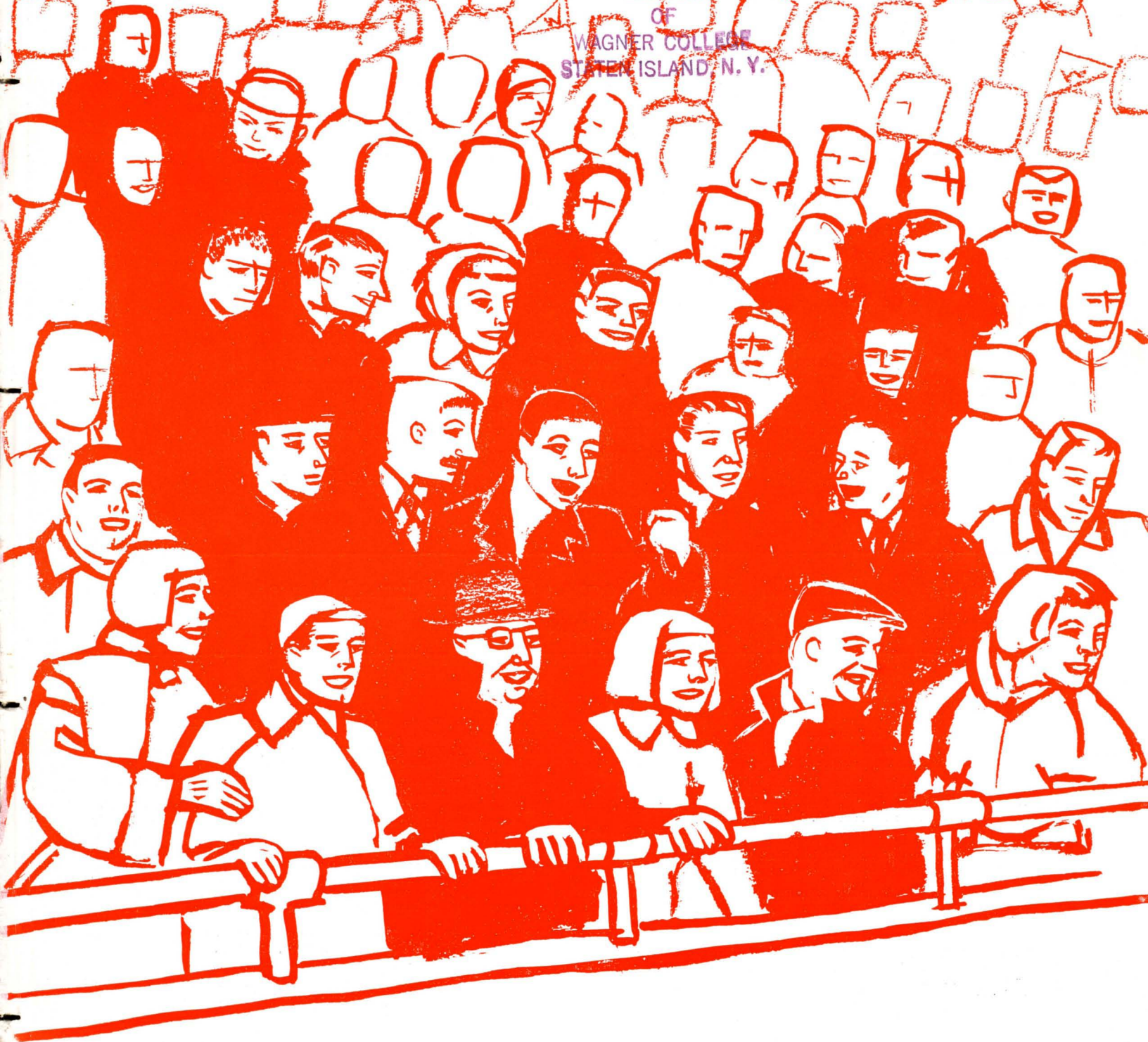

It's always nice to read complimentary things about Wagner, but this note in the July 21 issue of THE LUTHERAN gave us special pleasure. Editor Elson Ruff, in his column "In Conclusion," wrote "I spent a few days on the Wagner College campus this year and found Negro students were fully accepted in every way . . . I asked a Negro student to state in a public meeting whether he had found any discrimination against him at Wagner, and he said positively that he had not."

The plaque pictured on this page was presented to the Wagner Alumni Association by the American Alumni Council at its annual convention in Edgewater Park, Miss., on July 12.

The percentage increase upon which the award was made was the jump from 24% in 1952 to 50% in 1953. Bob Olwig was the Fund Chairman in 1953.

The other winners: largest total raised from alumni, Yale; highest percentage of alumni contributing, Dartmouth; largest average gift, Union; greatest number of alumni contributors, Harvard.

1954 FUND BREAKS RECORDS

Still has two months to go

Each year since 1951 our alumni fund has broken two records—number of contributors and amount given. 1954 is no exception.

1057 persons have contributed \$7,243 with 68 pledges for \$450. This eclipses last year's high of 1035 givers of \$6,860.

To achieve this took the combined efforts of over 100 loyal alumni who have given time and effort to make this year's campaign another record-breaking one. Our personal solicitation campaign has been expanded successfully and has been the prime factor in our continual rise in contributions and contributors.

As you already have read, the successful 1953 campaign brought distinguished recognition to Wagner College. Its record of 50% participation of its alumni is a record we have not yet attained in 1954. It is important to us to maintain and increase this goal to show that our achievement was not a flash-in-the-pan but, rather, the combined effort of a loyal, growing alumni group.

We only need 2% more contributors to reach last year's goal. However, let's not think of just reaching the '53 goal. Let us think that we must reach 60%. If we could get that many contributors we would be 4th or 5th in the whole country

in alumni participation. Last year, we were 12th.

We need \$1300 more to reach our \$8500 goal for '54. If your gift isn't in, please send it now!

A successful part of the '54 campaign has been the upswing in the average gift per alumnus. Since 1949 our average has steadily declined until 1954 when it has taken an upturn from \$6.62 in '53 to \$6.85. We feel that now that our larger graduating classes, starting in '50, are progressing in their chosen fields we will continue to see the average gift grow.

A list of contributors is found on the adjoining pages. I hope your name is on it. If not, send in your contribution now and we will include it in the next issue of the LINK.

Again, may I thank the many loyal alumni, workers and givers both, who have made this campaign another successful one.

Football Team Finds Going Rough

Wagner's bid for its first winning football season since 1949 suffered three early setbacks—and possibly more by the time the LINK goes to press—losing to Hobart, Haverford and Hamilton.

A new coach with a new formation greeted the dozen lettermen and other candidates at the start of pre-season practice. John (Bunny) Barbes discarded the "A" in favor of the "T" with the hope that the Seahawks would get more mileage out of a moderately fast, light backfield.

Most of the returning veterans were linemen, however, and the new backs had a severe case of butterfingers. The Seahawks fumbled more in the first two games than they did the entire 1953 season. By the time the third contest came up, Wagner had lost its fumblyitis. But in that third game Wagner also lost the services of halfback Ben Serra, who will most likely be sidelined for the remainder of the season with a badly sprained ankle.

Serra's loss heightened a backfield shortage that had been acute since Karl Strobel broke a leg before the season started.

Bunny isn't discouraged over the backfield's failure to get enough touchdowns. He's amazed with the improvement shown between the first and third games.

He points with pride to the line. "This year's forward wall," says Bunny, "compares favorably with any ever seen at Wagner." As usual, it lacks depth.

The line does open the holes, however. The real problem is to find a few more backs who have the speed and know-how to take advantage of the opportunities supplied by the line.

Bunny has words of praise for several of his ball carriers. "There are a couple of boys who can really go, but they can't go the sixty minutes an undermanned squad requires," Bunny concludes.

Basketball Plans Made for '54-'55 Season

Wagner College opens a 19-game basketball schedule December 3, against a new opponent, Loyola College of Baltimore, at Grymes Hill, Staten Island, N. Y.

The Seahawks, who have won the Hofstra Invitation Tournament twice in its three-year history, will also defend its Hofstra Tournery title from December 27 to December 30 in addition to their regularly scheduled games.

Wagner will continue its New York area rivalries with Manhattan College, St. John's University, C.C.N.Y., Fordham University, Army, St. Peter's College and Hofstra College.

Another new opponent on the Seahawk card is Lycoming College of Pennsylvania.

Last year the Staten Islanders won 18 of 24 contests, including initial victories over Manhattan, St. John's and C.C.N.Y. All three will play at the Grymes Hill gym this year in addition to nine other home games.

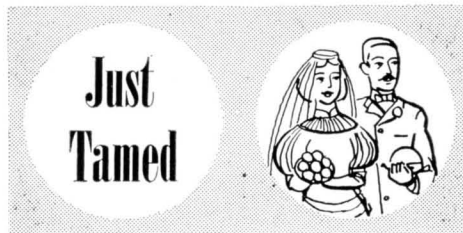
Five Alumni Scholarships Held This Year

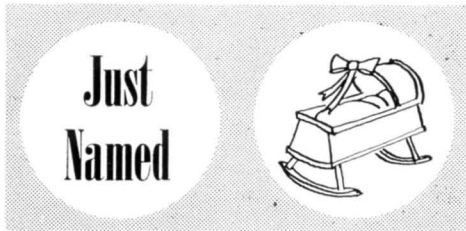
