

## Protest Leads to

 Compus Improvements

On Monday, September 30th, a group of Philander Smith students publicly acknowledged their concem over several issues on campus.
Student unrest occurredon campus when a mattress caught fire in the Men's Dormitory. Upon reprimand from the Dean of Students, Mrs. Naomi Cottoms, and the possibility of the student's dismissal from the College, $\alpha$ student protest followed. Although damage was minimal, and there were no injuries, students seized the opportunity as a means of addressing
their concems. They requested improved housekeeping and fumigation in the dormitories, repairs to restrooms and electrical fixtures, improvements in the common use arras, and the need for r iore recreational and intramural sports activities. Statewide attention focused on the incident after students contacted the local news media.
PSC President, Myer L. Titus, who was out of town on College business when the incident occurred, scoid, "This is the first time these concerns have been
broughttomyattention.: It is the belief of the administration that stu-dentsover-reactedtothe situation, and failed to address it in an appropriate manner within the framework of the College. He pledged to take steps towards resolving the issues by allowing students the opportunity to voice their opinions and propose solutions during a cam-pus-wide forum. The forum, held on Monday, October 7th, was attended by administrators, faculty and staff members, parents and

Three new televisions have also been purchased and placed in student common use areas. "We have taken these steps in good faith, to demonstrate that we're concerned about our students, and do put their needs first." " Dr. Titus and the PSC faculty and staff, acting in good faith, have made the requested improvements and renovations as needed, and have done so in a timely and efficient manner."

Dr. Mahmoud Braima, Assessment Coordinator, attended the National Association of Assessment Coordinators in Anaheim, CA in August, where he presented two research papers. The first was titled, "The Press and the Not-So-Mean Streets: The Relative Influence of the Media on Public Knowledge of Crime Rates," and the second was titled "A Comparative Assessment of the Effects of Exposure to Media Reports and Political Ads on Voter Leaming and Voting Intention." These papers were co-authored with

He returned from the seminar with copies of the two databases used, and will make them available to anyone interested in doing research on educational issues and policy discussion. Healsonoted that research grants are available, but that competition for the grants is national in scope.

His illustrious career in education includes experience as a Public School Teacher in Gary, IN, Administrative Dean of Human Social Studies and Director of Academic Services at DePauw University in Indiana. He has served as Superintendent of Public Schools in New Orleans and in Greenville, MS.

Dr. Thomas began his tenure at Philander Smith College as the Director of the Walton Delta Scholarship Program. As Dean of Instruction (in the Division of Academic Affairs), he oversees all Academic programs,. Dr. Thomas hopes to incorporate new teaching methods that will make learning on exciting experience for students. One particular concept is distance learning. By using a computer and a satellite, students will be able to communicate in classes all over the world. For instance, students taking foreign classes may have a native instructor. Distance learning has been embraced as a future method of instruction.

Attimes, one couldnot always distinguish between her songs and stories. She would strum for a while and then tell the audience a story or give some personal history or insight, like her observation that history is about politicians, judges and robber barons, not regular folk.

Her voicerangedfrom $\alpha$ whisper to something strong and eerie as she raced through "I'm a Rambler, I'm a Gambler," "IHateto Hear That Lonesome Whistle Blow," "900 Miles", "He Had a Long Chain On," "Hushabye," "Poor Wayfaring Stranger," "Shenandoah" and "I Can't Keep from Cryin' Sometimes."

is a community organization which seeks to increase public awamess of domestic violence. and theincreasingnumber of women who die asaresult of abusive husbandsorboyfriends. The anniversary was marked by a graphic display in the Student Union of $t$-shirts, each representing a woman who was a victim of domestic violence.
