## Working Girl Randy Graff

From Staten Island to City of Angels

Born in Brooklyn, she was a resident of Canarsie until she was 15, at which time she moved with her family to Staten Island. No, we're not talking about Tess McGill, the woman Melanie Griffith made famous in *Working Girl*. This is Randy Graff who is doing double duty as Miss Oolie, secretary to Stone, and Donna, mistress of Stine, in *City of Angels*.

Graff comes from a musical family. "But," she notes, "I was the Graff who resisted music. When I was 10, my mother tried to make me continue taking piano, and I told her, 'No, I want to be a serious actress—like Mary Tyler Moore.'" And lest anyone think that she's referring to La Moore's *Ordinary People* blue-period, Graff clears that up: "I meant as *Laura Petrie* on *The Dick Van Dyke Show*. That was real acting to me."

Graff joined the high school drama club and "dabbled" until she saw a production of *The Roar of the Greasepaint* at Wagner; a college on her native Staten Island. "The show was so beautiful," she says in a still-awed voice—which will come as no surprise to those familiar with Lowell Matson's legendary productions; the professor would exactly replicate the original staging, costumes, and lighting of classic Broadway musicals. "After seeing it," Graff reports, "I had to go to school there."

She did—and landed Joanne in *Company*, and Joan in *Dames at Sea*. After graduation, she, like Tess McGill, took the ferry to become a *Working Girl*—not in New York, but in North Carolina "where I sang 'Nobody Does It Like Me' from *Seesaw* to get a job in non-equity dinner theater—Louise in *Gypsy*. I had to do my strip quick-changes during a blackout in front of a rambunctious audience, but," she smiles, "I was 21 and making \$100 a week. I did the whole dinner theater non-equity circuit. I didn't have an agent, so I went to open calls and hung around waiting to sing eight bars of music" The *Working Girl* stops and smiles. "Yeah, the same famous old-fashioned-struggle story."

Then the chance came to move up a bit on the theatrical food chain: "Vinny Liff [of Johnson-Liff-Zerman Casting] called me to audition to understudy five roles in a tour of *Grease*."

Tess McGill's lack of the right business school couldn't sink her, nor could Graff's not having a "Yale Connection." After all, she had

## Ed Waller Named Alumni Director

**E**d Waller, a seasoned administrator with 16 years' experience, has been named Wagner's Director of Alumni Affairs. He began his duties July 1.

He will be responsible for all aspects of the College's alumni affairs program in-

cluding formation of a new National Alumni Association Board of Directors; operation of a network of class agents for news, reunions, student recruitment and development; identification and recruitment of other volunteers; and the establishment of regional chapters. He will also manage all on and off campus alumni events, such as Homecoming; and coordinate publication of the LINK.

A native of Washington, D. C., Waller has lived around the country and travelled around the world. Most of his journeys have been with the U. S. Navy in his capacity as a Naval Reserve public affairs officer. Awarded the Navy Achievement Medal last September, Waller was recently selected to the rank of Commander.

He is a member of the Navy Office of Information unit in Manhattan.

He earned a BA in speech from William Jewell College, Liberty, MO, in 1968 and an MS degree in Educational Administration from the University of Southern California while serving five years active duty with the Navy. He returned to William Jewell as Director of Alumni Services and Public Relations in 1974. His grandmother was one of the first ten women to be admitted to William Jewell in 1917. "That's where I developed my interest in alumni affairs," Waller recalled.

He and his wife, Leila, whom he met while stationed with the Navy at a NATO command in Belgium, then moved on to

the University of Iowa where he served two years as Assistant Director of the Alumni Association.

Hired by Memphis State University in 1979 as Executive Director of the MSU National Alumni Association, Waller led that program to win the Citation Award for "Improvement in Alumni Relations" from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), Washington, D. C. He was subsequently selected by CASE as one of eight alumni professionals nationwide to serve on the faculty of the CASE Summer Institute.

Waller had served as Director of Alumni Affairs at the tri-campus system of Fairleigh Dickinson University since November, 1986.

## Seahawk '90 - 'The Challenge' Ahead

Head Coach Walt Hameline speaks of "the challenge" the Seahawks are certain to encounter during the 1990 season.

The challenge of returning to postseason play after a rare absence last year. The challenge of competing against as tough a Division III schedule as you'll find. The challenge of attacking the '90's at the same level which made the Seahawks so successful in the '80's. In addition to, the challenge for the head coach himself to become Wagner's winningest football coach (a feat to be completed with the team's second 1990 victory).

The schedule includes four teams that went to the NCAA's in the 1980's (Montclair St., Alfred, Salisbury St., and Hofstra), and four new opponents (Ramapo, Salisbury St., Montclair St., and Glassboro St.). Sixty-five lettermen return from last season's 6-3 squad, a team which was at one time 5-0 and ranked number one in the nation.

The Seahawks traveled to Copenhagen and became the first American Football Team to ever play in Denmark. They went on to win 51-0 in front of 1,300 Danish spectators.

"It was a great educational experience for our players," said Hameline. "Denmark was the perfect setting to present American football while experiencing European culture first hand." It was also an opportunity to take a look at the team that will be on the field during the 1990 college football season - a season which depends on how successful the Seahawks are in meeting "the challenge".

The Staten Island chapter welcomes Ed Waller, who recently joined Wagner as the Director of Alumni Affairs, and looks forward to closely working with him.

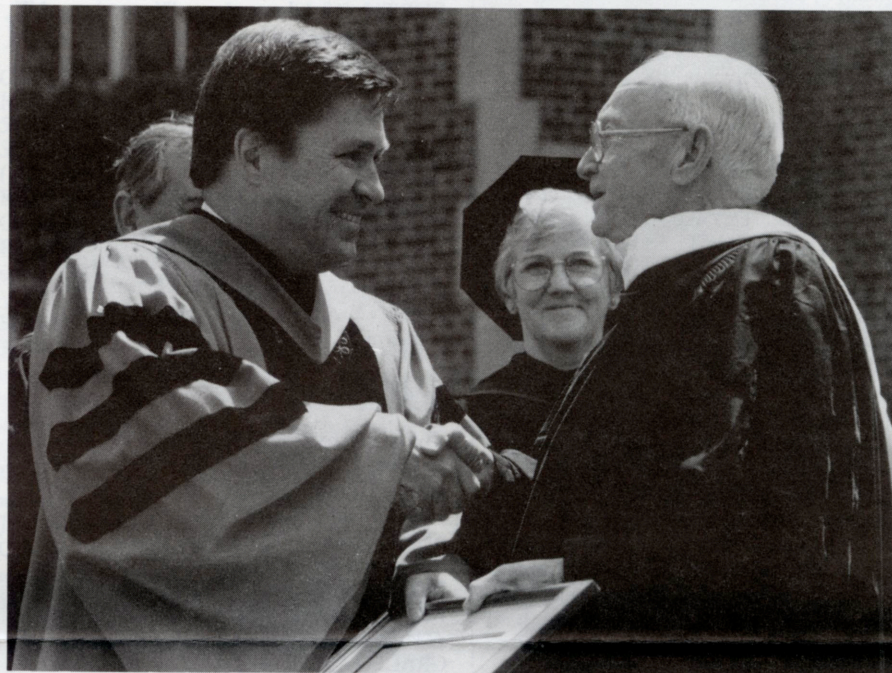

what henceforth might be called "the Wagner Way." "A lot of people I worked with in college helped me get started," Graff says, including Milton Lyon, who'd guest-directed her in *Jacques Brel*. "When I heard he was doing *Pins and Needles* at Roundabout, yup, I called him up and asked," she adopts a mock voice to hide the embarrassment she still feels "can I try out for your play?"

She got the "Chain Store Daisy" role and an agent. When she was asked to understudy *Grease* again, it was on Broadway. And so it went for the Working Girl: stints in the fondly remembered *A...My Name Is Alice* and the less-fondly remembered *Sarava*. Out-of-town gigs included *Fiorello* "where I played the faithful devoted secretary who pines for her boss and gets him only because his wife dies."

Then she heard "I Dreamed a Dream" on the London Cast Album of *Les Miserables*, and said to herself, "I have to be seen for this." She was; twice. "This time, I was able to hire an accompanist," she says with a victorious smile. But when she left to do Tzeitel in *Fiddler* in Pittsburgh Civic Light Opera, she still hadn't heard whether she'd gotten Fantine "not until the afternoon of *Fiddler's* opening night, in the middle of an orchestra rehearsal, when I got a message: 'Call Vinny Liff and Andy Zerman.' And," she smiles, "I knew they weren't calling me to tell me I didn't have it." A sigh. "When I got off the call, I screamed and disrupted the whole rehearsal," she says, putting her hands over her face to hide the embarrassment.

Of course nobody looks a gift hit in the mouth, but Graff admits that playing the doomed Fantine night after night turned out

to be "emotionally exhausting." But it got her one of the great American dreams: an appearance on *The Tonight Show*—"where for once I got to sing in front of a microphone wearing a pretty dress. And," she beams, high as Tess McGill in her new office, "it was even on a night Johnny was on. I got to talk and sing—and talk again—with him."

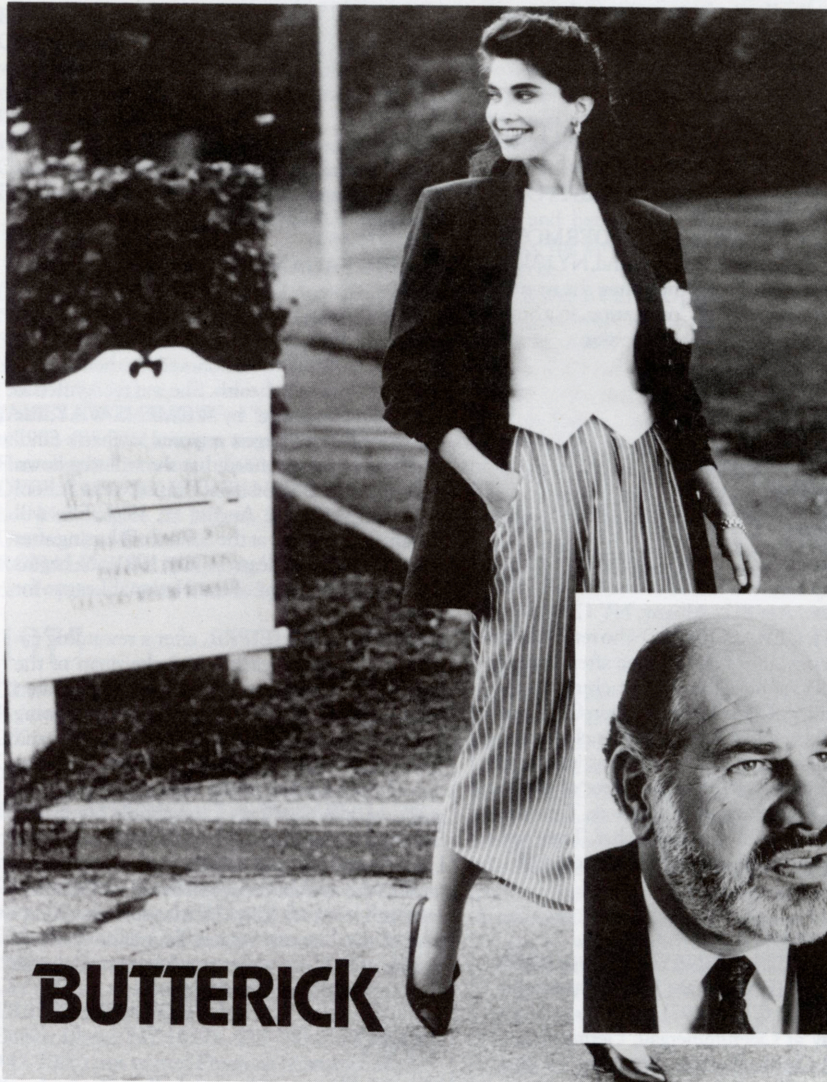
After *Les Miz*, she went to La Jolla to play Nellie Bly in *80 Days*. Then, on her first trip to L.A., she even managed to get cast on a pilot—the aired-but-not-picked-up *Ed Begley, Jr. Show*. "I played Ed's wisecracking sister-in-law Marlene, who was not unlike Miss Oolie."

Which brings us to *City of Angels*. This time it only took one callback before getting cast. "And from reading it, I liked that I was Miss Oolie when I turned the lights out to sleep, and then popped up as Donna. And I liked the lyrics, but I didn't hear my songs 'til the first day of rehearsal. It wasn't until I ran into [lyricist] David Zippel at City Opera that he told me, 'We've written you a show-stopping number.'"

He was right. Nightly she sings, "You Can Always Count on Me" which she calls "the musical comedy song in the show that really 'goes for it.' Cy told me his prototype was 'Nobody Does It Like Me,'" she smiles, thinking back on how her career began. "And I love playing those fast-paced comedy scenes in the movie sections," she says.

So, with two major Broadway shows on her resume, does Randy Graff feel like Laura Petrie at last? "I don't know about that, but I do now take the same exercise class as Mary Tyler Moore."

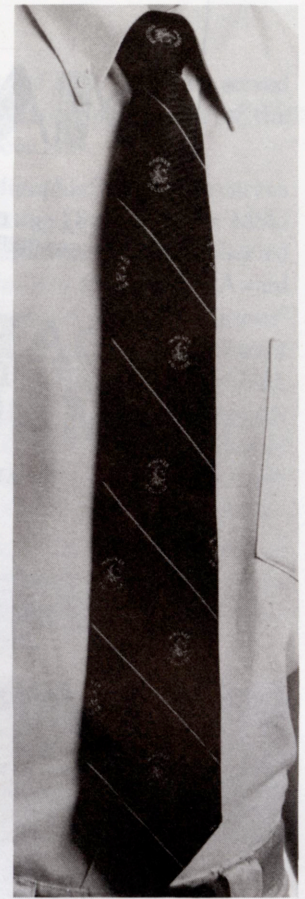
