GROCERY GIVEAWAY SERVES 900+

MCC-Omaha in conjunction with the Nebraska Food Bank gave away 12 pallets of groceries Friday, May 22, including over 400 hams, sixty boxes of frozen meat, a pallet of potato skins, two pallets of mixed snacks, corn on the cob, Panera Bread, water, soda, etc. Over 275 households in need received the free groceries. People began lining up at 2PM for the givea-

way, which was scheduled to start at 5PM. At 4:25 when the line reached from the back of the church to the street in front of the church, the 29 MCC volunteers who came to



help with the giveaway starting filling the boxes and bags that people had brought with them. For the next 2 1/2 hours the line didn't seem to get any smaller as friends told their neighbors and neighbors called family members. The 275 households who received free food totaled over 900 individuals in their families.

Proclamations or Progress?

After more than five months of no action

on his agenda for the LGBT community, expectations are high for President Obama in the month of June. Pride month, rumor has it, is when the White House will unveil a "major announcement." How major and by whose standard remains to be seen.

One of the special celebrations this year will be the 40th anniversary of the Stonewall riots, which gave birth to our modern social movement. For me, however, and you must forgive my pessimism, instead of celebrating, I am still wondering why life and limb were risked for so little progress over those 40 years.

My perspective on this is as a Gen X'er, so I understand when many of those who came before me gasp with horror when I suggest that little progress has been made. After all, going from being harassed in our bars to hosting political candidates in our bars who desperately seek our votes and our money qualifies as great progress. Even during the span of my political consciousness I have seen much improvement in public perception and respect from the political establishment.

But for too long that respect has been limited. While most Republicans have used the LGBT community as a lightning rod for electoral gain over the past two decades, most Democrats have responded in kind

with acquiescence. In the Congress, that is still very much the case. Even the easy lift of hate-crimes legislation seems insurmountable for Harry Reid's Senate and a Democratic caucus busting at the seams with 59 members. Although polling shows the legislation supported by an overwhelming majority of the public, Senator Reid can't wrangle the necessary votes for passage of a stand-alone bill.

There is one Democrat who shed the usual pattern of candidates beyond any before him. Tears came to my eyes when he took the oath of office as president of the United States because I knew that everything was about to change. Throughout the campaign candidate Obama promised to be a fierce advocate for the LGBT community, and the political climate of the nation was ripe for major progress.

Obama quickly appointed LGB people (no T's) to positions in the government in unprecedented numbers. However, including hate-crimes legislation passing the House, there has been no progress on achieving civil rights for the LGBT community beyond progress that hadn't already been achieved.

So, we stand at a moment where expectations are high — and Obama's administration has set this as a time when he will surprise us. Let's hope their beginning effort is just that — only a beginning. On June 1 the White House issued its LGBT Pride Month Proclamation. While some laud it, I don't. It's nothing we haven't heard before. More important, it is without substance. Proclamations aren't legislation and don't do anything to achieve full civil rights.

What is forthcoming, I have no idea. Over the past two months we've seen amazing progress on the state level in marriage equality, with more to come. Yet, on the federal level, it's not only been zilch, but the White House keeps stumbling over itself on our issues. Nearly ever person at the Pentagon has flubbed "don't ask, don't tell" -- from the secretary to a junior press guy. The White House press secretary is

increasingly pummeled with questions on our issues and he has yet to deliver an answer that reflects honesty, transparency, and candidness.

Many in our community have asked others to give President Obama time to get in office and get settled before we hold him accountable for his promises. Some have also suggested that the economic crisis and the wars should take precedence over our civil rights.

Excuses for waiting are running out.

What the White House does this month will set the tone for whether Barack Obama's administration will be one of proclamations or progress. While I have been consistently pushing him and his administration to do what every one of us knows is right, I remain inspired by his message and philosophy. Yet, I need reason to believe that he will be the fierce advocate he has claimed to be. Now is the time to show it.

Spirit of Pride

40 years is a long time, a lifetime for some; but change can take many lifetimes before what once was considered impossible, becomes possible. On a typical night 40 years ago, what began as a typical raid on a New York City bar, and the typical harassments by police, as they cuffed and loaded the typical gay patrons, something, anything but typical happened. This time, the police met resistance. Was it a drag queen, a butch lesbian, a street hustler or a combination, no one knows for sure, but cat calls and epithets were shouted. Rocks and bottles were thrown. The police retreated inside the Stonewall Inn and barricaded the doors. Someone tore off a parking meter and used it as a battering ram. A fire was set. Police called for backup. The crowd grew. The riot police arrived. As they pushed through the crowd, Roman Legion style, the crowd reformed behind them. The Stonewall

riots had begun. The Gay Rights Movement was born.

The same courage that gave birth to the Gay Rights Movement is the element that has kept the movement going and has brought that movement to the four corners of the earth. Right here in the Midwest, it is that same courage that has led to the right to marry for same sex couples in Iowa. It is that same courage that gives us our local heroes. A true hero is measured not by the size of his strength, but by the strength of his heart.




Reefer Madness





Diane's Story

"My partner and I had been together for 14 years when I received the worst phone call of my life. There had been a terrible accident, and she was being flown to the hospital by helicopter. The hospital staff wanted to know how to get in touch with her next of kin. Mine was the only phone number they could find in her wallet. 





A Tale of Two Couples

A dark cloud has been lifted for gay and lesbian couples from the help of the Iowa Supreme Court. For those wondering, what was it like to get married in Iowa the first week of legal same-sex marriage; here are two couples that will share their story. Mike Yowell and Hersh Rodasky give a brief background of themselves seeking a marriage license. "My spouse and I, since we are now married, of 28 years wanted to get married so we could have the legal protections that straight couples have. We applied for the license on Monday (April 27th) and had to wait three days before we could actually have the ceremony, due to Iowa law, (April 30th)."



The other couple is David Jones and Thomas Clark. They give a brief background of their relationship. "We met in the summer of 1996 at the Rainbow Outreach Center in Omaha at a fundraiser. After a year of dating, we cohabitated in the Omaha metro area and remained ever since. Thomas is from here and David moved from Wichita, Kansas."

What was it like on day one when couples started turning in their marriage licenses, the atmosphere? Mike and Hersh reply "in the early morning, it was polite and civil. By the afternoon, though, the employees had seen that there was nothing to fear from GLBT people and the atmosphere was very warm. We developed a very good relationship with the people in the courthouse." Was there literally a line? "Not really. There was a steady flow of applicants but no lines. There seemed to be more female couples than male couples" seeking marriage licenses. They were impressed with the same-sex couple turnout. "Pottawattamie County had 42 same-sex marriage applications from April 27th to April 29th. Of the 42, 24 were from out-of-state, most from Nebraska. That speaks volumes to me,"

So it was quiet and peaceful inside the courthouse, how about outside the courthouse? Mike and Hersh comment "there were a few (protesters) on Monday, April 27th. They were out front praying. On Thursday, April 30th there were a group of about 12 Neo-Nazi protestors. They were peaceful and there was no violence...but the sight of Nazi's gave reason for pause. The courthouse employees on Thursday were much happier to see us than the Nazi's. We had to pick up our license on Thursday due to the three day waiting period."

David and Thomas share their thoughts about what was going through their mind about the Neo-Nazis and walking up the courthouse steps. "They didn't deter us or any of our wedding party. I was given a prior notice that there would be protesters so I alerted all our party to use the back entrance of the courthouse if they wanted. Our strong willed family and friends wouldn't be intimidated by these intolerant homophobes and we all entered through the main entrance where we gathered between the front door and the protesters to wait till all family and friends arrived safely with a show of force. We outnumbered the freaks. As David and I walked past the protesters we stopped and

kissed in front of them and this silenced them momentarily." At any point did you feel that you wanted to say go home your fight is over? "No need, you could see it was obvious who won that day."

What was the wedding like at the courthouse? What events took place after the ceremony? David and Thomas share some details. "Judge Mark Eveloff presided over our ceremony that was attended by more than 30 family and friends. David's two sisters drove up from Wichita, Kansas the day before, much to David's surprise. I kept my mouth shut and it was worth it, he was speechless, but only for a brief moment. About 50 guests including family, friends, and neighbors attended a casual vet elegant luncheon at our residence in Council Bluffs. Then following the luncheon we went to the Max where Steven Knox and Rita Mohn organized a super awesome reception with white linens, big gay cake, and all the fun wedding reception type of stuff. It was very touching for them to do this for us for we told everyone we was going to have a reception later this summer and our friends wanted to do something for us now and we were so honored and touched by this gesture. A couple hundred family, friends, and work friends joined us for an afternoon of good food, cocktails, and fun activities facilitated by our friend Mark the DJ at the Max." What does this slip of paper mean to you now? "This paper is a symbol of our commitment to each other as well as a legal document protecting us as a family.'

Since David and Thomas had resided in Nebraska prior to their move to Iowa awhile ago, this was asked. If you were a Nebraska resident, would running over here and getting married in Iowa be the same as being a resident of Iowa in your opinion? "That depends on if the state of Nebraska recognizes a same sex marriage from another state such as in Washington D.C. where they just voted to honor same sex relationships from other states. If it isn't recognized then it is legally useless."

The GLBT community knows the outcome of California with same-sex marriage. Mike and Hersh respond about backlash here in Iowa and at the court-house. "None at the court house, although conservative politicians, radical religious groups and the Nazis have banded together to try to overturn the decision. I've read about it in the press. The backlash will get more pronounced in the fall and in January when the legislature is in session."

David and Thomas have their two cents worth about the situation that happened California happening here in Iowa and if it was a reason to go get married in the first week of legal same-sex marriage. "Yes, we waited the three days and were the first to marry in Pottawattamie County Courthouse that Thursday. Yes this is a concern. It was sad to see a state that has always been in the fore front of social progression take a step in the wrong direction. Iowa has always been a socially progressive state. For example, Iowa was one of the first to allow multiracial marriage and women the right to own property. The state motto says our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain. We have two years before this issue can be challenged in the legislation and brought to a vote for the people so we have time to show Iowans the positive implications of same sex marriage. We need to be active in political campaigns of those who support us and always maintain a positive image in our neighborhoods. Take a page from Harvey Milk, we need to stand up and be counted. Come out and let everyone know you are gay/lesbian and proud. People tend to vote in favor of an issue if it affects someone they know.

So what will happen of these two couples? What are they going to do now after being hitched? Mike and Hersh have been key people in getting the Council Bluffs Community Alliance going and growing. They have been very active in the group and having the group is out in the community more often and joining forces with other GLBT organizations to help keep marriage equality in Iowa. "Getting the ruling from the Iowa State Supreme Court was the easy part. The hard part will be keeping the equal rights now that we have them. That's why it's important to support One Iowa. One Iowa is the only state-wide organization fighting to keep marriage equality. Equality does not come cheaply. I encourage everyone in the Omaha metro area to donate generously to One Iowa. They are found on the Internet. One mistake that was made in California was that only a small percentage of gays and lesbians contributed to the "No on Prop 8 Campaign". One Iowa needs as many donors as possible to help fight the backlash." With being part of the Council Bluffs Community Alliance and being interviewed by the local media when gay marriage in lowa freshly be-came legal, what impression did you want to make? "That marriage equality was about protection all Iowa families and all Iowa children, including the families and children of gays and lesbians."

David and Thomas are doing similar things. "From here we become more active in our communities and neighborhoods to spread a positive image of same sex relationships. We used our connections to spread the word that yes the guys next door are a couple who we know and respect, who deserve the same rights that we all have come to cherish."

As of May 29th, Pottawattamie County Courthouse has received 82 marriage license applications and was approved.
