National Telephone Campaign and Weissglass Pledge

Launch New Alumni Loyalty Fund Drive for \$30,000

Spurred by the incentive of a challenge pledge and the dynamics of a national telephone campaign, the 1961 Loyalty Fund was launched toward its goal of \$30,000 on January 30.

The challenge pledge, the first in Wagner's history, was provided by the Weissglass Gold Seal Diary Coporation of Staten Island. Joseph Weissglass, president of the firm and a member of Wagner's development council, has turned over a pledge of \$3,000 designed to develop a broader base of alumni participation in the fund.

The pledge provides for a gift of \$500 for each percentage point above the normal figure of 34% up to and including 40%. Two similiar challenges are now being sought to cover the possibility of alumni participation up to 52%.

The money realized from the alumni effort will go toward the construction of the long-awaited Horrmann Library which is scheduled to be completed during the summer.

The College still lacks \$125,000 of the library's total cost of \$950,000. The alumni effort is planned as a spearhead to an overall final drive to reach the \$950,000 cost and to preclude the possibility of financing the structure after it is actually in use.

Mario Esposito '50 treasurer of the Alumni Association, has accepted the role of National Chairman for the Loyalty Fund. His plans call for three prime techniques for reaching the \$30,000 goal.

Advance Gifts

The first of these is an Advance Gifts effort to be headed by Ernest C. Kiefer '50. This phase will be conducted by mail. It consists of a letter to each alumnus who has completed a pledge in the 75th anniversary drive.

Those who did pledge will be asked to renew that pledge for an additional 30 months. The alumni phase of the 75th anniversary campaign resulted in pledges exceeding \$100,000.

The second step of Esposito's plan calls for a massive telephone effort on a national scale. This step started on January 30 when the Staten Island solicitation began. Off the Island, calls will begin on February 6.

Telephone centers are to be set up wherever there is a concentration of alumni. The Island drive, headed by Arnold Thompson '57, was bolstered by a crew of 75 workers. The group's goal was the completion of 1,000 calls by the end of its first week of operation. The Staten Island calls are expected to end on February 11.

Eight Staten Island firms have generously donated the use of their offices for the telephone effort. They are: Canal Lumber Co.; Costal Drydock & Repair Corp.; Evans Air Products Inc., H.G. Matthius Real Estate & Insurance; Piel Brothers Inc.; Prudential Savings & Loan Assoc.; Tech Products Inc.; and The Russo Agency, Inc.

Off the Island, 27 regional chairmen have already accepted the job of enlisting alumni telephone workers and designating centers from which calls will be placed during the evening hours. The names and areas of these regional chairmen are listed on page 4.

The third phase of the plan consists of class competition. For this plan, volunteer agents will write to their classmates as a follow-up to the telephone calls. This part of the job will begin in February.

Alumni Weekend Set

The dates for the annual Alumni Weekend have been set as May 5 and 6. Ernest C. Kiefer '50 is chairman of the committee for the event.

The program will begin with an alumni golf tournament during the afternoon of May 5. The committee is now investigating the possibility of using the Richmond County Country Club course for that purpose.

Saturday's program of events includes seminars by chairmen of selected Wagner academic departments and class reunions of seven classes.

To date, five men have accepted the responsibility of heading up class reunions. They are Herb Sutter '31, Rolf Danielson '36, Werner Johnson '41, Reginald Kennedy '56, and Bob Murphy '60.

The weekend will be highlighted by the annual Reunion Banquet which will be held at Demyan's Hofbrau, 730 Van Duzer Street. Also scheduled in conjunction with Alumni Weekend is the undergraduates' Spring Songfest.

The Nursing Chapter's executive committee has also announced plans for a 15th anniversary reunion of the nursing school to be held on May 6. A committee for this purpose is headed by Rosanne Schlichting Anderson '56N.

Letters will go out to all Alumni this month reminding them of the Alumni Weekend events.

A Perfect Season

Back in Early September a sportswriter asked Mickey Sullivan to sum up his feelings about the 1960 Wagner team. The Wagner coach, without batting an eye, replied "We're going to win them all."

The writer, accustomed to pessimism when dealing with coaches, asked Sullivan if he might not like to temper his prediction because of the uncertain injury factor. "It doesn't matter", Sullivan responded simply, "we are going to win them all." And so Wagner did win them all, nine games, to achieve the first undefeated season in the college's 33 years of football.

This belief in the inevitability of victory was Sullivan's prime gift to his players who responded by giving Wagner a perfect season. They proved too that a sane football program can be an integral part of the overall college plan.

Wagner was true to its background with this remarkable team. There were no sacrifices made, academic or financial, to assure victory. Indeed, the cumulative academic index of the football team is higher than that of all Wagner's male students.

Three of the seniors are members of the men's honor society. Others are engaged in a variety of activities apart from football ranging from head proctor in the freshman wing of the new dormitory to chairman of the junior prom.

The talent was there of course, but again Wagner can be proud of how the

talent arrived. The players themselves were the chief recruiters. They went back to their home towns and sold Wagner to boys who were both good students and good football players.

A paramount example concerns end Al Ferrie and quarterback Don Cavalli. Ferrie arrived at Wagner in 1957. One year later, his high school teammate from Ridgefield Park, N. J. enrolled. Eventually the pair broke every Wagner passing and pass-catching record.

A glance at the Wagner roster confirms many other instances of this healthy recruiting system.

Among the more satisfying aspects of the season was the excitment generated in the community where people flocked to Wagner games in great numbers for the first time.

That they had an opportunity to see Wagner's best team at home six times is a tribute to Athletic Director Herb Sutter who sensed that 1960 would be a banner year and arranged for six home games by some skillful schedulejuggling.


Before consigning the 1960 season to the files, it might be well to record some of the highlights that will be pleasantly recalled always by those who participated in it as players or spectators.

• Halfback Neil Johnston took the opening kickoff of the year against PMC and raced 88 yards for a touchdown to set a tone for the entire season.

- Cavalli, with his team trailing 18-13, cooly engineered a 67-yard drive in the closing minutes against Trenton to keep the victory streak alive. To score, he shocked the opposition by sending Johnston around end from a formation Wagner had never used before but was storing up for just such an emergency.
- Ferrie made a series of astounding catches and runs at Homecoming in a 47-6 rout of Dickinson and was awarded the Robb Trophy for his performance.
- Halfback Frank Melos ripped off four touchdowns in the 49-20 win over Ursinus. Melos eventually scored 68 points to break the one-year scoring record he had set the year before.
- Cavalli, whose 18 touchdown passes were second in the nation, twice completed passes on fourth-down situations at midfield to spark the 21-12 success against a very strong Kings Point team.
- The Wagner line, growing stronger as the season progressed, threw back Moravian time and again when the vaunted Seahawk offense sputtered. Behind that line were the superb line-backers, Wally Pagan and Tony Franchina. The Moravian score was 13-0.
- Johnston, who began it all against PMC, finished it up with a brilliant performance in the final 19-12 defeat of Upsala. He ran for one TD, passed for another, and caught a pass for the third. Six-thousand spectators, many standing on all sides of the field, roared their tribute when the game ended.

A HOMECOMING REVIEW

 $T^{\rm HE}$ off-campus dinner dance, a 1960 Homecoming innovation, received a rousing vote of approval when 246 Wagner alumni and friends attended that function on October 22 at the Richmond County Country Club.

One of the first acts of the newly-appointed Homecoming committee for 1961 was to seek out an even larger site for a similar affair this year. The group, headed by William Mangini '57, has settled on the new hall of Labetti American Legion Post on Staten Island's Hylan Boulevard. The hall can accommodate 400 persons and there is a strong possibility that the \$18 per couple charge for the initial dinner-dance will be lowered in 1961.

As for the traditional Homecoming events, they were every bit as successful and well-attended as expected. The 1960 committee, headed by Arnold Thompson '57, did an exhaustive preparation job for what was certainly Wagner's grandest Homecoming.

Thompson's final report cited an attendance of more than 5,000 at the Wagner-Dickinson football game and also reported a surplus of \$134 for the entire program. He announced that October 14 is to be the date for Homecoming 1961. Susquehanna University will be Wagner's football opponent on that day.

ONE YEAR AWAY

DESPITE THE NEAR certainty of the third losing basketball season at Wagner since 1945, there is a prevailing school of thought which holds that the Seahawks are only years away from success.

Experience, a quality the 1960 championship team was blessed with in abundance, is sorely lacking this season. Six of the seven men who played regularly last year are no longer at Wagner.

This dearth of steady hands was largely responsible for the Seahawk losing streak that had extended to nine games as *The Link* went to press. The record at the time of the mid-year break was two wins and ten losses.

Even in the midst of the lossses, there was cause to look to the future with hope. Playing as regulars on the varsity are two big freshmen who give every indication of developing into stars of the first magnitude, 6'4" Fred Klittich and 6'7" Van Neher.

Klittich A Future Star

Klittich, who is averaging both nine rebounds and points, has all the physical attributes. He needs only shooting confidence to fulfill his potential. Neher, a boy with desire to grab the ball that borders on the ferocious at times, has shown remarkable progress in a short time. His best and most recent effort was 22 points as a substitute against a very powerful Hofstra team.

A third player with a lot of ability is sophomore Marty Ansa, a 5'11" speedster who didn't play basketball in high school. Ansa, the junior varsity's high scorer, was elevated to the varsity after a particularly torrid performance in which he rolled in 42 points.

Bob Larsen, the 6'7" senior who is the lone returning regular, is averaging 16 points to lead the team in scoring. He's followed by junior Ken Graham whose average is 13. These two, Klittich, and juniors Ollie Smith and Walt Brooks most often comprised Wagner's starting lineup.

The outstanding individual performance was Larsen's 38-point burst in an overtime loss to Siena during a Christmas tournament at Jersey City.

Larsen's 38 points was the most scored by a Wagner player since Bob Mahala set the record of 41 in 1956. Another 5 - minute overtime period, prevented only by a last-second Siena shot from the floor, would surely have given Larsen a chance to top 41.

Operation Deepfreeze

Alumni are invited to submit articles based either on their own unusual experiences or their views of Wagner. Here Al Brier '55, recently discharged after 40 months service in the Coast Guard, tells of Operation Deepfreeze '60 which he participated in as a communications officer aboard the USCGC Eastwind, an icebreaker.

OPERATION DEEPFREEZE is the name used by the U. S. Navy for its yearly logistical resupply and rotation of personnel of the U. S. scientific bases located on the Antartic Continent. Personnel assigned there are replaced annually because of the isolated duty and extremely adverse weather conditions.

The Eastwind left Boston, Mass. on December 1, 1959, enroute to McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, to fulfill her part of the resupply and scientific operation.

After stops in Panama and New Zealand, we sighted our first iceberg on Jan. 11. The camera fans had a field day at first, but in a few days icebergs became so commonplace that few ventured to even look at them.

As part of our participation, we were to occupy various geographical positions, called oceanographic stations, for purposes of collecting bathytheromograph samples, samples of the ocean's bottom, and meteorological information.

History was made on Jan. 13 when three men from the Eastwind became the first men in 58 years to touch down on historic Scott Island in the Ross Sea which they reached by helicopter from the ship. During the operation, the ship conducted soundings around the island, gathering useful hydrographic and navigational data.

Our first mail delivery received at sea occurred on Jan. 15 when we had a rendezvous with the USNA Towle, a Navy resupply ship, bound for Antarctica.

We arrived at McMurdo Sound on Jan. 19 to help the Towle in offloading her cargo while keeping a 14-mile long ice channel free of freezing ice. Men of the Eastwind comprised part of the "longshoremen" gangs who had this cold but necessary job.

Coast Guard History

Another page in Coast Guard history was written on Jan. 30 when two crewmen of the Eastwind became the first Coast Guardsmen to land at the South Pole itself. There they became part of a working party to aid in the off-loading of the giant ski-equipped transport planes which resupplied the base there

In early February, we reached Cape Hallett, the northernmost tip of the Admiralty Range. There exists at Cape Hallett a meteorological station manned by both U. S. and New Zealand scientists as well as a penguin rookery, or breeding ground, manned by some 150,000 penguins.

We sometimes wondered who was watching whom! The naturally curious penguins wandered close enough to allow photos from a distance of three feet. At the same place is Mount Silver, ice-capped and 10,000 feet high. To the rear, or westward from the station, a glacier actually "poured" over a mountain top and slid down the near side, much like whipped cream sliding down the sides of a cake.

McMurdo Sound is but a few miles from the historic base of Little America V, abandoned in 1958, and even closer to the base used by the English explorer Scott who died there from exposure and starvation in 1924.

In mid-February, the New Zealand Oceanographic Ship, HMNZS Endeavor stopped at the Sound, and we offered her logistical support. It was a fine opportunity to exchange ideas by two ships operating similarly but of quite different design.

The Eastwind is an ingeniously and specially-designed icebreaker, capable of withstanding tremendous pressures of ice, and of breaking ice of thicknesses up to 19 feet. She is powered by six diesel engines, converting to electric, and develops 10,000 hp on two propellors.

This power, coupled with remarkable manueverability is nearly instantaneously available to the "conning offiser" on the bridge.

The ship has, within its design, a system of transfer of tonnage, in the form of sea water, from tanks along her sides and both fore and aft. By employing this system, the ship can be rocked free from being caught up in ice pressure. It is nearly impossible for the ship to become locked in ice, although on one occasion it took us 24 hours to do so.

After nearly 60 days in Antarctic waters, we pointed our bow homeward. Our ports of call included Sydney, Pago Pago and Balboa in Panama.

Four and one-half months after departure, and some 32,000 crusing miles later, the Eastwind and her crew landed in Boston.




