ALUMNI RESPOND TO CAREER MENTOR PROGRAM

The mentor-apprentice relationship is as old as the concept of education. It has offered students a guiding hand as well as hands-on experience in a trade.

But with the advent of institutions of higher learning, with professors and textbooks, the distance between those learning and those doing has grown.

Wagner College has introduced a program aimed at bridging the gap between the work world and the world of study. Using the College's alumni network, faculty members are taking students to places including banks and the floor of the stock exchange.

Over the past year, Wagner classes have traveled to a variety of alumni work settings. In each case, alumni who are senior executives have hosted tours of their companies and orientation sessions.

"These on-site visits are invaluable in bringing a real-life dimension to the coursework," observed Professor William Olson of Wagner's business faculty. "The students become much more interested in the reading requirements after they've seen the materials in real life."

With the broad range of careers open to liberal arts students, these forays into the "real world" help students narrow their choices, giving them concrete examples of various career fields.

Hence, a student with an interest in art can realize a career opening in, say, marketing for cosmetics.

The College's proximity to Manhattan, the capital of so many avenues of business, makes for exciting opportunities.

Recently, students were given a tour of the New York Stock Exchange, with Wagner alumnus Tim Murphy taking them right onto the trading floor.

"It was exciting. I always wanted to go there," said Darrin Defeo, a sophomore who is considering a career in the stock market.

The trip fleshed out his impressions of the career, which had previously been shaped to a great extent by Hollywood. On the trading floor, he said he could see how hectic and computerized the field is. "I could see exactly what they do," he said.

Should he consider pursuing this

career path, Defeo feels he has a foot in the door.

"I would think he would prefer to hire a Wagner graduate, rather than somebody he doesn't know," Defeo said.

Mona Motte, Wagner's Director of Development, hopes the new program will result in more networking between students and alumni, opening up more internships and job opportunities.

"Career opportunities are getting harder to locate, even with a college degree," agreed Dr. Norman Smith, Wagner College President. "Contacts made through alumni can be the difference between getting in the door or being left out in the cold."

Alumni also hope to form relationships with the students, guiding them and possibly tapping into Wagner's pool of graduates.

Students visited Chemical Bank in Manhattan, the guest of Wagner alumnus and College trustee Robert O'Brien. He and other bank officials reviewed with the students a case study on lending. The group also spoke to financial analysts.

"My goal was to show them that banking is more than just a teller behind a window," said O'Brien, a member of the Class of 1966 who is heading the merger of Chemical Bank and Manufacturers Hanover into one of the largest financial organizations of its kind.

"Hopefully, this will lead to some mentor relationships between alumni executives and students," he said, "and maybe even some job opportunities."

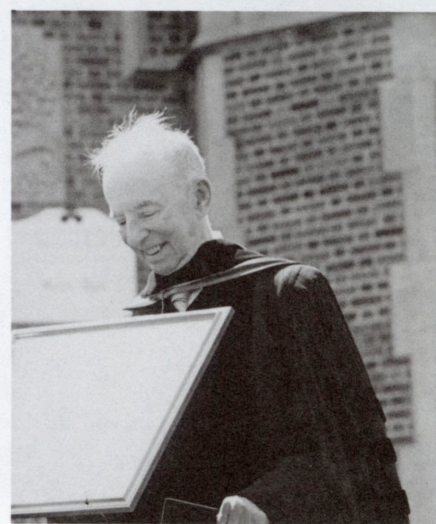

HIGHLIGHTS OF WAGNER'S 1992 COMMENCEMENT



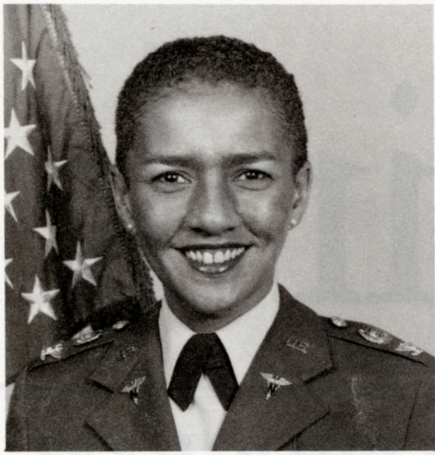

COLONEL SHARON RICHIE '71 HEADS ARMY NURSE CORPS RECRUITING

In 1969, a nurse recruiter from the Army changed Sharon I. Richie's life.

"I came from the projects in Philadelphia. My family gave me their best wishes, but were unable to provide any financial support," said the once beleaguered Wagner College nursing student, now a Colonel in charge of the Army's nationwide recruitment of nurses.

What saved her education and ultimately her career was the Army's financial aid package. The former Sharon Ivey committed to three years of active duty in exchange for financial support.

"The Army paid for tuition, room and board and a stipend. It allowed me to study without working for the first time since the seventh grade. And let me tell you, I made the Dean's List. I was very proud," she said.

When Col. Richie speaks of the unprecedented opportunities offered by the Army, she knows the truth first-hand. In 20 years Col. Richie has travelled the globe, served in the White House on an elite one-year fellowship, and attended the military's prestigious War School, where only one nurse a year is accepted.

Among the many achievements of her career, Col. Richie helped develop the Army's first alcohol and drug treatment program. For her effort on that project she received in 1982 the Secretary of Defense Meritorious Service Medal.

She was honored by Wagner in 1983 with an Alumni Achievement Award. Col. Richie remembers her Wagner days with fondness. "Wagner College was and still is one of the leading nursing programs in the country," she said.

As a black student, Col. Richie said there were some awkward moments. She recalled that her roommate in her freshman year "had never met a black person before". At first she felt discomfort attending a "majority white" school, but by the time she became Homecoming Queen in 1969 she felt right at home.

Col. Richie received the master's degree in psychiatric nursing from the University of Texas at San Antonio and is currently a doctoral candidate at George Washington University. At both schools, the Army pays the bill.

She said the Army has been tremendously supportive of her career goals. She supervises a staff of more than 200 nurse recruiters who pitch the benefits of an Army career to nursing students.

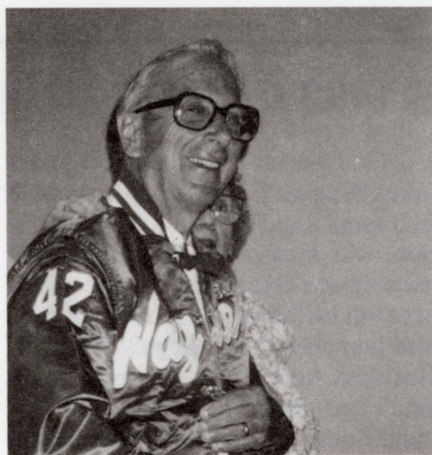
Asked if the rapidly rising salaries of civilian nurses have made it harder to attract new recruits to the Army Nursing Corps, Col. Richie avoided a direct answer. Rather, she emphasized the good points of an Army career, including the potential to earn far more than civilian nurses and ascend to positions of power and authority.

"In the military our starting salaries are not as high, but they can go much higher. A nurse out of school can come in as a Lieutenant up to a Captain, depending on experience," she said. "In addition, a certain percentage of your salary is not taxed. Your health care is totally paid for. You get housing allowance and insurance as well."

Col. Richie, who is currently stationed in Chicago, this year celebrated her sixth wedding anniversary. Her husband, she said, has willingly relocated several times as Col. Richie's career continues to grow.

"I hope to stay in the Army for 30 years. I always said I would stay as long as I was able to provide a service. Each assignment is better than the last," Col. Richie said. "I tell nursing students to find what makes you passionate, what makes you want to get up in the morning. Obstacles are out there, but you can turn them into opportunities."

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The men's basketball team, which returns everyone from last season's 16-12 squad, will compete in the prestigious 16-team Pre-Season NIT this year, playing at Tulane Dec. 18. Other highlights of the men's basketball preseason schedule include:

- The "Mile High Classic" in Boulder, Colorado, competing with Middle Tennessee State, Lehigh, and host University of Colorado.
- Syracuse, facing the Orangemen in the Carrier Dome.
- Iona in the Meadowlands as the first game of a doubleheader featuring Princeton and North Carolina State in game two.
- The "Iona Holiday Classic" in New Rochelle, NY, competing with Akron, Florida International, and host Iona College.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The women's basketball team, under third-year head coach Pam Roecker, loses just two players from last season's squad. Returning senior Michelle Diener, Dana O'Neill, and Martine Verrier will power the Seahawks in the frontcourt, while sophomore Brenda Milano, a Northeast Conference All-Newcomer selection, returns at point guard. Highlights of the 1992-93 women's basketball schedule:

-Wagner will play in two in-season tournaments this year, participating in the University of Connecticut Tournament in early December and hosting the 17th annual Wagner College Christmas Tournament. Participating in the Seahawks' holiday event will be Yale, Middle Tennessee State, and the University of Massachusetts.

The Athletic Department, with last year's addition of David Potter as the Coordinator of Academic Advisement for Athletics, hopes to improve on its figure of 67 student-athletes per semester with at least a 3.0 grade point average.

DR. LES TRAUTMANN '40 - A LASTING LEGACY

Some people create for themselves a presence that is larger than life, making it difficult to contemplate being without them. For Staten Island and for Wagner College, Dr. Les Trautmann was such a person.

Les Trautmann's death was sudden and unexpected. He died in his sleep; just the way, I suppose, that we would all want to go.

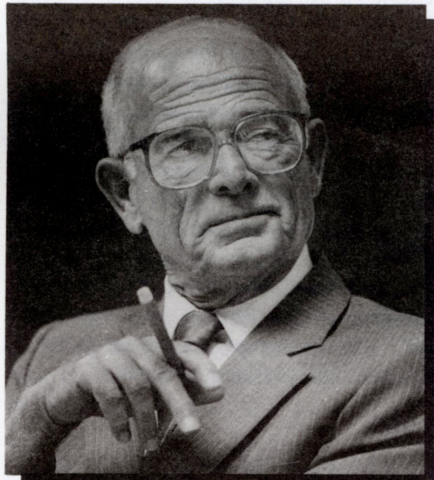
I sat next to him in Sutter Gym just days earlier watching the young Wagner basketball team become one of the biggest turnaround stories in NCAA Division I sports. We were both excited to see the Seahawks actually becoming a contender. I could have never imagined that it would be the last time I would talk to Les.

Les Trautmann was one of the first Wagner alumni I met. He was on the advisory search committee that screened dozens of presidential candidates. He was also one of the first Wagner alumni to give me advice after I was selected as President.

He made it a daily routine to walk through the Wagner campus each evening after dinner - his constitutional. I would walk with him occasionally. Les and I shared a vision for Wagner College; that it should be among the prominent, small, private liberal arts colleges in the northeast. "New York City should have such a college and Wagner is the only institution in the City with such a beautiful setting. Staten Island would benefit enormously if it was home to a prestigious private college. Wagner should have had that status decades ago," he told me.

During the next two years as the campus underwent a renewal program, Les' daily walks turned into inspection tours. To his credit, his criticisms and suggestions were always prefaced with acknowledgements of the improvements. Les never hesitated to criticize, yet in my experiences with him he never held back credit where he thought it was due.

Thankfully, he liked what was going on at Wagner throughout the four years he knew me as the College's president.



To Wagner's benefit, he made it a point to report the College's changes in the newspaper he captained for decades, *The Staten Island Advance*. There is absolutely no question in my mind that Wagner College would not have made so much progress in so short of a time without the encouragement, support, and most important the acknowledgements of Les Trautmann.

Les saw to it that Staten Islanders knew something new and good was happening to Wagner College. He brought everyone back. He put the College back in business and made everyone take a new look.

Wagner College lost one of its greatest advocates when it lost Les Trautmann. I lost one of my most valued counsels and friends.

Thankfully, Wagner College acknowledged Les' role before he died by conferring upon him an honorary doctorate two years ago. He had truly earned it.

Things feel a lot different now that Les Trautmann is gone. He is already profoundly missed. But his contributions endure and his standards of excellence will remain the watermark for our continuing efforts.

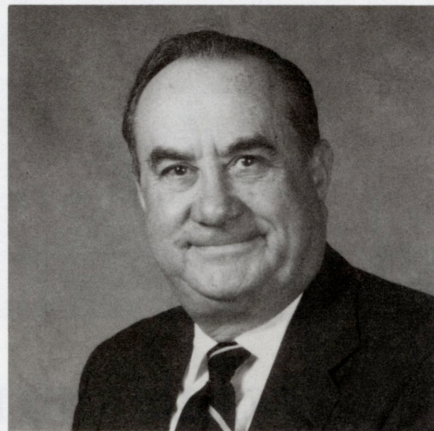

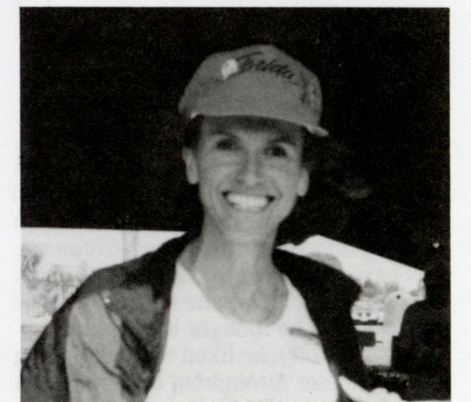

OBITUARY

George R. Tollefsen, a retired businessman and a 20-year member and former chairman of the Wagner College board of trustees, died this past February.

In 1933, he founded the Tollefsen Brothers Contracting Corp. in Brooklyn, which was involved in marine manufacturing, engineering, rigging, and pier operations in the United States and Norway. He was president of the company for 40 years until his retirement in 1974, at which time the company was dissolved.

Mr. Tollefsen was appointed to the Wagner College board of trustees in 1953. In 1959, he was elected vice chairman of the board, and was named chairman the following year. He served as chairman for six years, and continued to serve on the board until he stepped down in 1974. As a board member, Mr. Tollefsen was involved in a range of key planning committees of the Grymes Hill college, from finances to personnel. He was involved in the executive and finance, faculty and nominating committees, and headed the buildings and grounds committee.

Wagner awarded Mr. Tollefsen an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters in 1967, the same year his son George "Skip" Tollefsen, Jr. received his BA degree.

SCHOOL DAZE AND THE EDUCATION MAZE

AUTHOR CHUCK CASCIO '68 TALKS TO PARENTS

Where, if at all, is there room for parents in the increasingly specialized world of public school education?

Once guidance counselors, peer group advisers, experts on drugs and sex, resource teachers, consulting teachers and before and after school care givers have had their say, are parents really necessary? Are parents, after all, pretty much what they are depicted as in most of the popular entertainment media - hapless, albeit sometimes endearing, fools? Maybe not.

After years of being beat up on, lectured to, joked at and often just ignored, parents of school-age children have an articulate and persuasive friend and advocate.

He is Chuck Cascio, author of the new book *School Daze and the Education Maze. A Teacher Talks to Parents* (Tech Books). Cascio has been a classroom teacher for almost 24 years - for most of that time a highly regarded member of the staff at South Lakes High School in Reston, VA. A teacher of English and journalism, he is also an evaluator of teachers seeking the career-level II position that has earned them merit pay.

Cascio is now on leave of absence from the Fairfax County system to serve up to 18 months as a teacher in residence with the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. This board hopes to establish a voluntary system of "high and rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do" and certify them on that basis.

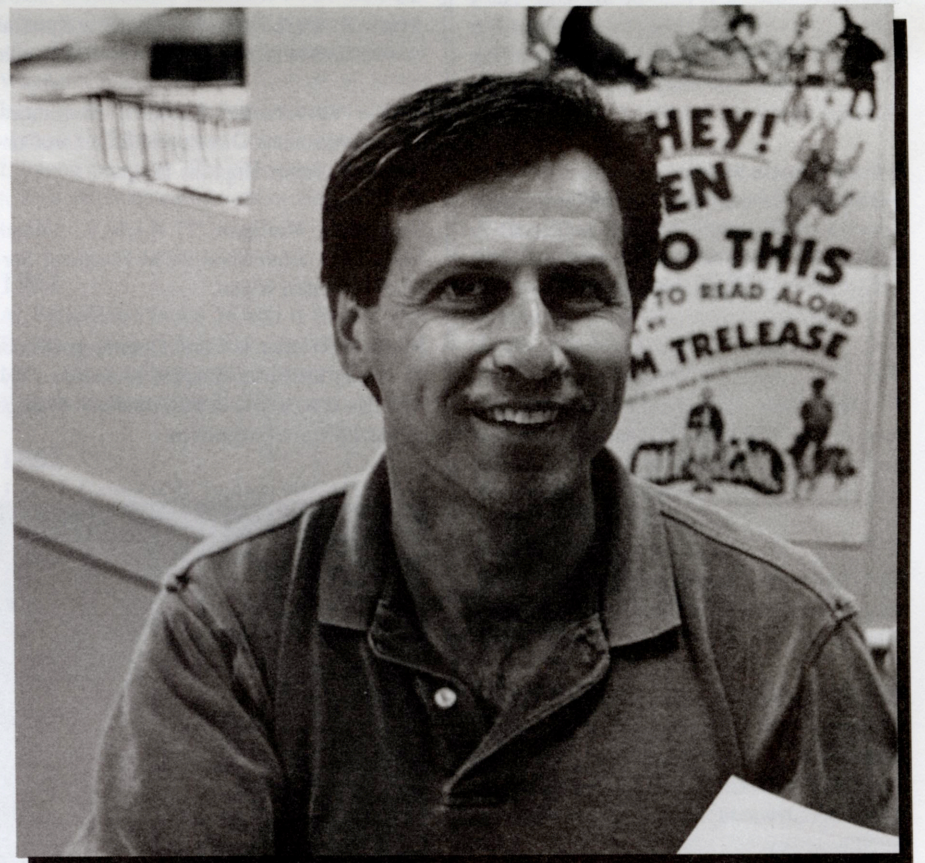
Teacher Cascio thinks that parents are, or should be, the most important educators of children. "When the parent takes a direct, active role in the education of his or her child, that child generally succeeds in school. That's my experience - it's unmistakable." What should parents do to help their children succeed?

In *School Daze*, Cascio offers both practical hints that can often produce quick results and ideas for achieving longer-term goals where success usually can't be measured day-to-day. On the practical side, for example, the book has a section of the importance of parents providing a specific work space for their child "away from the rest of the family".

But *School Daze* also looks at the big picture. Parents, Cascio says, should encourage the child to pursue learning for learning's sake, recognize the need for a child to have peers, but know those peers and - very important - become an educational role model.

Lots of parents feel very intimidated by the youth culture," Cascio says. "Teachers do, too. Parents have to realize that kids do not respond to an outpouring of wisdom, but instead to genuine concern and support. Parents don't have to put on a show every day, they don't have to show that they're 'hip'. They don't have to enter the youth culture, but they should be aware of standing on its periphery. Too many parents close themselves off. Each parent should view himself or herself as a teacher."

Cascio says parents don't have to re-create a classroom to teach. They can teach, he says, through a variety of daily events, many of them seemingly insignificant - sharing their enjoyment of a book or play or even a television program, or encouraging dinner

table discussion where everyone participates. The involved parent, Cascio says, is the best antidote to that familiar malaise among kids: boredom.

Children of all ages respond to example," he says. "If they don't see enthusiasm on the part of their parents for things that are stimulating or enriching, if they don't see their parents reading a book or talking about it, they will never feel that kind of excitement themselves."
