# Protest Leads to Campus Improvements

On Monday, September 30th, a group of Philander Smith students publicly acknowledged their concern over several issues on campus.

Student unrest occurred on campus when a mattress caught fire in the Men's Dormitory. Upon reprimand from the Dean of Students. Mrs. Ngomi Cottoms. and the possibility of the student's dismissal from the College, a student protest followed. Although damage was minimal, and there were no injuries, students seized the opportunity as a means of addressing

their concerns. They requested improved housekeeping and fumigation in the dormitories. repairs to restrooms and electrical fixtures, improvements in the common use areas, and the need for riore recreational and intramural sports activities. Statewide attention focused on the incident after students contacted the local news media.

PSC President, Myer L.
Titus, who was out of
town on College business when the incident
occurred, said, "This is
the first time these concerns have been

brought to my attention." "It is the belief of the administration that students over-reacted to the situation, and failed to address it in an appropriate manner within the framework of the College." He pledged to take steps towards resolving the issues by allowing students the opportunity to voice their opinions and propose solutions during a campus-wide forum. The forum, held on Monday, October 7th, was attended by administrators, faculty and staff members, parents and

students. School administrators agreed to work willingly with students, but reminded them that they would also have to cooperate and assume responsibility for personal cleanliness of their dorm rooms, and assist in helping to maintain campus facilities. Both parties agreed to work together as a family to bring about change.

Following the forum, the wheels were put in motion to make renovations and improvements in the student dormitories, and common areas. Within a two week period. Dr. Titus made the following statement. "We are pleased to report that the concerns voiced by our students have been, or are being corrected." He added, "The comfort and welfare of our students play a very important role in their educational

growth; and we have worked willingly as a family, and with dispatch to address any problems that would in any way hinder this growth." Areas of improvement and renovation include: Hiring additional housekeeping staff to clean and maintain the men and women's dormitories, assigning a female housekeeper specifically to the women's dorm, the pest control service, already contracted by the College to fumigate twice a month, provided additional service during this time, laundry room equipment was repaired, light fixtures have been replaced, new stall doors and seat covers have been installed in dormitory bathrooms, and the common use areas have been reopened under supervi-

sion. In addition to fulfilling the requests made by students, the College also purchased new furniture for the women's dorm lobby, and for the lounges on each floor of both the men and women's dormitory. Three new televisions have also been purchased and placed in student common use areas. "The renovations and new purchases have really raised student morale," said Assistant Dean of Students. Mrs. Ruth Nash. "We have taken these steps in good faith, to demonstrate that we're concerned about our students, and do put their needs first." "Now it's up to the students to do their part by helping us to maintain the campus, and to protect the investments the College has made. "The Student Center area houses the cafeteria, student union. and the men and women's dormitories.

"We are very pleased with the manner in which our concerns have been handled." said Junior Class President, and student representative Tianka "Kitty" Mitchell. " Dr. Titus and the PSC faculty and staff, acting in good faith. have made the requested improvements and renovations as needed, and have done so in a timely and efficient manner."

On October 24th, students showed their gratitude to the PSC faculty and staff by hosting an Appreciation Reception and "Open House" in the lobby of the Women's Dormitory. Certificates of Appreciation were presented to Mr. Henry Jemison and the maintenance staff, and Mr. Don Nunerley and the housekeeping staff. Assistant Dean of Students Mrs. Ruth Nash, Human Development Counselor Mrs. Vivian Dovne. Men's Dorm Director, Mr. Curtis Lang, and Faculty member, Mr. Curtis Freeman received "Student Choice" certificates: Dr. M.L. Titus was presented with a personalized coffee cup and a card signed by the students.

"A lot has been accomplished on campus during the past few weeks, and there's more on the agenda." said Dean of Students, Mrs. Naomi Cottoms. "Students can look for additional improvements during the school year."


### NEW BOOKSTORE OPENS

# BRAIMA'S TRAVELS

Dr. Mahmoud Braima. Assessment Coordinator. attended the National Association of Assessment Coordinators in Anaheim, CA in August, where he presented two research papers. The first was titled. "The Press and the Not-So-Mean Streets: The Relative Influence of the Media on Public Knowledge of Crime Rates," and the second was titled "A Comparative Assessment of the Effects of Exposure to Media Reports and Political Ads on Voter Learning and Voting Intention." These papers were co-authored with

Mrs. Jayanthi Sothirajah and Dr. Tom Johnson, both of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. The latter of the two papers was judged a "Top Three Faculty Paper" of the year.

Dr. Braima also traveled to the nation's capital in August to participate in the Advanced Studies Seminar on the use of the National Household Education Survey (NHES) databases for educational research and policy discussion. He returned from the seminar with copies of the two databases used, and will make them available to anyone interested in doing research on educational issues and policy discussion. He also noted that research grants are available, but that competition for the grants is national in scope.

# New Dean of Instruction

Dr. William Thomas of Cairo. Illinois is the new Dean of Instruction at Philander Smith College. Dr. Thomas is a graduate of Southern Illinois University and a former US Air Force officer. His illustrious career in education includes experience as a Public School Teacher in Gary, IN, Administrative Dean of Human Social Studies and Director of Academic Services at DePauw University in Indiana. He has served as Superintendent of Public Schools in New Orleans and in Greenville, MS.

Dr. Thomas began his tenure at Philander Smith College as the Director of the Walton Delta Scholarship Program. As Dean of Instruction (in the Division of Academic Affairs), he oversees all Academic programs,. Dr. Thomas hopes to incorporate new teaching methods that will make learning an exciting experience for students. One particular concept is distance learning. By using a computer and a satellite, students will be able to communicate in classes all over the world. For instance, students taking foreign classes may have a native instructor. Distance learning has been embraced as a future method of instruction.

Dr. Thomas has already begun to put forth his best efforts toward making sure Philander Smith College remains

# Odetta Onstage at PSC

Odetta graced the PSC stage Saturday, October 7, as part of the 15th anniversary celebration of the Women's Project.

Though she is 65, her voice and spirit are timeless. Colorfully attired, she came onstage with an "I Am" medallion and an acoustic quitar ground her neck.


