### HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

fficially founded in 1877, Philander Smith College is the result of the first attempt west of the Mississippi River to make education available to freedmen (former African-American slaves). The forerunner of the College was Walden Seminary, named in honor of Dr. J. M. Walden, one of the originators and the first Corresponding Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid Society. In 1882, Dr. G. W. Gray, President of Little Rock



University, the institution for the Arkansas Annual Conference, met Mrs. Adeline Smith, widow of Mr. Philander Smith of Oak Park, Illinois, while soliciting funds. The late Mr. Philander Smith had been a liberal donor to Asiatic Missions and had developed an interest in the work of the church in the South. In making her gift to Dr. Gray, Mrs. Smith designated \$10,500 for Walden Seminary. The trustees accepted the gift and gave it special recognition by changing the name of the struggling Walden Seminary to Philander Smith College. A new site for the school had already been purchased at Eleventh and Izard Streets. The gift made by Mrs. Smith was a significant contribution toward the construction of Budlong Hall, the first brick building on the new site.

Philander Smith College, which has a rich Christian heritage and acknowledges a definite obligation to The United Methodist Church, was also chartered as a four-year college on March 3, 1883. The first Baccalaureate Degree was conferred in 1888. The Presidents of Philander Smith College are recorded as follows: The first President is the Reverend Thomas Mason who resigned in 1896. He was succeeded by Reverend James Monroe Cox, Professor of Ancient Languages. Dr. Cox, who retired in 1924, was succeeded

by the Reverend George Collins Taylor, a graduate of the College. Dr. Taylor served as President from 1924 to 1936. In May, 1936, Dr. Marquis LaFayette Harris succeeded Dr. Taylor. Harris, who greatly enhanced the College, was succeeded by Dr. Roosevelt David Crockett, a graduate of the College on June 1, 1961. Dr. E.T. Dixon, Jr. took office on January 1, 1965 as Philander's Sixth President. Succeeding Dixon was

Dr. Walter R. Hazzard, who took office as the Seventh President of the College on July 1, 1969. Succeeding Hazzard was Dr. Grant S. Shockley who took office on January 1, 1980 as the Eighth President of Philander Smith College. Dr. Shockley was succeeded by Dr. Hazo W. Carter, Jr., who was elected unanimously by the Board of Trustees and took office August 20, 1983. When Dr. Carter resigned the presidency in August 1987, he was succeed by Dr. Myer L. Titus, a 1954 graduate of the College. Dr. Titus retired as President on June 30, 1998. Elected by the Board of Trustees in February 1998 as the Eleventh and first female President of Philander Smith College was Dr. Trudie Kibbe Reed. In 2004, Dr. Julius Scott succeeded Dr. Reed as Interim President. In 2004, the Board announced the selection of Dr. Walter M. Kimbrough as the Twelfth President of the College. In May 2012, Dr. Kimbrough resigned from the presidency. On July 1, 2012, Dr. Johnny M. Moore, a 1989 graduate, became the Thirteenth President of the College. Following the resignation of Dr. Moore in February 2014, Dr. Lloyd Hervey, a 1968 alumnus of Philander Smith College, was named Interim President. Succeeding Dr. Hervey was Dr. Roderick L. Smothers, Sr., the Fourteenth President of the College, who took office on January 1, 2015.

hilander Smith College is a small, privately supported and historically Black, four-year liberal arts institution related to the Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church. The College currently offers four degrees, including the Bachelor of Arts, the Bachelor of Science, the Bachelor of Business Administration, and the Bachelor of Social Work. The College's mission is: "To graduate

academically accomplished students, grounded as advocates for social justice, determined to change the world for the better." Philander Smith College, the only United Negro College Fund (UNCF)-member institution in Arkansas, strives to provide a quality college education for all regardless of race, religion, sex, national origin or ethnic background.

# PHILANDER SMITH COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER



oland Martin is the host and managing editor of TV One's NewsOne Now, the first daily morning news program in history to focus on news and analysis of politics, entertainment, sports, and culture from an explicitly African American perspective. Martin is a nationally syndicated columnist with Creators Syndicate, and is senior analyst for the Tom Joyner Morning Show, where his daily segment is heard on more than 100 stations and 8 million people daily. He is the author of three books: Listening to the Spirit Within: 50 Perspectives on Faith; Speak, Brother! A Black Man's View of America; and The First: President Barack Obama's Road to the White House as originally reported by Roland S. Martin.

In his career, Martin has been showered with more than 30 awards for journalistic excellence, including being named the Journalist of the Year in 2013 by the National Association of Black Journalists for his extensive focus on voter suppression and other issues of concern to African Americans during the 2012 election. He was named by NewsOne.com as the number one Black pundit in the country; and he has been named several times to The Root 100, their annual list of influential African Americans. Martin was also awarded the 2008 President's

Award by the National Association of Black Journalists for his work in multiple media platforms. In 2008, he was also inducted into the Texas A&M University Journalism Hall of Honor. He is a two-time NAACP Image Award winner; and has been named by Ebony Magazine on three occasions as one of the 150 Most Influential African Americans in the United States.

Martin spent six years as a contributor for CNN, appearing on numerous shows and earning accolades near and far for his no-holds honesty, conviction and perspective on various issues. In 2009, CNN was awarded the Peabody Award for its outstanding 2008 election coverage, of which Martin was a member of the Best Political Team on Television. Martin has been named one of the top 50 political pundits by the Daily Telegraph in the United Kingdom, and has appeared numerous times on a variety of American networks, as well as media outlets in Canada, Columbia, Italy, Australia and South Africa.

From October 2005 to October 2008, he served as a radio talk show for WVON-AM in Chicago, first as mid-day host and later as morning drive host. He is also the former executive editor/general manager of the Chicago Defender, the nation's most historic Black newspaper. He is the former founding news editor for Savoy Magazine under the team of New York-based Vanguarde Media, and the former founding editor of BlackAmericaWeb.com. He has also written pieces for *Ebony* and *Essence* magazines.

Mr. Martin is a life member of the National Association of Black Journalists, and a life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc...He is a 1987 graduate of Jack Yates High School-Magnet School of Communications, and a 1991 graduate of Texas A&M University, where he earned a bachelor's of science degree in journalism. In May 2008, Martin received a master's degree in Christian Communications from Louisiana Baptist University. He has been awarded honorary degrees from Florida Memorial University, University of Maryland-University College and Lemoyne-Owen College.

He is married to the Rev. Jacquie Hood Martin, author of Fulfilled! The Art and Joy of Balanced Living. They reside in Washington, D.C.

# M. JOYCELYN ELDERS, M.D.

oycelyn Elders was born Minnie
Lee Jones in Schaal, Arkansas on
August 13, 1933. In college, she
changed her name to Minnie Joycelyn
Lee (later using just Joycelyn). In 1952,
she received her B.A. in biology from
Philander Smith College in Little Rock,
Arkansas. After working as a nurse's aid
in a Veterans Administration hospital
in Milwaukee for a period, she joined
the Army in May 1953. During her 3
years in the Army, she was trained as a
physical therapist. She then attended the
University of Arkansas Medical School,
where she obtained her M.D. degree

in 1960. After completing an internship at the University of Minnesota Hospital and a residency in pediatrics at the University of Arkansas Medical Center, Elders earned an M.S. in Biochemistry in 1967.

Elders then received a National Institutes of Health career development award, also serving as assistant professor in pediatrics at the University of Arkansas Medical Center from 1967. She was promoted to associate professor in 1971 and professor in 1976. Her research interests focused on endocrinology, and she received certification as a pediatric endocrinologist in 1978. She became an expert on childhood sexual development.



In 1987, Elders was appointed Director of the Arkansas Department of Health by then-Governor Bill Clinton. Her accomplishments in this position included a ten-fold increase in the number of early childhood screenings annually and almost a doubling of the immunization rate for two-year-olds in Arkansas. In 1992, she was elected President of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers.

Elders became Surgeon General of the Public Health Service

on September 8, 1993, appointed by President Clinton. She was the first African American to serve in the position. As Surgeon General, Elders argued the case for universal health coverage, and was a spokesperson for President Clinton's health care reform effort. She was a strong advocate for comprehensive health education, including sex education, in schools. She was outspoken in her views, and was forced to resign after only 15 months in the position as a result of a controversial remark about sex education. Her last day in office was December 31, 1994. She returned to the University of Arkansas Medical Center as professor of pediatrics.

# BISHOP FELTON MAY

(1935 - 2017)


elton Edwin May was born in Chicago. After receiving a B.A. from Judson College, he was ordained deacon in the Northern Illinois Conference by Bishop Charles Wesley Brashares. He served two appointments in Chicago: St. James Church and Maple Park Church, a new church start. He then transferred to the Peninsula Annual Conference where he served as associate executive director of the Methodist Action Program in Wilmington, Delaware. In 1970, he was ordained an elder by Bishop John Wesley Lord after receiving an M. Div.

Degree from Crozer Theological Seminary. In the Peninsula Conference, he also served as pastor of Ezion-Mt. Carmel Church, Wilmington, superintendent of the Easton District and director of the Conference Council on Ministries.

He was a delegate to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference from 1972 to 1984, and a delegate to General Conference from 1976 to 1984. After his election to the episcopacy in 1984, he was assigned to the Harrisburg Episcopal Area where he served until 1996. In 1996, he was assigned to the Washington Episcopal Area. After retirement in September 2004, he accepted the position of Dean of the Harry R. Kendall Science and Health Mission Center at Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Arkansas.

In 1990, he served as Bishop-on-Special Assignment to organize and coordinate the United Methodist Bishops' Initiative on Drug and Alcohol Abuse and Violence in Washington, D.C. Bishop May has served as a member of the General Council on Ministries, the General Board of Global

Ministries, and the General Board of Higher



Education and Ministry. He has also served as chair of the National Shalom Zone Committee, the Special Program on Substance Abuse and Related Violence, the Commission on Pan-Methodist Cooperation, the General Board of Global Ministries' Finance Committee, the Northeastern Jurisdiction Board of the Multi-Ethnic Center, the Advance for Christ and His Church Committee, and the Council of Bishops' Emerging Issues Committee.

In 1999, Bishop May served

as a member of the White House Presidential Mission on Children Orphaned by AIDS, which traveled to Africa. The mission's study of HIV/AIDS in sub-Saharan Africa led to a Clinton Administration recommendation that U.S. spending in response to the crisis of AIDS worldwide be increased by \$100 million. He was also a participant in the White House's Faith Leaders for One America Initiative, the UN Millennium World Peace Summit of Religious and Spiritual Leaders, and the Camp David Presidential Retreat Interfaith Chapel Committee.

Bishop May's articles have appeared in the New York Times, Christian Social Action and Parents Magazine as well as other publications and curriculum. He has received honorary degrees from Lebanon Valley College, Lycoming College, Wesley College and Rusk College.

Phyllis Henry and Felton Edwin May were married on June 22, 1963. They have two children, Daphne Endrea Snead and Felton May II and eight grandchildren.

# Major General (Ret) Harold Gwatney

arold Gwatney started his automobile career in 1942, sweeping floors and washing parts at his uncle's garage. In 1944, he went to work at Critz Chevrolet in North Little Rock as a mechanic's helper and by 1946 was a certified mechanic-all of this prior to High School graduation. After graduation from high school in 1947, Harold Gwatney held several positions at different car dealerships and in the Arkansas National Guard. On November 7, 1957, Chevrolet approved a franchise for Harold Gwatney Chevrolet Co.

Throughout the 60's, 70's and 80's, Gwatney started a variety of business and ventures; including, an apartment complex, a national bank, Harold Gwatney Realty Co., Jacksonville Properties, Dalco Enterprises, Inc., Consolidated Insurance Co. and Financial Properties Insurance Co. At the same time, Gwatney held a variety of ranks in the Army



National Guard; he was promoted to Major General in 1981 and retired in 1989.

In June 1989, Gwatney moved to Memphis to help his son, Russell, in their second Chevrolet dealership purchased in 1988. Shortly after moving to Memphis, he purchased a third Chevrolet dealership and broke ground on one of the first original Saturn dealerships in the nation. In 1993, he purchased the Ford dealership in Millington. In 1994, he built his second Saturn store known as Saturn of

Germantown and in 1998 he built his third Saturn store, Saturn of Jackson in Jackson, Tennessee.

Throughout his career, Harold Gwatney has been very involved in the community including serving two terms on the North Little Rock City Council. Gwatney was also active in the Memphis Area Chamber of Commerce, and many other civic and charitable organizations.

## RUSH HARDING III

ush F. Harding, III graduated from Clarendon High School in Clarendon, Arkansas in 1972. In high school, Rush was President of the student body. He was an Eagle Scout, captain of the football and basketball teams, and Governor of Arkansas Boys' State in 1971. He was Co-valedictorian of his senior class. He received an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point from Senator John McClellan in 1972.

He transferred during his sophomore year to what is now the University of Central Arkansas. As a

student at UCA, he was a member of the men's basketball team, a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, and a member of the Wesley Foundation. He was President of his social fraternity, made the Dean's list and graduated with honors with a degree in math and English.

Upon graduation, he joined T. J. Raney & Sons and in 1979, along with Adron Crews and five other partners, founded the investment banking firm known as Crews & Associates. He served Crews as Executive Vice President from 1979 to 1996. He was named President in 1996 and Chief Executive Officer in 2000. Crews & Associates was sold in 2000 to First Security Bancorp, a \$5.5 billion bank holding



company headquartered in Searcy, Arkansas.

He currently serves on the board of First Security Bancorp and St. Vincent's Hospital. He is a former long term Board member of Pulaski Academy. He served on the Board of the University of Central Arkansas for four decades and was named a "Distinguished Alumnus" in 2006. He has served on the Boards of the Arkansas Arts Center, Philander Smith College, and the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. He is a member of the First United

Methodist Church in Little Rock. He and his wife, Linda, were named "Arkansas Outstanding Philanthropists of the Year" by the Association of Fundraising Professionals in 2007. Rush was named "Arkansan of the Year" by Easter Seals of Arkansas in 2014.

His parents are the late Rush (Buddy) Harding, Jr. and Martha Stone Harding. He is married to Linda Turner Harding and they have three children: Shaylea, Rush IV, and Payne.

He and Linda are very proud of their three grandchildren: Elowen, Ruby, and Rush Flowers Harding V (Five).

# COMMENCEMENT REGALIA

#### COMMENCEMENT

The term "Commencement" derives from a practice in the Medieval University where it was customary for a candidate for an academic degree to present a public lecture or disputation to the faculty and other scholars gathered to hear it. If the disputation was successfully defended and accepted, the candidate was "Admitted" to the degree "with all the rights, privileges and responsibilities thereunto appertaining." This first public lecture or disputation was originally called an "Inception." It signified the beginning or "Commencement" of the scholar's academic career in the degree to which he/she had been admitted. The ceremony surrounding this inception or "graduation" has subsequently come to be called Commencement.

#### **HONOR CORDS**

The Honor Cords are used to recognize students' achievements during commencement, and they identify those students who have the right to wear the cords. At Philander, the green, white & gold cord represents Summa Cum Laude which is with Highest Distinction (3.75 - 4.0 GPA); the gold & white cord represents Magna Cum Laude, which is with High Distinction (3.5 – 3.7499 GPA); the white cord represents Cum Laude which is with Distinction (3.0 – 3.49 GPA); and the old gold cord represents Distinction in Field of Study. Various other colors are used to identify members of the Honors Society, fraternities, sororities, and others.



#### ACADEMIC REGALIA

The distinctive dress associated with academic processions and convocations dates from the Middle Ages when long-sleeved, hooded gowns were necessary for warmth in the unheated stone colleges. Most of the scholars were clerics in holy orders, and they wore cloaks to which were attached hoods that could be pulled up to cover their tonsured heads. Over the centuries, much diversity occurred in academic costumes. To bring some order to this diversity in 1894 in the United States, the Intercollegiate Commission met in New York and agreed on a code of academic dress which has become the standard for most colleges and universities. According to this code, both the styling and color of the regalia have significance. The design of the gown indicates the degree. The bachelor's gown is simple, with a full sleeve. The master's gown is much like the bachelor's except for the long sleeves, which hang loose. The doctor's gown is fuller and more elaborate. It has velvet edging and three velvet stripes on the full, gathered sleeves. Usually, the color of the gown is black. Hoods, which are worn over the gowns, are similar for all degrees although differing slightly in length. The candidates for the Bachelor's Degree usually do not wear the hood. The hood has a velvet edging, which indicates the area of the degree. The inside or lining of the hood is satin in the colors of the college or university granting the degree. A partial list of the degree colors to be found on the edge of the hood or the trimming on the doctor's gown is given below. The usual cap, proper for all degrees, is the black mortarboard, although some colleges use the beret to represent the doctorate. Tassels, usually black, are worn over the left front quarter of the cap for a degree holder and on the right for a candidate for a degree. Holders of the doctorate may wear tassels of gold thread. Holders may also wear tassels in the colors of the college or university granting the degree.
