Legalize Trans Campaign Launches

A new public education campaign, Legalize Trans, has

launched with the goal of drawing increased attention to



transgender people and their issues.

The campaign, created by activists Asher Kolieboi and Brian Murphy, is selling T-shirts, buttons, and other merchandise bearing the message "Legalize Trans," a response to what they see as a lack of trans inclusion in American Apparel's Legalize Gay campaign and in the gay rights movement generally, says Kolieboi, who earlier this year was co-director of the Soulforce Q Equality Ride and one of the young activists featured in The Advocate's Forty Under 40 issue.

In addition to raising visibility, merchandise sales are intended to generate funds for trans people's gender-transition costs, Kolieboi says. He is funding his own transition in this manner, and other trans-focused organizations and individuals can become Legalize Trans affiliates and sell the goods to raise money for medical expenses and trans activism.

In the near future Legalize Trans will add a blog and resource page to its website to help people "navigate the legal, medical, and social parts of transition," Kolieboi tells The Advocate. Find out more about Legalize Trans and its efforts at http://www.legalizetrans.com.

Council Tucky

When my husband and daughter asked if we could move to Council Bluffs I flatly said, "No!" We had moved to a country home in Iowa after the passing of Bad 416 in Nebraska. My husband commuted to west Omaha 50 miles a day, and that included taking our daughter to school in Omaha every day. I worked in Council Bluffs and commuted 34 miles six and sometimes seven days a week.

Gas prices continued to rise and one of the winters was relentless. Then, one wintery evening we drove home in a blizzard from our daughter's high school play and I think it was the first time we prayed out loud as a family. We made it home safely but it was so frightening that I decided to reconsider moving into town.

I loved the country (we lived in the beautiful Loess Hills) and the view of the Missouri River Valley was spectacular. We saw deer every day as well as wild turkeys, fox and, in the spring and the fall, thousands of geese migrating.

We decided to start looking for a house closer to the metro area on the Iowa side of the Missouri River. I demanded something "country" and our daughter would settle for anywhere that "pizza could be delivered." My husband just wanted to be closer to civilization.

My family literally blindfolded me and drove me to a home that

was located in timber and was on a dead end road. It was still in the hills with a view of the south end of the Eppley



Airfield. Deer and other wildlife were abundant. To my shock, we were in the middle of Council Bluffs.

What were our options? I would be less than 10 minutes from work and 10 minutes from our daughter's college. My husband

thought he would enjoy the shorter commute to his west Omaha work. Our property taxes would be much lower than in Omaha. Sales taxes would be lower. We would be less than 10 minutes from any store. There were no traffic jams. We were 10 minutes from downtown Omaha. And, we all loved the house!

We purchased the home and, on the day we moved in, our neighbors down the road (we couldn't see their house because of the foliage) stopped by with a bottle of wine to welcome us. OMG! We were moving to Council Tucky! On our first evening in town we drove around Council Bluffs and discovered something extraordinary. There were clean streets, a growing downtown, public art, a beautiful town square with an incredible fountain, and friendly people who waved and said, "Hello." And, we also had a gay bar.

Then, in 2007, Iowa became the 7th state to ban discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity. In 2008, the Council Bluffs City Council added sexual orientation and gender identity to its list of protected classes. That same year, the Mayor of Council Bluffs, with unanimous approval of the City Council, appointed me as the first "out" gay man to a city commission, the Civil Rights Commission. On April 3, 2009 Iowa state approved marriage equality. And we became legally married that year.

So, the next time I hear someone say, "Council Tucky," I'll love my city even more and I will choose it any day over Omahaha!ha!ha!ha!ha!ha!ha!ha!

Condos versus Houses: Critical Legal Insight for Every LGBT Condo Buyer

Many LGBT buyers mistakenly and understandably assume that the purchase of a condo is no different from buying a typical single family home. But the fact is that condominium ownership has its own exclusive set of rules that are quite different from those that apply to traditional houses.

The laws of ownership are not exactly the same and neither is the totality of the physical assets and amenities that are fully transferred to the buyer. That's why is it crucial that LGBT consumers familiarize themselves with the special characteristics of condominium ownership before they enter into a contract to buy a condo. Even those who have plenty of experience buying and selling "regular" dwellings will need to understand how condominiums are uniquely different – not just in the way they look but also in the way that condo contracts work.

The most important thing to grasp is that the term "condominium" does not refer to a style of architecture. Although most condos do have a similar apartment type of look – with units arranged so that they open into an interior hallway and basic floor plans and designs that resemble one another – the term "condo" really refers to a legal definition. Many LGBT buyers don't make that distinction, but it is an important one that impacts the overall ownership experience. The truth is that almost any kind of structure, from an office building to a cluster of townhouses, may be sold as condominiums as long as the legal framework for condos exists.

Just as hybrid vehicles run on a combination of gas and electric power, the legal format of the condo is a clever blend or hybrid of individual and communal ownership. The owner of a condo owns the unit where they live, but they also share other amenities and features with everyone else who is also a member of the condo ownership group or homeowner's association.

An owner may own their balcony, for example, and the rooms inside their condo. But they don't individually own the roof above their unit, the hallway outside, or the parking lot. Those features are owned in partnership with the rest of the condo residents. Each owner, in other words, claims a share of many common features that might include the outside landscape, the swimming pool, the central air conditioning system, the plumbing infrastructure, the condo management office, the sidewalks outside each condo, and the building's elevator.

While a person may be able to do whatever they want with their

own unit, they have to get permission to make any changes to the shared property. If common property needs to be repaired or replaced they also have to shoulder their fair share of financial responsibility to make that happen. Many condo owner associations also prohibit the renting or leasing of individual condos, for example, so persons who buy a condo and then decide to lease it may be penalized. That kind of rule helps to ensure a more stable community of neighbors. But whether that is interpreted as a drawback or a positive benefit will depend upon the point of view of each individual resident, so before buying it is necessary to carefully study all of those rules and regulations.

Once upon a time that list of rules would normally be only a few pages long, but these days it is more common to get an entire computer CD full of legal jargon explaining the rights and obligations of each owner. This includes the bylaws of the ownership association and it should also show a detailed accounting of money that is set aside or spent from the accumulated monthly condo maintenance fees.

Check the bylaws and notes from meetings to find out, for instance, if any major repairs have been done or if there are any disputes with contractors. If the roof is in bad shape, the paint is peeling, and the landscape is a mess but there is not enough money in the condo association account to remedy those problems, that's a red flag. But when the maintenance fund is flush with cash and the condo project is in immaculate condition, that's a great sign of sustainable value.

The best way to wisely invest in a condo is to do so with the expert guidance of a building inspector and a real estate attorney. Hire those who specialize in condos, though, because the scope of the inspections and the legality of ownership restrictions for condos are different when compared to all other types of real estate. They can explain everything and answer any questions that arise so that the buyer knows exactly what they are purchasing and can enjoy a stress-free closing and a happy condo ownership experience. It is also strongly recommended that LGBT buyers work with LGBT real estate agents because they will better understand the unique needs and concerns of the LGBT buyer.

Cultivating a Sense of Humor

Perhaps only God Herself is more important than humor. Seriously.

Psychological research has found that when people list the qualities they desire in a partner, a good sense

of humor consistently shows up near the top. For some of us, a good sense of humor is more important than physical appearance or socioeconomic status. Why? Perhaps life is so hard that a humorless partner is too much to bear. When the road gets rough, it's great to have a partner you can laugh with at all the absurdities along the way.


University of Oregon psychologist Robert L. Weiss studies humor in relationships and has found that the more a person likes his/her partner's sense of humor, the more satisfied he/she will be in the relationship. People who laugh together feel more positive toward each other and are more likely to give each other the benefit of the doubt, says author Polly Shulman in Psychology Today.

Humor can defuse tense situations and change the mood from serious and heavy to lighter and more balanced. A good sense of humor is a tangible asset ...but can it be cultivated? If you're pretty humorless, are you doomed to be this way forever? Luckily, no. A sense of humor can be developed just like any other personality trait. This is great news, particularly for those of us who have been told, at some point or another, "You have no sense of humor" or asked, "Where's your sense of humor?" A sense of humor can be cultivated, and this column will help you get started.

"Why bother?" you may be asking yourself, especially if it takes a lot of work. Ironically, having a good sense of humor is serious business. Humor is no silly little thing; it's part of your life force, right up there with breathing and eating. Just for a moment, Imagine that you are (temporarily) having trouble breathing. It has been proven that telling a joke to hospital patients who suffer from asthma or respiratory problems helps them breathe more easily. Humor lowers panicky feelings that contribute to poor breathing. In fact, a well-developed sense of humor has been linked to improved all-around physical and mental health in study-after-study: it strengthens immune systems, lowers blood pressure, reduces stress on the organs and muscles, etc.

On a personality level, many of us highly value a good sense of humor. We seek it out in others and are proud to claim it in ourselves. If someone has a great sense of humor, isn't it likely that he/she is happy, confident and has a good perspective on life? Look at Ellen DeGeneres. The basic message in her humor is: we're all alike, we find the same things funny and we're all in this together.

Take a few minutes and get in touch with your own sense of humor (or lack of it) and ask yourself:



Make a list of things that you find funny. It can be a
person, a TV show, movie or comedian, a comic strip...it
doesn't matter, write down a few things that you find funny.

Can you laugh at yourself? When was the last time you did something "weird" and were able to laugh at yourself? If it's difficult for you to answer these questions, I urge you to spend some time cultivating your sense of humor. Not only is it good for your health, it also makes you more attractive. People who can laugh at themselves tell the world that they love themselves enough that they don't have to pretend to be perfect... that it's okay to fall on your ass now and then, grin sheepishly, get up and move on.

Humor is innately anti-perfectionistic. Unlike perfectionists, people with a well-developed sense of humor know they're all totally human, will inevitably screw up something important and appear vulnerable when they do. Humor is a form of kindness to yourself and everyone around you. Research shows that people with a well developed sense of humor live longer, much happier lives. They're more pleasant to be around because they're less demanding of others. They make better parents, bosses, friends and partners. This may sound impossible for you perfectionists reading this. Perfectionists and other people who are hard on themselves won't see the humor in their mistakes, instead, they berate themselves for not doing everything perfectly. But perfectionism is a learned characteristic and can be unlearned.

Wherever you are in your life, you can improve your self of humor: it's not a fixed quality. Start small: be willing to laugh at little things that you find funny. It can be something you do or something someone else does. Watch funny movies or videos. Ask people to tell you jokes and try telling a few jokes on your own. Like any skill, it takes practice. Don't give up after one or two tries and say, "I can't do it." Persist and experiment. After all, it's not brain surgery: have some fun with it!

Tea Partyers Up In Arms

A Montana Tea Party leader has been removed from his position, the result of an antigay Facebook post he had made earlier this summer, the Associated Press reports.

Tim Ravndal, the nowformer president of the Big Sky Tea Party Association, was dismissed by the group's board of directors after a July 23 post in which he voiced his opposition to marriage equality.

In a likely reference to the 1998 Matthew Shepard murder in neighbor-

ing Wyoming, another Facebook user wrote on the post, "I think fruits are decorative. Hang up where they can be seen and appreciated. Call Wyoming for display instructions."

Ravndal replied, "Where can I get that Wyoming printed instruction manual?"

Jim Walker, chairman of the Tea Party chapter, said in a state-

ment, "We continually make it known that we will not tolerate bigoted dialogue, behavior or messages at our functions, our meetings or within our ranks."

But there's also dissension in said ranks. Kristi Allen-Gailushas, secretary for the local Tea Party group, resigned in protest Tuesday, the Helena Independent Record reports. "They didn't even listen to Tim and what he had to say," Allen-Gailushas told the newspaper. "They were just worried about the [Montana] Human Rights Network and the ACLU and what they were going to say."

In a Facebook post, Allen-Gailushas fired a further shot across the bow: "The Gay community wants a war. ... they've got one!!"

Bulgarian Bishop's Antigay Awards

Plovdiv Bishop Nikolay (pictured) of the Bulgarian Orthodox Church on Monday awarded an antigay local mayor and prosecutor for defending "the sanctity of marriage, family, and statehood."

Sofia News Agency reports that Nikolay bestowed high honors to both men for their support of an ordinance that would ban displays of sexuality in public in the city of Pazardzhik, located





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about 70 miles southeast of the Bulgarian capital of Sofia.

"There is something called public morality," Nikolay said at the award ceremony. "The society is not obliged to watch how somebody is sticking into its eyes their own travesty, and to watch how somebody is destroying the souls of our children, and pours poison into the very idea about the sanctity of the bond between a man and a woman that forms a family."



First In-Flight Same-sex Wedding Planned

Swedish airline SAS plans to host the first same-sex wedding ever to be held in the air, with a ceremony scheduled for December on a flight from Stockhold to New York.

According to the New York Daily News, the airline is still looking for a couple that would be married in Swedish territory, where same-sex marriage is legal. The winners will be selected by online vote.

"Besides getting a free flight, the couple will receive three nights at the W Hotel in New York and a honeymoon in Los An-



geles," reported the Daily News. "The couple will forgo packets of peanuts for a special wedding buffet during the flight."

Gay Successor to Chicago Mayor?

Mayor Richard M. Daley and wife Maggie Richard M. Daley (pictured), Chicago's mayor since 1989, surprised the city by announcing Tuesday he won't seek reelection in 2011 — and political observers say the Windy City's first openly gay alderman is a potential successor.

Daley, 68. made his announcement at a brief press conference. saving, "This is a personal decision, no more, no less," and that it's time for both him and the city to move on. the Chicago Tribune reports. Daley. a Democrat and son of longtime



mayor Richard J. Daley, has been reelected easily in every race since taking office, but his popularity has declined recently due to the city's budget problems and a surge in crime, the paper noted. On the personal side, his wife, Maggie, is suffering from cancer.

Daley has had a generally good relationship with Chicago's large gay population. In 2006 he was inducted into the city's Gay and Lesbian Hall of Fame as a "Friend of the Community." His administration's achievements include establishing Chicago's Advisory Council on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Issues and Office of LGBT Health; instituting domestic-partner benefits for city employees; and adding gender identity to the municipal human rights ordinance. He has voiced personal support for marriage equality.

Restaurateur Tom Tunney, the first and only openly gay Chicago city council member, is reportedly among those interested in the mayor's office. Tunney saidlast spring that he would consider a run, but only if Daley retired. Other potential contenders, according to the Tribune, include President Obama's chief of staff, Rahm Emanuel; Cook County sheriff Tom Dart; outgoing county assessor James Houlihan; former Chicago inspector general David Hoffman; and several other aldermen.

Gay Pride Parade Planned for Serbia

Following threats of violence that canceled last year's gay pride parade, organizers in Serbia will try again next month.


According to the Associated Press, the march planned for October 10 in Belgrade would be the first in nearly a decade. Marchers plan to use the slogan, "Let's Walk Together."

"Gays and lesbians often face harassment and pressure in predominantly conservative Serbia," reported the AP. "Extremists broke up the Balkan nation's first gay pride march in 2001 and beat up several participants. No gay pride marches have been held since then."

Last year, a gay pride parade in Serbia was canceled because police said they could not guarantee security.




