Disrupting Racism: Next Steps by Anita Coleman, Ph.D.



Scripture: Luke 4: 16 - 21 and Matthew 6: 9 - 13 (NRSV)

Our discussion takes its shape from a recent book: *Rise, Shine, Be Woke* by Anita Coleman, Stephanie Patterson, Francena Willingham, Ash Coleman, Susan Skoglund, Sharon Wakamoto, and Marvella Lambright. 7 voices from different generations, 4 women leading edge Boomers, a Gen X woman, an immigrant woman, and a young Millennial American, write about being Black, White, and Other, in middle class America. The Immigration Act of 1965 made the USA more diverse; along with renegade capitalism, it is also shifting the power balance, increasing racism, and injustices. Euro-Americans are now the majority-minority in half a dozen states, income inequality increased most among Asian Americans from 1970-2016, and suburbanites are the new face of homelessness in America because of wage uncertainties, housing shortages, and classism. Confronting privilege, decentering whiteness, and exposing colorism are critical steps for achieving racial equity and the Beloved Community, Jesus' kin-dom of God among us.



Anti-racist Rule & Actions (examples of how people are actively practicing anti-racism): Golden rule: Identify a person the way she or he asks to be identified. Actions: Advocacy; Active Listening; Activism; Ally; Civic Engagement; Christian Witnessing; Cultural Humility; Lifelong Learning; Reconciliation; Reparation; Solidarity (see also Eight Steps To End Racism). Link Learning to Action: What is a specific way in which you can apply or turn into action what you've heard today? The action may be a daily practice or strategy that helps you be woke, disrupt racism in your sphere of influence, increase engagement across racial communities, etc. For more ideas please consult the GA Overtures and Notes and Resources below.
