We, the Members and Seatholders of the Congregational Church, Keld, find ourselves placed in a very difficult position. Our Chapel being built among the Yorkshire hills, in fact the highest Congregational Chapel in the country, exposed to very severe weather. During the last winter found the roof in a very bad condition, requiring urgent attention, snow and rain getting in and doing considerable damage.

The mason also informs us that the walls must be pointed with cement to keep wind and water out of them. Necessity will compel us to have new windows, as the present ones are rotten and only just hanging together.

At our last Church-meeting it was decided to hold a Bazaar, if possible in December, to raise the necessary funds for these repairs. It will be held next MARCH or APRIL. Most of the members and friends are sheep-farmers and farm-servants, and, all told, within a radius of two miles they only number 197 persons. They have very little time to spare, and owing to the late flood in the dale, find themselves, however willing, unable to help as they otherwise have done had their farms been more prosperous. workers being limited in time and number, we venture to make a general appeal to friends outside our own district.

gallery and re-pewing of the bottom of the chapel. The entire

RE-OPENING

OF THE

INDEPENDENT CHAPEL, KELD.

For the Bradford Observer.
July 1st, 1851.

KELD: INDEPENDENT CHAPEL.—At the extremity of Swaledale, about three miles from Muker, is a little hamlet called Keld. It contains about a dozen houses and other buildings, of which a small chapel, a school-room, and a library, constitute the chief (in course of erection) form last. Out of this narrow and illiterate village referred to now, about fifteen, and does not amount to more than 200 people. The Rev. J. Wilkinson is the pastor of this little church, in the date, which he has secured with all the fervour and assiduity of Pasto Oberlin, having regard to the temporal as well as the spiritual welfare of his people. When he commenced his ministry there was not a garden in the place, and notwithstanding the efforts and example he has induced his flock to cultivate many a piece of waste land, and at this moment there are in Keld several highly-cultivated Kitchen gardens which would not disgrace a Southern county. This pastoral culture is a fair symbol of the higher culture of mind and heart which has been carried on among the people of this sequestered spot during the last twenty years. But while this work has been going on the little chapel has been falling into decay, and about a year ago it became evident that something must be done to restore it, or it would become a hopeless ruin. The difficulty was how to do it. The people are poor, at least their wealth is not of an exchangeable nature. However, they applied themselves to the work, and encouraged by the late Mr. T. E. Plint (whose premature and lamented death is recorded in this day's paper) Mr. Wilkinson and their pastor, came down to these parts, and sought assistance. It was not withheld. Friends in Bradford, Leeds, Halifax and Huddersfield kindly sympathised, and supplied what funds were still required. The little chapel was forthwith repaired, virtually rebuilt, and is now the prettiest little country place of worship in all that hilly region. The completion of the work was celebrated on Wednesday, in last week, by a series of religious services. A prayer-meeting was held in the afternoon; in the afternoon the Rev. J. Mellor, of Halifax, preached; and in the evening a meeting was held, under the presidency of John Crossley, Esq., of Willans, Esq., of Huddersfield, Mr. William Bradford, Rev. E. Mellor, Mr. W. Byres, the Rev. J. Wilkinson, and Rev. J. Wood, of Harvers. The proceedings were highly interesting and gratifying. Between the services the refreshments hospitably provided by the people of the place, were dispensed by the young females of the congregation with a true Yorkshire welcome. The expense of the alterations referred to has been £200; towards which about £275 had been raised previous to Wednesday last; collections were made at the services of that day, and the balance of £31 was cleared off, and a surplus left for other purposes.

The origin and past history of the cause of Christ at Keld, according to the order of Congregational or Independent Dissenters is not without interest, a brief record of which may be useful, and interesting in after time.

Prior to the year 1789, Keld and the neighbourhood was without any place of worship, or Evangelical instruction beyond occasional visits from a few zealous men of the Inghamite persuasion whose labours were not unappreciated, as some from near Keld were in the habit of attending on their Ministry at Birch Chapel where they stately preached, a distance of more than 26 miles from Keld.

In the year 1789 Mr Edward Stillman (who afterwards became the Bishop of Keld) was engaged as an Itinerant Preacher (on his own account) found his way into Swaledale, where he engaged to preach for the first time at Muker in the open air, on a Sunday afternoon, but in consequence of the weather being unfavourable, the service was conducted in a Barn which was kindly

sent for the purpose; from thence Mr. Stillman proceeded to Kold where he preached in the open air, where many came to hear. Mr. Stillman professing an attractive appearance, was a good speaker, and a delightful singer, so that while the people looked and listened their minds became captivated, so that nothing would satisfy them but he must remain & ^{come} be their Minister, he was conducted to an old Chapel which had lain in ruins for more than 100 years, which the people promised to rebuild if he would remain amongst them. Mr. Stillman walked into the centre of the ruins, and there amongst the weeds by which it was over grown, stuck in his stick, and said here will I have my Chapel, and hear will I preach the gospel. The Chapel was rebuilt with two adjoining Rooms, the one Mr. S. used as a School, the other was his dwelling. Having now a settled habitation, he cast in his lot amongst the Moravians for a wife, and a good wife he got, who was a comfort to him, and a blessing to the neighbourhood, by her unremitting diligence in the Day School which she taught, As the gratifying of one desire often gives rise to others

so it was with Mr. Stillman, he became tired of his temporary Building, and resolved on having a new Chapel and an enlarged dwelling House, which he accomplished in the year 1818. Mr. Stillman having undertaken these alterations on his own responsibility, he had to contend with many difficulties, and was involved in a heavy debt, which caused him to have many Begging excursions, but being successful he had the pleasure to see his Building free from debt. He next bought a piece of Land behind the Chapel for a Burial ground. In 1830 he received a severe stroke in the death of Mrs. Stillman, an event which to him was a great loss, but to her infinite gain, his earthly comforts were greatly marred, other difficulties came upon him. Lady Hewley's charity was withheld; by reason of advanced years, and many trials his faculties failed; his congregation diminished, and his resources from them declined, so that his whole stipend would not be more than £15 a year, for a few of the last years of his life.

In this time of difficulty Mr. Edmund Knowels of Low Row, bought a field, called Broken Saitack, and gave it to the Chapel for the benefit of the Minister.

On the 12th of March 1837 Mr. Stillman preach in the Chapel for the last time, on the 14th he became seriously ill, and only lived eight days, on the 22nd his spirit took its departure to another and a better world, on the Sabbath following his remains were deposited in the same grave with Mr. Stillman's in front of the Pulpit. Thus after 48 years of care and toil, privation and suffering, of which could all the circumstances be recorded, they would tell many a fitting tale; but they are all past, and he rejoices in his reward. He left a church consisting of seven members, but no church Book, or any record of their formation or order.

In the Month of June 1837 Mr. William Sedgwick who had finished his studies at Airedale College visited Held, meeting with acceptance; on the invitation of the people, ^{church} he became their settled Pastor, and commenced his labors with the hope of much good, but the cheering morning of his labors, and his hopes, was soon over cast by dark and threatening clouds of opposition, which were

principally in consequence of a change in Mr. Sedgwick's views by which he became too much an Armenian for those who had been accustomed to the Doctrines of his predecessor: the congregation became divided much excitement prevailed, those who at the first were Mr. Sedgwick's friends now became his enemies, and would gladly have removed him, in this the church were unanimous, and decidedly refused to receive any of his new converts into their fellowship, as they regarded them all Methodists, Mr. S having many professed converts, and not being able to work with the existing church, resolved on the expedient of forming a New Church, which was done on the 18th of June 1838; when 18 persons were formed into a Christian Church by The Rev^d John Harrison of Barnard Castle, but this proved an unhappy affair, things were done hastily without due preparation, and it was soon discovered that excitement would not answer the end of piety, on the 18th of July following Mr. Sedgwick was ordained Pastor over his newly formed church; these

things dreadfully exasperated Mr Sedgwick's opponents, who did all they could to oppose the Ordination, the Chapel was held in possession with a continuall series of Services from Sunday Morning, night & a day, till Tuesday night the Day of the Ordination, but though Mr S. so far gained a triumph over his foes, these things tended more to the weakening than the Strengthening of the hand of Mr Sedgwick, not being able to place confidence in his church, for the want of principle, and being more and more opposed by his enemies he found himself very uncomfortably situated, so much so that at the end of three months he resigned his charge.

The Revⁿ William Sedgwick having resigned his charge, the Church and congregation at once presented an unanimous unanimous invitation to Mr James Wilkinson their Decon, and Lay Preacher in connection with the Independent Church at Sedbergh, (who had occasionally supplied at Keld,) to supply the pulpit for 12 months, the invitation was accepted, and Mr Wilkinson entered on

his labors on the first Sabbath in Nov^r 1838.

At the end of 12 months 8 members had been added to the church, former breaches had in a great measure been healed, and all things apparently had gone on very prosperously. A new Stove had been placed in the Chapel which had added much to the comfort of the congregation, The front of the Chapel had been enclosed with iron palisading which added much to the respectability of the appearance.

The church and congregation now presented Mr Wilkinson with an unanimous invitation to become their settled Pastor, which was accepted, at a public meeting held for that purpose on the 31st of Oct^r 1839, conducted by the Revⁿ John Boyd of Low Row.

Mr Wilkinson was Ordained to the office of Pastor on the 21st of Sept^r 1841.

Soon after this solemn Service there were evident tokens of the operations of the workings of the Divine Spirit on the heart of many, so that at the close of the year a

revival of religion broke out, but the Lord
has his own ^{way} of doing his own work, the
Pastor through over-exertion and exposure
to night air had brought on an effect on the
lungs, in consequence he had to be confined
to his room for 6 weeks and 2 days, and not
able to preach for 8 Sabbaths, the weather
was such that supplies could only be got
for three Sabbaths, yet the people regularly
met together and prayed and the Lord was
with them, and many were converted,

In answer to prayer the Pastor was restored
and strengthened for his work, and again
began to labor as amidst the delights of
Spring.

In the year 1842 the new School was Built,
and opened with over the Annual Tea Party
on the 5th of Jan, 1843. Mrs Mary Thompson
gave £15/- towards the erection.

In 1844 The Chapel was duly Licensed
for the Solemnization of Marriages.

After the excitement of the revival had passed
away, evil spirits began to manifest themselves
disturbances began to rise, discipline had to
be exercised, things continued to get worse and
worse, some had to be cut off, others left, but
still the cause of trouble remained, which might
be attributed to the first formation of the Church
which was bad in principle, and bad in ma-
terial; the evil was one which required means
extraordinary to remove it, to break up the
Church and make a ^{new} beginning appeared
the only effectual means, but to this many were
opposed, and many objections were raised; at length
some became so refractory as to render it necessary
to take some decisive measure, for this purpose
a Church Meeting was held in the Chapel on the
15th of July 1850, when 12 members and the Minister
were present; it was proposed, and unanimously
agreed to, that the Church should be dissolved
for a time, and arrangements be made for
the re-forming of the church as soon as it

could be done consistantly; Sermons were preached relative to Church-fellowship for 5 successive Sunday afternoons after this those who wished to become members were requested to make application to the Minister, Meetings ~~were~~ held for conference and prayer, necessary arrangement having been made the candidates for membership met in the Chapel on the 1st Day of September 1830, when the Rev^d Henry Robert Reynolds, Minister, of East Parade Chapel, Leed, formed them into a Congregational Church in the presence of the Rev^d J. W. Rolls of Hawes The Rev^d C. H. Bateman of Hopton, and many other witness.

The church being formed, they again elected the Rev^d James Wilkinson to be their Minister, the office being accepted the union ~~not~~ was again formed; with a desire that it might be long, prosperous, and happy.

Owing to the unsettled state of things resulting from the late disruption, matters were allowed to rest, with a view to guard against further agitation, and if possible to bring about a settled peace. In this way things went on till the year 1834, when a favourable change had taken place in the appearance of things, it was proposed that Deacons should be chosen, and an effort made to move on.

At a church meeting held Feby 3rd 1834, James Alderson Clarkson, John Scott, and James Cherry were unanimously chosen by the church to take the office of Deacons. They having complied to the wish ~~of the~~ of the church were on the following Sabbath set apart to the office of Deacons, by Prayer offered by the Minister.

Jan^y 1835. It is with sincere gratitude to God, and for the honour of His name that I would here put upon record that peace and prosperity has attended all events of the past year; During the years 1833-4, the Chapel had undergone considerable alterations and enlargements at the cost of more than £35, towards which £45¹⁷.⁶ ha-

been subscribed by Friends at a distance; 130 Years of this alteration a Room was provided for Vestry and Reading Room, in which a Mutual Improvement Society was formed for the benefit of Young Men, in May 1854; at the end of the year the Society numbers 21 members and in the hope of much good to the neighbourhood.

1861 July 24th Time has moved on but no very notable change has taken place, mercy has been continued and grace conferred, the cause of much thankfulness to the grace of all good; during the past year the ^{Chapel} has been in a great measure pulled down and rebuilt, which had become necessary through the decayed state of the wood both in the roof and in the Pews. Encouraged by J. E. Flint, Esq. of Leeds, and John Cropley, Esq. of Halifax, and other kind friends in the West Riding the work was commenced in July 1860, the season was a most difficult one on account the constant rain. The work was completed in Nov., and the Chapel was used during the Spring of 1861 but not formally opened till July 10th 61. when the following services were held; In the forenoon a prayer meeting was held, in the afternoon there

was a public service when the Rev^t E. Mellor A.M. of Halifax preach from 1 Peter 3-13. In the Evening a Publick meeting was held under the presidency of John Cropley Esq. - the congregations were large and several influential Gentlemen and Ministers were present, Ministers present, Rev^t John Harland of Leyburn, Rev^a R. W. Valentine of West Burton, The Rev^a H. C. Wood of Hawes, Rev^a J. Redman of Selby, Rev^a M. White of Keighley, Gentlemen W^m Williams Esq. J.P. of Huddersfield, Thos Cropley Esq. Halifax, Alderman Brown, W^m Byres Esq. Walter Willigan Esq. of Bradford, and other influential Gentleman in the neighbourhood. The entire cost of Erection was £306¹⁰, previous to the opening £252³ had been raised by Subscription, and £25 promised by the Congregational Society, leaving a Balance of 24⁷. Collections were made ^{at} the Opening service amounting to £24⁹¹¹. Several of the Ministers and Gentlemen took part in the service which were highly interesting, and profitable, May God of his infinite mercy crown the whole with his blessing for the sake of his son Jesus Christ Amen.

Memorandum. In the month of October, 1866, I first visited Keld, having engaged to preach for the Rev Jas Wilkinson, for two Sabbaths, on account of his not being able to preach. Having supplied at Keld, on the 14th & 21st October, 1866, & spent the intervening week with Mr Wilkinson & his family, I became so much interested in himself, his work, & his sphere of labour, that at the earnest desire of myself & his people, I promised to come & take charge of the place for three months. Accordingly, I came with my family to Keld, on the 30th November, 1866. On the 3rd of December, 1866, Mr Wilkinson died at Southport, rather suddenly & unexpectedly, altho he had long been in a weak & declining state. Thus, after three days residence, the charge of the place devolved upon me, and a strong desire was expressed by the people, and also by the executive & deputation of the West Riding Home Missionary Society,

that I should accept the pastorate of this "church in the wilderness" but I could not see my way to entertain the thought of a permanent settlement, altho I resolved to remain for 12 months, & do the best I could to promote the prosperity of the place. Three objects I have been anxious to accomplish - viz. 1. The removal of the debts connected with Keld Chapel - this is now promised by the friends in Leeds & Bradford &c - Mr Scott & Mr Alderman Law, having undertaken to collect the money. 2. A memoir of Mr Wilkinson. This I have written, but intend to revise & remodel. 3. The improvement & enlargement of the Literary Institute at Keld, and the erection of a stable, gig-house, & harness room for the use of the minister & his friends when required - The ground for this has been purchased, the new building partially built, & almost roofed - & £ 65, towards the £ 110, (the estimated cost) either (see page 15.)

1863, June 19th James Brown departed this life in the 55th year of his age, he was truly a man of God his religious experience was very exemplary, he had many conflicts and trials, but all tended to lead him to a closer attachment to the saviour, his last day were attended with much bodily weakness and affliction, but his desire was to glorify God in all things, so that in him could be seen unmistakable proofs, and satisfactory evidences of the truth of Christianity, on July 5th a Funeral Sermon was preached from Act 11-24, to a large and deeply affected congregation.

year, for the Schoolmaster, in addition to the School pence, instead of £10 which was originally promised — The services at Keld & Thwaite have been well sustained during the 12 months — but in consequence of serious sickness in my family, & my own serious illness, & also in consequence of frequent journeys to Lancashire, the West-Riding of Yorkshire, & Scotland, &c — besides a very considerable amount of private & family business to which I was obliged to attend, it has been quite impossible for me to give that amount of attention to pastoral visitation, & district preaching, which is desirable, which I however have had pleasure in attending to, if other, & equally important duties had not prevented — The great want of this place is earnest, spiritual work, & especially in reference to direct efforts for the conversion of sinners; and

the safe but speedy increase of the church which appears to me exceedingly small — I preached yesterday, being my last Sabbath at Keld, from the command given to the children of Israel, "Go forward" Exodus 14^c. 15^v & took occasion to speak of the importance of "trust in God" on the one hand, & earnest persevering effort, for personal advancement & improvement in everything truly great & good — In the evening I preached at Thwaite from 2 Cor. 13^c. 11^v — The ordinances of the Lord's supper was observed at Keld in the afternoon, & at Thwaite in the evening — (for the first time at Thwaite) On Tuesday Evening, Dec^r. 10. 1867. Mr Thomas of Leeds, will preach (D. V.) at Thwaite — On Wednesday, Dec^r. 11. 1867, a service will be held at Keld, at which addresses will be given by myself — Mr Thomas, of Leeds, & Mr Holland,

of Leeds, who is coming to supply at
Yead & Thwaite, for two months -



Repairs of Chapel Property.

27th March 1889.

A meeting of the Church & congregation was held on this date: the Pastor presiding. The Pastor stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of taking into consideration the repairs of the property which in many places had got into a dilapidated condition.

After a consideration of the work requiring to be done, I was moved by Mr Crombie that the following committee be appointed to examine the property and specify the necessary repairs, with a view to letting the work as far as possible by estimate. Also to arrange for the necessary funds to meet the expense. This was seconded by Mr John Metcalfe Jr. and unanimously agreed to.

10th May, 1869.

Pastor Presiding. In accordance with motion of last meeting Mr Rickt^d Clarke reported that the proprietors of the land at east end of Chapel were willing to sell such portion of their land as was necessary for the enlargement of the grave yard. The price to be sixpence per yard.

It was then resolved that Mr Clarke be allowed to complete the purchase of said land to the extent of 350 yards or thereby. and to do so as early as convenient. and to get court admittance for same in name of the trustees of the Chapel of Thwaites Chapel & other property.

In the event of the purchase being completed it was resolved to sell in the portions of land soon after ready tracts.

The wall in front of the manse & Chapel having been let for repair by the Committee. It was resolved to authorise Committee to let for repair, the pointing & clashing the outside walls of the Chapel & House. also to repair the coal house. & to build a new W.C. ^{on} the site of the old one.

It was resolved to leave over for future considerations the "clashing" & repairs of the garden walls.

The being the Centenary of the cause in held it was resolved that meeting in connection therewith be held on the last week of June or first week of July. A meeting to arrange these to be called on an early date. and in the meantime to consider the propriety of holding a tea meeting in connection with the Centenary at Kessidow forge.

1889. Centenary Meetings. June 26th

The Centenary of the cause in Keld was held on the above date. The proceedings opened by a devotional meeting in the Chapel. Revd Wm. Croulbie, pastor presiding. He opened the meeting by giving out Doddridge's well known hymn "O God of Bethel".

After which the Revd Thos. Sleath of Poulton-le-Feld, a former pastor of the church, engaged in prayer. The pastor then read Psalm 103rd and Revd Alex^d McCornach, of Reeth engaged in prayer. "Stand up Stand up for Jesus" was then sung and the benediction pronounced. There was a large congregation and all seemed heartily to join in the devotion, as well as in the singing led by Mr. John Scott of Hawes on the harmonium.

Afterwards a procession was formed, headed by the Brass Band from Low Row under the leadership of Mr. John Redmondson, and made to the grounds at Kisdon Force, kindly granted by Mr. James Alderson of Park Lodge.

An open air meeting was held presided over by Revd Alex^d Cross of Knaresborough. Stirring addresses were delivered by the Chairman, Revd Geo. Hinds of Leeds, McCornach, Reeth; Clarke, Low Row; Mc Gee, Hawes; Brown, Turb^b Stephens; Cartwright, Guisborough; Croulbie, Keld & Rich^d Clarke Esq. Thwaite.

After this meeting a public tea was held in a Marquee on the grounds, which was well attended, and all passed off harmoniously & successfully.

On the following Sabbath June 30th the Centenary Services were held in the Chapel. The Revd Bryan Dale, M.A. of Halifax, the Secretary of the Yorkshire Conf. Union preached two able sermons to large congregations.

At this date the Churches of Keld & Thwaite had 36 members.

Annual Meeting of Church on
January 6th 1891.

The Annual Meeting of the Church was held on this date - the pastor presiding - The yearly accounts were gone over & passed Income £124-18-1. Expenditure £125-14-8.. leaving a bal. due to the Treasurer of £1-6-7. This was considered very satisfactory - seeing that the purchase malling & other costs connected with the additional Burial ground had all been met.

A Committee to prepare a scheme for the management of the Burial Ground was appointed the Pastor, Messrs. Clarke & Geo. Sweet.

The following resolution was proposed by Mr. Richard Scott & seconded

That among the Trustees for Thwaites Chapel Hall School Room & Institute have all died except one it is now necessary that some new Trustees be appointed and this meeting instructs the officers of the Church to take

the necessary steps to have this effected - This resolution was unanimously agreed to.

Appointment of Trustees.
Friday 22nd May, 1891.

On this date a meeting of the seat-holders in Keld & Thwaites Independent Chapel was held in the Chapel at Keld - Eleven seat-holders being present. Rev'd Wm Crowther, pastor, presiding Mr Crowther informed the meeting that they were met for the purpose of appointing eight new Trustees under the Deed for Thwaites Chapel Hall School Room & Literary Institute, to fill the vacancies made by death. That the following Trustees had died:- James Alderson Clarke, Strands, Swaledale; Ralph Metcalfe, Hurst, Mervick; James Knowles, Low Row; Richard C Allen, Hawes; Thomas Butson Clarke, Thwaites; George Scottson, Leeds; Thos. Chapman Yeats, Leeds; and Joseph Longfield,

Leeds. That William Henry Conyers,
Leeds was now the only Survivor Trustee.
Mr. Cramlin further stated that the
requirements of the Trust Deed, for the due
appointment of Trustees, were as follows.— That they
be nominated by a two thirds majority of
the male members of the Church, and ap-
proved by a majority of seatholders, voting
at a meeting which had been convened
from the pulpits of the Chapels at Head & Hareh-
ead the two previous Sundays.

IV. Where practicable new graves must be opened to the depth of 6 feet. Two bodies may be buried in one grave; but in no case shall a body be buried at a less depth than 3 feet from the top of the coffin to the surface.

V. The short lengths at the top to be used for infants as directed by the management.

VI. In no circumstances whatever ~~shall~~ a grave be opened, or a burial take place without the permission of the Pastor or the Officebearers.
