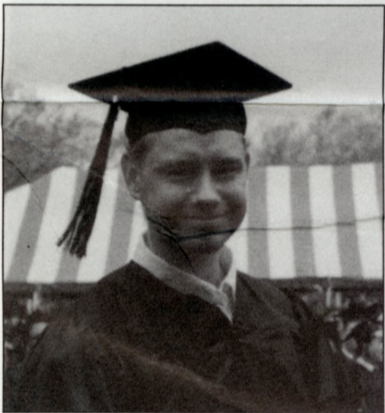

The honorary title of Doctor of Laws was conferred on Speaker Pro Tempore of the State Assembly, Elizabeth Connelly. One of New York State's most distinguished public servants, Dr. Connelly is the longest serving woman in the history of the New York State Legislature and the highest

Reunion Day 1996

'46 grads share the spotlight

Reunion Day 1996 may not be remembered for its sunny skies, but it will certainly be remembered for its festive and lively spirit. Over 200 alumni from as far back as the class of 1929 came together on May 18th on the Wagner campus to celebrate, reminisce, renew friendships and form new ones.

The day began with coffee and chit-chat during registration. The air was filled with, "You haven't changed a bit.", "Has it really been that long?", and more than a few, "Do you remember when's." The morning continued with a panel discussion with a number of the College's Senior Officers. Alumni were pleased to have their questions answered on the spot and even more pleased to hear all the good news on the College's academic standards and the recent and ongoing improvements to the physical plant.

The luncheon was a highlight for the Class of 1946, who were recognized and honored on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of their graduation. Special recognition was given to the Nursing Class of '46. They were the first class of nurses to graduate from Wagner and were at the forefront of what has become one of Wagner's most respected programs. Also given special recognition, was Henry Pape, '36, who received a certificate during the luncheon, presented by Wagner Trustee, Al Corbin '35, in recognition of his 60th anniversary.

The afternoon was a time for class photos, tours of the campus and catching up on old times. The College provided a shuttle bus for those who wanted to return to their hotel and prepare for the evening festivities . . . or just to rest.

And rest they needed. By five

o'clock the evening was under way with a delightful cocktail party on Trautmann Square hosted by President Norman Smith. Chairman of the Board of Trustees and Wagner Class of 1949, Donald Spiro, was on hand to greet alumni and to encourage their participation in the future of their alma mater.

But the evening did not end there. As more alumni arrived, dressed to party, the Wagner College Jazz Ensemble kicked into gear in the main dining hall, and the dinner dance got under way.

Led by director, Dr. Robert Delfausse, the band launched into some of the best of the big band era.

While some were cautious at first, it didn't take long before the dance floor was filled with twirling skirts and tapping feet. The melodic sounds of vocalist Sarah Shappert '97, held the attention of even the hardest critic, as she expertly wove a spell throughout the dimly lit hall.

The sparkling Verrazano Bridge, the candlelit tables and the sounds of music and laughter served as a fitting backdrop as the day's festivities came to a close.

A day filled with reminiscing, and a night filled with new memories.

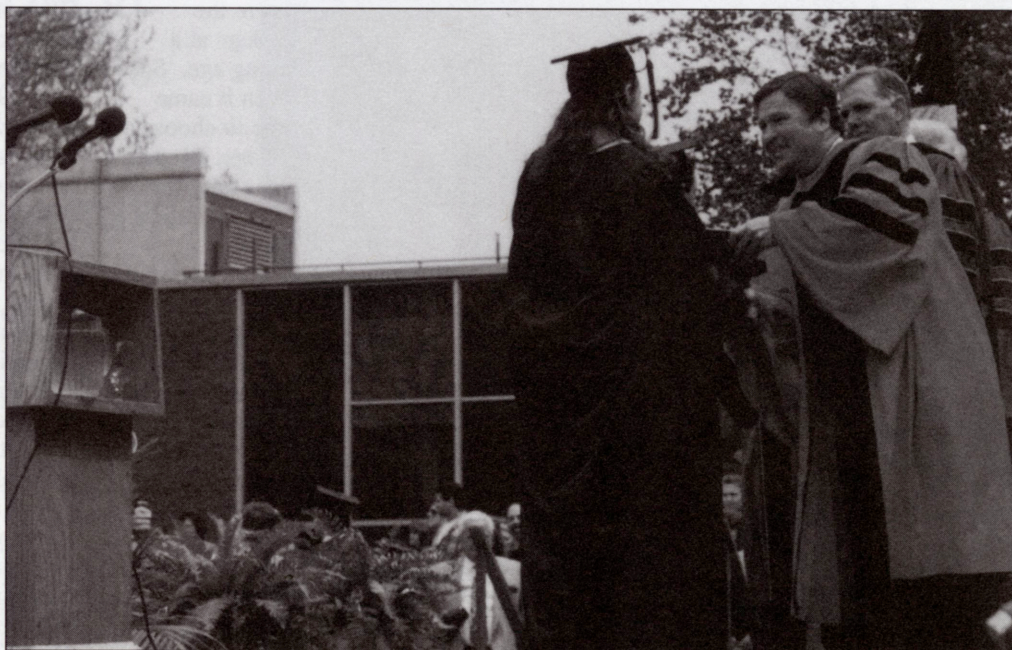

ranking woman in the history of the State Assembly.

Dr. James E. Sudbrock was the recipient of an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. A servant of the church, Dr. Sudbrock's career has been devoted to the Lutheran ministry and the tradition on which Wagner College was founded. He is presently the Bishop of the Metropolitan New York Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, presiding over 233 congregations with a combined membership of 95,000 persons.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was bestowed on Dr. Raymond L. Flynn, United States Ambassador to the Vatican. One of Boston's most accomplished and popular mayors for nearly a decade, Dr. Flynn has represented our country in Vatican City since 1993, emerging in a broader role to represent President Clinton in many of the most

troubled spots around the world. As Mayor of Boston, he won the respect and admiration of mayors throughout the country becoming a national advocate for solving many urban problems including homelessness and civil rights.

CEO of Credit Suisse, North America

Bob O'Brien feels fortunate to have held the type of positions in the banking industry that have enabled him to have an influence, not only in business, but in the community and with various charitable groups. "I believe that I have been able to make a difference," says the Chief Executive Officer of Credit Suisse - North America and current Wagner College trustee. Driven by that same attitude, Bob has made a profound impact on the success of Wagner College.

Since March 1996, he has been in charge of Credit Suisse's North American operations, having joined the company from CS First Boston where he was the Managing Director in the leveraged finance group since June 1994. During his time at CS First Boston, Bob collaborated closely with Credit Suisse on many projects. Prior to joining CS First Boston, he was a Senior Managing Director and member of the Management Committee of Banking and Corporate Finance at Chemical Bank with direct responsibility for the Corporate Banking Division.

Bob's involvement with Wagner runs deep. As a member of the Board of Trustees, he serves as the head of the Trustee Development

Committee. Bob has also participated in various Wagner College functions, including admissions open houses for prospective students. Reflections on his Wagner experience at these events has added a real, personal touch to the day which is appreciated by those trying to make their college decision.

Bob's decision to attend Wagner was based on the College's reputation and the commute. A resident of Staten Island, at the time, Bob was able to continue his job at St. Michael's Home and help finance his education. Upon entering Wagner, Bob wasn't sure what to major in, but he soon found his niche: "Like most kids I did not have a clue, but selected Business Administration because I knew that some day I would have to make a living. This, together with the liberal arts foundation, provided an excellent combination of disciplines."

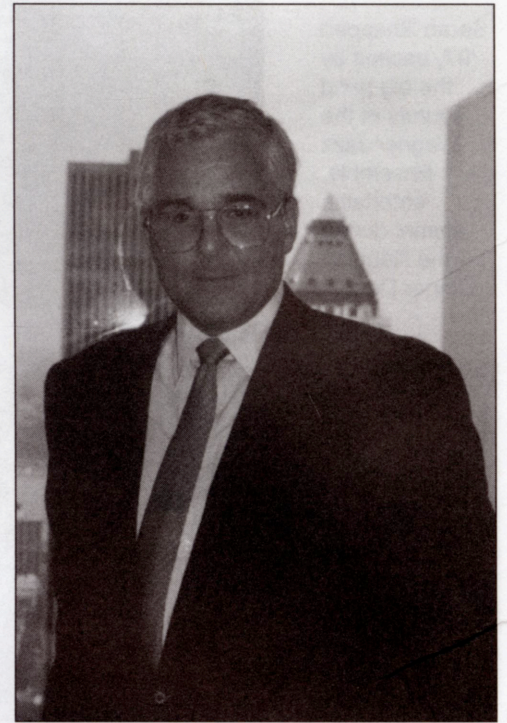
Bob truly feels that his overall Wagner experience was quality throughout, and like many fellow alumni who majored in business administration, was particularly fond of Professor Charlie Kraemer. "He gave us all a sense of reality," says Bob. When asked if he has had a chance to "use" his degree, Bob responds "every day," and feels very strongly about it:

"Wagner provided me with a solid foundation as good as the best schools in the country. Over the years I have worked with a wide variety of talented individuals in many situations, and I believe that I had equal or better academic and professional skills."

Throughout his career, those skills have been put to the test as Bob has served in a variety of positions within the banking industry. He began at Bankers Trust where he last served as co-head of Merchant Banking and as a member of the department's Management and Underwriting Committee. For a number of years Bob was responsible for the New York based Structure Finance Group, which was one of the leading advisors and providers of financing for leveraged buyouts and acquisition financing. Bob organized the \$25 billion leveraged-buyout of RJR Nabisco, the largest one in history and the inspiration for the book and movie "Barbarians at the Gate."

On the personal side, Bob has "a great wife and three wonderful daughters who are beginning to achieve their own success in their chosen fields." They certainly don't have to look far for a role model.

Bob is also a role model for today's Wagner students. He



believes in them and the Wagner experience: "Wagner is clearly on the move. With Norman Smith's direction, it will rival the best liberal arts schools in the nation." When asked to sum up how he feels about Wagner Bob replies: "To the graduates of Wagner - remember it and support it. To the present student body - enjoy it. To anyone looking for a great college experience - think of Wagner!"

Louise Repage Kaufman '75

Vice President, Warner-Lambert

Lifelong resident of Staten Island, Louise Repage Kaufman admits to being in awe of her alma mater as a child. Growing up "just down the street", Louise remembers endless hours watching the football team practice. With the Wagner campus as her playground, she developed strong ties to the College at a young age. So, when it came time to choose a college, Wagner was really the only natural choice.



With hopes of a veterinary career, Louise majored in Biology. Some of her fondest memories are of classes with the late Dr. Dale Yarns. "He always made the

class interesting", recalls Louise.

"Although", she adds with a grin, "some of the experiments were a little wild!"

So how does a Biology major come to be Vice President at Warner-Lambert, Co.? According to Louise, the biology degree, together with work experience in a veterinary hospital got her a position at Merck & Co. in the veterinary division. Add to that an MS in microbiology, also from Wagner, and an MBA from St. John's and you have the solid background which prepared her for the many positions she has since held

in the pharmaceutical industry.

Over the years, Louise has moved from working in the purely scientific area to the more administrative. Leaving Merck in 1985 as a manager in International Regulatory affairs, Louise went to work for Warner-Lambert as Director and then Senior Director of International Regulatory Affairs. Here she worked with leading DRA officials from countries such as Italy, Sweden and the UK in major international agencies.

In 1992, Louise became Senior Director for Government Affairs, International, where she established policies for international issues as they related to the pharmaceutical sector in Warner-Lambert, including pricing, trade and healthcare.

At the same time, Louise was doing double duty on a special assignment. As a senior member of Warner-Lambert's Compliance Task Force, she had specific assignments, including coordinating methods of development and validation; development and execution of action plans for medically needed products; and centralization of standard operating procedure at the corporate and facility levels. Louise was also instrumental in assuring that certification regarding facilities, products, analysts, etc., were achieved on a timely basis. All this while handling the headaches in the international arena.

Since May of 1995, Louise has been wearing a new hat. It doesn't come with any less pressure, and it still keeps her out of town every other week. As Vice President, Compliance Task Force, Louise reports directly to the President and Chief Operating Officer of Warner-Lambert, Co. She has the responsibility to manage in a matrix environment, the activities of the Line management in areas of manufactur-

ing and quality assurance, in order to assure that FDA requirements are met. "I have worked on over twenty new pharmaceuticals which have come to market. These lifesaving products have brought new hope to patients with heart disease, Alzheimer disease and other conditions." Says Louise, "It has been satisfying to be a part of an industry that makes such contributions to the health and welfare of people around the world."

Commenting on the contributions Wagner is making in the field of higher education, Louise remarked, "... the College has made great strides since the 1980's. The image of Wagner has really been turned around in the last five to seven years. People are more aware of the Wagner name. I would however, like to see greater participation on the part of other alumni. I look around at the personal and professional achievements of so many of our alumni and don't understand why they won't share their success or knowledge with their alma mater."

Louise is doing her part. As a member of the National Alumni Association Board of Directors, she chairs the Nominating Committee which just recently chose Harold Theurer as the new NAA Board President. She also lends her professional expertise to the Career Development Office, and along with her husband, Peter, shows support as a member of the college's prestigious Inner Circle.

As a professional and a Wagner alumna, Louise Repage Kaufman has found ways to say thank you to her alma mater and to help insure the future of a Wagner College education for the next generation of students.

No stranger to Wagner College, **Ms. Angela Apuzzo** received her B.S. and M.S. in Nursing here. A member of the staff, Angela has been the Head of the Nursing Resource Center, but this year joins the faculty as an Instructor in the Nursing Department.

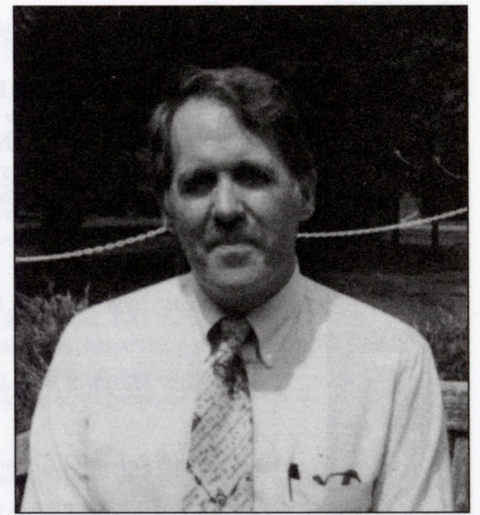

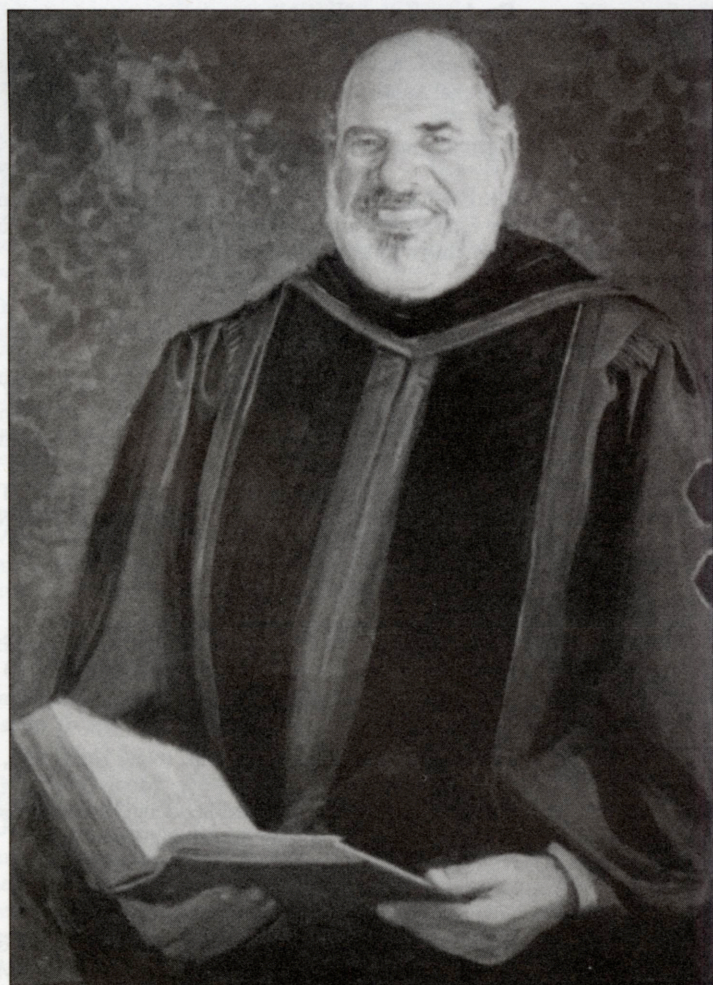

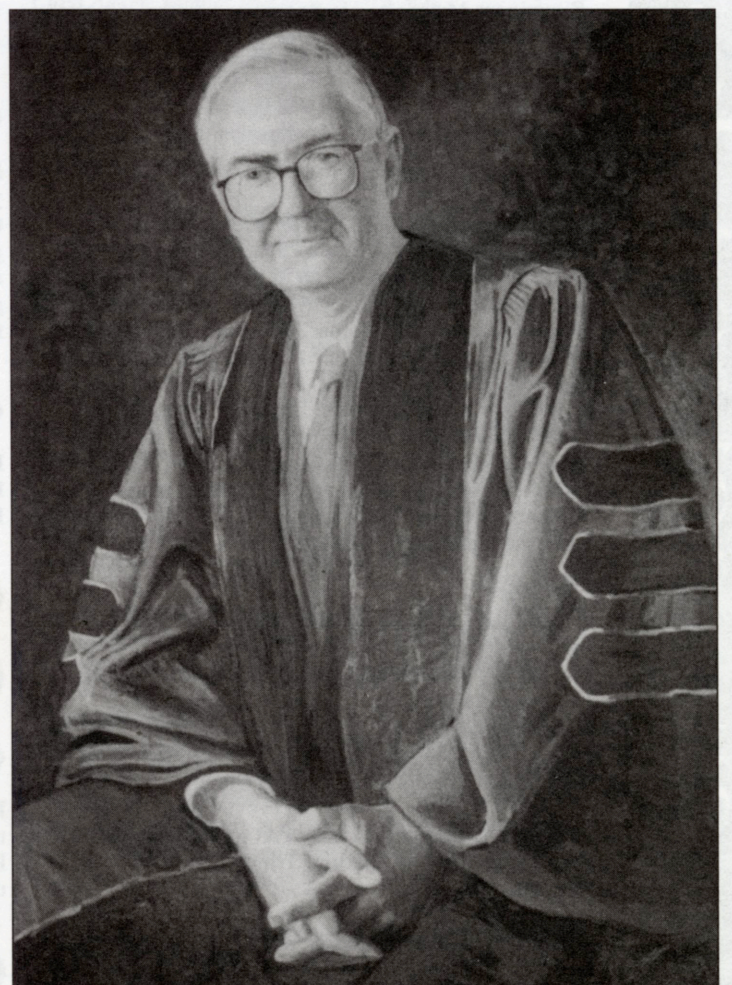

Wagner remembers four friends

Dr. L. Philip Qualben, '51, pastor and psychologist

Philip Qualben, former Director of Psychological Services and member of the class of 1951, died August 18, 1996 in Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, Manhattan.



Born in Minnesota, Dr. Qualben came to Staten Island in 1934 and to Wagner in 1947 where he received a bachelor's degree in English.

His education continued at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, where Dr. Qualben received his degree in theology.

He pursued and completed his Ph.D in clinical psychology at Wayne State in Detroit, and in 1965 was employed as chief psychologist for mental health at the Lutheran Medical

Center in Brooklyn. In 1968 he returned to Wagner College as the Director of Psychological Services, retiring only last year.

An excellent athlete, Dr. Qualben received the Staten Island Varsity Club award as outstanding high school athlete of the year upon his

graduation from Port Richmond in 1947. He played baseball, basketball and football at Wagner, and was a member of the team that won the metropolitan championship in baseball. His passion and excellence in the sport later took him to a four year stint with the Cleveland Indians minor league team.

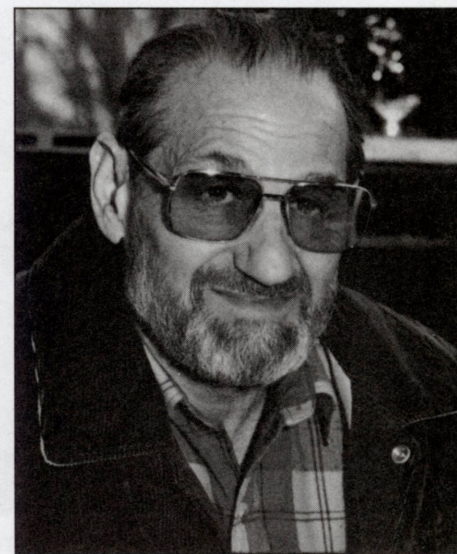
In addition to his work in the psychological field, Dr. Qualben also served his Lutheran ministry in parishes in Hibernia, New Jersey and Detroit, Michigan.

He was a consultant to the Eger Health Center on Staten Island and the Norwegian Christian Home and Health Center in Brooklyn. He worked with the church in examining and evaluating overseas missionary candidates for the Board of World Missions for the ELCA as well as for the Metropolitan New York Synod of the ELCA.

Dr. Philip Qualben was the 1970 recipient of the Wagner College Alumni Achievement Award and a recent nominee to the Athletic Hall of Fame.

His love for Wagner College was evident in the way in which he tendered his resignation last year.

He submitted it on Valentines's Day saying, ". . . it is just a hint of how I feel about Wagner and the good years I have spent here."



Professor William Horn, '52, retired math professor and sports enthusiast

Bill Horn, affectionately known by students and colleagues alike as Chief, died Thursday, July 11th following a long illness.

Born in Queens, Prof. Horn came to Staten Island in 1937, and as many knew, lived only a block from the campus since 1958. A Professor of mathematics for 29 years, "Chief" retired from teaching in 1983, but not from Wagner life. He could always be found, "making the rounds" in the dining hall during breakfast or lunch. His quick wit and bad jokes endeared him to the students who welcomed him to their tables.

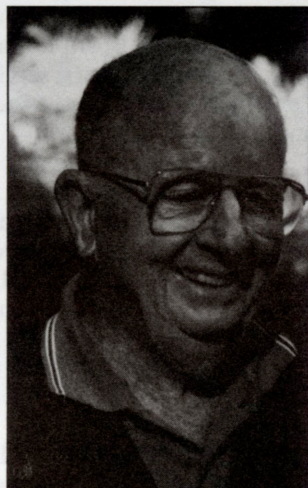
While a teacher at Wagner, Prof. Horn received the Omicron Delta Kappa Honor Society Faculty Award for his academic achievements and devotion to students. He was also the recipient of the Alumni Achievement Award for Service and the George A. Giesemann Appreciation Award.

One of Chief's greatest loves was sports, particularly hockey. He founded the Wagner College Hockey Club 25 years ago, and was on hand this past March as the club celebrated its silver anniversary. At the dinner celebration held on campus, Chief was awarded a very special honor by his former students and players. With family and friends in attendance, he was inducted into the first ever, Wagner College Hockey Hall of Fame. It was an honor, long overdue and well deserved.

A familiar figure at other Wagner sporting events, Bill Horn could always be found with his finger on the button at basketball, football and volleyball games. If the clock was running, Chief was behind it. Professor William Horn's contributions to Wagner College as alumnus, faculty, mentor and friend leave a lasting impression on more than one generation of Wagner students.

Herbert E. Sutter, '31, Wagner's first Athletic Director

Member of the class of 1931 and the first Athletic Director at Wagner College, Herb Sutter passed away on May 10 following a brief illness.



A native to Staten Island, Herb was the son of the late Rev. Dr. Frederic Sutter, for whom the Sutter Gymnasium is named.

Mr. Sutter was the athletic director at Wagner for more than 40 years. He

coached the basketball team for 27 of those years, earning a record of 349 wins and 251 losses. Herb also coached the baseball and golf teams during his tenure at the College.

Wagner and the Sutter

name have become synonymous over the years. Mr. Sutter was part of a family, who, to this day, put a strong emphasis on quality liberal arts education. His daughter, Joan Scialla is a member of the class of 1959, and his brother, Rev. Dr. Carl Sutter, a member of the Class of 1929, still sits on the College's Board of Trustees.

Herb was well liked and well respected by students, alumni and peers. That respect earned him the title "emeritus" in 1975, as well the honor of being nominated the first inductee into the Wagner College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1988.

In honor of Herb Sutter, a fund is presently being set up at the College in his name. Those who would like more information regarding the Herbert E. Sutter memorial fund may contact the Alumni or Development Offices.
