Wagner's New Undergraduate Curriculum Applauded by Major Education Association

Association of American Colleges & Universities singles out Wagner College for having developed "one of the most interesting and promising new designs abroad in the land."

n the summer 1999 edition of Liberal Education, the magazine of the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AACU), Carol Geary Schneider, President of AACU, dedicated most of her "President's Message" editorial to developments in experiential learning at colleges and universities throughout the U.S. Singled out as being in the forefront was Wagner College's new undergraduate curriculum which emphasizes experiential learning and learning community models.

The curriculum revisions are the brainchild of Wagner Provost Dr. Richard Guarasci who came to Wagner two years ago from Hobart College where he was Dean. "Needless to say, the AACU nod is a great honor and validates the quality of academic standard that Wagner College has become," observed Guarasci. He noted that after two years, the "Wagner Plan" has already shown its effectiveness. Most notably, freshman retention has skyrocketed.

Key to the change is a freshman program that evolves around learning communities where clusters of first year students work together with several faculty mentors who specifically oversee the community. "This model more quickly bonds students to the College and to each other while also providing each student with a community of academic partners who help motivate academic performance," explained


The new model, Guarasci observed, is a credit to the cooperative spirit and high academic aspirations of Wagner's faculty. "I have never worked with a faculty more committed to being the very best. These changes would not have been possible without that spirit and standard of excellence," declared Guarasci.

The following is an excerpt from the AACU accolade:

There are some promising designs for reflective and integrative learning abroad in the land. One of the most interesting has been developed at Wagner College under President Norman Smith and Richard Guarasci, Wagner's academic vice president.

Wagner, a liberal arts college on Staten Island in New York City, has recently recast its general education program to require that all students take at least three learning communities, or topically linked courses. Generally, students will take one learning community in the first year, one in the second and a third in the context of the student's

Two of these required learning communities, however, also involve an internship in a New York City organization. So even as students are studying a topic academically, from more than one disciplinary perspective, they are also encountering the topic experientially, in the messy real world of unscripted and hard-to-handle problems.

The juxtaposition of linked courses and experiential assignments is interesting enough. But the really exciting feature of the Wagner Plan, is that it takes on directly "The synthesizing enterprise-the bringing of what one has learned in one context to another, from one community to another.

When students join a learning community in the first year program-including the experiential learning placement—they also take a credit-bearing "reflective tutorial," a linking course taught by faculty members that is expressly designed to help students integrate the different parts of their learning, from different disciplines and from experiential as well as formal learning. The idea is to teach students from the outset how to engage in systematic refection on what they are learning in applied settings. And because the reflective tutorial is a group rather than an individual experience, students have a chance to compare their own field-based learning with those of other students.

When I heard about Wagner's development of reflective tutorials, my thoughts went back to my own introduction to "experiential learning" as an undergraduate (at Mt. Holyoke).





Wagner College ranked "top tier" again for 2000 by U.S. News & World Report BEST COLLEGES

agner College once again earned "top tier" rank by the U.S. News & World Report judges who annually grade colleges and universities throughout the United States. Wagner is ranked among the regional colleges and universities of the north from Maine to Washington, D.C. The ratings are based on a complex formula of data that includes academic admissions standards, admissions acceptance rates, student retention rates and the votes of senior college administrators at comparable regional colleges and universities.

"While I am not a champion of these rankings, I am nonetheless gratified to know that Wagner is being recognized as a first-rate college," said President Smith. Wagner was one of only 12 colleges and universities in all of New York State to be ranked top tier in the regional category and is the only Staten Island college in history to ever receive a top ranking.

WAGNER COLLEGE'S QUIET RENAISSANCE

Bigger donations, better students stream in as the Grymes Hill college's reputation soars

agner College is a school on the move and it's shooting for nothing less than a place among the national stars of higher education.

After years of wallowing in the backwaters of academe--and in red ink--the

After years of wallowing in the backwaters of academe--and in red ink--the school is beginning to realize a return on its investment in Dr. Norman Smith, a Toronto-born educator who was named president of the College in 1988.

Though he arrived on the 105-acre, Grymes Hill campus unheralded at the tender age of 41 - fresh out of a deanship at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and untested in any president's seat - he has clearly risen to the challenge of running a \$40 million-a-year educational operation.

Smith said his first visit to the campus yielded such a clear vision of what Wagner College could be that his business and marketing plan for the school almost wrote itself.

"I was struck by the campus and what it wasn't," said Smith recently, recalling that he nearly shuddered after his first Ivy League-jaded glimpse revealed private cars parked in rag-tag fashion all around the school's main lawn, which itself was void of grass because the football team used it as a practice field. "It was a sea of mud," said Smith. Not these days. Thanks to about a \$30 million investment in any number of improvements - from new faculty hires to engraved trash receptacles - the rough-edged look is history. Now, there are discreet parking lots and newly tilled athletic fields. The walkways are being painstakingly bricked over and an \$11 million, state-of-the-art sports facility has been constructed, with the help of generous alumni like Donald and Evelyn Spiro.

The Association of American Colleges & Universities recently cited (Wagner's curriculum) as the best in the country.

Classrooms have been carpeted and refurnished and the school has made a major commitment to keeping pace with the latest in computer technology.

In sharp contrast to 25 years ago, the residence halls are full and paying for themselves, and most of the school's 1,800 undergraduates hail from somewhere other than Staten Island.

But it's not just the physical plant that's been spiffed up.

Last year, the Institute of Mind and Body Research at Harvard University's Medical School chose Wagner's undergraduate science students to conduct the basic research component of a nationwide project investigating the effects of emotions on a person's physical health.

With the help of new provost Dr. Richard Guarasci, the undergraduate curriculum has been completely overhauled and last summer the American Association of Colleges and Universities cited the school's new, experiential approach to liberal arts as the best in the country.

Harvard University's Medical School chose Wagner's undergraduate science students to conduct the basic research of a nationwide project investigating the effects of emotions on physical health.

And for the second year in a row, *U.S. News and World Report* placed Wagner in the "top tier" of colleges and universities in the North

in the "top tier" of colleges and universities in the North.

We've hired 80 new faculty since I've been here, said Smith, noting that among the 200 instructors now on board, the head of the school's music department graduated from prestigious Williams College, the head of the history department graduated from Johns Hopkins University and was a professor at Vassar College, and the head of the biology department also taught at Dartmouth College.

"I see this school as a (potential) Swarthmore, a Haverford, an Amherst," he added. While students and faculty say they don't feel like they're among the elite just yet, they say the school is on its way. "It's made huge strides in becoming more of an Ivy League school" said senior business major Christina Rosensteel from Hanover, Pa. She is a golfer who chose Wagner over places like Villanova, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and Longwood. "There have been fundamental changes, said Christopher Catt, a native

Californian now in his fifth year as producer and head of the school's theater department. The differences include theater classes that are more academically

agner's new Vice President for Development is Frank Young Jr., who arrived in January from Philips Exeter Academy where he was responsible for major gifts to the prestigious New Hampshire private academy. "Here is a rare opportunity to play a key role in building Wagner into one of the top colleges of its kind at a time when Wagner is perfectly positioned to move to the next plateau and beyond. The faculty and senior leadership at Wagner greatly impressed me and I look forward to helping the College be everything it can be."

Prior to Philips Exeter, Young was Director of Leadership Giving at his alma mater, Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, New York. During his decade in development there, he was also Director of Alumni and Community Relations. Before beginning his impressive and successful "second career" in fundraising, Young was a 15-year veteran of the Geneva High School system where he was head of the English

"We are lucky to have recruited someone of Frank Young's caliber," observed Wagner College Provost Dr. Richard Guarasci. "I worked with Frank at Hobart when I was Dean there and I know from personal experience that he is the best." President Smith noted that Guarasci's prior work with Young was instrumental in successfully recruiting him to Wagner.



Young assumes the Wagner development helm at a time when Wagner is positioned to build the program and staff. "We needed the institutional success we have had in enrollment, admissions and academic stature to show that Wagner has a very promising future worth the investment of significant donations," said Smith. "Clearly, that case has been made and we are ready for Frank's leadership," Smith concluded.

"This place is beginning to look like a shiny, new penny. He's [Smith] got a goal and he's going for it," said Ms. Rosensteel.

"They've got the right idea. They need to continue with the right ideas," said

ron Smith, a sophomore from Albany who plays quarterback and tight e the school's Division I football team.

As noteworthy and pervasive as the changes are to those who frequent the somewhat secluded campus, they remain a well-kept secret on Staten Island.

"Smith maintains that the school is not out to turn its back on Staten Island teens. It's just that he believes the caliber of student Wagner is looking for now is top-drawer, and serious students everywhere usually choose a college outside their immediate neighborhoods, - within a 4-hour travel distance - rather than sign on for more of the same for another four years.

Today the bulk of the College's students come from upstate New York,

southern New Jersey and the Bucks County area of Pennsylvania.

Publications used to market the school to prospective students and to big money contributors are filled with photos - many taken by Smith himself - of campus turrets and towers that soar majestically against a backdrop of the

Students also say that Smith's no-nonsense personality makes for a campus atmosphere that is tightly controlled and more straight-laced than many. "They crack down on everything. Some people try, but they limit it [partying] said While President Smith might take issue with some of the student gripes, he too agrees there's still work to be done - about 10 years' worth - before the school is where he envisions it. For instance, though more than 10 percent of the students at Wagner major in theater and the performing arts, the school's only theater is in a building that dates from the 1920s.

With his wife, Dr. Susan Robinson, now at the helm of the Snug Harbor Cultural Center, Smith 53, says he can see finishing out his career at Wagner. He said he is periodically contacted by search firms looking to set him up elsewhere, but he admitted that he has made many close friends among the Wagner faculty

and has nothing to prove by going elsewhere.

"I've already been at Harvard," he said. He continued: "I might [stay]. If everything continues to evolve as productively over the next 12 years, I'd be hardpressed to find a more interesting job.

Wagner College to host Undergrad Science Research Conference in March 2000

he Eastern Colleges Science Conference (ECSC) will hold its annual college science major research competition at Wagner College on March 31st and April 1st, 2000. This 53 year old convention offers college science majors an opportunity to present their undergraduate research in a formal academic setting. Over 150 science majors from several dozen colleges and universities are expected to participate.

Founded at Vassar College in 1947, other institutional hosts have included Yale, Penn State, West Point, Georgetown and Ithaca Colleges.

Dr. Donald Stearns, head of Wagner's biology department, is a member of the ECSC Board and will host the event with the help of Wagner faculty members Dr. Laurence Nolan and Dr. Kathleen Bobbitt.

"Needless to say, this is a wonderful opportunity for Wagner to heighten its visibility as an institution with a first-rate science program," said Dr. Richard Guarasci, Wagner Provost. Guarasci noted that the academic quality of Wagner's science undergraduates has soared in recent years and that a number of recent Wagner graduates have gone on to doctoral programs at major research universities including Princeton and Yale. "Providing undergraduates with meaningful research opportunities is key to their future success in the profession," noted Dr. Stearns, "so we are delighted to be the year 2000 venue for this great program."

"Opportunities like the Brown University invitation are wonderful opportunities to raise the academic visibility and stature of Wagner College within the professional community of higher education," noted Provost Richard Guarasci. "That our academic designs are receiving such widespread national acclaim is a gratifying outcome, to say the least."

Wagner Launches Centralized Campus Academic & Cultural Program to Complement Curriculum and to Enrich Intellectual Life at College



nder the leadership of Dr. Lori Weintrob (History Department), Wagner College has initiated a comprehensive program of academic speakers, current events panels, cutting edge performances, poetry readings, and a remarkable film series. Carrying the banner Academic and Cultural Enrichment Program or ACE, Dr. Weintrob and a team of involved students and faculty forged a series of 47 events in the first semester alone that brought exciting dialogues to the campus community.

Notable among the programs were three panels in October and November that debated the strategic importance of the Panama Canal, the lessons learned about ethnic rivalry in Kosovo and the Balkans, and whether Staten Island will be "New York City's next hottest borough?" "The ACE program is successfully creating an atmosphere outside of the classroom that promotes cultural exploration and enables participation in cutting-edge intellectual inquiry," observed Weintrob.

OppenheimerFunds endows Wagner Scholarship to honor Dr. Donald Spiro's Retirement after 37 years on the job




Manhattan Gala at the Hotel Pierre Ballroom featured accolades from OppenheimerFunds partners citing Spiro's extraordinary leadership

agner Board Chairman Donald Spiro '49 relinquished his "other" Chairmanship last fall when he ended his 37-year career with OppenheimerFunds at a gala retirement party in the ballroom of the Hotel Pierre in Manhattan. The tribute was led by Dr. Spiro's successor, Bridget Macaskill, who hosted the evening's festivities. "We were stumped about what kind of retirement present Don would most cherish," noted Macaskill, "so we finally just asked him. His answer was that he didn't want anything and that he would most appreciate something being done for Wagner College." In response, an endowment was established that will enable an annual OppenheimerFunds Spiro scholar recipient be selected from among those honors students aspiring to careers in corporate finance.

In accepting the scholarship endowment, Wagner President Norman Smith said that everyone at Wagner was proud, but not surprised, to learn that Dr. Spiro once again put Wagner College first and foremost in his thinking. "Don has been the essence of the College's impressive success for exactly this kind of reason. Dr. Susan Robinson leaves Wagner to become President of Staten Island's Snug Harbor Cultural Center

fter nearly 12 years as Associate Provost and Associate Professor of Education, Dr. Robinson last November was appointed President of the Snug Harbor Cultural Center, an 83-acre waterfront facility that is home to dozens of Staten Island arts and culture organizations. Among the 28 Snug Harbor institutions is the Botanical Garden, the Children's Museum, the John Noble Art Collection, the Newhouse Gallery for Modern Art, the New York Chinese Scholar's Garden and several performance halls.

"Susan has long been ready to assume this kind of responsibility," said husband President Norman Smith, "although I will miss her daily involvement at Wagner. Fortunately, she has built a terrific team of professionals in admissions, academic advisement and career development that are going to be able to keep those critical functions working well."

Dr. Robinson is credited with having built the admissions staff and marketing program that resulted in the College's full-to-capacity enrollment. She also broadened the geographic composition of the student body from what was primarily local commuting students in 1988 to a 75% residential student population from over 35 states and 15 foreign countries.

"She is the most brilliant and able academic administrator I have ever worked with," recalled Dr. Mordechai Rozanski, Wagner's Provost in the early years of the Smith administration who subsequently assumed the Presidency of the University of Guelph in Ontario. "Had she not also been the President's wife, she would have been my certain successor."

"Susan was my closest academic colleague," acknowledged current Provost Dr. Richard Guarasci. "There was nothing I could not count on her to do. She is first rate and was greatly respected by the Wagner faculty. She will excel at Snug Harbor."

"Snug Harbor is an exciting opportunity for me," said Robinson, "and, needless to say, I am close enough to stay involved at Wagner whenever I am needed." She noted that she has had a lifelong interest in the arts. She studied piano and dance throughout her youth and has held a variety of arts positions including Dean of Admissions at Moore College of Art in Philadelphia and President of the Staten Island Symphony.



A native New Yorker, Dr. Robinson graduated from Skidmore College, earned her master's degree at Columbia Teacher's College and her doctorate from Harvard. 



Lionel "Ro" Rotelli '54 played basketball and baseball and was Outstanding Athlete of the Year in 1954.


Jim Lee Howell was Wagner's football coach from 1947-1953 and was also a coach for the New York Giants.




