DEDICATION



This year, we wish to honor two people for whom art was of central importance: Dr. Richard E. Fuller, founder, President, Director, collector and donor, on the centennial of his birth; and Mrs. Coe V. Malone, "Dottie," who was Dr. Fuller's personal secretary and was closely involved with virtually every aspect of the museum from 1931 until her death in 1997.

We asked Honorary Trustee John Hauberg, himself a longtime friend of the museum, to write a brief tribute to these two extraordinary individuals who were, indeed, the very heart and soul of the Seattle Art Museum.

In the 1928–1929 Annual Report of the then "Art Institute of Seattle," Richard E. Fuller is listed as a member of the Board of Directors. Two years later, he became President. In 1931 the organization was renamed "the Seattle Art Museum" as the Fuller family donated \$250,000 to build a museum in Volunteer Park. Along with this splendid gift to the City of Seattle came the commitment, never spoken or written, to fund the annual budgets of the museum.

Fuller's interest in Oriental art began with his mother's small collection of Far Eastern objets d'art in the family home in New York. In 1919 the whole family began a series of extended visits to the Orient, then to Egypt and the European continent. Buying objects everywhere they traveled, the Fullers developed a meticulous system for recording purchases. Later Dr. Fuller admitted that the "Depression was a favorable time to purchase from important dealers their white elephants, many of which are now museum treasures." His acquisitions, however, increased as the years went by.

This great man had many interests and a fine mind which enabled him to accomplish objectives in many fields that have benefited the Seattle community beyond the Seattle Art Museum for which he is best known.

In Seattle Art Museum's Annual Report for 1931–1932, Dr. Fuller wrote, "In preparing for our duties in opening the (new) museum, we added three members to our staff [including] Mrs. Coe V. Malone as secretarial assistant..." By 1939 Mrs. Malone, "Dottie" to everyone, had become Secretary to the Director. A year later Dr. Fuller closed his Director's Report acknowledging "my secretary, Mrs. Malone, who so ably handles her many responsibilities."

It was to be an increasing responsibility for Dottie, who added Dr. Fuller's many other interests to her Museum Secretary tasks. Nearly every Director's Annual Report from the 1950s gratefully acknowledges Dottie's loyal support.

Mrs. Malone stayed on at the museum after Dr. Fuller's retirement in 1973. She had become the keeper of the museum's traditions, the one person who could connect new Directors to the staff, trustees, close friends of the museum, volunteers and donors. She was, literally, a necessity to everyone at the Seattle Art Museum from 1931 until 1997.

Art challenges our intellect, stimulates our sense of form and color, educates us and adds new dimensions to our lives. The Seattle Art Museum offers a wide range of artistic expression and integrates visual art of the highest quality into the life of our community.

The past year marked the fifth anniversary of the downtown museum with remarkable artistic and institutional success. More than 200 works, ranging from 18th-century Chinese snuff bottles to modern African photographs, were added to our permanent collection. The permanent collection also was complemented by special exhibitions that attracted new and diverse audiences. These exciting exhibitions included an exploration of design at the height of the industrial age; evocative drawings by Matisse and Picasso; a celebration of individual art collecting in the Seattle community; elegant priests' robes of the Edo period; Vietnamese ceramics; Chinese calligraphy of the Ming and Qing dynasties; and captivating paintings by Japanese literati artists of the 18th century.

To encourage learning through direct experience with art, the Seattle Art Museum, under the aegis of a new education strategic plan, enhanced our 2,660 education programs and launched a four-year initiative called *Growing Up with Art*. This initiative, funded by The Pew Charitable Trusts' Program for Art Museums and Communities, includes a partnership with Seattle-area elementary and middle schools and the establishment of a teacher resource center at Volunteer Park, accessible via the Internet. The initiative also incorporates an exhibition series, *Documents International*, in which middle-school students will organize exhibitions at SAM. The Seattle Art Museum is proud to be one of only six museums in the country chosen by The Pew Charitable Trusts to model unique arts education initiatives.

The Seattle Art Museum's artistic and educational advancements over the past year would not have been possible without a secure financial underpinning. Director Mimi Gardner Gates, the staff and the board have worked together to maintain a balanced budget and to significantly broaden our base of support. The Museum developed new corporate partnerships that provided unprecedented support for our special exhibitions, and upper-level membership has continued to grow, resulting in our highest annual-giving level in the history of the institution.

We are proud to be a part of the dedicated team of Seattle Art Museum board, staff, volunteers and supporters who have made the past year one that will challenge us for years to come.

EXHIBITIONS AND SPECIAL INSTALLATIONS

Exhibitions and special installations opened a compelling world of art of the highest caliber to almost 400,000 visitors to the Seattle Art Museum and Seattle Asian Art Museum this year. Of our Special Exhibitions, Matisse, Picasso and Friends: Masterworks on Paper from the Cone Collection was the most highly attended, making it the fourth most popular exhibition since the downtown building opened in 1991.

Admissions revenues were right on projection and provided \$844,000 in operating support during FY97.

We would like to thank everyone who made these exhibitions possible: from the artists and curators across the world who provided their creative vision; to the generous funders who gave financial support; to the thousands of visitors who filled the galleries. In addition to corporate, government and private foundation support detailed in the following pages, further vital funding for exhibitions was provided by contributors to the Annual Fund.







LOANS

The museum received three long-term loans this year. The loans included two major collections of Chinese ceramics (for a total of 291 objects), which will be on view in changing exhibitions at the Seattle Asian Art Museum for the next five years. In addition to special exhibitions and long-term loans, 147 artworks loaned from 43 institutions or private collectors were on view in our galleries. The museum also loaned 32 objects from its permanent collection for 14 exhibitions, which were shown in 16 national and international venues.

REPATRIATION

A Tlingit killer whale dagger (Keet Kwahla), 85.358, was deaccessioned from the collection in accordance with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) as an object of cultural patrimony claimed by the Tlingit tribe. The dagger was returned on June 30, 1997. In gratitude, Tlingit elders gave the original owner, Trustee John Hauberg, an honorary Tlingit name and placed a replica of the dagger on loan with the museum.

CONSERVATION

The Seattle Art Museum was reaccredited by the American Association of Museums in 1996, "recognizing the museum's commitment to high professional standards of operation." The reviewers noted in the areas of collections care and conservation:

"The collections are well cared for and storage areas are state-of-the-art. The museum is certainly performing the conservation function at or above the level of most American museums."

PUBLICATIONS

As the scale and ambition of the Seattle Art Museum's programming has expanded, so has our publications program. During this year, several important publications were initiated or drew near their completion for publication in FY98. These include a publication entitled *The Samuel H. Kress Collection at the Seattle Art Museum*; the catalogue *Leonardo Lives: The Codex Leicester and Leonardo da Vinci's Legacy of Art and Science*; and a publication about the Thal collection of Chinese snuff bottles at SAM.

The catalogue for the upcoming exhibition *Native Visions: Northwest Coast Art, 18th Century to the Present* is nearing completion, thanks to generous support from The Henry Luce Foundation and The Eugene V. & Clare E. Thaw Charitable Trust. The book will include an introduction and major essay by Steve Brown, Seattle Art Museum associate curator of Native American art, and over 160 photographs by Paul Macapia. It is co-published with the University of Washington Press.

Work continued on Long Steps Never Broke a Back: African Art from the Seattle Art Museum, a catalogue of the distinguished Katherine White Collection of African Art. Funding for this project has been received from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Teachers enjoy the new computers at the opening of the Teacher Resource Center in January at the Seattle Asian Art Museum. Performance artist Won-dly Paye entertains sixth-grade students from Washington Middle School in SAM's new workshop, African Lives-American Lives.

EDUCATION

This was a landmark year for education activities at the Seattle Art Museum. During the year, a committee of docents, community advisors, trustees and education staff rewrote the education strategic plan, directing our efforts over the coming years. It now has a more clearly articulated vision, focusing on programs for our traditional audiences and targeting underserved audiences: families, schoolchildren, and people of Asian and African descent.

Our vision is to use the most innovative, creative, and effective program strategies, research and technology available to engage the public in a dialogue about the visual arts.

The Seattle Art Museum's education efforts are committed to:

- ~ Encouraging lifelong learning through direct experience with works of art
- ~ Initiating and utilizing current research in art education to address audiences' needs
- ~ Using evaluation and feedback to continually improve programming
- ~ Providing ongoing training and support for teachers
- ~ Creating an enjoyable, social and educational environment for children
- ~ Sustaining our current audiences
- ~ Developing new audiences for the visual arts and the Seattle Art Museum through a variety of community partnerships

FAMILY PROGRAMS

We held seven all-day family festivals at SAM and SAAM, which attracted 5,800 family visitors. Included in the festivals were art-making activities, music and dance performances, storytelling and family tours.

During the three special exhibitions, Design 1885—1945; Matisse, Picasso and Friends; and Seattle Collects Paintings, 30,000 interactive family guides were given to visitors. These guides encouraged children and families to explore the exhibitions together and obtain a better understanding of the art in the museum. Drop-in art-making spaces in the Special Exhibition Gallery encouraged visitors to respond directly to the art by trying their hands at creating their own masterpieces.

In keeping with the new strategic plan, the Art Studio Program focused on families this year by offering one- and two-day parent/child workshops such as *Elephants and You*, a collaborative workshop that took place at SAAM and the Woodland Park Zoo.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Growing Up with Art

In 1996, SAM was chosen as one of six museums in the country to build an innovative arts education program with funding from The Pew Charitable Trusts' Program for Art Museums and Communities. *Growing Up with Art*, a four-year initiative joining SAM and selected Seattle elementary and middle schools, was launched this year. It is earmarked to become a national model and to serve the region for many years.

The goal of *Growing Up with Art* is to develop a sequential, intensive arts education program and to create a new relationship between schools and the museum. The program involves active learning, direct interactions with artists, and the use of resource materials and teacher in-services to provide an historical and cultural context for the museum's collection.

Other components of *Growing Up with Art* include the development of two exhibitions at the museum with teacher and student input. Members of the education and curatorial staffs worked with two classes at South

Shore Middle School to develop the first of these exhibitions, which will focus on identity in art. Planning continues through the fall of 1997, and the exhibition will open at SAM downtown in April 1998. Assessment is a key element of the program, so we can make a case for the importance of arts education on both the local and national level.

The four-year grant for *Growing Up with Art* requires the museum to raise \$300,000 in matching funds. The following grantmakers are helping us meet this commitment:

Teacher Resource Center

As part of *Growing Up with Art*, we opened a Teacher Resource Center (TRC) in January 1997 at the Seattle Asian Art Museum. Through the TRC we offer a variety of services to educators and parents, including slide packets, video tapes, CD-ROMS, books, posters, and outreach suitcases for the classroom with materials on Northwest Coast, Japanese, Chinese and African art and culture. The Center contains three computers with Internet access and a color laser printer. The TRC is also a regional lending center for the National Gallery of Art.

During the TRC's first six months, 205 teachers registered to use our facilities. Of these, 43% were elementary teachers; 30% middle school teachers, 20% high school teachers, and 7% university and college instructors.

School Tours

Our school programs grew again this year, with more than 26,000 students touring SAM and SAAM and more than 12,000 students participating in hands-on art-making activities or a performing arts workshop.

We offered two innovative new school programs. A new tour, African Arts: From Algeria to Zimbabwe, for 4th through 12th-graders, was followed by African Lives-American Lives, a hands-on workshop with an African performance artist. Tea ceremony demonstrations were made available to school groups at the Japanese Teahouse at SAM, downtown. Students tried on kimonos, viewed a host serving tea to a guest, handled utensils, and tasted green tea and Japanese sweets.

SEATTLE ASIAN

ART MUSEUM PROGRAMS

The summer, fall, winter and spring Performance in the Park Series offered 24 performances featuring Indian, Korean, Japanese, Chinese, Southeast Asian and Australian music and dance to more than 1,200 visitors.

We offered a new audio tour of SAAM's permanent collection and special exhibitions for the first time this year.

A star lineup on the lecture series included James Cahill, Professor Emeritus of Art History, University of California, Berkeley; and Vishaka Desai, Director of Galleries of the Asia Society, New York.

ArtStars, SAAM's teen docent program now in its third year, had 15 middle-school student participants. After several months of training workshops, which included art history and hands-on art making, the ArtStars led over 300 people on 14 tours through the museum.

ADULT PROGRAMS

The Art Councils presented 75 programs to over 5,000 visitors. Highlights of the year include:

- ~ Art and Opera, a series co-sponsored by the Education Department, the Decorative Arts and Paintings Council, the Friends of the Seattle Art Museum and the Seattle Opera;
- ~ World-renowned scholar and critic John Richardson's lecture on Picasso to a sold-out audience, sponsored by the Collectors' Forum; and
- ~ Artist Martin Puryear's lecture on his work, sponsored by the Contemporary Art Council and the University of Washington School of Art.

More than 16,000 people enjoyed the film program at the museum, which included: the 19th annual Film Noir series; an evening with Christine Panushka and her films; the fifth annual Polish Film Festival; a celebration of American Film Comedy and French Film Comedy; and a special Seattle Art Museum fifth anniversary showing of Casablanca.

During 16 Tea Ceremony demonstrations, 160 visitors enjoyed a taste of green tea and sweets in our Japanese Teahouse.

Docents led over 14,000 adult visitors on tours through the galleries.

NATIONAL DOCENT SYMPOSIUM

In April 1997, the National Docent Symposium held its ninth biennial symposium in Seattle. The Seattle Art Museum's docents, led by co-chairs Betty Winskill, Doni Pahlow and Sally Hirst, were host to 470 docents from all over the U.S. and Canada. The event was an outstanding success:

- Of the symposium's \$40,000 net income, \$30,000 will go toward SAM docent education, including special education projects for the Docent Lecture Series, speakers and presentations, workshops, special events and book purchases for the library.
- ~ For the first time in the history of the symposium, \$10,000 has been sent to the National Docent Symposium Council for aiding host museums with seed money that would be perpetuated by other symposia in the future.

RENTAL/SALES GALLERY

This was another successful year for the Rental/Sales Gallery, which is the major fundraising source for the Volunteers Association. Local businesses and individuals rented 1,550 artworks by Northwest artists, and 195 artworks were sold. The Gallery hosted four successful exhibits. Revenue from sales was up 13%.

The Rental/Sales Gallery is located next to SAM downtown at 1334 1st Avenue, Suite #140.

REFERENCE LIBRARIES

The libraries of the Seattle Art Museum and the Seattle Asian Art Museum together gained 532 titles; both libraries now contain a total of 18,108 volumes. The acquisition highlight of the year was the purchase of *Dictionary of Art*, a 34-volume, highly acclaimed set that has already become invaluable to our users. This purchase was made possible by a bequest from Hilda Barnard, a former museum docent and Professor of Romance Languages at the University of Washington.

In addition, The Dorothy Stimson Bullitt Library in our downtown museum was fortunate to receive books on the decorative arts as part of the Guendolen Carkeek Plestcheeff Endowment for the Decorative Arts. Other gifts were received from Charles Andonian, Jane Lang Davis, GGLO, Elliot Mittler, Ruth Nutt, Patterson Sims and Katy Homans, and the West Seattle Art Club. The Decorative Arts and Paintings Council contributed 11 titles, including gifts in memory of John Robinson, Suzanne Ries, and Jayne Wrightsman Hill, and books in honor of Chiyo Ishikawa, Julie Emerson, Susan Garcia, Muriel Baxter, Ruth Eller, Mary Lou Everett and Neva Wiseman.

The McCaw Foundation Library of Asian Art at SAAM was again the recipient of a generous gift from an anonymous donor, which makes it possible to keep the library open three afternoons each week and to acquire books in Asian languages as well as in English. A new set of books on Chinese ceramics was donated by the Asian Art Council in memory of Dorothy C. Malone. The library also received a grant from the Metropolitan Center for Far Eastern Art Studies in Kyoto, Japan, for the purchase of *Meiji no Takara*, a publication in eight volumes.


TECHNOLOGY

This year SAM accelerated its creative use of technology to further open the museum to the community. Our vision is to bring the collections directly into homes and schools electronically, thus educating new audiences and encouraging them to visit the museum. Included in the plans are an educational Web site, interactive computer stations located in exhibition galleries, and access to digitized images of our art collections over the Internet.

Steps taken this year include:

- ~ The Teacher Resource Center opened in January 1997, boasting state-of-the-art computers, each with Internet access. Teachers can now access the Internet for educational resources, create lesson plans and print images using a color laser printer.
- ~ Our first Web site was launched this spring. ArtStart, an educational site for teachers and students, offers special materials on the museum's Northwest Coast Native American art collection.
- ~ We received a grant from the Benton Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts to become one of 10 national mentor-training sites for artists and arts organizations. The purpose of the grant is to teach Web-producing skills to artists and organizations, ultimately increasing the presence of the arts on the Internet.

We are indebted to The Boeing Company for the loan of three systems executives who, over the course of three months, evaluated the museum's current capabilities and developed a comprehensive plan to reach our vision. Generous funds from the Seattle Foundation, the King County Arts Commission Hotel/Motel Tax Revenues, and the Norman Archibald Charitable Foundation are purchasing the necessary hardware to get the project under way. DEVELOPMENT

There exists a unique partnership at SAM — one which consists of more than 22,000 individual donors and members together with corporations, foundations and government agencies — whose extraordinary generosity provided a solid base of financial support for SAM this past year. It is with much gratitude that we celebrate this partnership and applied the generosity of our many donors.

ENDOWMENT

In order to secure the museum's financial future, the Endowment Committee of the Board of Trustees, under the dedicated leadership of Chair Faye Sarkowsky, and Vice Chair Virginia Wright, has launched A Legacy for Art: The Century Endowment. With a goal of raising \$30 million, this endowment campaign will effectively double our existing endowment by the end of the year 2000.

Our priorities for endowment funding include: curatorial and key leadership positions; outreach efforts such as Free Days and Senior Days; the Teacher Resource Center and related education programs; enhancements for our docents and volunteers; technology; conservation; and art exhibition and acquisition funds. A special component of this effort will fund the Seattle Asian Art Museum. Naming opportunities and special recognition benefits are available for campaign donors.

The hallmark of The Century Endowment campaign is Percent for Art. This unique feature dictates that a full 15% of every gift will be placed into a special art acquisition endowment fund, generating approximately \$5 million in endowment funds dedicated to art purchases. By purchasing new works of art on an ongoing basis, we will be able to fill crucial gaps, enrich our holdings in new areas and continue to grow in stature.

While the Seattle Art Museum is fortunate to have a sound financial foundation, we recognize that endowment funds provide the stable and constant income stream that will enable us to innovatively plan for the future.

As we begin this fundraising effort, we know that The Century Endowment will be a lasting legacy for the museum. The work we do now will ensure that future generations will know the joy of art.

SEATTLE ART MUSEUM SUPPORTERS (SAMS)

FACILITIES MARKETING

During our second year of expanded operations at both facilities, more than 39,000 friends attended 311 private events scheduled at the downtown and Volunteer Park buildings. These events contributed more than \$204,000 to museum operating funds.



FINANCIAL REPORT

FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1997

The museum achieved a \$12,000 operating surplus while undertaking new education programs and increasing endowment by over \$3 million.


Total operating support, including downtown and Volunteer Park museums, museum store and café, ancillary groups and restricted fund activity, increased by \$95,000 this year to a total of \$9,664,000. Strong support of the museum's endowment program resulted in investment income increasing by 15%, up \$248,000 this year. Foundation support, including grants for *Growing Up with Art*, increased by 52%, up \$79,000. These increases helped offset the decline in government funding, which dropped 19%, or \$91,000, this year.

Total operating expense increased by 5%, or \$442,000, to \$9,652,000 this year. Programs and Education expense increased by \$451,000. The museum opened the Teacher Resource Center and initiated its *Growing Up with Art* collaboration with Seattle schools. The museum's docents hosted the National Docent Symposium in Seattle. Increased services and last year's extraordinary fundraising success resulted in the decrease from last year's exceptional \$360,000 surplus. The museum's excess of revenue over support was \$12,000 this year. In addition, the museum paid over \$50,000 in principal on notes payable, and enabled the Museum Development Authority of Seattle to reduce its bond debt by \$465,000.


Continued growth of the museum's endowment sustains growth in our services. Investments for the benefit of the museum (both museum endowment and outside trusts) now total \$35 million, an increase of approximately \$5 million this year in the investment balances. Pledges due in future years bring the total endowment balance to \$37 million. Investment income totaling \$1,938,000 this year was critical to our success.
