SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR PHILANDER COMMENCEMENT

Dr. Myer L. Titus, President of Philander Smith College, has announced that Philander Smith College will hold its 117th Commencement Exercises on Saturday, May 14, 1994. The largest class in a quarter-century, approximately 150 students, will receive the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree. The day will begin with an 8:00 AM Senior Breakfast in the College Cafeteria. The Breakfast will be followed by the Baccalaureate Service at Wesley Chapel, 11th and State, at 10:45 AM, and the Commencement Exercises on the South Mall of the College's Administration Building at 6:00 PM. The Baccalaureate Service and Commencement Exercises are free and open to the public. the nationally-known Philander Smith College "Collegiate" Choir, under the direction of Dr. William Powell, will perform at all three events.

The speaker at the Baccalaureate Service will be Dr. Jonathan D. Keaton, who currently serves the United Methodist Church as Superintendent for the Aurora District of the Northern Illinois Conference. He has served as Pastor at St. Luke United Methodist Church, Chicago, and Broadway United Methodist Church, Rockford. A 1968 graduated of Philander Smith College, Keaton holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology, and a Master's in Divinity and Doctorate of Sacred Theology from Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary. While at Garrett, he received graduate and teaching assistantships in Communications, Ethics and Society, and the Black Experience, and was twice awarded the Crusade Scholarship, in 1976-77 and 77-78.

Dr. Jon Michael Spencer will speak at the Commencement Exercises. An Associate Professor for the Curriculum in African and Afro-American Studies at the University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill, Dr. Spencer holds a Bachelor's in Music from Hampton University, a Master of Arts and Ph.D. in Music Composition from Washington University, St. Louis, and a Master of Theological Studies from the Divinity School at Duke University. He has also taught at Bowling Green State University, Duke University, and North Carolina Central University. Dr. Spencer has six published books and eight monographs dealing principally with the relationship between African American music and worship. He is currently at work on three books dealing with similar topics.



Again, to all of you, please accept my heartiest congratulations and may GOD BLESS YOU!



Student Loan Repayment Guidelines for Seniors

Washington, D.C., April 29, 1994 — If you borrowed money to help finance your education, you should start planning now for your first student loan payment, which typically comes six months after graduation.

"Many students don't think about repaying their loans during school, but it's important to remember that the money you borrow comes due shortly after graduation," says Allison Smythe, academic services representative at Sallie Mae. "Try to put some money aside each month to cover your payments."

Towards the end of your senior year, to help you understand your repayment responsibilities and the repayment options available to you, you will be required to attend an exit interview with (school name's) financial aid adviser. Before you graduate, you lender will provide you with a disclosure statement outlining the amount you owe each month and your total principal and interest payment over the term of your loan(s). Read this document carefully. You don't want any surprises.

"Be sure to keep all loan documents you receive in on place — especially the disclosure statement, which gives you all the information about the terms of your loan," notes Smythe. "And, notify your lender regarding any changes in your address or if your name changes. It is up to you to let your lender know your whereabouts, so you won't get behind in your payments."

Many lenders sell their student loans to secondary markets, such as Sallie Mae, before students graduate. The lenders do this to free up cash, which enables them to make more student loans. If your loan is sold, don't worry: your terms remain the same and, additionally, you may be able to benefit from an expanded array of repayment options.

About one in three loans is sold to Sallie Mae, the nation's largest holder and servicer of student loans. It your loan is one of them, you will receive a letter from Sallie Mae and a "Select Your Terms" guide, which provides an outline of all of the repayment options available to you to help you compare the plans and determine which one is right for you.

Your lender of loan holder may offer you a number of repayment options upon graduation, including automatic payment deduction from a checking or savings account, a graduated repayment plan, and loan consolidation. All of these programs can help you keep on top of your student loan payments, which will ensure that your credit history remain good.

On incentive to keeping your credit record unblemished is the Great Rewards program offered by Sallie Mae, which can save you money by lowering your interest rate by two percentage points if you make your payments on time for the first 48 months. Another program offered by Sallie Mae, Direct Repay, automatically deducts your monthly payments from your band account and reduces your interest rate by 1/4 percentage point.

For borrowers who find it helpful to lower the amount they owe in the first years out of school and consolidate their various student loans into one monthly payment, loan consolidation may be the right choice. Sallie Mae's SMART LOAN Account enables you to consolidate all outstanding loans into one account and extend the term of your loan from 10 to up to 30 years, keeping payments low throughout the repayment period. And, for shorted term relief, Sallie Mae offers a graduated repayment plan, making your loan payment a more manageable part of your budget for the first two or four years of repayment without extending the term of the loan.

If you plan to attend graduate school in the fall, notify the holder of your loan. You can apply for an in-school deferment, which will postpone repayment of your student loan as long as you are a full-time student.

If you are unable to find employment, you may also be eligible for a deferment for up to three years. Again, talk to your loan holder to make sure you know all of your options. If you are not able to make a full payment during any given month, contact your loan holder and work out a repayment plan. The alternative — possibly going into default — can irreparably damage your ability to get another loan or even a mortgage.

"If you have questions about your student loan while you're in school, talk to your financial aid administrator," says Smythe. "Your FAA has a wealth of information on the best way for you to repay your student loan."



Arkansas HIV/AIDS Report


HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, has been reported from each of the state's 75 counties. Reports received at the Arkansas Department of Health in April confirm that AIDS is indeed a statewide epidemic. For the thirty day period ending April 20th, 53 new cases of HIV were reported from 20 counties around the state bringing the statewide total to 2,684 cases. 12 counties reported multiple cases. Counties reporting multiple cases included:

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Many of the cases reported this month were of East Arkansas residents who have been receiving treatment in Tennessee. The Arkansas Department of Health has recently concluded discussions with the State of Tennessee that will allow better access to the medical records of Arkansas residents who are being treated in Tennessee.

- * 24 percent of HIV reports received this month were females; (13 of 55 reports).
- * 4 of the 55 HIV reports received this month were teenagers.
- * Garland County (Hot Springs area) this month reported its 100th case of HIV.
- * Of the 55 reports, mode of transmission was reported in 36 of the cases. 23 (of 55) were infected by male/male (homosexual) sexual contact. 8 (of 55) were infected by male/female (heterosexual) contact. 2 (of 55) were hemophiliacs. 19 (of 55) had no risk documented in the initial report and have been assigned for further investigation.
- * Individuals who are involved in unprotected sex outside a monogamous relationship should consider themselves at risk for exposure to HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus), the virus that causes AIDS.
- * Testing and early treatment can lengthen the lives of persons who are HIV-positive.
- * HIV testing is provided at all county health units of the Arkansas Department of Health.
