

Message From The President

Setting A New Course

Over the past few years, I have led the College community in a critical self analysis to better define where we are realistically and where we want to be. This was not an easy process. While Plato indicated, "The unexamined life is not worth living," Malcolm X made it plain by saying, "The examined life is painful." Since PSC is worth living we painfully conducted this examination.

Still being relatively new, the process helped me to dispel myths about the College, its mission and its purpose. I always chuckle when people say that we have always done something a certain way because our institutional memory is often colored by our viewpoint. So being a shade tree historian, I go to the archives for the facts.

After Philander Smith eliminated the primary and secondary programs by 1936, it established itself as an institution of the highest standards. The 1939 catalog stated the first principles of the College: "The College does not propose to see that every person who wishes may enroll. A well planned program of selectivity aims to preserve excellence in scholarship."


Our present mission statement, however, speaks of granting "access to higher education to individuals who are, or who have the potential to be, academically talented, regardless of their social, economic, or educational background." This statement evolved following a faculty committee's work in the early 1970s to evaluate the mission of the College. That committee changed the mission realizing that, after Brown v. Board, colleges and universities that had previously prohibited Black students now sought them, suddenly creating competition for the best and brightest Black students.

The College realized that the times had changed after Brown v. Board. Today we realize a need to change again, this time incorporating elements from both periods, but looking toward a broader mission. The emphasis for so many colleges and universities is to prepare young people to earn a good living. That's great, but when our communities are rapidly crumbling, someone needs to be developed so that they use their education not simply for personal gain, but to impact the lives of many.

So through our discussions we decided that we will become an institution for social justice, where we bring in academically ambitious students who want to change the world for the better. Hurricane Katrina is still a painful reminder that there are gross disparities that exist nationally and in our local communities we are impotent when trying to close the educational achievement gap by race.

A new generation of leaders is needed to passionately attack these issues. Philander Smith College will serve as the cradle of this new movement. This fall we will officially launch our social justice initiative which coincides with the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Central High School desegregation. Our opening convocation will feature the Rev. Dr. Joseph Lowery, president emeritus of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and dean of the civil rights movement. He will not only tell us what social justice is, but why it is needed now more than ever.

I hope that you will consider joining us at 10 a.m. Thursday, August 30, to hear Dr. Lowery give us our marching orders. Yes, this is a new mission—one that is important not simply for the benefit of the College, but to literally save lives.


On The Cover:

In Memoriam: Dr. Clifford Minton and Mrs. Alma Minton

The Philander Smith College family suffered a tremendous loss on April 3 when two treasured alumni and staunch supporters died in a tragic accident in Indiana.

Alma and Clifford Minton (Class of '36 and '35) of Merrillville, Ind., will be remembered long after their deaths for their contributions to their alma mater—The couple donated generously to the college. In 1999, they gave an initial \$50,000 to establish the Minton Foundation Scholarship Trust Fund and form a scholarship and lecture series for the Black Family Studies program; they were also members of the PSC Legacy Society-and for their work and investments into the larger society.

Alma Minton was an educator for 43 years in Arkansas, Ohio and Indiana and her beloved husband Clifford—they met while attending Philander Smith—worked tirelessly for civil rights, dating back to as early as 1939, when he joined forces with Thurgood Marshall to file lawsuits to gain equality in salaries for Black teachers in Little Rock. Alma was equally involved in the community and received special recognition for a leadership role in her local chapter's National March of Dimes Foundation.

Before moving to Cleveland and later Gary, Ind., to serve as executive director of the Gary Urban League, Clifford's efforts in Little Rock included opening job opportunities for Blacks at Camp Robinson and the Arkan-







sas Ordnance Plant. While with the Gary Urban League, Clifford broadened community participation and support, and developed programs to provide better socio-economic conditions. He went on to serve in a variety of positions with the federal government in the U.S. Office of Education, Office of Equal Healthy Opportunity, U.S. Public Health Service and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. As a consultant he contributed to the President's Committee on Manpower and the U.S. Regional Office of Economic Opportunity.

"Philander Smith College has lost two giants. Not only were the Mintons people of great character, love and integrity, but they were committed to their alma mater. They never simply talked about how much they loved this college, they showed it in their deeds," remarked PSC President Dr. Walter Kimbrough.

The Mintons, both in their mid-90s, drowned when their car plunged into Lake Louise near Valparaiso, Ind. They are survived by sisters Bernice Hawkins Allen, Mattie Hawkins Beard: sister-in-law Artha M. Minton; nieces Ann Minton Ramsey, Pauline Minton Roberts (Alvin), Alma E. Minton Williams, Kimberly Minton Keating (William), Dedra F. Allen; nephews Paul L. Minton Jr. (Tracey), Wayne Douglas; and a host of grand nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.

They will be sorely missed.

The United Negro College Fund Advisory Board at Philander Smith College presented the *Frederick D. Patterson Awards Banquet* on March 16 to honor those who have demonstrated support to the UNCF. The black-tie affair, held at the Embassy Suites hotel in Little Rock, also raised funds to benefit the college's annual fund campaign.

Former White House correspondent and Little Rock native Deborah Mathis was the keynote speaker. The syndicated columnist and author challenged the audience to continue their support of Philander Smith College, emphasizing the importance of the nation's historically Black colleges and universities. Mathis is currently vice president of media and communications at The Whitaker Group in Washington, D.C.

Evangeline Parker, public affairs coordinator for Comcast, was the mistress of ceremony for the evening; music was provided by the Sounds So Good band featuring Curtis "JJ" Adams and soloist Karen Campbell.

Charles "Dwayne" Stuart of Little Rock, customer service manager at Entergy Arkansas, received the *Dr. Frederick D. Patterson Award*, the UNCF's highest honor. Others receiving recognition for their 2006-2007 support to the United Negro College Fund were "Broadway Joe" Booker of Citadel Broadcasting (*Gordon W. Clowney Memorial Award for Volunteerism*) and Judy Green '77, UNCF Statewide Chair (*UNCF Award for Contributions to Community*).

The annual golf benefit, named in honor of the late PSC alumnus and former Green Bay Packers great **Elijah** Pitts, was sponsored this year by Alltel, Dillard's and Danny Burleson and the City of Little Rock. Thirteen teams took the course and the team from Webster University took home top honors.

"This is an outstanding turnout based on the weather and the Pitts family appreciates the support from all the sponsors and participants," said Ron Pitts, son of the tournament's namesake. He added, "We look forward to a bigger and better tournament next year."

The 2007 Golf Tournament Committee included Dr. Sherman E. Tate (chairman), Harold Banks, Charles Robinson, Danny Burleson and Gary Garrett.

Mayflower, Ark., native Elijah Pitts was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 13th round of the 1961 draft. Following a successful NFL career, Pitts gained a reputation as an assis-

UNCF Planning Grant to Aid Development Operation

Philander Smith College has been awarded a \$20,000 planning grant from the HBCU Institutional Advancement Program of the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) Institute for Capacity Building to assess resources needed to strengthen private fundraising and development activities at Philander.

In addition to the grant award, the institutional advancement department will undergo a full evaluation in an effort to strengthen the college's development operation. As a recipient of this planning grant, Philander is now eligible for a larger implementation grant that could provide up to \$1.5 million in support over five years.

Michael Hutchinson Joins Institutional Advancement Staff

The Office of Institutional Advancement announced the addition of Michael Hutchinson to the staff as director of annual fund and special events. Hutchinson, a graduate of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, comes to the advancement team from the nonprofit New Futures for Youth in his second stint at Philander; he previously served in the Integrated Counseling Center.

In his newly created role Hutchinson will focus on events such as the President's Luncheon, as well as UNCF and other events related to fund development. He will also direct annual fund activities to include the 1877 Giving Society.

Johnetta Lewis will attend Tiffon University in Ohio to complete a master's degree in criminal justice, majoring in forensic psychology.


Sedric Mayfield will attend the Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Ark. to pursue a master's degree in sports administration.

The exhibit was on display in the library from Feb. 20 through March 9.



TOWN HALL MEETING ON HEALTH DISPARITIES

The Kendall Center recently collaborated with Arkansas Baptist College, the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff and the UAMS College of Public Health, to hold a special student town hall meeting on racial and ethnic health disparities. The April 11 town hall meeting provided an opportunity for students to learn about the experiences and insights of Thomas LaVeist, Ph.D., professor of health policy management and director of the Center for Health Disparities

Solutions at Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, who has studied the major healthcare gaps in America, their trends and the problems they create. LaVeist has authored numerous articles in scientific public health and medical journals, including his latest work, Minority Populations and Health: An Introduction to Health Disparities in the United States, which was released in 2005. Students participating in the town hall discussion were encouraged to engage in honest dialogue about career opportunities in the fields of public health, health disparities and research and the requirements needed to pursue careers in these areas.

Now going into its third year, Bless The Mic is an important vehicle through which the community comes together for thought-provoking and stimulating lectures that make us more aware of the broader issues facing us all. Last year, the series averaged more than 400 persons that came to the Philander Smith campus to enjoy the variety of speakers, thoughts and perspectives—proving the ever-increasing interest and vitality of this popular lecture series.

The spring lineup of speakers also included **Jonathan Kozol**, Ph.D., noted education and social justice advocate. Presented Jan. 16 by the Darragh Foundation, Kozol, the author of numerous acclaimed books, enthralled a capacity crowd with his cautionary tales and wisdom gleaned from his experience as a public school educator and from research into some of most challenging, impoverished areas of the country. Kozol's visit was particularly timely given the upcoming 50th anniversary of the desegregation of Little Rock Central High School.

On Feb. 7, one of the world's preeminent psychologists and a pioneer in the development of an African-centered approach in modern psychology, **Dr. Na'im Akbar** 'blessed the mic'. Akbar is known nationally as a distinguished and impressive orator and his Little Rock lecture held true to that reputation.

And in honor of Women's History Month, a true music pioneer graced the podium at the M.L. Harris Auditorium on March 27. Lana Moorer—better known by her hip-hop moniker **MC Lyte**—held her audience's rapt attention as she talked about the state of the art form and acknowledged women's place in the evolution of rap and the culture of hip-hop.

The third installment of Bless The Mic begins this fall. Make plans now to attend one of the most intelligent, passionate displays of discourse to be offered on a college campus anywhere.





BETHUNE-COOKMAN CHOIR ROCKS





In 2005 Giovanni taught the student, Seung-Hui Cho, but later had him removed from her introduction to creating writing class because of his distracting and troubling presence. Prior to her captivating lecture in the auditorium, a group of Philander students, faculty and staff members gathered in the Joycelyn Elders Lecture Hall in the Kendall Center to hear Giovanni speak, unexpectedly and candidly, about her experience with Cho and how the "Hokie nation" would prevail in the aftermath of the horrible tragedy.



alumni profile: Bishop Steven Arnold

HBCU alumni form a rich history and perpetuate a legacy of education obtained with a sense of pride. As an important link in students' chain of learning, alumni help instill purpose and pride by teaching the students of today about the students of yesterday and, with their gifts, support the College into the future.

One such Philander alumnus is Bishop Steven Arnold '94, who shepherds St. Mark Baptist Church in Little Rock, the largest African American church in the state of Arkansas. A native of North Little Rock, Bishop Arnold attended Northeast (now North Little Rock High School) and Louisiana Tech where he ran track before attending Philander Smith College.

As senior pastor at St. Mark, which boasts more than 6,000 members, Bishop Arnold has led the charge for his congregation's regular donations to his alma mater. In fact, the sum of St. Mark's annual contributions make the church one of Philander's largest corporate contributors. (St. Mark also regularly gives to Arkansas Baptist College.)

Additionally, Bishop Arnold is committed to helping Philander Smith College whenever and however he can—whether he comes back to deliver a chapel sermon or to lend support to activities associated with the annual UNCF campaign. When asked why he remains so involved he said, "Philander Smith College had a huge impact



on my life. It stretched me as a person and a preacher by allowing me to gain exposure to education. The professors were personable and concerned about students. I was a non-traditional student at the age of 29 and the professors demonstrated general concern for me."

Bishop Arnold said he would like to continue to collaborate with Philander; foremost on his mind is aiding with recruitment. He would like for representatives from the Admissions and Recruitment Department to visit St. Mark and encourage students to attend Philander. "There are a lot of bright and sharp students that are not being exposed to historically Black colleges," he continued, "It would be nice to have a program in place for students to help get the word out about Philander Smith College."

Finally, the pastor made a challenge to other alumni, asking them to reach out to students as the College has reached out to them: "Don't forget the bridge that brought us over."

Former Miss PSC (2005-06) Moya Leigh Edwards will graduate next May with a bachelor's degree in English. Known for her talents as a singer—she has performed before many dignitaries and luminaries as a member of the renowned Philander Smith Collegiate Choir—she is also interested in uplifting African American females and is starting an organization with a mission to do just that. When she leaves Philander Smith College, Moya plans to pursue a master's degree in public relations from the University of Memphis.

William Stanton '69:

Philander Grad is First Black Mayor of Eudora

The city of Eudora ushered in a new era in January when longtime City Councilman William Stanton was sworn-in as the town's first African American mayor. Before entering politics Stanton, who received bachelor of arts degrees in English and psychology from Philander Smith College and a master of science degree in education from Henderson State University, spent 36 years as a guidance counselor for Eudora's public schools and ten years on the Eudora City Council. The new mayor said his immediate goals are to attract new business, develop housing, improve education and improve public relations to the town with a population of 2,819—about 84 percent of whom are Black. Stanton, a widower, has three children: Marlene Battle of Dallas, a junior high science teacher; Edwin Stanton of Eudora, who works in the garment factory; and William Stanton of McKinney, Texas, a public relations manager.

Neva Carmichael '51:

Musical Heritage Lives in Scholarships

Neva Carmichael passed away in 2001 but her musical legacy is remembered each year in Hope with the annual Neva Carmichael Scholarship Committee Musical. Neva Carmichael taught music to many children in Hope and in the state of Arkansas and the annual musical variety program in her honor funds scholarships for deserving students. She was born October 27, 1907 in Curtis, Ark., and attended high school at Arkadelphia Baptist Academy in 1929 and began her teaching career in Dardanelle. After graduating from Philander in 1951 she taught school for 42 years in Hope and neighboring counties. Carmichael, who became a piano instructor in 1926 and continued to teach and play until her health began to fail in 1995, touched many young people with her gift and love for music. Today musicians all over the world are sharing and demonstrating their talents as a result of her dedication and expertise.

Scipio A. Jones

Post Office Named for Civil Rights Leader

During Black History Month in February, Congressman Vic Snyder announced that his bill to designate the U.S. Post Office at 1700 Main Street in Little Rock as the Scipio A. Jones Post Office Building passed the U.S. House.

Jones, who was born a slave in Dallas County, Ark., in 1863, was educated at Philander Smith College and Bethel University (now Shorter College). He was admitted to the Arkansas Bar in 1889. Jones garnered national attention in the aftermath of the Elaine Massacre with the successful defense of 12 sharecroppers who had been condemned to death and by securing the release of nearly 100 other Elaine defendants who had been sent to prison.

His efforts ultimately resulted in the U.S. Supreme Court finding that mob-dominated trials were a violation of the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Jones, who died in 1943, is buried at Little Rock's Haven of Rest Cemetery.


