HORRMANN LIBRARY OPEN FOR BUSINESS

Four years of concentrated effort were culminated on Saturday, September 30th when Wagner's magnificent Horrmann Library was officially dedicated.

With the dedication of the library the first step in Wagner's 20 year development program has been completed. The architectural firm of Perkins and Will envisions the building as one of the elements of a central academic quadrangle that will ultimately consist of the Horrmann Library, the Main building, the Sutter Gymnasium, a chapel, a hall of science and a student and conference center.

The library, constructed at a cost in excess of \$1,000,000 has space to house 90,000 volumes. Aside from the spacious stack area the building contains lecture, conference, and browsing rooms; storage and display area for church archives and Wagneriana; and carrels for individual study and reflection.

From an architectural point of view the building is designed to have complete flexibility for interchange of bookstacks, furniture and partitions.

HONORARY DEGREES

As part of the dedication program Wagner saluted the conspicuous contributions of the American book publishing industry by conferring honorary degrees upon three American book publishers.

The honorary degree, Doctor of Humane Letters, was conferred upon Mr. Cass Canfield, chairman of the editorial board and the executive committee of Harper and Brothers; Mr. Storer B. Lunt, chairman of the board of W. W. Norton and Company and president of the American Book Publishing Council; and Mr. Victor Weybright, chairman of the board and editor in chief of the New American Library of World Literature. This is the first time that three eminent publishers have been so honored simultaneously by a liberal arts college.

In a challenging article in the June issue of the Link, attorney Thomas Russo '49 compared present day politics with American politics of the Revolutionary War era. Our era came out second best.

After recalling that the generation of the founding fathers produced the federal system, the constitutional convention and a written constitution, among other innovations, Mr. Russo commented, bitingly:

"What has the 20th century invented, or perfected in the realm of politics? Virtually nothing."

I should like to come to the defense of 20th century man.

First, I want to make it clear that I, too, have the highest admiration for those brave, forward-looking, high-thinking men who founded our nation and bequeathed us a form (and spirit) of government that has withstood the vicissitudes of the years. These men wrought well, with great imagination.

But bravery in the political sense, political imagination and high-thinking did not die with the 18th century. All these attributes of greatness still live on in the 20th century.

They lived, for example, in Woodrow Wilson, who in his famous "14 points" enunciated the doctrine of self-determination for all peoples. We are seeing the fruit of this unprecedented doctrine today as more and more colonial areas become independent nations.

In the same message to Congress in which he enunciated this doctrine President Wilson also recommended the formation of a League of Nations. Such

A DEFENSE OF 20th CENTURY MAN

a league was formed. True, the League of Nations has not survived, but it was mankind's first great attempt to bring order out of the chaos of international relations (certainly a unique, forward-looking, imaginative, politically brave action) and the League has been reborn in its spiritual successor, the United Nations.

Future generations may look back on the 20th century as the era in which the world began to solve its international problems. We not only have the United Nations but we also have cooperative international bodies such as the Organization of American States and the even more far-reaching European Economic Community, more commonly called the Common Market.

There are even forward-looking men in many countries who envision the day when the nations of the world will be joined in a true federation — an extension of our federal government to the world at large. In this country they are organized as the United World Federalists.

What else has 20th century man invented in the realm of politics?

Gandhi, a skinny little man in a loin cloth in India, developed the technique of satyagraha — commonly, but not quite accurately, referred to as passive resistance. By first lifting up his people spiritually, then training them never to fight back, he defeated the mighty British raj with his program of civil disobedience and won independence for his people.

Gandhi's method of gaining a political end — of winning a revolution without resort to arms — was a completely new political innovation. It is now being successfully used by American Negroes in their fight for equality in the South.

The 20th century also produced a great social revolution under Franklin D. Roosevelt. As a result of his efforts, the nation's wealth is more evenly distributed and poverty and hunger are no longer the great fears of the less fortunate. The Social Security Law alone is a fitting monument to 20th century man.

Mr. Russo quite properly deplores the sources of much of our current patriotism — its nourishment on fear and suspicion — but this is only the patriotism of the little man. Our forefathers had little men to contend with, too. But the men of vision triumphed then and, somehow, I have confidence that the men of vision of the 20th century will triumph also.

OF L. A. DREYFUS CO.

1961 SEAHAWK CLUB

The Wagner College Seahawk Club, now in its second season of operation, is planning another banner year, according to club president Ed Monkman '58. It is the organization's aim to interest at least 200 alumni and friends of Wagner in the season ticket plan for home football games.

Many special privileges, such as reserved seats at mid-field for the four home games, reserved parking, postgame coffee hours, weekly bulletins, and a post-season banquet, will be offered to members. Considering the many benefits, the club fee is quite nominal. An individual membership costs \$10 for the season. Two adults may purchase membership for \$15 and children's membership will cost \$3. Cards are transferable and guests may accompany club members, but must pay the general admission price.

In Memorium

VINCENZA MATTIACE

George A. Giesemann, an associate professor of history at Wagner died of heat prostration in his home last June 14th. He was 51 years old.

Mr. Geisemann was associated with the history department of Wagner College for 14 years.

Before coming to Wagner he was an instructor at New York University. During World War II he instructed Army officers at the United States Army Transportation School in Louisiana, and served as Port Historian for the U. S. Army Port of Embarkation, publishing a manual, "Organization of Ports of Embarkation," for the U. S. Transportation Corps.

Mr. Giesemann received his A.B. degree from Columbia University in 1933 and his M.A. degree from New York University in 1939.

He was active in the Foreign Policy Association; The American Association for the United Nations; the Citizenship Clearing House; and the American Association of University Professors. Mr. Giesemann was the former director of the Speakers' Bureau of the Staten Island United Nations Forum. He was also a member of Kappa Sigma Alpha, Phi Gamma Delta, and the Cameron Club of Staten Island.

Mr. Giesemann is survived by his wife Teresa, who is assistant director of health services at Wagner; a son, Joseph, aged 10; and a daughter, Dorothy, aged 12.

Dr. Vincenza *Mattiace* Zitano, an associate professor of modern languages died September 4 in St. Vincent's Hospital, Staten Island, after a lengthy illness. Her age was 42.

A native of Manhattan, she received her bachelor's degree from Hunter College, and her master's and doctor of philosophy degrees from New York University.

Dr. Mattiace taught at Wagner for nine years. She was a member of the American Association of University Professors and Kappa Delta Pi, an honor society at N.Y.U. She also was presented with the Founders Day award for outstanding scholarship at N.Y.U.

Prior to coming to Wagner, Dr. Mattiace taught at the College of William and Mary, St. Helena Extension, Norfolk, Va.; Monmouth Junior College, Long Branch, N. J.; Chautaqua Institute, N. Y., and the summer school of Staten Island Academy.

As an employee of the U. S. Office of Censorship during World War II, Dr. Mattiace did intelligence and editorial work and served as a translator in Spanish and Italian, and dialects of both languages. She worked for the War Department as an instructor of Italian prisoners of war and for exporting firms as a translator, interpreter and correspondent.

Surviving Dr. Mattiace are her husband, Rudolph Zitano and her daughter Lauretta, aged 2.

ALUMS RETURN AS FACULTY MEMBERS

Two Wagner Alums, Al Wagner '58 and Tony Vassiliades '56 are returning to the campus this fall as faculty members.

Al has been appointed as an instructor in Speech and Drama. Tony has received an appointment as assistant professor of physical chemistry.

After leaving Wagner Al attended Carnegie Institute of Technology where he majored in design.

Since 1959 he has been in charge of Stage Design at the University of Pittsburgh. He has also worked at the Bucks County Playhouse, Equity Library Theatre, Gateway Theatre and the East 74th Street Theatre.

Al has also had exposure in the television medium, working as a studio supervisor for WQED-TV in Pittsburgh, Pa

Tony, who was a part time instructor at Wagner last year, completed his M.S. in physical chemistry at Syracuse University in 1958 and is currently continuing his studies towards a Ph.D. at the Polytechnical Institute of Brooklyn.

He attended the 35th National Colloid Symposium in Rochester, N. Y. this past summer, where he presented two papers.





FOOTBALL FORECAST

Faced with the unenviable task of sustaining perfection, the 1961 Wagner College football team began pre-season drills in the midst of the summer's most uncomfortable weather on August 31.

The Seahawks, the toast of Staten Island last year when they ran through a perfect season, were scheduled to open a nine-game schedule on September 23 against Pennsylvania Military College.

Coach Mickey Sullivan, beginning his fifth season at Wagner, was inclined to view 16 lettermen and the application of an immutable law of athletics as his chief assets. The law: A winning team tends to continue winning.

This is more commonly known as confidence and Sullivan is a master at instilling it. He hoped that his nucleus of seasoned players would quickly transmit it to the newcomers who will have to step in at critical spots vacated by the departure of six starters from the undefeated team.

Gone are some of the most storied figures in Wagner football — the giant ends Al Ferrie and George Kling, tackle Ralph Canarozzi, guards Al Palladino and Charlie Jopp, center Tony Franchina, and fullback Wally Pagan. Most of those players were in Sullivan's starting lineup for four years.

A complete overhaul is not necessary. Much of the striking power returns in the backfield, and in co-captains Ben Sarullo and Rudy Fusco, Wagner has the start of a strong interior line.

As always, Wagner fans can count on a strong passing attack sparked by the gifted quarterback Don Cavalli who threw 18 touchdown passes last year, an average of two every game.

Cavalli, who will break his own records every time he completes a pass, figures to again be among the national leaders in a variety of statistical categories.

Cavalli is joined in the backfield by the brilliant halfback pair of Neill Johnston and Frank Melos. The latter is the high-scoring specialist, a harddriving runner who is also one of Cavalli's prime targets.

Johnston set the tone for the entire 1960 season when he ran the opening kickoff of the year back for a touchdown. He went on to lead the team in rushing.

Seniors Bruce Wilson and Dick Rice, who were interchangeable with Kling and Ferrie by the end of the year, are certain to be the regular ends. Fusco and Sarullo, both of whom have been tackles for three seasons, have been moved over to guard. Sullivan figures both more physically adept at that position.

The other four positions are up for grabs. The tackle spot is particularly acute. A number of big and promising freshmen were in tow as the drills began, and it is hoped they can learn fast enough to offset their inexperience.

Walter Frueh, a sophomore who played tackle last year, is being given a thorough trial at center. The same applies to Herb Vargas at fullback. Vargas, a senior, has been slowed by injuries heretofore.

Dick Schlenker, a junior halfback, will replace Ferrie as the team's punter.

High School Honor Students Complete Summer Program The 1961 summer program for high school honor students met with much success.

Eleven students who had completed the junior year took a total of 14 courses, with a total number of 52 credits, and an average of 4.8 credits per student. Ten of the students attended a five-week session while one attended for eight weeks. The students took regular "solid" college courses such as English, History, Chemistry and Sociology, and were in class with the regular college students.

What were the results? Seven of the students received a grade of A, five a grade of B, and two a grade of C. There were no D's nor F's. This is an average index of 2.3 which is in the cum laude category.

The experiment has conclusively demonstrated after three years, that high school students who have completed their junior year, and who are of high intellectual ability can not only do satisfactory college work in competition with regular college students, and meeting regular college standards, but are able to earn high grades.

Dr. J. Trygve Jensen, Director of the Summer School, reported that in addition to the academic gains, there also seems to be valuable social benefits for the high school students in meeting with the regular college students.

This past summer Dr. Sigvart J. Steen, chairman of Wagner's department of music, conducted a choral workshop at the Lutheran summer school for church workers at Silver Bay, Lake George, N. Y.

Also representing Wagner at the session, which ran from the 22nd to the 28th of July, were Mrs. Steen and Alumni Director Howard Braren.

Dr. Steen also conducted a choral workshop this past summer at Lutheridge, a Lutheran camp near Arden, N. C. which is sponsored by the Southern Synods of the ULCA.

Dr. Steen, who was on a leave of absence from Wagner this past academic year, has returned to the campus to continue his work with the college choir. He will, however, conduct a limited number of choir clinics in the United States and Canada during 1961-62.

Choral Workshops Conducted By Dr. Steen

Nutrition Experiment Conducted at Wagner A successful experiment in the field of nutrition was recently conducted by Mrs. John Millett of the Wagner faculty.

Using white rats and guinea pigs she demonstrated to the youngsters of St. Michael's home on Staten Island the value of a well balanced diet.

The animals were fed unbalanced meals, given excessive sweets and deprived of vitamins. Their day to day physical deterioration made a vivid impression on the children.

The project began as a nutrition class problem at Wagner. The education majors studied methods of teaching nutrition effectively to grade school students and the nursing majors measured the hemoglobin count in the animals' blood as the experiment progressed.
