HOCKEY SIGNALS

Every Fan
Should
Know



1. CHARGING — Rotating clenched fists around one another in front of the body.



2. SLOW WHISTLE — Arm extended above the head, to be used for an icing infraction, delayed offside, or delayed penalty.



3. HIGH STICKING — Holding both fists, clenched, one above the other at the height of the forehead.



4. HOOKING — A series of tugging motions with both arms, as if pulling something towards the body.



5. HOLDING — Claspings either wrist with the other hand well in front of the chest.



6. SLASHING — A series of chopping motions with the edge of one hand across the opposite forearm.



7. ELBOWING — Tapping either elbow with the other hand.



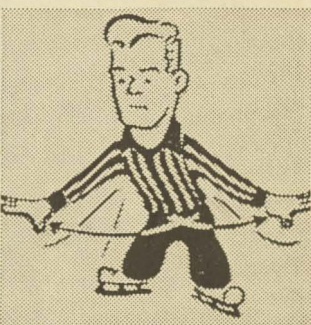
8. TRIPPING — Extending the right leg forward, clear of the ice, and striking it with the right hand below the knee.



9. CROSS-CHECKING — A series of forward and backward motions with both fists clenched extending from the chest.



10. MISCONDUCT — Placing both hands on the hips several times and then pointing to the penalized player.



11. WASH-OUT — Both arms swung laterally across the body with the palms down; when used by referee it indicates goal disallowed; when used by linesmen it indicates no icing or offside.



12. DELAYED PENALTY — Referee points several times to penalized player and then uses "slow whistle" (2) signal until stoppage of play.



13. INTERFERENCE — Arms extended and crossed in front of the body.



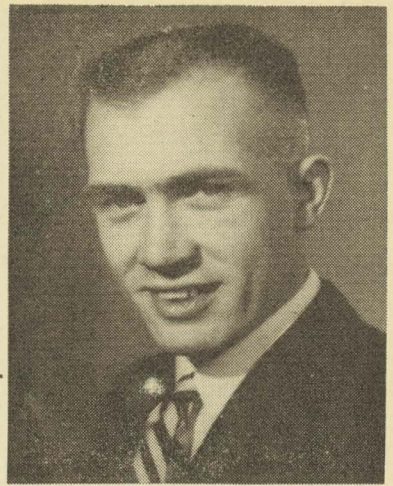
14. KNEEING — Extending the right leg forward and clear of the ice and tapping the knee with either hand.



15. ICING — A series of upward motions with the right hand to indicate the possibility of an icing infraction. Upon the completion of icing, signal (2) is given for a whistle.

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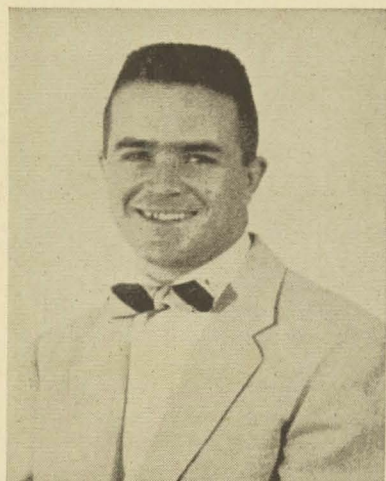
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PIONEERS ON WAY TO MANY NEW RECORDS

If the present University of Denver hockey team continues its winning pace of the first 10 games of the season, Coach Murray Armstrong's forces will set several D.U. school records.

Including the Michigan Tech game of December 27, the Pioneers have won nine and lost one in over-all competition and sport a 6 - 1 Western Intercollegiate Hockey League record. At that pace, the Pioneers will set new records in both league and full-season play.

The best previous D.U. season came in 1951-52, the first year of Western League play. The Pioneers won nine and lost three in league play and sported an 18-

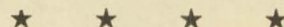
6-1 over-all mark. The Pioneers finished second, tied with Michigan, in league play but lost out to the Wolverines in a vote for the right to enter the NCAA tournament.

No other Denver team has ever finished that high in league play and, of course, no Denver team has ever won a berth in the NCAA playoff. That's why, if Armstrong and his Pioneers reach the dual WIHL title and NCAA tournament goal they have set for themselves, you can rewrite the University of Denver hockey record book along about March 15.

INTERESTING ICE ITEMS—Minnesota holds a slight 9-11-2 edge over the Pioneers in a series that began in 1950-51 . . . Minnesota Goalie Jack McCartan was named to the all-American team last winter . . . Next D.U. home game — Tuesday, January 7, U.S. Nationals, the 1958 equivalent of the American Olympic team.



GEORGE CONGRAVE



Undoubtedly the best hockey news to reach University of Denver sports fans this month is the news that George Congrave, seriously-injured Pioneer hockey player, is making remarkable strides toward recovery from his near-fatal brain injury suffered in a pre-season practice incident. Congrave is now undergoing physio-therapy treatment at the Craig Colony Rehabilitation Center in West Denver and daily reports indicate continued improvement.

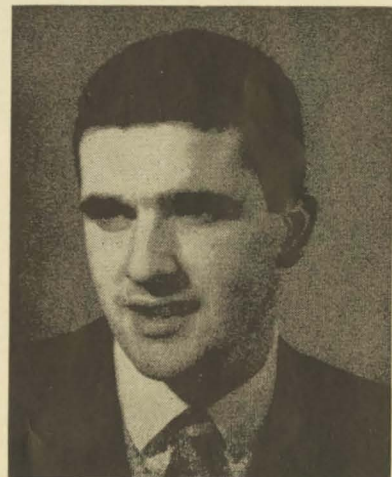
The road to recovery is a long and expensive one, however, and donations are still being accepted for the Congrave Fund, set up to help George and his family defray some of the staggering costs of the current emergency. Persons who care to do so may make contributions to E. E. "Tad" Wieman, University of Denver director of athletics and trustee of the Congrave Fund.

Congrave's teammates have requested that his name and picture appear in the official D.U. hockey program along with all other members of the team. Here is the way Congrave would have been listed in the program had he not been injured.

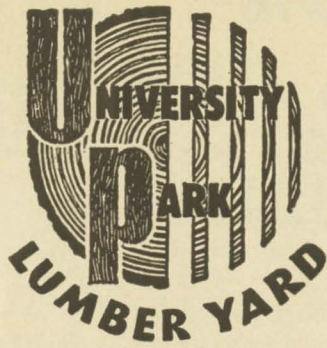

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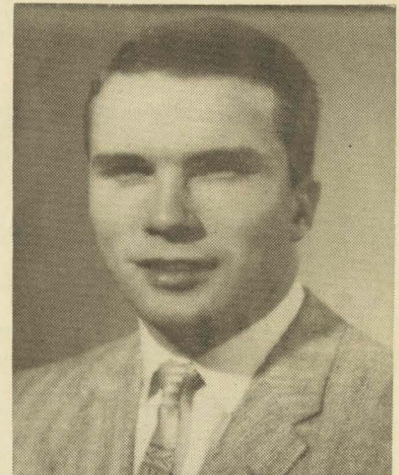

HOCKEY RULES

SCORING

When the puck is put fairly into the goal by means of the stick or if it should carom off any part of a defending player, a goal is scored. The duration of a match is 60 minutes divided into three periods of twenty minutes each. Rest periods of ten minutes are allowed between the playing periods.

STOPPING THE PUCK

A goal-keeper may stop the puck in any way he chooses, but must not throw it forward.

FALLING ON PUCK

No defending player, except the goal-keeper, shall be permitted to fall on the puck when the puck is within the goal crease. For infringement of this rule, play shall immediately be stopped and a penalty shot shall be ordered.

THE PENALTY BENCH

Each rink must be provided with a bench capable of seating eight persons, for the use of penalty timekeeper, time-keeper, scorer and penalized players.

TIMING DEVICES

Each rink must be provided with a gong or other suitable sound device for the use of timekeepers. Each rink must be provided with some form of electrical clock in order that spectators, players and officials will be properly informed as to the time element at all stages of the game.

PRECEDING THE PUCK INTO ATTACKING ZONE

Players of an attacking team must not precede puck into Attacking Zone. This is an off-side, and play is stopped and the puck faced in Neutral Zone at face-off spot nearest Attacking Zone.

HOCKEY EQUIPMENT

The Hockey Stick

Hockey sticks shall not exceed 53 inches from the heel to the end of the shaft and 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches from the heel to the end of the blade.

The blade of the stick shall not exceed three inches in height except in the case of the goal-keepers' sticks which shall not exceed 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches except at the heel where it must not exceed 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

The stick, unless otherwise permitted, shall be made of wood and without any projections.

A match misconduct penalty shall be imposed on any player except a goal-keeper, using an over-size stick. A penalty shot shall be awarded against any goal-keeper using an over-size stick.

GOAL-KEEPER'S PADS

The leg guards worn by goal-keepers shall not exceed ten inches in extreme width when on the leg of the player.

DANGEROUS EQUIPMENT

The use of pads or protectors made of metal or of any other material likely to cause injury to a player is prohibited.

THE PUCK

The puck shall be made of vulcanized rubber or other approved material, one inch thick and three inches in diameter and shall be of approved make.

SKATES

Hockey skates shall be of approved design. The use of the skates known as "reachers" or of any skates so designed that they may cause injury is prohibited.

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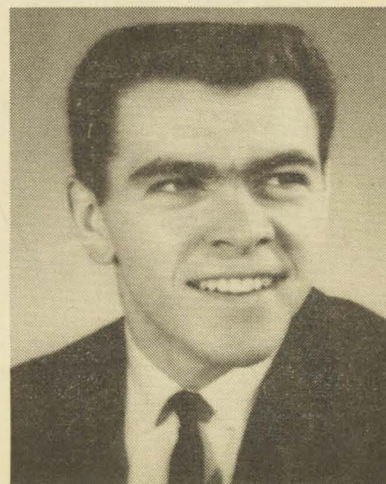
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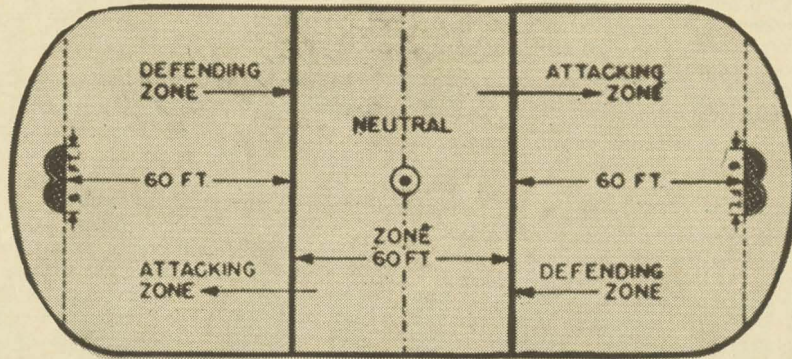

THE PLAYING SURFACE



The playing surface is as nearly as possible 200 feet long by 85 feet wide. Ten feet from each end of the rink and in the center of a (red) line 2 inches wide, drawn completely across the width of the ice, regulation goal posts (nets) 6 feet wide and 4 feet high are set.

The ice area between the two goals shall be divided into three parts by lines, 12 inches in width, and blue in color, drawn 60 feet out from the (red) goal lines, and extended completely across the rink, parallel with the (red) goal lines.

That portion of the ice surface in which the goal is situated shall be called the "Defending Zone" of the team defending that goal; the central portion shall be known as the "Neutral Zone" and the portion farthest from the defended goal as the "Attacking Zone."

There shall also be a line, 2 inches in width, and red in color, drawn completely across the rink in the center ice, parallel with the (red) goal lines, known as the "Center Line." Body checking is permitted by defending team to this red line.

A player may advance the puck toward the opponents' goal by passing it to a teammate anywhere inside his own blue line up to opponents' blue line.

If, however, the puck is passed forward from the Defending Zone into the Attacking Zone then the puck must enter that zone ahead of the pass receiver—in other words, the pass receiver must be "on side."

No player of one team is allowed to be in his opponents' goal zone ahead of the puck and if that happens there will be

a whistle by the Linesman and an ensuing face-off. However, there are occasions when stopping the play for this reason would have the effect of preventing the other team from making a good play by intercepting the puck and starting an attack in the opposite direction. To meet this situation the rules provide for a "slow whistle." Thus where a defending player intercepts the puck and carries or passes it back into the "center" (neutral) zone the Linesman will indicate the offside by raising his arm above his head and permit the play to continue without blowing the whistle. If the defending player is not successful in getting the puck into the "center" (neutral) and then the Linesman will blow a "slow whistle" and the ensuing face-off will take place in the usual way.

Should any player of a team, equal or superior in numerical strength to the opposing team, shoot the puck from behind his own blue line (defending zone), beyond the (red) goal line of the opposing team, it will be known as "Icing the Puck," and play shall be stopped and the puck faced off at the end face-off spot of the offending team.

Three red face-off spots, 12 inches in diameter, marked on the ice in the Neutral Zone five feet from each blue line are used for facing off the puck when any rule infractions occur in that particular area.

The face-off spots in the end zones and surrounded by a circle with a radius of fifteen feet are used for facing off the puck when rule infractions occur in the end zone area. The reason for the circle with a radius of fifteen feet is to designate the distance all players are to remain from the two passing players facing off the puck.

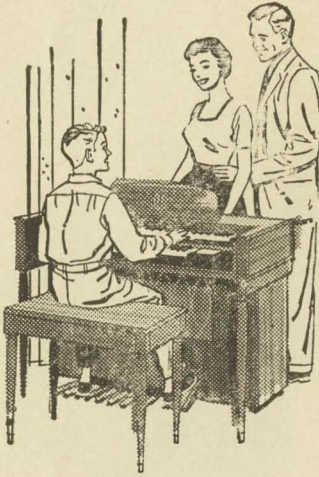

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Hockey Penalties

Players are penalized for infractions of the rules by being banished from the game for intervals of from two minutes to the balance of the game, depending on the type of rule infraction or foul committed.

There are five types of penalties, namely: Minor (2 minutes); Major (5 minutes); Misconduct (10 minutes); Match (balance of game); Penalty Shot (free shot on goal).

Minor penalties are given for such minor infractions as tripping, hooking, holding, elbowing, interference, slashing, cross-checking, charging, spearing, etc.

Major penalties are given for injuries resulting from a player carrying his stick above the height of his shoulder, starting fist fights and other serious offenses.

Misconduct penalties are divided into two classifications—10-minute misconducts and game misconducts. A misconduct penalty is given for foul and abusive language. Also abuse of officials. A game misconduct is given when a player's conduct is such that, in the opinion of the referee, it is best for all concerned that he leave the ice for the balance of the game.

Match penalties are imposed when a player deliberately injures an opponent or fights. The penalized player is through for the match, and the case referred to the league for further action.

A Penalty Shot is awarded when an attacking player is tripped on a break-away with no one to pass but the goaltender. The player fouled must take the penalty shot.

An explanation for the reason of the penalty will be given over the Public Address system, as well as credit for the scoring of goals and assists by the various players so deserving.



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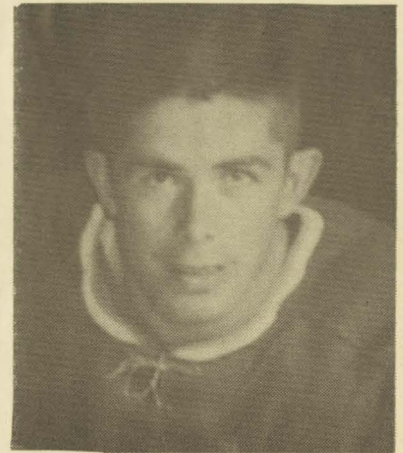

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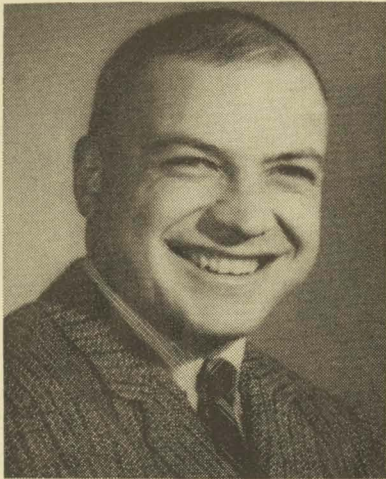
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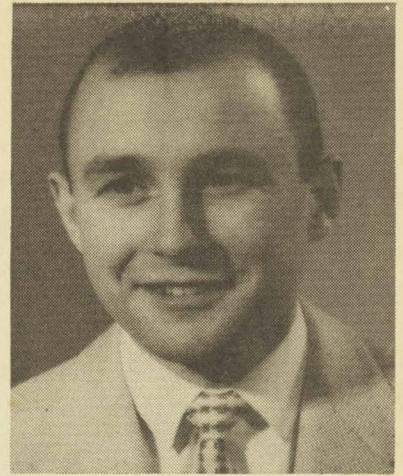
