ABA, NEA Come Out for Gay Rights

LGBT causes got a major boost last week when two large professional associations announced their support for same-sex marriage recognition.

The National Education Association (NEA) and the American Bar Association (ABA) recently adopted resolutions supporting gay rights.

The ABA, at a Chicago conference last week, called on lawmakers to repeal the Defense of Marriage Act. While the association did not take an overt stand on marriage equality, they called the active law, which bars federal agencies from recognizing

legal same -sex marriages, unfair.



Estelle Rogers, a member and consultant on civil rights, told the ABA's

newsletter, "This is a very modest recommendation, some would even say a fair recommendation,"

In San Diego, the NEA came out for LGBT causes, aligning itself with the community on DOMA, the passage of an employee nondiscrimination act, the Uniting American Families Act, and the Domestic Partnership Benefits and Obligations Act.

Additionally, the NEA said the association opposes same-sex marriage bans while supporting individual religions' decisions to refuse to perform them and individual states' rights to decide whether "marriage," "civil union," or "domestic partnership" are appropriate in defining a legally recognized relationship.

Don Randolph Honored

Don "Flowers" Randolph was honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award and a Congressional Commendation during the 29th Coronation of the Imperial Court of Nebraska in recognition of his pioneering work in the area of gay rights and AIDS awareness.

In 1963 Don joined the US Navy, serving until 1966 when he was discharged because of his sexual orientation. He became an advocate for gay rights and in 1984 was named to the National Board of Gay Rights National Lobby. Don's fundraising generated \$3000 to provide the sound system for the first National AIDS Vigil and \$10,000 for the GNRL. In 1986 he was named to the National **Board of Human Rights** Campaign Fund and went to Washington D.C to lobby



Congress including Senator Virginia Smith of Nebraska who stated "there are no homosexuals in my district."

In 1979, Don joined with gay men from Lincoln to form The Imperial Court of Nebraska. The first Coronation of an Emperor and Empress was held in 1980. Don Randolph was chosen by the board to serve as "Regent One" and occupied the throne until Gary West was crowned Emperor I. Don served as President of ICON for 10 years, as Treasurer for 2 years, and was on the Board of Governors for 26 years leading ICON to become the premier fundraising organization in the area. In 1996 Don was named "President Emeritus" and "King Father" and in 2003 he was appointed to serve as Emperor 23

In 1983 Don founded the PWA Emergency Assistance Fund (the Flowers Fund) which still provides financial help to those living with HIV. The Flowers Fund has paid out over \$200, 000 through grants to Nebraska AIDS Project, to PWA's and to the UNMC HIV Clinic.

Don was a founding member of Nebraska AIDS Project and served on the Board of Directors for six years. He served as the Interim Director of NAP for 8 months and for 13 years on the management staff, including Director of Wellness Center Programs and Buildings Supervisor for all five buildings of NAP.



His service to the Nebraska AIDS project has been recognized through many awards including the Red Ribbon Appreciation Award from Nebraska AIDS Project 2004, an Appreciation Award from the All-lowa AIDS Benefit, a Community Service Award in 1986, and in 2008 the Board of Directors Award.

Don has received multiple awards including several from University of

Nebraska Medical Center for on-going support of programs of the Viral Syndrome Clinic, from the State of Nebraska in Recognition of Outstanding Service to Nebraska HIV Care and Prevention Consortium 2000-2003, The Shadowcliff Boys Award 1998, AIDS Interfaith Network Jonathan C. Goldsmith Caregiver Award 1997, PRIDE Award of Excellence 2008, The Barbie's Lifetime Achievement Award 1991, and UNO Gay Awareness Organization Special Recognition Award 1979

Don's involvement in Omaha's gay community began in 1972 when he joined the Omaha Meatpackers, a gay leather and levi organization. By 1980 the Meatpackers became a major fundraising group, raising money for over 20 years through "Skag Drag" and the "Foolish Follies." The Omaha Meatpackers and their supporters will present a special "Meatpacker Reunion" show this coming Labor Day, September 7, at the MAX, with all proceeds going to support programs of the Nebraska AIDS Project.

MCC Omaha Helps Cool the Homeless

As temperatures hit the 100 degree mark in Omaha, MCC volunteers hit the streets of downtown Omaha with tubs and coolers full of ice cold bottled water. Making stops at 24 & Leavenworth, 14 & Douglas, and 17 & Nicholas, MCC passed out nearly 200 bottles of ice water to the poor and homeless. Volunteers became more aware of the needs of the homeless as they watched two dozen men and women stand on a treeless

corner for nearly an hour waiting for a van that would take them to the Open Door Mission for a meal and a bed for the night. When the van finally came, there was room for all but one, who was left to stand on the street corner for another hour.

MCC also serves the needs of the poor and homeless by joining with the 12 other faith



communities that make up Neighbors United to provide a hot meal on Saturdays in the social hall of First Baptist Church. These meals serve up to 200 people each week.

MCC OMAHA TEAMS WITH HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha continues to establish alliances in the greater community as they have teamed with Habitat for Humanity as a house in central Omaha is renovated to provide a home for a family in need. Volunteers have provided food for those working on the renovations on this house and look forward to more extensive involvement in the future. MCC Omaha already has a close working relationship with Habitat ReStore and have provided excess and usable building supplies to help fund future homes for those in need.






Life Without Pills

Many of my clients – at some point consider anti-depressants. You
know anti-depressants: they're those
pretty little pills that make ugly,
weepy people into happy, beautiful
people who run through fields of
flowers (at least on TV commercials). It sounds too good to be true,
and often, it is.

Anti-depressants are very helpful for lots of people, but they are not the end-all for depression. I'm not a doctor, and yet I've seen that for



• Do some kind of exercise every day; at least 20 minutes every day. It needn't be the gym, but it needs to be something strenuous enough to get an endorphin lift: these "natural" anti-depressants are better than anything money can



- Do not isolate. This is important: even if initially you don't enjoy it, force yourself to be around people. Slowly increase your social contacts and you'll be less self-obsessed and won't feel so alone in your sadness.
- Force yourself to say hello to at least 3 people a day.
 Practice being approachable and pleasant-looking. This may sound obvious, but many people look unapproachable and aren't aware of it. If you feel really brave, you could even practice flirting a little bit!
- Avoid alcohol or recreational drugs. Alcohol is a depressant and you know where that takes you, and the aftermath of recreational drugs is often intense sadness and loneliness.
- No anonymous sex. This is not the time to put yourself out there and risk rejection or have sex that leaves you feeling empty and lonely.
- Get out in nature, be around trees, flowers and plants...or the ocean, or the desert. Let Mother Nature work her soothing magic on you...plus you can check out all those good-looking men and women in jogging/hiking shorts.
- Spend time around animals, if you like them (and if you don't, I feel sorry for you). If you have animals, this is the time to let them comfort you. Even goldfish are good listeners...you can imagine what they'd say! Animals are proven depression lifters. No animals of your own? Volunteer to walk





a friend's dog or hang out with friends who have pets...petting a sweet dog or an adorable cat can be more effective than any anti-depressant.

- Watch what you eat and drink. If you're tempted to eat junk food, (1) get yourself out of the house and eat at a healthy place or (2) buy some healthy food and make a nice, simple meal for yourself. A junk food diet contributes to depression (especially the highs and lows of large amounts of sugar and caffeine), so feed yourself healthy stuff and you'll feel less depressed.
- Make yourself get dressed and leave the house, even on non-work days. Stay in bed if you're tired, but not if you're sad. My rule of thumb is: it's okay to stay in bed for the morning, but not for the whole day.
- If you're depressed, let yourself have a good cry whenever you can. It's cathartic, and you're likely to feel better after. Keeping strong emotions inside is not good for your mind or body.

Sometimes, depression or anxiety is too much for us. If you have suicidal feelings, pay attention to them. Do not ignore them. This is a sign that you need professional help. Call your doctor, therapist or go to the nearest hospital emergency room if you experience suicidal feelings. Get professional help! Don't try to do it alone. Get professional help.

And, as a last resort, get off your butt and volunteer. When you give to others, you feel good about yourself and you put yourself in social situations where you're likely to meet like-minded people...and what could be better than that?

The 'Broken Truth' of a Band

Broken Truth began its roots in October of 2007 with the chance happening of a work project for OBI Creative. The chance happening was T.J. Johnson and Jared Rodehorst teamed together on the project. The project was to create a

holiday ecard for OBI Creative. From this project, the two discovered their passion for music and from there worked together to create Broken Truth.



What is Broken Truth? Old Turtle and The Broken Truth was a children's book written by Douglas Wood. From the book, Wood has created messages of tolerance, understanding, love, and universal connection which are a foundation of Broken Truth and its original song creations. Lead vocalist T.J. Johnson opens up and explains Broken Truth.

After reading your Myspace page of how the group had formed. when T.J. met Jared while creating an original song for a holiday e-card, did you two think Broken Truth would gather up two more guys and be at the point you're at today? Johnson,

"When Jared and I met with our first project I think we were both hopeful that something more than the project we were working on would happen. When we both met we set out to write modern day big band music. I laugh now, but I really wanted to have a band called Big Daddy T and the Pops. The funny thing about our initial direction as a writing team is that we quickly moved past the idea of writing for a big band and found the current voice and style that can be heard with our first album, "At the Waters Edge" released in January of 2009." The group has lost and gained band members over time. It was difficult and a process to replace the members who moved on to other ventures. When did Alex and Andrew come on board? How did they or what were they doing when they came into the group? "It wasn't too long into working together that both Jared and I realized that we had something interesting with our shared sound. We had been working on a couple of songs that I had written on the free old upright piano that sits in my living room and after a couple of writing sessions we both voiced that we should reach out to other musicians and fill out the sound that we were just starting to create. Jared worked, at the time, at Schmidt Music and through his work relationships was introduced to Alex who was dating Anna (his new wife) and she mentioned Alex might be interested in collaborating. Andrew on the other hand was an admired musician that I had heard about through working with our sound engineer, Jeremy Garret. We had worked with Jeremy on our album, "At the Waters Edge", and he knew that we were going to be losing our original lead guitar player and songwriting collaborator, Matt Karsten. Matt had to leave us in the middle of truly forming how our audiences here know us as his wife landed a GREAT job that also opened up the opportunity for Matt to return to school and finish out his degree. This was a huge blow to our band and it wasn't easy to replace Matt. We met with 4 or 5 potential replacements that either answered our ads on craigslist

Diane's Story

"Well, sweet cheeks, in my country, I'm called a Queen so I outrank you. Put up the tray, bitch!"


Blonde Humor

or we heard about from people within the Omaha music community. We went through 2 replacement guitar players before we connected with Andrew. Andrew had been working with a couple of local bands (still is) and when I voiced our desire for someone that could help take our sound to the next level, our sound engineer Jeremy Garret introduced us to Andrew and in a matter of a late night after hours party conversation, we achieved the current strategic noise makers and the current band membership we call Broken Truth."

The other members and their talents are Jared Rodehorst, bass and vocals, Alex Wimmer, drums, Andrew Malashock, guitar, and T.J. while being the vocalist also plays keys. What is each members background? (was anyone instructed, played in school, came from other bands, etc.) "Jared has his degree in music composition, Alex is a high school band instructor, and Andrew recently graduated from UNO with his music major and is a classically trained guitar player. I'm really the "odd man out" in the group as the only training I've had has been vocal training. The music itself and what I accomplish with the keys is all by ear. I can find middle C in a matter of a second but after that I'm pretty much blind. I hear what I play first and then play what I hear. The rest of the guys definitely make the professional and seasoned feel to our sound happen" answers T.J.

From Broken Truth's Myspace page is says "Each member of "Broken Truth" brings a unique passion and love for music with the hope that their musical creations will provide a force of positive connection." Can you describe this positive connection, what is the positive connection? Johnson, "I think a positive connection is felt differently by each individual, so the interpretation or meaning can be so many things. For me the positive connection is when audiences really hear what we are say-

ing with our music and see how we interact with each other and with them and that each individual feels welcome and a part of the greater noise we create together. This is the positive connection for me! We have been so blessed by Nick Hudson and his club, Nomad Lounge, in Omaha's historical Old Market to bring each Wednesday night the positive connection that we value in our sound. We, with Nick and his staff, have been working to provide music lovers an atmosphere and vibe that welcomes the diversity and uniqueness that is offered in Omaha's local art's scene. We have taken our band's mantra of sharing our time, talents and treasures with those that seek this from us and have been trying to live a "positive" example as a human being and help to inspire "connection" and help bridge the gaps that divide us."

What are the band's rehearsals like? Are some nights hell and some nights the practice session just flows? "Lately we've been using our weekly performance at Nomad Lounge to refine the set list that we established after the launch of our first Album. To get to where we are now required about 4 months of meeting weekly for a couple of hours and going over the music from the album and picking a couple of new songs to keep us fresh. We all work together pretty easily and for the most part the guys know exactly what to pull out and play on top of what was created on the keys. We typically just groove until one of us puts up our heads, smiles and mouths "This is fucking good". We try to keep it simple and go with our guts and what we like. We spend a lot of time talking about the structure of our music, a song, our set lists, etc. to ensure we provide our fans with an experience that is easy to listen to and best represents us as a collective."

Broken Truth creates its own songs, so as a group, how long of a collaborative effort in time, say hours, does this take? Will

there be instances where a song will begin in the mind of one member and be completed in the mind of another member? T.J. "We've seen songs take 10 minutes to write collectively and some that require a few meetings to further develop. Our process, typically, is that I come to the group with lyrics, the lead line melody and piano parts already written. The same time requirements are true with me - some songs take me minutes and some months. But for the most part, due to the fact that all of these guys have amazing training and understand music theory, we can produce a song that has the "Broken Truth Sound" in a few hours. We play live all of the time and we like to experiment, so some songs we started to play one way now have a new twist. As we evolve so does how we play and as we evolve as a band how we play together is also in flux. I think the interesting thing about us as a writing collective is that we're still pretty green in the process and I'm encouraged to see what will happen to how we write together with more time to focus on our music and the funding to produce it."

So after the rehearsals are the gigs. What was Broken Truth's worst gig? What was the best gig? "I would have to say that our worst gig was when we got involved in a show that was produced by a group that gets bands from Myspace and then invites them to play but they have to sell a minimum of 30 or some tickets. We arrived and all of the bands had members with the average age being 14. We haven't worked with this promoter again. As for our best gig, I think I had the most fun at our CD release party at the Waiting Room when we played with my good friends Vinyl Haze. Our largest attended performance so far has to be Nebraska Gay Pride. But my most enjoyable times

performing are Wednesday nights at Nomad. The place and staff make me feel like I'm home with the guys playing in the basement."

Since The Gayzette is a GLBT community newspaper, obviously, who here is "family"? Have you ever played at the Max(if so please describe the experience)? Would Broken Truth like to take the stage at the Max for one evening? Johnson, "are you serious. The Gayzette is a homosexual publication, who knew! And the Max is a place where those homosexuals gyrate their sweaty well kept bodies to that techno dance beat that makes stoners crave glow sticks!?!? What is world coming too? Damn these modern days, this sure makes a maverick angry! I, and my boyfriend Paul (backup vocals), are the only homosexuals in the bunch. You can imagine my surprise when I found out that most of the band members are heterosexuals. I often ask them about when they knew they were heterosexual and most of them comment that they knew from the time they were born. Crazy I know! Broken Truth hasn't played the Max in our full band format. Jared and I did a small show around Christmas to help better launch our January Album. The full group, this last time with a replacement drummer as Alex was on his honeymoon, played Nebraska Pride on the main stage both nights. Our sound is universal and we don't discriminate on places that want us to perform. If the Max wants to have us we would play for sure, our fans are very loval and diverse so I'm sure they would enjoy the experience of having us perform at the Max. As for our past experience at the Max, when Jared and I played with my good friend Michael Ingmansen, we were treated like royalty. The Max staff has always taken good care of me and anyone I've been out with."

The tracks may mean different emotions and feelings from one person to the next. It is how you connect with it. The track, "The Way That I've Changed", has you feeling that there is something you have to say to those who don't understand, or the way you feel about something and need to explain it. The person could be a best friend or an ex-lover that just needs to have a heart to heart with you about how you feel about them now versus the way you did back then. Another track "Know The Way" can have you feeling on a mission to know where you are now from where you came from then. The song talks about man, but you can substitute it for anything personally affecting you in life. The truth holds that it takes time. "Your Own Song" spoke volumes with the first words of the song being about what those say to each other when they disagree. The following the message is relayed that just don't get caught up in it, there is more to life, move on, you don't always have to win.

Judge: Let Florida GSA Meet

A federal judge bypassed the objections of a school district on Friday to rule that a gay-straight alliance must be allowed to meet on the campus of Yulee High School in Northern Florida and enjoy the same privileges as other student groups, reports the Florida Times-Union.

U.S. district judge Henry Lee Adams issued a permanent injunction that prohibits the Nassau County school district from forcing the GSA to change its name or cease its advocacy for LGBT people. He also ordered that the district must not retaliate against students or staff members involved in the lawsuit.

In February, Hannah Page and Jacob Brock, two student members of the Yulee High School GSA, sued the school district after officials refused to allow their group to meet unless it changed its name. Officials said that the GSA violated the district's abstinence-only policy and presented potential disruptions.

Judge Adams issued a preliminary injunction in March that allowed the GSA to continue to meet in the spring.

Page and Brock, who said they were "grateful" about the decision in a statement, were represented by the American Civil Liberties Union, which will be paid approximately \$40,000 in attorney and court fees by the school district.
