I have received your much esteemed favour of the first December last. Please to accept my sincere
thanks for your valuable communications, and your affectionate cautions; the pamphlets came also to hands at
the same time, but I have been obliged to pay three dollars 18cts postage Northern because postage have been lately
raised if they had been put up in a small box to be forwarded by the diligence this would have paid only about 30cts
but by the mail those bundles's postage is taken in proportion of the postage price of the single letters this one has
been taxed by its weight at the rate of 28 single letters friendly correspondence for such things are more suitable, but
never mind. I am very much pleased with them, and what I observe here, is for your future government, the lists of
your two Southern and northern Concessions will be very useful to me in the present occurrence.

ADMITTED to the present you will find a correct translation of the communication I have presented to the
G. E. O.: f. about his affiliation with J. C. this translation is as near as the two languages can admit to be well
understood and my ability permits, I am pleased to think that that piece will be acceptable to you and to our Bre-
thren as to the final success of it. I can't exactly say what it shall be, may you will find it drawn in pretty str-
ong words but I must follow the running tide here of the times Smooth speeches have but very little effect upon
bold hearts sharp expressions raise them up from their sleep like pungent salts rise the spirits of the fainting
G. H. has good many friends amongst the officers of the G. E. O.: f. who will try to excuse him as much
as they will find it possible to do, so the business is going on very slowly, until now the G. E. O.: f. never has heard a
single word on that subject all letters or bundles coming from America at the G. Secretary office of the G. E. in Pa-
ris have always been delivered to M^r. G. H. alone who on that account was at liberty when in possession of them
to intercept or destroy them at pleasure, but the master now puts in evidence he can't hide it no more it must end
ego examination and Judgment, the president of the Sup^r: council of the Rites hath promised me to have it na-
me of the Mock N. Y. Consistory and of J. C. & C^o erased from the masonic Calendar of the G. E. O.: f. at once
printing this is a point carried and if I don't succeed to further more it will be always a satisfaction for the good
masons to see those names blotted out of the list of the regular bodies connected with the G. E. O.: f. and J. C. shall
be deprived of the show he so proudly makes of his alliance with the G. E. O.: f. time will learn us more I hope.

As to the unfortunate Ch^r: la Triple Union, I can't do nothing in his behalf the foolishness of his old
rulers have brought him to its ruin they have called him in the mire and from the mire to the tomb where he
is now well entombed forever to rise no more, There is now seven years he has been erased from the list of the
Chapters constituted by, and under the jurisdiction of the G. E. O.: f. since the granting of his Capitular letters
and Warrant, 21 years ago. 1806, never the G. E. O.: f. has received from him a single word of communication
even of the arrival of the warrant, never the list of the officers, members initiations &c. &c. has been sent, never
one single cent for the dues hath been paid, never after the death of the first representative dead 18 years ago another
one has been appointed, what can I say in excuse of such a neglect and contempt of all the laws & regulations
of the Order, I will tell you besides that this ch^r: hath never enjoyed a good name, at the G. E. O.: f. the sojourners
P. R. T.: from France or the West Indies, who have visited the ch^r: at N. Y. have always been so rudey received by
the president J. G. T. that they have all made unfavourable reports, and by those who have witnessed the reigning dis-
cord in his bosom he hath been represented as a tumultuous body paying no regard to the dignity of the Order its
laws and regulations, in respect to the knighthood, being disorderly governed only by the fancies of a rude despotic
ruler, all that hath been magnified and strengthened yet by J. C. friends, so that the poor ch^r: without hesitation

hath been interdicted for his antimasonic conduct his want of duty towards the constitutive body lies superior and condemned to be erased from the list of the Ch. Ch. belonging to the G. E. O. F. and his name blotted out of the calendar Please to observe my dear Bro^r. how far will this be from the verisimilitude you wrote to me about private animosity the Capital Warrant the property of fools, to be sent back in due form & if you tell me now that you certainly was crazy at that time, have you forgotten that the Warrant is the property only of the Grantor who gives it to good masons and takes it away when they behave bad, Did you not recollect that I have been my self two and twenty years preaching against all those abuses for the preservation of the Ch. to who have I preached to Blocks unwilling to hear me to Coax the passions of their adopted ruler, who was vexing the Ch. at home and killing him in secret both at home and in France can you believe that I ever will consent to be the plotters of guilty against my own Conscience no the fools must receive now their deserved reward, I can't help it, if one day the G. A. O. T. V. grant to J. G. T. grace enough to descend in the deep of his own Conscience there he will find great causes of repentance, so god help him, but the Ch. is gone, et consummation est, it is shut up forever, let me now leave the dead sleep peacefully in its dust, to fight living imposture, when conversing last summer with some Capital members of the G. E. O. F. about Jo. C. affair they plainly told me that if the G. E. O. had been easily taken in, on account of Jo. C. the first fault comes from the silence of the ch. La T. V. the duty of whom being attached to the G. E. O. V. was at the time that Jo. C. has set up his first ch. to give immediate notice to the G. E. O. F. of what was passing in the Valley contrary to the interests and regulations of the Order, then this ch. would have been proclaimed illegal and irregular, shut up his founder published an impostor expelled from all the masonic bodies, Jo. C's trade was then cut off and he was himself unable to make one step farther, but not to have that trouble J. G. T. hath preferred to see tamely two illegal chapters set up before his very face under his nose, without uttering a word in behalf of the injured Order and for the honour and preservation of his right chapter, leaving the impostor going on without opposition in his speculations never Jo.
