Omaha Sets Gay Pride Week June 16-22

June 16-22 will be Gay Pride Week in Omaha as agreed by consensus of representatives of Omaha Bars and Organizations.

The representatives, meeting April 10 at the Stage Door, agreed that dates and plans first suggested at the group's February meeting worked out the best because they avoided conflict with other events in Omaha, fell into the timeframe suggested for Gay Pride Week nationally, yet allowed appropriate lead time for planning and organization of a successful Week.

The Week in Omaha will be geared around key major events supported by smaller events. The "anchors" are:

Thursday, June 19

-Gay Pride (awards) Banquet

Friday, June 20

-- Gay (live) Theater Saturday, June 21

-Choral concert

Sunday, June 22

-- Gay Pride Parade

Another major event will be a Gay Arts Festival/Show/Sale continuing Friday through Sunday of the Week.

Among supporting events which representatives mentioned as being planned for Gay Pride Week were special shows at the various bars, candlelight vigil (MCC), film festival (DIGNITY/Omaha), ecumenical worship service (MCC, DIGNITY/Omaha).

The Bars and Organizations of Omaha group is comprised of representatives from the gay/lesbian bars in Omaha and organizations formed for lesbian and gay men or persons concerned with that populace.

Represented at the April meeting were the Stage Door, The Run, Diamond Bar, River City Mixed Chorus, Metropolitan Community Church (MCC), DIGNITY/Omaha, TWO (TwoWheelers of Omaha), The New Voice, and two persons representing the community-at-large.

Represented at earlier meetings but absent from the April meeting were Stars Restaurant, Parents/Friends of Lesbians and Gays (P-FLAG), Imperial Court of Nebraska, Chesterfield bar and the Max.

Meetings are at 6:30 p.m. the first Thursday of the month. The next meeting was scheduled for 6:30 p.m. May 1, scheduled by rotation to be at Stars Restaurant.

Dessert/Champagne Reception

The River City Mixed Chorus will host a Dessert/Champagne Reception at Stars Restaurant and Lounge, 1113 1/2 Howard Street, Omaha, on Sunday, May 18, from 5 pm to 8 pm. Entertainment will be provided during the evening.

The Reception is a kick-off fundraiser for the Midwest Gay Arts Festival, to be held June 20-22 at Chanticleer Theatre in Council Bluffs.

Admission for the elegant evening will be \$8.00 at the door.

Women's Week Held at Nebraska Wesleyan

Women's Week at Nebraska Wesleyan, our first in ten years, was a complete success -- thanks to the hard work of quite a few women.

Of the many panels that were offered, "Parenting in the 80's" (a panel discussing non-sexist parenting) and "Dating Expectations and Sex" (examining date rape and relationship issues) elicited the strongest attendance. "Woman to Woman," with sex therapist Carol Rogers, was also well attended by heterosexual, bisexual, and Lesbian women alike. Lesbian issues were also presented in the panel "Women without men: Living Arrangements," and Lesbian

guest speakers were well received by non-Lesbian women and students in attendance (although the subject matter was not as well received by some members of Wesleyan's administration). Overall, attendance was even higher than expected, and we were pleased by the participation of so many women from the community.

In our opinion, the highlight of the Week was "Women's Voices," a night of entertainment by talented women from Wesleyan and Lincoln. Women's music, poetry, artwork, and comedy made for a very special evening. We want to thank Amethyst, Katie Boner, Bridget & Friends, Lori Hand, Twyla Hansen, and the Alligator String Choir for sharing their talent and energy with us!

An unfortunate note: scheduled forum speaker, Charito Planas (business-woman, lawyer, and former director of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce) was forced to cancel. Ms. Planas had returned to the Philippines at the request of President Aquino, who has offered Planas a government position. While she was out of the country, U.S. officials revoked her visa in retaliation for her outspoken criticism of former President Marcos. Ms. Planas is now unable to enter the U.S. even to obtain her belongings.

In the end, let no one doubt the resourcefulness and determination of women: the entire week was implemented without a budget (although several donations were gratefully received). Without the energy, talent, and diligence of the women who worked on Wesleyan's Women's Week, it never would have happened. Although there were times when we all wondered if the Week would become a reality, we all agree that Women's Week must become an annual event at Nebraska Wesleyan University.



Auditions will be held in May for a gay theatre production, as part of the Midwest Gay Arts Festival, sponsored by Omaha's River City Mixed Chorus.







GALA Chorus Festival in the Twin Cities

Omaha's River City Mixed Chorus is travelling to and participating in the GALA Choruses Festival, July 2 through 6 in Minneapolis-St. Paul. GALA Choruses (Gay & Lesbian Association of Choruses) is a nationwide network of 40 gay, lesbian, and mixed choruses. 18 choruses will be performing, individually and together, in this once-every-three-years event.

The Chorus will be taking a chartered bus to and from the Festival. The bus will leave early the morning of Wednesday, July 2, and will return by 8 am, Monday, July 8. 

Gay Games II to Include Arts Festival

During the week of August 9-17, San Francisco will host what promises to be one of the most exciting gatherings of the gay and lesbian community, Gay Games II. The SFAA (San Francisco Arts and Athletics) coordinators have also



planned an international arts festival in conjunction with the games.


The SFAA Cultural Festival will be a 17-day international festival of the arts featuring theater, music, dance, art exhibits, films, and related activities.

Several hundred athletes are already registered to participate in Gay Games II. Athletes will hail from 47 cities, with New York City leading in the number registered. Canada and Australia share the lead for foreign countries. Entries for Gay Games II are being accepted through June 1. All athletes are eligible. Entry fee is \$20 per athlete

per sport. Individual sports include boxing, cycling, golf, marathon, physique, powerlifting, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, triathalon, and wrestling (for men). Team sports include basketball, billiards, racquetball, SOCCET. softball and volleyball. DIGNITY/Omaha **Elects Officers**

Presently designated as a "chapter in formation," DIGNITY/Omaha moved closer to full chapter status with the election of officers. Until the election, the Omaha organization had been operating informally headed merely by a volunteer "coordinator."

Elected president was Russ W., who had been acting coordinator for about 18 months. Members elected Dan O. as their vicepresident and chose Joe P. as secretary/treasurer.

The group as yet has no bylaws, but once bylaws are written, it's assumed they'll provide for a one-year term of office.

Writing bylaws will DIGNITY/Omaha's next major step toward achieving full chapter status. The "in formation" status means that the Omaha organization may use the name DIGNITY which "belongs" to the national organization, but until the Omaha chapter completes requirements necessary for full chapter status, they have no voting rights on the regional or national levels, though they may send delegates who have the right to be heard, just no voting privileges.

DIGNITY is an international organization primarily for gay men and lesbians who are Roman Catholic. The group also welcomes person of other religious affiliations and concerned non-gays. Among the organization's primary tenets are that gays and lesbians indeed are children of God, equal members of Christ's family, and that it is possible to express one's sexuality responsibly and unselfishly in a manner consistent with Christ's teachings.

DIGNITY/Omaha sponsors a Mass at 7 p.m. the second Sunday of each month in the Celebration Room of St. John's Church (lower level) on the Creighton University campus. Another monthly meeting, the "Gathering," is the fourth Sunday of each month and rotates among members' homes.

Gays Grow Old Tool

As one observes the gay scene in Omaha and Lincoln, Nebraska (and most other areas), it would appear that only the young are gay. Homosexuality is not a result of modern technology, and not every gay person dies of some terrible disease when they reach the age of thirty. Homosexuality results in the formation of an alternative lifestyle. For some, as they mature, they give up the "disco" scene in favor of a more subdued lifestyle - but they continue to live and to love those of their own sex. Many develop relationships that exist in a very domestic manner. Some despair in the pursuit of a relationship and go into seclusion. Others continue the pursuit and some seem to pursue only the sexual activity that they can find in the anonymous sex of bathhouses, parks, Tea-rooms, etc. The latter group are often referred to as "Old Trolls."

It would be a safe bet to wager that every "Old Troll" was once a young man who desired very much to develop a life-long relationship with another young man. They did not have the advantages of the gay men of today. I an 46 years old-in many eyes--an "Old Troll." I became sexually (homosexually) at the tender age of 14. The only photos of the nude and near-nude bodies were in nudist magazines, body-building magazines and The National Geographic. Since I was not stimulated by men with women in the nude, strained veins, or African men, I didn't collect magazines. Engaging in a homosexual act was covered by the sodomy law (against having sex with an animal), hence one did not dare be open in their attraction to other men or boys. The religious belief was that a homosexual could not only cause personal damnation, but cause God to destroy your very homeland and family. At 17, I left home to join the service. In the first three months, I knew several men who were dishonorably discharged for homosexual traits. We were not then that far removed from the time of WW II and military dishonoring was a life-long stigma. For me,


military service was a four year tour into celibacy. Upon separation from the military, I moved close to the University at Lincoln and found kindred spirits. One was caught in his station wagon on a back road and spent time in prison.

At 27, I succumbed to social pressures and set aside my natural sexuality and was married. Eleven years later, I was released from that bondage and was again free to express my natural self. I was no longer a young man. The gay social scene had emerged, and I did not fit in - no matter how hard I tried. I had not been a part of the bar scene for 15 years and my body said no to the consumption of liquor. I love to dance, but am often caught jitterbugging to a disco beat. My hair line retreated and I looked stupid dressed "preppy."

If I could, I would return to being 27 and continue where I left off, and that may be why I am attracted to that age group. My sexual life was stunted then and as I attempt to develop my natural homosexuality, I am confronted




at the Boardwalk from 9 pm-1 am Well Drinks





with the conflict of a 30-year-old sexuality in a 46-year-old body. I suppose one could say that I am a retarded homosexual. However, I am still a homosexual in the process of development. I have a lot to offer in a relationship and I shall pursue that relationship.

Since most of our readers are of a younger generation, I encourage you to give thought to how we "Old Trolls got to be what we are-or seem to be--and remember that you too will someday be an older gay. -- Jerry Peck



Dear Izzy.


