

## Rethink College

Trecently attended the annual conference of the Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church in Rogers, Arkansas. I like to attend every year, even if for a day, to get some of the updates on the conference. This year, I had a chance to present a ten-minute report on Philander Smith College. The conference schedule is always tight, so I was glad we were able to have some time on the agenda along with several other United Methodist institutions, including Hendrix College in Conway.

I always enjoy hearing the Bishop's address the first day of the conference for the big picture perspective. In his talk, Bishop Charles Crutchfield indicated that "ministry is not about the past; it is about the future." He went on further to say "we need to rethink church in order to redo church." The global Methodist 'Rethink Church' campaign is aimed at redefining the church experience for 18- to 34-year olds. Launched in May, the campaign promotes that there are 10,000 ways to be involved in the church and that this generation can find meaningful ways to transform the world through the United Methodist Church.

As a United Methodist college, we too should rethink what we do and how we do it. Recent news stories have discussed the shameful graduation rates throughout higher education. I have pointed out before how many people believe that providing access is good enough, and that is their mission. This is hollow because it never takes into account the tens of thousands of dollars people accumulate in debt without a college degree, and that lack of a degree prevents them from landing a high enough paying job to repay their loans. Essentially, the access argument has nothing to do with the student and everything to do with the school.

The United States is falling further behind the world leaders when it comes to education, so it is imperative for us all of us to graduate more students, not simply admit them and hope for the best. This is what we are doing at Philander Smith College. We want to make sure we are graduating students, and over the past few years we have made significant progress. Yet, we have a long way to go.

Through our renaissance, we are actively rethinking what we do, and that is the first step.



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## GIFTS BENEFIT RENAISSANCE 100

recent \$100,000 gift from an anonymous donor will translate into support for students in need of tuition assistance as part of the **Renaissance 100** program that seeks to secure scholarships for 100 incoming students who have

high scholastic potential but require financial assistance to complete their education. Funds from the grant will provide \$2,500 scholarships for ten students over the next four years.


President Walter M. Kimbrough.

## alumni profile: EDDIE REED '75

## EDDIE REED DID NOT PLAN TO BECOME A DOCTOR WHEN HE LEFT SMALLTOWN HUGHES, ARK., HEADED FOR COLLEGE IN THE BIG CITY IN THE EARLY 70s.


Instead, his intention was to double major in mathematics and music, start a career in computer programming while organizing a band and playing music on the side until hitting it big. With a record contract under his belt, he figured, he would give up computer programming and focus on music full-time. However a professor at Philander Smith College changed his life forever.

"In my first semester, Professor Willie B. Johnson, my professor of biology, pulled me aside by the arm, looked me in the eye, put her finger in my chest and said 'You are going to be a doctor. You are going to medical school," Reed recalls. "This was right before the Christmas break, I believe. So I came home and was talking with my mother. I said 'I'm thinking about becoming a doctor and going to medical school.' She just smiled. That was it. She smiled and to me that one gesture said a thousand words. I

knew then and ever since that I was going to do this."

With that determination,
Reed graduated with his
bachelor of science degree in
1975 and, four years later, earned
his medical degree from Yale
University. He completed his
internship and residency in internal
medicine in Palo Alto, Calif., at
Stanford University Hospital.
About a year ago, Reed
joined the staff of the
Mitchell Cancer
Institute
at the

University of South Alabama as clinical director. in addition to being a professor of oncologic sciences at the university. Prior to this appointment, he was director of the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control at the National Center for



Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion in Atlanta from 2005-2008. Last year, Reed was elected to the national board of directors of the American Association for Cancer Research, the world's oldest and largest scientific organization focused on cancer research.

Reed notes that he's come a long way from the small town where he grew up, and as the ninth child of 17, one can imagine that living in Little Rock took some adjusting.

"I had grown up on a farm," Reed said. "I had no idea how protected an environment that had been – protected in the sense that you simply were not exposed to many of the things that go on in a more urban environment."

David Featherstone, a childhood friend of the 55-year-old Reed, also remembers small-town life. He and Reed played basketball together. He remembers his buddy as a good student.

"He was always the smartest in the class. He set the standard of education in our class," said Featherstone, now a Little Rock businessman. "He was never one to get into trouble. His parents didn't allow that. I never remember him getting called to the principal's office. If he got into trouble it wasn't public trouble."

Philander Smith, being a private, historically Black college, offered Reed a family atmosphere that reminded him of his hometown of about 2,000 residents.

"It was sort of like an extended family at Philander," he reflected. "Everybody knew everybody. The faculty

knew all the kids on campus by name. There was a level of attention, based on what I've seen over the years, that you simply do not get at the vast majority of other institutions. At that point in my life, it was a very valuable and very important characteristic of Philander Smith."

As he progressed on his educational path, Reed became the extended family of other students, particularly his sister's best friend Alice Richardson, Richardson was a business major then and today is an accountant

serving as controller for the Houston Academy of Medicine, Texas Medical Center Library.

Richardson, who graduated from Philander in 1977, remembers that when Reed pledged Phi Beta Sigma fraternity, his nickname was "Big Brother Country Bumpkin." She said she immediately adopted him as her big brother.

"I guess the main reason he automatically became one of my good friends is because I grew up in a household with a small number of sisters; I didn't have an older brother. I had never known anybody with such a large family and they were so close. I guess that appealed to me."

For Richardson, having a big brother who lived off campus also came in handy.

"His apartment was only two or three blocks down the street," she said. "Whenever the cafeteria was closed or we needed to scrounge for something to eat, we could always go to big brother's house."

According to Reed, he hasn't been able to visit the campus as much as he'd like over the past few years but is impressed with his alma mater's progress, which he got a chance to experience firsthand when

he returned in May for his nephew's graduation. Although his busy career hasn't left time to come back often, Reed still finds ways to be supportive. Richardson notes that he is a lifetime member of the school's national alumni association, of which she is financial secretary.

In addition to witnessing his nephew's commencement ceremony, Reed also took part in the school's first-ever Alumni Reunion Weekend: he was on hand to be inducted into the inaugural group of M.L. Harris Society members. Formed to recognize the extraordinary

commitment of a select group of alumni and friends, membership into the M.L. Harris Society requires a cumulative giving history to the college of \$25,000 or more - an indication of Reed's level of financial support to the institution.

A modest man, Reed declines to discuss any specifics about his history of giving, but said it's important for him to give back.

"I am a graduate of Philander Smith," he said. "It is my school, my own, and if you don't take care of your own, no one will."

#### 'BLESS THE MIC' ON THE ROAD WITH KIRK FRANKLIN

he *Bless The Mic* lecture series took the show on the road Feb. 4 with gospel superstar **Kirk Franklin**.

In order to accommodate more people, Philander Smith College hosted the Grammy Award winning artist at the much larger auditorium at the historic Little Rock Central High School a mile down the street from campus.

With "Personal Accountability: Challenging the African American Community" as his topic, Franklin, who did not perform, gave one of the most solid, substantive and entertaining lectures of the entire year to a record-breaking *Bless The Mic* crowd of about 1,400—most of them middle schoolers, high school and college students.


After an inspiring, humorous and



at times emotional talk, Franklin answered a few audience members' questions, was presented with a key to the city of Little Rock, and then hung back for over an hour taking photographs and signing autographs.

The singer said he has been speaking on college campuses for about three years now, but that Philander Smith College is only the second HBCU that he had visited.





### **SEASON 4 is punctuated by heavy-hitters**

n January 21, the *Clifford* and *Alma Minton Lecture* was presented by the national executive director of The Black Think Tank, **Dr. Julia Hare** of San Francisco, Calif. With her husband, she is co-author of several books about relationships and the Black family.

In her trademark frank and feisty style, Dr. Hare addressed a number of issues and generated lots of laughs with her quips and one-liners. She was so well-received that she was held over to speak the following day.

"We really didn't have enough time for her to cover everything in one session, but she didn't leave town until that Friday. So I invited her to our special chapel that my wife and I were hosting to have frank conversations [with our students] about relationships," said President Kimbrough.

Next up in March, the lecture series got a serious shot in the arm with an appearance by the beloved editor emeritus of Essence magazine

Susan L. Taylor, presented by
Alltel, who was the driving force behind the iconic Essence brand for nearly three decades up until her 2007 retirement.

Taylor, with her warm and engaging spirit, enraptured the capacity crowd with her reflections on pain and suffering ("suffering is deciding to live in a painful place") and encouragement to be the best ("you're more than what you see, more than you think, you are human and divine"). Before concluding she spoke about her new organization, the National Cares Mentoring Movement, and made a passionate appeal for caring adults to serve as mentors.

The series ended this spring with a lecture by **Charles Murray**, the W.H. Brady Scholar in Culture and Freedom at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, on April 14. He is also the bestselling co-author of *The Bell Curve*, one of the most controversial book of the 1990s.

Murray's newest book is Real Education: Four Simple Truths for Bringing America's Schools Back to Reality in which he posits that

> ability varies among children, half of all children are below average, too many people are going to college, and our society depends upon how we educate the academically gifted.

> > Given his earlier reputation, Murray's visit was not the



released book, Let's Talk About Pep, a biography chronicling her rise to fame and her life of domestic abuse.

The Queens, N.Y., native's timely message, even for being "nervous" as a first-time public speaker, hit on all cylinders with her anthems of self-love, self-respect and self-worth—which for Denton, as her talk candidly revealed, were each earned the hard way. —S.C.

wenty-one teams took to Little Rock's Rebsamen Golf Course on Friday, May 15 to raise money for scholarships during the 14<sup>th</sup> annual Elijah Pitts Memorial Golf Tournament.

Elijah Pitts was a running back for the Green Bay Packers from 1961 to 1969 and again in 1971. Though the Mayflower, Ark., native enjoyed a successful career, winning four NFL championships and two Super Bowls (I and II), his was hardly an obvious path. A sharecropper's son, Pitts attended high school in Conway (the high school at Mayflower was too small to field a football team) and chose to play on the collegiate level at Philander Smith. He was taken by the Green Bay Packers in the 13th round of the 1961 draft.

Pitts established the golf tournament as a means to drum up support for his alma mater. Although he lived in Buffalo, New York, he and his family were active with the event until his death in 1998 at age 60.



...to graduate academically accomplished students, grounded as advocates for social justice, intentionally changing the world for the better.

The 2009 graduation ceremony of Philander Smith College took place at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 2 at the Statehouse Convention Center in Little Rock. It was the culmination of a dream fulfilled for the Class of 2009 who anxiously awaited this day along with supportive relatives, friends, alumni, and PSC faculty and staff members.

The traditional ceremony featured participation from the Philander Smith Collegiate Choir and the board of trustees' **Dr. Frances "Freddie" Nixon**, who delivered the invocation, and a welcome by **Lynda Byrd '69**.

**Gena R. Lovett '86**, president and chief operating officer of Alexandria Investment Management in New York, rendered the Commencement address. The Banks, Ark., native, who later moved with her family to Little Rock and graduated from Parkview High School, is serving a two-year term as president of the 3,000-member New York Junior League—the first Black woman to hold this office.

Because of her success on what he termed as "the world's biggest stage," referring to New York's prowess as the world's financial and social epicenter, President Kimbrough thought Lovett could be inspiring to students. Plus, as the president point out, the graduates could see that it "doesn't have to always take you a lifetime to do some remarkable things," he told a reporter.

After Lovett's moving speech, **Senior Class President Channel Morris** of Riverside, Calif., rendered "Reflections" on behalf of her fellow classmates, after which, the air was punctuated with applause and cheers as each graduate's name was called.





#### HISTORY REIGNS




Originally from Durango, Mexico, and raised by a single mother and her grandmother, Francennett graduated in 2007 from Olive Harvey Middle College in Chicago.

scholarship recipients were selected from a pool of 1,200 by a panel of local educators, business leaders and Alltel employees based on the student's





Razing the (Brick)house



he mere mention of the Brickhouse Liquor store that sat a stone's throw from the entrance of the college can sometimes elicit a mysterious-yet-fond sounding chuckle from alumni, but to President Walter M. Kimbrough, the store was no laughing matter. In fact, the final straw — a sign that bid students 'Welcome Back' following the holiday break — pushed the president and campus officials to ensure that such tidings, or any other nefarious activity, would no longer be an issue. But it would come at a price: a \$225,000 price tag, which is the amount the college paid to purchase the property



on Daisy Gaston Bates Drive and the cinder-block building there that raised the ire of many.

And so, on a blustery and wet morning in March, the walls of the liquor store came tumbling down, signaling yet another phase in the college's push to revitalize the area surrounding the campus. (Two nearby abandoned properties have also been purchased.) A master plan started last fall will ultimately determine the property's fate, but for now, an empty lot is all that remains of a decades old landmark that was razed to make way for more positive symbols of progress.

### Playing Budgetball: Turning 'fiscal' into physical

This spring Philander Smith had the good fortune to be designated as one of the first colleges in the country to team with the National Academy of Public Administration to debut **Budgetball**, a new sport that teaches students about debt management, spending strategies and fiscal policies — all within a high-intensity aerobic workout.

With that, on March 19, the Mims Gymnasium and the Tate Recreation Center were turned into Budgetball tournament venues, with teams of students vying against one another and learning the basic principles of budgeting at the same time. To win, a team must creatively and responsibly use debt and savings to gain advantage over their opponents and score more points.

"We are thrilled to be among the first colleges to host a Budgetball tournament for our students," said President Kimbrough. "These issues are critical to their future, and we want to do all that we can to get young people engaged in finding solutions."

The goal of the National Academy of Public Administration is to "raise awareness about fiscal issues among college students and motivate them to get involved." But perhaps best of all for Philander students, the winning team received an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C., to participate in the national tournament. 

Free and open to any interested individuals, this year's event hosted nearly 500 high school students from across the country. **George R. Gray** is director of admissions and recruitment.



Samuel H. Drake '56, of Los Angeles, Calif., was the subject of a retrospective feature story published by the Macon Telegraph newspaper May 10, 2009. "Macon's Jackies: The forgotten story of Samuel Drake and Ernest Johnson" chronicled Drake's story as one of two of the first Black baseball players to play for the minor league's Macon Peaches in the mid-1950s. Drake went on to play in the Major Leagues for the Chicago Cubs (1960) and the New York Mets (1962) before an injury forced him into early retirement. Also mentioned in the article was his older brother Solomon Drake '54 who was called up by the Cubs in 1960, marking the first time in modern history two Black siblings had played Major League Baseball. Samuel Drake is retired from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Solomon Drake is pastor of Greater Ebenezer Missionary Baptist Church in Los Angeles.



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## **Every Penny Helps**

## THERE MAY BE HELP ON THE WAY FOR RECENT GRADUATES STRUGGLING WITH STUDENT LOAN DEBT.

Beginning July 1, **income-based repayment (IBR)** became available to at least a million federal student loan borrowers. Through this program recent graduates may be allowed to reduce their monthly payments based on their earnings. And if you're a teacher or work in government or at a nonprofit organization, you might even qualify for a new type of **public service loan forgiveness** after 10 years of eligible payments and employment.

The U.S. Education Department has published a detailed chart (see below for Web site address) of how income-based repayment may affect certain borrowers. For example, a single person earning \$20,000 a year would face a monthly repayment of only \$47. Adjustments may occur each year based on earnings and debt.

However, **Kevin Barnes**, assistant director of financial aid, encourages students and recent grads to use the IBR calculator instead of relying on the chart, because the chart does not factor in the student's actual loan debt where the calculator includes that information.

Those seeking income-based repayment **must** contact their lenders. But as a spokesperson for the Project on Student Debt in Berkeley, Calif., said "the main goal of IBR is to make sure that your student loan repayment doesn't ruin you financially."

Some much needed financial relief could be on the way, but you must apply for it — it is not automatic. So what are you waiting for?
