committees of the Museum Guild, all done to assist the Museum and its services in one form or another.

The Program Committee staged a most successful afternoon series, *Art in Action*, which brought the artist's studio right into the Museum Auditorium. Many different techniques ranging from oil painting to jewelry making brought to the audience a greater feeling of appreciation in the problems of creative art. This program made an admirable foil to the excellent series conducted by Dr. Richard E. Fuller, Mr. Millard Rogers, and Mr. Edward Thomas on the various paintings in the Kress Collection. On the final day of the Guild year, after a short business meeting, a Dollar Sale of work by Guild artists was featured with the names hidden. This sale, done primarily to add a bit of excitement to our final program, was accompanied by a tea. The Guild days were changed this year to the first and third Thursdays so that they might work out more easily with the exhibition schedule.

The Docent Committee conducted 178 tours which brought 10,491 visitors to the Museum. While as usual the majority of these tours were for children from schools all over Western Washington, many of them were public tours conducted on Saturdays, Sundays, and Thursday evenings, to acquaint the public with the greatly enlarged Kress Collection.

The Coffee Hours begun so successfully by the Membership Committee the previous year were continued. Again the inspiring talk by a member of the staff and a tour behind scenes brought an enthusiastic response from those attending and these new members will have a clearer idea of the problems and aspirations of the Museum.

The Public Relations Committee has entertained both local groups and national conventions; with the advent of the new activities room it is to be hoped that there will be an increase in both the number of events and those that are served. Eight teas were given this past year with an attendance of over 800 women; for many this was their first view of the Museum. During the International Rotary Convention here last June over 2000 women from all parts of the world toured the Museum after a luncheon in the

Park put on by the women of the Seattle Rotary. The Docents acted as hostesses in the galleries and the out-of-town guests left with a tangible reminder—one of our 1954 Engagement Books. This undoubtedly was a welcome gift and did much to advance the public relations of our Museum throughout the world.

The major project of 1954 was the Engagement Book. In its third year it has been successful not only in making over \$1,400 despite increased publishing costs, but also in spreading our national and international reputation. This year we have experimented with putting the sales through the stores on a commercial basis. It is hoped this will grow and relieve to some extent the work of the volunteers, but so far the greatest burden still falls upon the members of the Guild.

On Guild days the Hospitality Committee dispensed not only coffee and tea but also a truly friendly atmosphere. Frequently Guild members served as hostesses at a table set aside for the new members.

The Publicity Chairman received excellent cooperation from both papers and was able to keep all phases of Guild activities before the public most successfully. The radio programs broadcasted over KXA each month were based on the *Art in Action* series and Guild activities.

Another gay and pleasant party for the foreign students at the University of Washington, Seattle University, and Seattle Pacific College was held on the last Sunday before Christmas and was attended by over 400 students including for the first time those from Canada. The guests were served a delicious turkey supper and entertained by the excellent Lincoln High School Glee Club. It was a rewarding experience for both them and their hosts and hostesses.

The Eleventh Annual High School Art Exhibit in May 1955 sponsored by the Guild with the cooperation of the Museum staff has been unusually successful this year and has resulted in three galleries and the print room full of fresh and stimulating work by the public and private junior and senior high school pupils in King County. Including sculpture as well as painting and prints, this show was juried by Guy Anderson, John C. Braun, Henry William Petterson, Lisel Salzer, and Edward Thomas.

Financial Report

AUDITOR'S CERTIFICATE

We have examined the accounts of the SEATTLE ART MUSEUM for the calendar year 1954, and have prepared the attached statements which, in our opinion, correctly set forth the financial condition of the Museum at December 31, 1954, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

During the year the Museum received a distribution from the Estate of Margaret E. Fuller in securities of the present market value of \$205,800.00. These were credited to the Margaret E. Fuller Purchase Fund.

As with other securities these were taken up on the records at the market value when acquired, in this case at the estate appraisal or \$137,154.42.

Securities in the three funds carried on the balance sheet at values when acquired or \$484,344.18, had market values of \$810,781.00 at the close of the year.

It should be noted that the attached statements are on a strictly cash basis and no attempt is made to evaluate the Museum's collections, library, equipment and property other than money and securities.























FIG. 31. St. Luke, polychromed and gilded wood; Italy, XV cent.; H. 28 in. (It11.6). Arrigo M. Young Memorial, donated by Friends.


