

Dr. Davy has a Bachelor of Arts Degree in composition and speech from Philander Smith College, a Master of Arts Degree in American Civilization from the University of Maryland, and a Doctor of Education Degree in Educational Leadership in School Administration from Vanderbilt University.

Dr. Arthur E. Bragg passed away November 23, 2002. His military service spanned over 34 years of active and reserve duty in the U.S. Army. He retired from the Army Reserve in 1988 as a Lieutenant Colonel. He began his outstanding career as an educator at Tuskegee University where he served as instructor of mathematics for three years. He also served as the Chairman of the Department of Mathematics at Delaware State College, from 1962 to 1989. He introduced the use of an IBM 1130 computer to faculty and students, and developed a four-year program in computer science. He also wrote the initial program used by the Office of Admissions and Records for grade reports and related analyses. He was an active member of Whatcoat United Methodist Church and a life member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. Survivors include his two sisters, Beatrice Bragg Stafford and Serena Bragg White; two brothers, James and Archie Bragg; a godchild; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives, and friends.



Archie Lee Davis passed away October 31, 2002. He was employed by the Veteran's Administration, Long Beach Naval Shipyard, Compton Unified and Los Angeles School Districts. He was active in many civic organizations, coached little league football, and was a lifetime member of the Veterans of Foreign War. He also was active in the

Philander Smith College Los Angeles Alumni Chapter, serving as President from 1995-1997. Under his leadership, the first Alumni Luncheon was held to raise funds for the College. He also inspired inactive alumni to become active members of the Alumni Association. He was very benevolent and had great love for people. Survivors include his wife, Dr. Jacquelyn Sowell-Davis; a son, Darion; two stepchildren, Leadriane and Larquis Sowell; a brother, Willie Lee Davis; two sisters, Hattie Brown and Beatrice Rodgers; seven grandchildren; a special adopted mom; and a host of nieces, nephews, other relatives, and friends.



Iola Faye Dickson passed away November 26, 2002. She was a very active community contributor and service provider in Brinkley, Arkansas. A major part of her service was to her church. She joined her beloved Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Church in the early 50's and remained a devoted member and leader for the rest of her life. She worked as an advisor

in the Floyd Brown Training School for girls in Fargo, Arkansas, and as an elementary school teacher in the Wheatley and Garret Grove public schools for 33 years. She retired in 1985. He was a member of Second Baptist Church where he served as a Sunday School Teacher, President of the Hayden Memorial Scholarship Fund, and member of the Usher Board. He was an avid sportsman, and the first African-American Scout Leader in Maywood. He also helped form the Wheaton/Maywood Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. He was married 53 years to Gwendolyn Duff Fowlkes, and they had five children and ten grandchildren. He will be missed by his family, colleagues and many friends.



Robin Loretta Scaife passed away September 8, 2002. After graduating from Philander Smith College with a Bachelor's Degree in English and Secondary Education, she received a Master's Degree in Communications from Arkansas Tech University. She was a compassionate educator who was eager to help both young


PETRELLA: THE FIRST LADY OF COUNTRY SOUL

Petrella, billed as the nation's first black female country singer, is a Philanderian. She was born and raised in Hot Springs, Arkansas and grew up singing in the A.M.E. Church. She often was entered into local talent shows by her late mother.

When asked why she chose country music, she said "I didn't choose country music, it chose me. I was born and raised in the country, and that choice certainly was not mine."

Petrella's career has included a self-titled album released by Playback Records with five singles reaching the top 100 on the Country and European charts. In 1994, she was nominated for "New Female Artist of the Year," and *Nashville Tracker* magazine nominated her album for "Album of the Year."

With her second album, "Papa Did a Rain Dance,"



Matt Yeager, a musician and free-lance writer in Fayetteville, Arkansas gave Petrella high marks in one of his music reviews.

"Petrella [is a] true vocal powerhouse who will lead you to believe that every song is sung by a completely different person," he said.

"With hints of Aretha Franklin, Tina Turner, and Patsy Cline frappe'd into a country, hip-hop, Spanish, rockabilly, and gospel sound, Petrella has stumbled upon a beautiful, simplistic sound that I have yet to hear duplicated."

Yeager also encouraged fans of country, folk, soul, gospel, and R&B music to listen to her music. "Petrella is well worth it," he said.


