

The standing ovation given Colonel John H. Glenn by a capacity crowd in Sutter Gymnasium Sept. 18 was an early indicator of a thrilling week. Three speakers within four days gave emphasis to the importance of the Complex and noted new horizons for scientific research and knowledge. It was a week suitable to the dedication of Wagner's \$3.7 million Science Complex.

Earlier in September, a ribbon leading to a three-tier parking lot was cut, allowing enough parking space for all student automobiles.

On Nov. 23 the 15-story women's dormitory will be dedicated. See the story on page nine. Later this academic year the College Union will be dedicated. When this building is in use, the campus facilities will have increased about 60 per cent in one year's time.

Astronaut John Glenn Dedicates Science Complex

Colonel Glenn, first American astronaut to orbit the earth, talked about the role of scientific technology and how the scientific method affects our daily lives. He said this generation of college students is the first to go to school when the scientific method is at last being applied to everything in our lives.


This should "cut away the sham and hypocrisy" existing in our society, he said. Colonel Glenn pointed out that with the utilization of technology and scientific methods will come rapid change, such as the mechanization eliminating some job opportunities but creating others.

More than 50 per cent of college graduates in recent years are working in jobs that didn't exist when they were born, he said. He added "We no longer have the luxury of a generation of time to assimilate and adapt to scientific changes."


During the convocation dedication ceremonies, Colonel Glenn received an honorary Doctor of Science degree from the College.

In his talk, College President Dr. Arthur O. Davidson noted that "Wagner College, a private, liberal arts, church college, wants to pay special tribute to Colonel Glenn for dramatically emphasizing so much that is good; not only being a successful and productive man, but also in demonstrating that years of decision, determination, experience and perseverance precede success."

Colonel Glenn is a native of Cambridge, Ohio. He graduated from Muskingham College in Ohio with a B.S. degree in engineering. He lives in Seabrook, Tex. with his wife, one son, and one daughter. His address is Sleepy Hollow Court, a name that contrasts with the action he has crammed into his 47 years.



Dr. Leroy Augenstein

At a banquet for alumni and friends on Saturday, Sept. 21, that was part of the Science Complex dedication week, Dr. Leroy Augenstein was a provocative speaker on recent medical breakthroughs in transplanting organs of the human body.

Dr. Augenstein, chairman of the biophysics department of Michigan State University, is an internationally known educator and lecturer.

He raised questions concerning medical ethics, asking such things as "Who should make the decision when a person, an organ donor, is dead? How far should we go in making 'spare parts' to allow people to live almost indefinitely? How far should we proceed

in the biological control of man's genetic makeup?"

"Does the doctor make these decisions, or does the individual? Is it the patient, the federal government . . . who? Biological advances, accomplished and potential, compel us to decide now what direction manipulation is to take. In other words, shall we play God?"

Dr. Augenstein is a member of the Michigan State Board of Education, has served as chairman of the MSU Department of Biophysics since 1962 and is presently adjunct professor at San Francisco Theological Seminary.

He has appeared on three major television networks and delivers close to 200 public lectures a year.

Dr. M. H. Trytten, prominent in the world of science and Special Advisor to the President, Natural Academy of Sciences, talked to a luncheon group at Wagner following the Wednesday, Sept. 18 dedication of the Science Complex.

He said our environment has been seriously damaged by such things as air pollution, destruction of resources and oil spillages in the oceans.

The cost of reversal of these damages will be phenomenal, Dr. Trytten said, and the manpower requirements to work for these reversals will be considerable. The role of the liberal arts college, like Wagner, is gaining in importance as producers of this specialized manpower, he added.

"As scientists become more concerned with effects from without rather than within, there will be a great future for specialists in the behavioral sciences," he said.

From 1964 to 1968, Dr. Trytten served as Vice-Chairman of the Commission on Human Resources. Until earlier this year, and for the past seven years, he officiated as President of the Scientific Manpower Commission. He holds an earned doctorate and a half-dozen honorary degrees.

Enrollment Climbs to 3000

There are more than 3000 students enrolled at Wagner for the first time. Official figures of October 15 show 3035 students. Of the total, 2684 are undergraduate (including those studying overseas on the Bregenz campus) and 351 are graduate students. There are also more foreign students than ever—31 persons from 22 countries.

1000 Attend Summer Sessions

More than 1000 persons studied in the summer sessions again this year. There were 1086 enrolled in the two four-week sessions. There were more undergraduates than last summer (910 vs. 885) but less graduate students (176 vs. 223).

Afro-American History Course is Offered

A course in Afro-American history is being offered this fall.

Administrative resignations have been received from George R.F. Tamke, director of college relations, who has returned to the administrative staff of Susquehanna University; and Louis DeLuca, director of alumni affairs, who becomes vice president for development of Marycrest College in Davenport, Iowa in November.

Student Aid Program to Increase

There will be sizeable increases in the student aid program for 1968-69. Federal funds remain about the same, changing from \$331,950 in 67-68 to \$332,800 for 68-69, but aid from the College to students increases from \$217,800 to \$284,500. This year 311

students are receiving scholarship or grant money from the college, 111 receive a donated scholarship or grant, and 200 earn money in a form of student employment.

Top Salary Offer to 1968 Wagner Grad: \$9100

Top salary offer made to a 1968 Wagner graduate was \$9100, compared to a top offer of \$8190 the previous year. 48 firms recruited on campus.


At 1:30 p.m. the Seahawks meet one of their toughest opponents of the football season — Wittenberg. After the game an open house continues at the dorm.

Today's Church College

UPON BEING elected the first Director of Church Relations for Wagner College, I asked myself "What is the purpose of a church college?" Soon, as I again became acquainted with college life I asked two more questions: "Do the students of today really "dig" this concept?" "Is the church college a thing of the past?"

True, the concept of the church college has undergone manifold changes in the last decade. However, these changes should not prompt anxiety; rather they should be understood as a phenomena that is part of the changing sociological, economical and even theological patterns of the day.

I have found that today's reaction to the term "church related" varies. Some deride the term as a bit of ancient history, true to tradition, but a meaningless combination of words for our contemporary society. Others are convinced that it is an over-used phrase coined solely to continue the traditional separation of church and state.

Still others, aware that changes of thought have been and are taking place, ask and even demand that there be a re-examination of the words "church-related" in the light of contemporary thinking and experience.

There is a growing fear that we are becoming thoroughly secular. This very fact can be used for constructive ends. It presents an opportunity to serve a person in his particular situation using whatever resources — scientific fact, technical skills and religious principles — that may be helpful to his need.

An example is the new Science Complex at Wagner and the philosophy behind it — in a liberal arts college a science building is not built for science teaching alone. In fields as art, economics, religion, philosophy, sociology and others, natural sciences are indispensable, basic requirements for progress and success. A new synthesis between social studies, humanities and the sciences is required in a liberal education. Programs have to include an interpretation of science in its humanistic and sociological implications. This is not only sound reasoning, but also true to the concept that the college must enable its campus community to find its identity not only on Grymes Hill but as a functional part of the total society.

The challenge to the church college is great. It must be more than academically and intellectually sound. It must relate to society and be involved in its needs.

MY SEARCH for answers has brought me to the conclusion that the church college must see itself primarily as a servant. We, therefore, have the responsibility of confronting ourselves with certain questions:

1. What can the college — with the talent of its faculty, the beauty of its campus and the functions of its buildings — do for the church and its congregations?

2. What do the congregations of the church expect from their college to aid them in their mission? To put it another way, what role can the college play to strengthen the congregations in their confrontation with poverty, unemployment, inadequate housing, civil rights, ghettos, juvenile delinquency, dope addiction, alcoholism, the lowering of moral standards and the increase in the divorce rate? The college wants to help but the congregations must tell us how.

3 • What suggestions can the church make to the college so that we might fulfill our mission in the metropolitan scene?

• How can we alert industry to the advantage of a church college?

• How can we help the unskilled worker, the beatnik and the drop-out?

• What channels are open to bring the story of Wagner to the wealthy and the poor and to people who scoff at the church?

4. What does the church mean when IT speaks of a church college? It is vital that the church re-examine its thinking on this matter. Platitudes, stock answers and out-moded cliches will no longer suffice. Let the church speak. Its answers will be prayerfully and eagerly awaited.

These are some of the questions. Answers must be found within the structure of the church. When found answers must be carefully studied and placed in the position of THE priority deserved.

When all answers are available and we have the completed picture before us we have to seek ways to implement the answers. We dare not file them away. Truly the time is now.

It is important to remind ourselves that creative ideas are costly in their implementation. Good ideas demand translation into action and this is expensive in talent, time and money.

It must be understood that once a mutual understanding has been arrived at concerning these answers — which help the college move toward its specified goals — then another strategy is called for. It is at this point that the church, through its congregations, members and friends, must be willing to support and help bring these ideas to fruition. This can be done through intellectual, social, spiritual and financial contributions.

Such a combination of ideas and dedicated cooperation can only result in bringing new meaning, new power and new emphasis to the historic fact that Wagner is a church college.

Province of Staten

Madison Avenue pundits will advise you, "Never complain as long as they mention your name."

This corn pone advice may have to suffice for the Wagner College family because of *The Name Is' the Game* that begins this fall.

To get to the point, this is the first semester Staten Island students trek to their newest, largest and most comprehensive public high school — the Susan B. Wagner.

Now Susan B. Wagner, first wife of the former mayor of New York City and current ambassador to Spain, was a charming lady, but to memorialize her in a high school name in the same community containing Wagner College created, at the very least, a public relations nightmare. The choice of the name in the same locale as Wagner College has been variously viewed as the brain child of an empty-headed public official or that of an ever-hopeful sycophant.

The situation is not entirely gloomy. There aren't too many Island residents who remember that Wagner College had its own high school a little more than three decades ago. And Wagner College is about a mile north of the Clove Road exit of the Staten Island Expressway, while Susan B. Wagner High School is about a mile south of the expressway's Bradley Avenue exit. Thus, time and distance are dimensions in the College's favor.

Granted the College did not initiate the name. Nor does it hold a copyright. There was a composer, for one, by the name of Richard Wagner who preceded the rock 'n' rollers. And there was Honus Wagner who collected a bundle of newspaper clippings for his feats playing shortstop with the Pittsburgh Pirates. We don't mean to skip over any of the other Wagners, but we just wanted to give you the idea.

The situation has already caused concern — and a touch of consternation — among members of the editorial staff of the Staten Island Advance. Headlines have very restrictive letter counts, yet it will be essential to distinguish between Wagner College and Susan B. Wagner High School.

For graduates of the College, it will no longer do to say, "I studied at Wagner." For friends and fans, it will no longer be precise enough to report, "I'm going to the game (or concert or play) at Wagner." No longer can the conversationalist be provincial enough to assume that there is only one Wagner.

Naturally there's a big difference between a school awarding degrees and a school offering diplomas. But the public catches on slowly. I think it was 1942 before the folks down in Concord stopped referring to the College as "Wagners." They may have assumed the College was a branch of the Concord car dealer of the same name. With the new name game, we may all have to watch our language.

The impetus for Dr. Romaine L. Gardner's political involvement stems from his conviction that the policies being followed by the Johnson administration in Vietnam are not only immoral but contrary to our own self-interest as a nation.

When opposition to the President's policies coalesced the candidacy of Sen. McCarthy, who if nominated and elected to the presidency would change these policies, Dr. Gardner consented to run as a delegate to the Democratic National Convention.

Dr. Gardner is naturally disappointed that Sen. McCarthy did not receive the Democratic nomination. He remains convinced, however, that Sen. McCarthy was preferred over Vice President Humphrey by a majority of Democratic voters. He believes the convention system must be changed in order to give greater expression to the views of the people and less expression to the views of the party leaders.

ON THE LAST day of the Democratic National Convention, a home-made sign in the gallery of the Amphitheatre read: "Bring the Boys Home . . . from Chicago." Some of us came home from Chicago feeling a little like returning soldiers, and defeated ones at that. After the melee of Wednesday evening some of us began wearing tags around our necks which read: "U.S. National. If found beaten or dead please notify U.S. Consul."

The McCarthy delegates did not return with many victories. There was one action taken by the Convention, however, which all of us could applaud. The Credentials Committee asked that the Unit Rule be re-examined and perhaps abolished at the precinct, county and state level and asked that no state be permitted to send delegations to the National Convention that are hand picked by a few party leaders. (The Unit Rule is a winner-take-all rule and when it is pyramided from the precinct through the state level it can effectively block minority views.)

When one realizes that the entire Texas delegation was selected through just such a pyramiding of the Unit Rule and that some 600 delegates were selected by party machines one understands what a transforming effect this report could have on the next National Convention.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION '68

The good, the bad and the ugly

One wonders what the Democratic National Convention of 1968 might have been like had this report been made and accepted in 1964.

If the Convention was at its best in calling for an end to the use of the Unit Rule, it was at its worst in rejecting the minority report of the Platform Committee which called for an end to the war in Vietnam.

The Convention, instead, approved the majority report, which reaffirmed the Vietnam policies of the present administration. The action taken by the delegates in voting down the minority report was the greatest tragedy of the Convention because this action dramatically informed Democratic voters that their opinions did not really matter.

Of the 7.5 million Democrats who were given an opportunity to express their views on the war in Vietnam this year, 80 per cent preferred the Vietnam policies of Eugene McCarthy and/or Robert Kennedy to those of President Johnson. In spite of this fact, the delegations of state after state voted against a Vietnam plank which sought to embody the McCarthy-Kennedy position.

After the defeat of the peace plank I began to wonder if Arthur Miller, playwright and member of the Connecticut delegation wasn't right when he said: "Had

there never been a riot on Michigan Avenue, the meeting in the Amphitheatre would still have been the closest thing to a session of the All-Union Soviet that ever took place outside of Russia." The majority of delegates seemed to be saying to Democratic voters: "We expect you to vote for us in November, but don't tell us how to run our party."

IF THE CREDENTIALS report questioning the use of the Unit Rule was the good and the defeat of the peace plank was the bad, what was the ugly? It was the fight on Wednesday night, not the fight inside the Amphitheatre for the Presidential nomination, but the fight outside the Hilton in Grant Park and on Michigan Avenue.

On Sept. 18, Attorney General Ramsey Clark made a statement before the commission appointed by President Johnson to explore the causes of violence. The statement made by Clark before this commission was not made as an analysis of what happened in Chicago and yet its application to what happened there is unmistakable. The statements in italics below are those of Clark. My interpretation follows:

"The clear offer of a fair and reasonable accommodation of requests to assemble and speak reduces the risk of violence."

Mayor Daley's refusal to issue a parade permit to those groups who wanted to protest our involvement in Vietnam as well as his refusal to offer them a meeting place where their views could be aired increased the risk of violence. To confine 10,000 men and women who felt as passionately about our involvement in Vietnam as did those men and women in Chicago to a postage stamp size park, is to play your own game of confrontation politics.

"Careful distinction between non-violence demonstrators acting within the law and those who commit violence, protecting one, arresting the other, is essential to avoid the involvement of the non-violent in violence."

It is not clear how much provocation the demonstrators caused or how many demonstrators were involved in acts of extreme provocation, but it is clear that Chicago policemen used force indiscriminately on those who had committed violence as well as on bystanders, newsmen, peaceful demonstrators, doctors and medical students, thus increasing the level of violence.

"An express mandate to the entire police complement to use the minimum force necessary to execute lawful orders, to refrain from use of excessive force, must be understood by every officer."

The Chicago police department apparently either did not understand or accept this statement. Even if one were to grant that most of those beaten were guilty of extreme acts of provocation, this would hardly justify such acts as clubbing the subdued, the unconscious, or spreading tear gas into a police van loaded with those already arrested.

"It is the duty of leadership and law enforcement to control violence, not cause it. To seek ways of relieving tension, not look for a fight."

Some of the security forces in Chicago were plainly looking for a fight. This was demonstrated not only outside the Hilton but also inside the Amphitheatre. I was standing next to Alex Rosenberg when two men came up to him and demanded to see his credentials. Rosenberg had shown his credentials to at least five persons before he ever got to his seat with the New York delegation. Further, he had been asked to display his credentials on several prior occasions that evening. This time he asked to see the credentials of the security agent. The security agent refused and continued to insist Rosenberg show his own. When Rosenberg refused to either show his credentials or leave the floor, they called in the blue helmeted police, who moved in a flying wedge, knocked people out of the way and carried him out.

It is my belief that the violence could have largely been avoided if Mayor Daley and the Chicago police had taken seriously the position embodied in the statement by the Attorney General. If one believes that it is the function of the police to punish people who hold ideas different from their own, then the police in Chicago are to be applauded.

If, on the contrary, it is the function of police officers to protect the right to dissent while at the same time maintaining order with as little violence as possible, Mayor Daley and his police department have a great deal to learn.

At any rate, here is one McCarthy delegate to the Democratic National Convention who refuses to believe that everything that happened there was bad; some of it was good and a great deal of it was ugly.

On a typical day at a typical job, the typical worker gives slight thought to bugs.

For Lillian R. Olsen '50, bugs are it.

First thing in the morning, Lillian checks her hundreds of bugs to see if they are thriving cultures and finding a friendly environment for reproduction and for performing tasks that someday may result in more effective and diversified enzymes for industrial use.

Imagine the editor of this magazine trying to interpret how important these bugs are in Lillian's work. Imagine too that the editor's knowledge of biology is confined to fascinating fantasy like the many squiggles he imagines to be dancing about in his drinking water.

So there were problems of communication in writing this Alumni Profile, and it is to Lillian's credit that she could lead us to an area of understanding.

Enzymes manufactured by the Wallerstein division are designed primarily for industrial use. In industrial form, enzymes make the bread you eat more tasty, the shoes you wear more pliable and your clothing easier to clean and care for.

Last year the division marketed enzyme products for the baking and meat industry. During the baking process the enzyme acts on starch by converting it to smaller molecules that keep it fresh longer, conserve the aroma and retain the flavor of bread and rolls.

Enzymes are organic substances that cause—and direct—chemical reactions.

The complicated process of enzyme manufacture is achieved with specialized equipment including stainless steel fermentors, evaporators, centrifuges, dryers, filters and rooms with controlled humidity and sterile air.

A new area for enzyme application that involves Lillian is a detergent additive. Another exciting area of inquiry at Wallerstein is the application of enzymes and enzymatic processes to health needs; digestive aids and substances for wound debridement.

It is to Wagner College's benefit that alumni like Lillian are performing such vital tasks. Her division, research and development, concerns itself with the future.
